FARFIELD MILL

If you have not been to the Mill lately, you will have some surprises.

It was the Dover family who lived at Farfield House and Oakdene who ran the mill for a hundred years from its opening in 1837. So we have decided to call the new gallery which puts on display work of those who have studios in the Mill, the Dover Gallery. This is close to the entrance.

As you go further in, there is a present a 'bodger' at work, making the most beautifully crafted wooden chairs and other objects out of fresh wood, using only traditional tools. No electricity here!

At Easter however this area will be transformed into another Gallery where the work of 20 or 30 artists will be on display and available for sale. The work will include fine art, photography, glass, jewellery, silk paintings, ceramics, textiles and many others.

What else is there to see?

The studios are on this floor and the floor below. These are rented out to local artists. Do not expect to see an artist busy in every studio at all times, as they are not obliged to work there 7 days a week! However any visitor can ask to go into a studio to see the work on display.

The shop sells not only products made on site but also some wonderful gifts made by people living in the area and the standard of work is very professional. The range includes jumpers, hats, scarves, bags and slippers: there are books and jewellery: there are also home made foods, such as preserves, sweets and cakes; there is a wonderful range of hand-made greetings cards for all occasions. The shop is worth a visit for a

special present and there is of course no entry charge for the shop!

The Café is certainly worth a visit, for a morning coffee, a snack or a full meal. Everything is home-made, and quality is of the highest.

NOTE

From Saturday 23 March, the Mill will be open 7 days a week from 10.30 am to 5 pm (last entry 4.30)

We are so lucky that many of those most personally affected around the mill itself have supported the project from the start, with four of the Farfield residents becoming Trustees and three more becoming members. The upheaval caused by the building work was a trial and we thank everyone for their patience. Our patience was sorely tried because in dealing with those authorities who are in a position to say yea or nay, time does not seem to be important. A magic wand would sometimes have been useful. If the Trust has been slow in dealing with a problem, it was usually because 'they' were holding everything up, Can you believe it took nine month's wrangling between the electrician and the fire authority to decide whether or not certain external lights should remain on day and night? authorising letter arrived. The lights could be turned off! I guess such experiences are not altogether unusual. We are sorry for the problems such incidents have caused.

We get many congratulations but we do of course get many criticisms, inevitable when major changes are taking place. It must be said that some people would prefer that Farfield Mill should become a desolate ruin. It is a reasonable point of view. We believe the future is as important, perhaps more important, than the present. We do not expect everyone to agree with us and we can understand their anger when looking to the future means present discomfort and that leads to disgruntlement.

Only this week the shops in Kirkby Lonsdale are beginning to admit that the arrival of Booths was not an unqualified disaster, for it has brought more people into the town and improved road lay-out and parking. At Farfield the entrance from the main road is now safe, and backing every time you meet another car is no longer necessary. The drainage system which has been broken and inadequate for many years, will be repaired and upgraded this year thanks to pressure from the Trust. There is more to do and we will continue to try to explain the reasons for problems, even if we are not always in a position to remove them. We do what we can. Forgive us when we fail, if you can.

HAYFEVER

This might seem an odd time to be writing about hayfever, but if you read on, you will see that the message of Traditional Chinese Medicine about this is to strengthen the body outside the pollen season in order to have fewer problems during the season.

Hayfever, or seasonal allergic rhinitis, develops as a result of an antigenantibody reaction to inhaled pollen in the mucous membranes of the nose. This leads to symptoms such as sneezing, runny nose, swelling of the mucous membranes, itchy throat, itchy red eyes and possibly sinusitis. This is described in Traditional Chinese Medicine as an "invasion of Wind". Conventional treatment might be with anti-histamines or steroids by nasal inhalation. In Traditional Chinese Medicine, one would seek to "expel Wind" and in acupuncture treatment this would typically involve points at the top of the back and on the hand and wrist.

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The next question is why a particular person should be susceptible to "invasions of Wind" whereas others are not. In "The Practice of Chinese Medicine" (Churchill Livingstone 1994) Giovanni Maciocia puts forward the theory that this is due to deficiency of the body's defensive Oi. (Oi, pronounced "chee" is energy which is the source of all movement in the body and also powers the body's defensive systems.) The organs which are most involved are the Lungs, because it is the respiratory tract which is compromised, and the Kidneys, which are fundamental to the long-term management of the body's Qi. (Recall that in Traditional Chinese Medicine the organs are written with capital letters to remind us that in this system we are thinking of somewhat different functions.)

So what can be done to strengthen the body's defensive Qi? Here are some suggestions, the idea being to start now in order to be better prepared when the pollen season starts:

 general Qi tonics include whole grains especially oats, quinoa and rice (you may find it helpful to avoid wheat flour), small amounts of meat and fish, root vegetables, especially sweet potato and watercress (organic watercress is available from the Herb Stall 015395 21965).

- improve the flow of Qi and tonify the Lungs by getting sufficient regular exercise outdoors.
- bee products, such as pollen and royal jelly are potent Qi tonics. There is also the suggestion that ingestion of such products improves the body's resistance to inhaled pollen. For the latter purpose eating local untreated honey is often recommended.
- when practising yoga or T'ai Chi pay special attention to breathing exercises, exercises which act on the Qi of the lower abdomen and those which strengthen the lower back.
- some authorities recommend food supplements, for example Patrick Holford suggests taking a multivitamin and multimineral supplement, an antioxidant complex

and 3000g of vitamin C per day (see "The Optimum Nutrition Bible", Piatkus, 1997). He is extremely prosupplement and you may wish to be more moderate than this. Ask for advice at the Sedbergh pharmacy.

Consider preventative treatment.
 Acupuncture can work specifically on the body's defensive Qi system.
 Homoeopathy would also have something to offer.

This is an example of the Chinese philosophy of treating both the manifestation (the symptoms) and the root (deficiency of defensive Qi). The principle is to treat the symptoms when they arise, otherwise work on strengthening the defensive Qi.

Just a reminder about the Xing Yi Five Elements day at 10 am on March 9th in the People's Hall (see article and advert in last month's Lookaround). Hayfever sufferers are welcome: the Lungs and the Kidneys correspond to two of the five elements so suitable exercises will be demonstrated and practised.

CITIZENS ADVICE BUREAU

Q. I bought a television on interest-free credit. Even though I had the money at the time it seemed a good idea, meaning I could spread my purchase over 12 months. I knew that, in order to avoid paying interest, I had to pay the balance by the end of the interest-free term but my payment was one day late. Now the loan company says I must pay interest on the whole amount of the loan, another £600, which is almost as much as the television cost in the first place. This seems very unfair. What can I do?

A. It does indeed seem very unfair but will no doubt have been included as a 'term and condition' in the small print of your credit agreement. You could try writing to the lender and asking them to reconsider, as a gesture of goodwill, because the payment only just missed the deadline. However, unless they are a member of the Finance and Leasing Association (FLA), they are under no obligation to settle the agreement and waive the interest. If they are a member of the FLA they subscribe to a Code of Practice which includes allowing a short grace period at the end of the interest-free option period for the final payment to be made. A full list of members can be found at www.fla.org.uk. The FLA also resolves complaints against their members under the Code.

Yours is not an uncommon situation. Many people are not fully aware of how the 'interest-free' credit system works. It is not actually interest-free at all. Rather

COURSES ON THE CLOUGH at Farfield Mill

it is a credit agreement with interest but with an initial interest-free period. When you purchase items in this way, the instalments are set at a rate that means the whole amount is not paid off by the end of the interest-free period. In order to avoid paying the interest, you need to pay off the remaining balance by the date that the interest-free period expires. Bear in mind that the interest payable, should you decide to stick with the credit agreement, is payable on the full purchase price of the item - not just the remaining balance and is often at a very high rate of interest.

Often, without checking the agreement carefully, it is not very clear on what date your loan began as this will not necessarily be the same date that you purchased the goods. Make sure you contact the lender in good time to find out the date that the payment is due, how much is due and how and where you pay it. Some lenders (FLA members) will

contact you near the time the interest-free loan expires and provide you with the information but other will not. It is advisable, especially if you are paying by cheque, to make sure the creditors

receive this at least 10 days in advance of the due date. If you can, send your payment by recorded delivery, to reduce the risk of your payment going astray.

As with any agreement, make sure you read the terms and conditions at the time of signing and ask if anything is unclear.

clearing goes on, the road is shut.

And so it goes, my friends. Never a dull moment! But, it's a time to thank God for life. A season of thankfulness. So, stay healthy. See you soon.



South Lakeland District Council Concessionary Fares Scheme 200212003 From April 2002 the Council

- will ONLY provide the statutory half-fare bus pass.

PROPERTY MATTERS

It looks as though there is going to be wet and windy weather for a while yet so to prevent major damage there are some relatively simple things you can do to protect your property.

Make sure guttering and drainpipes are securely fixed, not cracked and clear of debris or leaves and drains and gulleys are not clogged.

If you have a flat roof, check the drain is clear and the roof is not covered with leaves which will block the drain, otherwise keep off! Put garden furniture away or tie it down and fix any loose fence panels.

Have a look at your trees. If any look rotten or are leaning badly call in a tree surgeon. Check sheds, doors and windows to make sure they close securely and will not be blown off in a strong wind. Whatever happens, do not go outside to make repairs during a storm, you could be hit by flying or falling debris, wait till its over.

Check the aerial or satellite dish is still attached, the roof is still in one piece, there are no loose or missing tiles or slates, gutters and downpipes are still attached, trees are still standing. No need to climb up ladders or onto the roof, look from ground level, use binoculars if you have them and if in doubt or there is damage contact your builder. Do not do anything to put your own safety at risk.

If there is damage, get in touch with your insurer immediately, this starts the claim process. Get a list of their recommended tradesmen and use them to carry out emergency repairs if your safety or further damage to the property is threatened.

The loss assessor will be busy dealing

with claims and probably will not get to you immediately, so, if you really have to start cleaning up take photos of the damage before you start, make a note of the date and write down what you have taken pictures of.

Keep any damaged items you are going to claim for as evidence and get at least two quotes for any work required and keep receipts for any work done or replacement goods purchased.

Naturally, what has been said above assumes that you have buildings and contents insurance cover for flood and storm damage, make sure your policies cover you fully.

If you want to know if you live in flood area you can ask for a report.

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350TH ANNIVERSARY OF QUAKERS - FOX'S PULPIT

George Fox visited Sedbergh during Whit week 1652, arriving at Brigflatts on June 6th. He stayed the night with Richard Robinson, the local blacksmith who was also known to be the leader of a group of people called Seekers.

The next day Robinson took George Fox to a meeting of the local seekers at Borrett Farm the home of Justice Gervase Benson. It was at this meeting that Fox realised the fulfilment of a vision that he had had on Pendle Hill near Lancaster "of a people waiting to be gathered in the name of the Lord".

During the rest of the week he stayed at Draw Well, the home of the Blaykling family who were also seekers. On the Wednesday George Fox preached to a large gathering of people in the churchyard of St. Andrews in Sedbergh. It was the day of the Great hiring fair, and Sedbergh was extremely busy. On June 13th there was to be a large meeting of

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the seekers on Firbank Fell. The seekers were people who had ceased worshipping at the established churches, and were worshipping on the basis of silence allowing the living spirit of God to speak to them, and to guide them as a community. George Fox never entered the Tiny Chapel which stood on the Fell, it is no longer there, having been blown down in a storm in 1836.

In the afternoon George Fox stood on the crag, now known as Fox's pulpit, and 'preached the everlasting Kingdom'. He spoke for three hours to about one thousand people. His message was that "Christ had come to teach the people himself", we did not need priests in the form of man, and in quiet meeting for worship without rite or ceremony there was the highest of all priests in the midst. the risen Christ himself. We would come to know Christ our teacher, our counsellor, our shepherd to feed us, and our bishop, to oversee us. We would know Christ our prophet to open to us. and our bodies are the temples of God and Christ for them to dwell in.

Many people that afternoon were so convinced that this was the truth, that they took this message from the fell side and preached it round the world.

Each year around June time the Quakers have a meeting for worship, and also on a separate occasion there is an ecumenical service. Both services are always well attended.

Today Firbank fell is visited by hundreds of people every year, some tracing their Quaker roots, some searching for deeper meaning to their lives, they read the plaque and take up the challenge "Let your lives speak".

THE KENYA EXPERIENCE!

That night we built a fire and drove to the lodge for a few beers. When we returned we got the shock of our lives, there laid by the fire was the biggest hyena I've ever seen. He slowly got up and ambled into the bushes, but, he wasn't alone. As we shone our head torches into the bushes there were lots of pairs of eyes watching us. We did our best to scare them off then got into our tents. Me, the lucky one, got the tent closest to the bushes and after about half an hour I heard something sniffing my tent! I turned my torch on hoping to scare it off. Well, whatever, it disappeared. But it wasn't my torch that

did it, it was the roar of a lion which didn't seem that close, but our very own David Attenborough decided it was, so we all had to get in the land rover to try and sleep for what was left of the night.

As we drove out of our camp that morning, on the other side of the bushes less than 50 metres away, what should be laid in the grass? - two female lions and 3 cubs! Was I glad I got in the land rover the night before.

The rest of the day was spent driving around the Masai Mara, taking pictures of all the animals. Once back in Nairobi, we went to a restaurant called Carnivores, where we sampled most of the animals that we had seen that day.

I would recommend a safari to anyone but camping out on the Masai Mara isn't for the faint hearted! As for Nairobi itself, I wouldn't recommend it unless you like being harassed by kids high on glue, inhaling car fumes, dodgy food, and warm beer! Ginner

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SLDC CONCESSIONARY TRAVEL SCHEME 2002-2003 GENERAL ARRANGEMENTS

Half-fare Bus Passes - use and eligibility

- The Council's concessionary travel scheme is based on the provision of a statutory minimum bus pass, issued free of charge by the Council, which allows the claimant unlimited half price travel on the services of bus operators whose routes are registered with Cumbria County Council.
- South Lakeland District Council and the other District Councils within Cumbria have implemented a scheme, in consultation with Cumbria County Council, which allows eligible persons to use the bus pas throughout Cumbria, so long as the journey starts and finishes within the County of Cumbria.
- The scheme does not however apply to park and ride services or long distance coach services (for example National Express Services)
- The half fare bus pass is available to: Women aged 60 or over Men aged 65 or over Specific categories of disabled people - separate information is available
- from the Council.
 The Council will publish a list of participating operators at the time of issue.
- The bus pass will be valid between I April 2002 and 31 March 2003.

How do I obtain my bus pass?

By attending your local issuing centre in accordance with the timetable set out

below. You will need to take with you:

- (a) Men over 65 and women over 60 Your State Pension Book (or the pink card issued instead of it) or other proof of your age, e.g. passport, driving license, birth certificate.
- (b) Disabled or Blind people
 If you have registered with the Social
 Services Department of Cumbria County
 Council, your F69 Card. Disabled people
 who already have a Doctors Disablement
 Certificate should produce the certificate.

If you are not registered with the Social Services Department, but feel you meet the Disable Person's criteria, please enquire at the Issuing Centre or at the Amenities and Development Department

> (Telephone 01539 733333). You will be required to obtain a Disablement Certificate from your Doctor.

Can someone else collect my half-fare bus pass for me? NO - the issue of the half

fare bus pass will require the signature of the eligible person to confirm receipt and to satisfy both security and audit requirements. To claim your half fare bus pass ,you must, personally, attend the appropriate issuing centre.

She goes on to say that "The demands now being placed on the Hospice are growing and as we need to raise over £1 million per year and are almost totally reliant on voluntary donations, this donation is very much appreciated." She concludes by saying "We assure you that it will be used effectively to benefit all the children."

Our congratulations are extended to Sandra who wishes to say that her campaign goes on throughout the year and that with the continued support of customers she looks forward to being able to send another substantial contribution to aid the excellent work of the Derian House Children's Hospice.

DENT PARISH COUNCIL

A special request is made to the young people of Dent, aged 16 and under, down to babes in arms - would you come to the Queen's Jubilee event to be held in the school playground on Tuesday 4th June in the afternoon? In keeping with tradition, each one of you will receive a present to mark the occasion. We think there will be about 100 youngsters all told and it is hoped as many as possible will come to the presentation to receive a gift and good wishes for the future.

The advertisement for someone to take over running the youth club has brought a response and we are trying to get the Friday night sessions underway again.

The long awaited stage 3 of the cobble relaying of the stretch in Main Street from the Sun to the George and Dragon is making progress. The highway authority have confirmed it is in their programme. They were planning a start after Easter. The work is scheduled to last 8 weeks and will involve the road being closed at times. Drivers wishing to go through the village have to divert by Back Lane. Having considered the proposal the parish council has asked for the work to be delayed until October. Members felt that having been hit so hard last year by foot and mouth the tourist traders should get a season without interruption, to recover a little, and the proposed works would interfere with trade. We wait to hear if the postponement is agreed.

The parish has made representations for some time to YDNP to reduce the £1 minimum fee in the car park to a lower charge of 50p for the first hour. Visitors resent being charged such a large sum for short stays, which in turn reflects on Dent. Some recognition has been given by the National Park to the local unhappiness. The £1 minimum is to remain, but visitors can stay up to two hours for this sum instead of one. It does not produce what is really needed, but is a step in the right direction. The council proposes to continue to push for a smaller charge.

FARFIELD MILL ENTRANCE CHARGE

With some reluctance we have decided to make a charge for entry to the Arts and Heritage Centre at Farfield Mill. This will not of course apply to anyone coming on business and it will not apply to members or to anyone coming just to the shop or café.

We also want local people to have the opportunity of coming without being charged, so from time to time we shall put tokens in the Lookaround so they can be used by people living in the area. Just save these tokens to use whenever you wish to make a visit. They will last all year. More tokens will be printed in the Lookaround later in the year.

The normal charge will be £1.50 for adults and £1.00 for children of school age and senior citizens. Anyone coming just to make a purchase direct from one of the artists on site, will have their entrance fee refunded.

We are very reluctant to make this charge and we tried last year to manage with donations only. The average donation worked out at under 50 pence, some contributing nothing and others putting very much more than £1.50. This year, as we are taking on some part time staff, costs will go up, and this makes a standard charge necessary.

Yoga has much to offer by way of balance to our busy western lifestyle bringing self awareness and providing a means by which we may gain some personal space and perspective - it also provides numerous health benefits when practiced with awareness and attention to breathing.

The idea of " making space "will be the theme of our afternoon together. Physically, we will work to gently realign our bodies, allowing gravity to work with our physical structure rather than against it. The emphasis will be on comfort and un-doing tension and tightness.

Mentally and emotionally, we will use breath awareness and some simple breathing techniques to encourage a sense of balance and well-being.

Spiritually, we will make space for the experience of deep release / relaxation through stillness. A place where we may quietly become aware of a sense of reverence and joy.

There are no special requirements for the session and I can guarantee that we will not be standing on our heads or tying ourselves in knots - rather the opposite. The afternoon will be informal and fun-(as any of my ex-students will tell you). It is best not to eat a big meal beforehand, ideally leave a gap of 2 hours after eating.

You do need to bring a rug or mat to work and rest on, a small cushion for added comfort and a blanket or some extra clothing to keep you warm during relaxation. There will be opportunities for questions throughout as well as during refreshments at the end of the session. Please do make some space for yourself come along and find out a little more about yourself and about the ancient, living science of voga as well as supporting vital medical research.

MARCH GARDENING

Did you know that Celandines are very fashionable at the moment, particularly, I understand, with people who have town gardens with shaded borders under high walls? I am quite fond of Celandines myself. They pop up in most of the flower borders and decorate the moss in the lawn underneath the trees. Although they do spread rather enthusiastically they never become too tall or rank in my garden and they obligingly die down and disappear as other herbaceous perennials grow up in late spring. My Celandines are all of the ordinary wild type (Ranunculus ficaria) but newer exciting cultivars are also available for enthusiasts. R. ficaria 'Brazen Hussey' has glossy dark chocolate brown leaves and yellow flowers, R. ficaria albus has pale yellow petals which fade to white, as does the double flowered cultivar 'Double Mud' (also known as Double cream). R. ficario auranticus has deep coppery orange flowers and 'collarette' and 'Double bronze' both have double vellow flowers. 'Salmons White has pale green leaves and cream flowers whose petals are tinted blue/purple on their reverse sides

The name Celandine is derived from the Greek Khelidon which means swallow. This association is thought to relate to the arrival of the swallows in spring (although it seems that the birds are always rather late in my garden, if they are meant to arrive with the first celandine blooms). Ancient beliefs held that swallows hibernated under water through the winter months so perhaps the bright flowers were supposed to be a signal for the birds to wake up and emerge from the watery depths.

CUMBRIA WILDLIFE TRUST

Ospreys

For many years there have been occasional sightings of a large dark brown bird with creamy breast and under-parts flying over Killington Lake, with luck it might be suddenly seen to plunge feet first into the water and emerge with a fish gripped in its talons. This was an osprey, the fish hawk (pandion haliaetus) seen on migration. Sometimes it stays for several days there or at Lilymere. Such sightings have become more frequent since the four pairs breeding in Scotland were strictly protected and an increasing number of young birds were raised successfully.

Now at last a pair of ospreys bred last year at Bassenthwaite and two young were reared, thanks to the protection of the RSPB. So perhaps we may hope to see these magnificent birds more often on Killington or on the river Lune and perhaps one day a pair may stay behind to breed in one of the old pine trees round Lilymere.

How long it is since ospreys last bred in Cumbria is not certain, perhaps 200 years ago. Even as recently as 1939 they were described as extinct in Britain. The earliest reference we have is that of Francis Willoughby writing in 1676. "There is an acry of them in Whinfield Park, Westmorland, (near Penrith) preserved carefully by the Countess of Pembroke."

A pair was still there in 1787 when Clark wrote in his "Survey of the Lakes" "...there was a nest a few years ago of this bird at Whinfield Park." A little later, the Reverend W M Richardson drew up a

sketch of the zoology of the Ullswater district in which he records "the osprey or fishing eagle is frequently seen fishing; he is very bold, and in pursuit of his prey will dart down within 40 yards of a man." Unfortunately it was sometimes confused with the Sea Eagle or White-tailed Eagle (haliaeetus albicilla) which also still bred in Lakeland at the end of the 18th century. But the Erne, as it was also called, was normally a crag nesting bird and there are several "Heron Crags" which obviously preserve memories of its traditional evries. The osprey, however, is normally tree-nesting, building a huge pile of sticks.. Between the time of writing and publication of Lookaround, Bill Kenmir, the RSPB warden at Haweswater will have given members of the Wildlife Trust and Sedbergh School an account of how the osprey was helped to re-establish itself in Scotland, and now in Cumbria, thanks largely to the RSPB and the cooperation of landowners.
