- Has a learning disability, that is, a state of arrested or incomplete development of mind which includes significant impairment of intelligence and social functioning
- Would, if applied for the grant of a license to drive a motor vehicle, have an application refused (otherwise than on the grounds of misuse of drugs or alcohol)

(b) Benefits Agency - (DLA 95 leaflet) To be able to claim higher rate disability living allowance -

- You will be severely mentally impaired with severe behavioural problems and you need help with personal care both day and night -OR
- You are both deaf and blind and you need someone with you when outdoors; you must have a large amount of hearing loss and sight loss, but you do not have to be totally deaf or blind - OR
- You can only walk a short distance before you feel severe discomfort -OR
- The effort of walking can be dangerous for you OR

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S&D BEEKEEPERS ASSOCIATION

Sedbergh beekeepers held their second meeting of the year in the Friends' Meeting House at Brigflatts on Monday 10th February when eleven members listened to an entertaining, amusing, and informative talk and demonstration given by Ian Molyneux, the Northern Regional Bee Inspector. Ian is a very practical beekeeper with twenty colonies of his own in Bolton, whose responsibility for bee health and advice extends throughout the north of England north of Manchester. One of the Seasonal Bee Inspectors assisting him is Stewart Beattie of Furness Beekeepers' Association, a sister branch of Cumbria Beekeepers' Association.

Ian's talk covered the very useful technique of the "shook swarm". This is a method of achieving a number of benefits to the beekeeper and the bees by transferring the queen and all the adult bees from their present hive to another clean and sterile hive by shaking them (carefully!) from the brood frames of one on to those of the other. The bees are kidded into believing they have swarmed and like real swarms work their socks off to rebuild the colony's stock of brood and honey. As well as building all new clean and disease-free honeycomb on new frames, the bees appear to be even harder working at their honey gathering, and the final honey crops are reported to be bigger! A number of us will certainly be trying out this technique on at least one colony this season.

Ian then showed us the practical test to find out the level of resistance of the parasitic *Varroa* mite from which our bees now suffer, to the standard treatment



of the mite with the synthetic pyrethroids Bayvarol and Apistan. Misuse of these treatments by some continental and US beekeepers, and nature's own ability to adapt, have together started to produce resistant mites. Fortunately for us in Cumbria at the moment this is affecting only beekeepers in a few apiaries in Devon. The danger is of the resistance spreading! So a nation-wide monitoring exercise is being organised by the Bee Inspectors. Ian left us several test kits which we shall certainly use at the proper time to do our bit!

Ian finished with various tips and hints for better bee and apiary management and was loudly applauded at the end when our Chairman, John Tallon proposed the vote of thanks.

Our next meeting is our 7th Annual General Meeting, which will be held on Monday 10th March at 7.30pm in the Friends' Meeting House, Brigflatts.

VIOLENCE

What are your children watching? For some time many of us have said that there is a link between violent behaviour and violence seen on TV and videos and increasingly on computer games.

I recently read an article which included an interview with Lt. Col Dave Grossman. Col Grossman is one of the world's foremost experts in the field of human aggression and the roots of violence and crime. He is Professor of psychology at West Point Military Academy. The shootings on school campuses in the USA and the shooting in Erfurt in Germany are examples of crimes committed by people who have been desensitised by playing computer games of the shoot 'em variety. The Erfurt killings were particularly horrific in that the youth shot his victims in the face. As Col Grossman points out there have always been guns about especially

in the US and in Germany between the wars when the Nazis developed massive youth organisations but these brutal killings did not take place. The factor that has brought about a change has been the spread of computer/video games which require killing as the way to score and defeat the opposition.

In the past if you looked at the X-ray of the smoker's lung it was easily recognised from that of a non-smoker. Now it is possible to look at the brain scan of video-game player and that of a non player. In the non video-game player the scan shows a healthy brain full of colour showing an active brain. In the videogame player the scan shows no colour in the forebrain, the cognitive region, it is shut down. Only the mid brain, the emotional region, shows colour indicating that when they kill in their games they do not think about it. A further disturbing fact mention in the article is that the US military have been giving away free copies of the "games" that they use to train their soldiers to basically kill without too much thought. The hope is that will get more recruits into the army who have already been trained to kill. This "game" can be downloaded in Europe from the US web site. If the cognitive region of the brain is disengaged it might account not only for the violent behaviour which is on the increase in our society but why schools have such a problem trying to teach these youngsters. children is of great importance. The answer lies, in my view, not in fluoridating the water (which in any case targets tea-drinking adults) but in reducing children's consumption of sweets, sugary foods and soft drinks.

Everybody knows that these things are bad for children and not only for their teeth. Obesity is a problem, even amongst six-year olds. Hyperactivity and attention deficit disorder, food allergies and childhood asthma are all linked to the consumption of food additives. Acne is

unknown in some traditional societies where little processed food is eaten. Many harmful products: sweets, soft drinks, crisps, "snacks", and junk breakfast cereals are specifically aimed at children. Walker's Footballs are promoted using sporting imagery and contain tartrazine. Monster Munch contains several different colourings. Colourings are an ingredient in 78% of children's desserts. One chocolate manufacturer calculates, that on average in the UK, children consume 3 to 5 chocolate bars a week spending £62 per year. There is concern that children consume too much salt (on average twice as much as government recommendations) and too many artificial sweeteners (Diet Coke is not a healthy alternative). Not all children's snacks are GM free, though public opinion has moved even McDonald's to cut out GM potatoes. Given the amount of damage these products inflict (and the cost to the NHS in the USA obesity is the second largest killer after smoking) government warnings would be quite in order: SUGAR CAUSES TOOTH DECAY or THE COLOURINGS IN THIS PRODUCT MAY CAUSE HYPERACTIVITY IN CHILDREN. In fact, just the opposite is happening. Coca Cola and Irn Bru were allowed to advertise at school meals counters in Glasgow. In England, the Department of Education and Skills has a key skills website on which Nestlé sponsors the nutrition element. Nestlé was also allowed to advertise in the Labour Party Conference brochure last year. This is the

same company many of us have been

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boycotting for years because of the way they have pushed powdered babymilk in areas of the world where there is no clean water to mix it with. The World Health Organisation calculates that 1.5 million babies die each year because they are not breast-fed. Baby Milk Action has a pack called "Seeing through the Spin" to help young people understand branding (telephone 01223 46420, www. babymilkaction.org).

A young child's digestion has to work very close to maximum capacity in order to consume enough food to support growth. It is easily disrupted when energy is diverted to cope with life events, emotions, illness or immunization. (Watch out for additives in vaccines. I recently read of a childhood vaccine containing a mercury compound as a preservative.) At times of such stress a child should eat less to avoid overloading the digestive system. One of the main childhood disorders in Chinese medicine is "accumulation disorder" arising from





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digestive overload.

A child's diet should consist of simple (few ingredients), digestible, nourishing foods. Mealtimes should be regular and overfeeding avoided. Foods which frequently cause trouble are: cows' milk, undiluted fruit juices, gluten, food additives, refined sugar, peanuts (including peanut butter), tomatoes and shellfish (these are thought to contain toxins which affect the nervous system and should be avoided). The Asthma and Allergy Research Centre says that "significant changes in children's hyperactive behaviour could be produced by the removal of colourings and additives from the diet." Let's all boycott junk food.

I plan to do a survey of food policy in local schools for a future article. Any information on this would be very welcome. My telephone number is (015396) 20972.

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CUMBRIA WILDLIFE TRUST Settlebeck Gill

If you are heading for the Howgill's from Sedbergh town centre you will probably tale one of the public rights of way following Settlebeck Gill. Should you feel the need to pause for breath, linger a little longer, look and listen. The gill holds a remnant of the ancient woodland which covered the area long ago. As such it provides a valuable and increasingly threatened habitat for flowers and ferns, birds and mammals. Depending on the season you may spot wood anemones, bluebells, wood sorrel, primrose, violet and many other plants. Settlebeck Gill has a particularly rich variety of woodland. Oak, ash, sycamore, rowan, hawthorn to name but a few and

there are also areas of low prickly scrub which provide shelter from the elements and from predators for small birds. Bird life abounds from buzzard to blue tit. There is evidence of coppicing, the cutting of wood a few feet up the trunk to provide new growth of narrow branches suitable for tool handles, fence posts and charcoal. Woodland was farmed and managed much more before the days of plastic and mass production. Not only does the gill provide winter shelter for stock but also a haven for winter visitors such as redwings and fieldfares. Red squirrels were seen last year and we anxiously await their reappearance. Many other mammals find refuge in heaps of dead wood and under low bushes. Rabbits, stoats, badgers and foxes interact



when the light fades and the walkers go home. The whole woodland is an interdependent system. From the smallest insect to the largest predator, all have their place in the ordered society of a wooded gill.

Geologically too the gill is special. Below the fell wall a series of waterfalls tumble over dark red rocks. It is difficult to imagine, but desert conditions prevailed here about 345 million years ago. Fine red sands blew into deep valleys in the lower Silurian rocks. Flash floods brought stones and pebbles which, buried under the pressure of subsequent layers, cemented into a conglomerate. After the Ice Age the overburden of ice melted and the land rose. Rivers cut down to a new base level exposing these ancient Lower Carboniferous rocks. These strata are buried at least a kilometre below the surface to the east of the Dent fault and the Upper Carboniferous layers, which would have covered the Howgill area in former times, were eroded away. Glacial action has also played a part in shaping the gill with great thicknesses of grey boulder clay still collapsing and slumping into the





upper stretches.

Where sheep can graze regrowth of woodland and plants is limited and the local CWT support group is embarking on an exciting Jubilee Wood project which involves excluding stock from the narrow part of the gill above Castlehaw Farm. We hope to restore the eastern hedge to its original thickness with replanting in gaps and supplementing growth in thinner sections. We hope to see a regrowth of ground flora and YDNP volunteers are putting up bird boxes to encourage small birds. Perhaps redstarts and pied flycatchers will be moving in. Funding has already been obtained from the Earthwatch Institute and the outcome of other grant applications is awaited. Meanwhile we must thank Mr Paul Wilkinson (YDNP) and Mrs Jean Postlethwaite for their support and encouragement. Watch this space! Susan Garnett

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KILLINGTON W. I.

Our February meeting was not held in the People's Hall. Instead we assembled at the Brigflatts Meeting House of the Society of Friends, perhaps better known as "Quakers". This Meeting House, built in 1675 is one of the oldest in the country - a place of considerable renown. Our host for the afternoon was Melvin Roberts who welcomed us and once we were comfortably seated proceeded to enlighten us on a great range of fascinating topics.

We learnt how, in the seventeenth century, the hamlet of Brigflatts was a thriving community comprising some 75 souls with an economy based on the growing and weaving of flax to produce linen. He told us how the flax was retted (the leafy part of the plant rotted away in the acidic water of the village pond), leaving the fibrous central veins of the leaf to be woven into the valuable cloth. The industry was sufficiently profitable to support a number of other craftsmen such as a blacksmith and a tinsmith. Brigflatts was a flourishing and independent community well before the coming of George Fox. Moreover the people here were already of a reactionary frame of mind, happy to worship simply, and unhappy to pay the fines imposed by the authorities for non-attendance at Sunday Worship and non-payment of tithes. Hence when Fox came journeying and preaching his message of a more direct way to worship (- no clergymen, no special places for worship, no service



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book to follow) - at Brigflatts and in the area around, the seed fell on fertile ground. He was made welcome in the area by Justice Gervaise Benson at Borrett and others. However his adherents suffered intense persecution from the authorities and at one time there were 5000 persons from the West Riding of Yorkshire imprisoned and many paid with their lives.

The building of the Brigflatts Meeting House took place at a time when it was illegal for more than 5 people to meet together in each other's houses to worship. Sir John Otway of Ingmire allowed it to be built on his land. With 40 tons of stone in the roof alone the building was evidently meant to last!

We learnt a little of the traditions of Quaker meetings - how baptisms, marriages and burials are conducted. Can you believe that over the years 700 people have been interred in the tiny burial ground at Brigflatts. Re-use of space is not the invention of new environmentalists!

Melvin was warmly thanked for his hospitality and for bringing the subject so vividly to life. It was a most informative and entertaining afternoon. Everything



was so beautiful from the solid, homely building to the snowdrops nodding in the winter sunshine outside.

After we had had a leisurely look around we adjourned to the home of one of our members nearby and enjoyed a welcome cup of tea and a good crack. (that's me pretending I'm not an offcomer!) Shirley, our President, whizzed through the necessary business and we are now looking forward to our Fair Trade Coffee Morning at High Beckside on 6th March. Our next regular meeting will be at the People's Hall at 2.00pm on Tuesday 11th March, at which you would be most warmly welcome. The speaker will be Lucy Morris who will give us an insight into "A Musician's Life". W.F.U.

As well as the standard predictions for the year ahead, each month they contained stories, opinions, and a section headed 'Smatterins o' Sense'. March includes the following gems.

A chap wi' brass "at cannot finnd what he wants, is as badly off as one 'at wants what he hesn't t'brass ti get.

Nivver bother yor heead abaat ha mich yo'll be able ti leave when yo dee, fer yo'll jist leave as mich as onnybody else at dees at t'same time - all theer is. A chap 'at doesn't do all 'at he can, does

less nor he should. Nubdy does mooar.

John Hartley was a prolific publisher of dialect, and many of his books command high prices in second-hand bookshops.

However, it is worth looking out for the various 'Alamanacks' which are not only a good read, but also contain advertisements which would never pass today's Trades Descriptions Act.

For instance, Dr Robinson's Purifying Pills cured indigestion, loss of appetite, dropsy, headache, languor and flatulence, as well as purifying the blood and strengthening the nerves. And all for a mere seven pence ha'penny per box in old money!

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HISTORY SOCIETY

February 5th was Members Night for the History Society. Once a year we dispense with professional lecturers and learn something of the work that individual members are carrying out. This year we started with Judith Robinson whose talk entitled 'Geneology and Family History' gave us a fascinating account of her research into her family history. She outlined the various methods and sources which can be used when delving back into the past and how these have altered since the early nineteenth century when more assumptions and fewer firm facts were the order of the day. The emphasis is less on family trees and more on the social background. Nowadays, more use is made of diaries, memoirs, wills, letters,



account books, census returns, newspapers and oral interviews.

Richard Cann followed with a very interesting history of the Widows' Hospital which was started by Thomas Palmer. The original mid-nineteenth century building is still in use although it has now been converted from six houses to three to allow for indoor washing facilities and kitchen etc. There were specific conditions for entry :- the widow had to be born in Soolbank, be a regular attender at church and be an upright, honest woman (with no past history against her!). She was supposed to live alone but there are known cases where grandchildren were living there presumably to avoid going into the workhouse. From 1891 the Hospital was administered by the Trustees of Sedbergh United Charities.

Richard then went on to give the history of the Reading Room which was built in 1858 with money collected from Sedbergh School pupils, past and present. This was in honour of Dr John Harrison Evans, the much admired (and feared) Master of Sedbergh School. An old house that had stood there previously was demolished and the ground level was used by various markets. At one time it was a butter market, later farm and garden produce were sold there. It was used as a store of a local grocer before being taken over by the SRDC as a public shelter. Meanwhile upstairs became a library and was later leased to WRCC. As it was insufficiently endowed it was taken over by the Trustees of Sedbergh United Charities and Widows' Hospital who still own the building.

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SEDBERGH SCHOOL GIRLS FUND

The Committee of Management will meet shortly to consider applications for grants for educational tuition and/or educational facilities from girls resident in the parishes of SEDBERGH, GARSDALE and DENT. The Scheme of Management for the Girls' Fund quotes the following principles of application.

1. The income of the Fund shall be applied by the Committee for the benefit of beneficiaries, in one or more of the following ways:-

A) The award of Scholarships, Bursaries or Maintenance Allowance tenable at any School, University or other place of learning approved by the Committee;
B) The provision of financial assistance, outfits, clothing, tools, instruments or books to enable beneficiaries on leaving school, a University or any other educational establishment, to prepare for, or to assist their entry into, a profession, trade or calling;

C) The award of Scholarships or Maintenance Allowances to enable beneficiaries to travel abroad to pursue their education;

D) The provision, or assistance towards the provision, of facilities, of any kind not normally provided by the Local Education Authority, for recreation and social and physical training, including the provision of coaching in athletics, sports and games, for beneficiaries who are receiving primary, secondary or further education;

E) The provision of financial assistance to enable beneficiaries to study music or other arts; and

F) In otherwise promoting the education of beneficiaries.

In this Scheme, the expression of "beneficiaries" means girls who were born, or who have for not less then three years been resident in the Parishes of Sedbergh, Garsdale and Dent, and who in the opinion of the Committee, are in need of financial assistance.

Anyone wishing to make an application for a grant from the Fund should contact the Honorary Secretary, Mr. N.A.H. McKerrow, at the Bursary before 12th March 2003.

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SETTLEBECK HIGH SCHOOL

Settlebeck's new Learning Resource centre (LRC)

You will no doubt be aware that for the last two months we have been seeking planning permission from the YDNP planning committee for our new learning Resource Centre and after considerable negotiation our plans were unanimously approved on Tuesday 11th February at Hawes Museum.

There had been two major concerns about the new building.

The first was that the line of yew trees across from Settlebeck Cottage would be at risk, and we have had the plans redrawn to move the building further away from the trees to protect them. We have unfortunately had to lose several trees, but some of these were already in a poor condition and our students have planted over a hundred new trees adjoining our playing fields this year, with the YDNP ranger. Some of these will provide hedging, others will be allowed to mature. We have plans to plant more trees along our side of the river paths and some of these will be yew trees to replace those lost.

The second concern was parking and we have identified ways of providing more parking in our front grounds by taking out 2 dying trees and using the larger space outside of our new Community Development Centre (CDC). We will in fact have 5 more spaces than previously here when all the building is complete. We're opening up our bus park for



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greater use and will have made 10 new spaces there by this summer. However in the short term, parking will be difficult at Settlebeck due to all the building contractor's vehicles. We apologise for this and urge visitors to park well away from the school entrance but not on Maryfell or the other surrounding residential areas.

We look forward to our new LRC being completed by the beginning of September when 3 new students with autistic spectrum disorders will join our school and benefit from the new facilities. The new facilities will also be used by most other students in the school and by some of the adults on our adult education programme in the evenings.



Our CDC is still on course for completion before Easter when our parking problem will ease a little. We look forward also to a grand opening of all our facilities (including our extended hall) in the autumn term.

SEWERAGE WORKS

Work has started on a five month project to connect two small villages on the outskirts of Sedbergh to the sewerage system. Farfield and Hallbank will be hooked up to the main sewers after years of relying on septic tanks, which have to be regularly emptied by tankers. United Utilities is carrying out the work and said the project would make the tanks redundant and end wastewater being discharged into the River Clough, a tributary of the River Rawthey. The septic tanks at two private gardens will be removed and landscaped, while sewage will be pumped form Hallbank, where it will join a pipeline that will be laid to take it from Farfield to a pumping station. "Wherever we put it, the pipeline will be crossing some roads - including the A684 - so with the best will in the world to avoid disruption some may be caused", said project manager Martin McGrath.

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DIET

Bread-the staff of life? I have just reread June Parker's and Carol Dawbarn's articles on diet. Recently I have been doing a bit of reading also and visiting the internet and have come up with some interesting findings.

Now most of us were brought upon the idea that a balance diet was the best for us but, according to what I read it seems that man, as a species, is naturally a hunter gatherer and our digestive system is geared to this way of life. In the 21st century there are few true hunter gatherers on the earth. The ones remaining are probably the Kalahari bushmen and to a limited extent some Inuit and some Australian Aboriginals and some Masai. Now for convenience man, decided that keeping and domesticating animals and farming the crops he needed would make life easier. It is from this point in man's evolution that things started to go wrong. Although our diet changed our physiology did not. Carol mentioned that the ancient Egyptians were a great civilisation based on the use of wheat flour. Apparently the Egyptian soldiers were rationed to FIVE POUNDS of bread a day. The Greeks called them bread eaters apparently. I phoned the Health Centre, no reply (Saturday, early afternoon). I phoned both Doctors, (No reply, engaged or leave a message, which I did). The St. John Ambulance drivers are also Cumbria Ambulance therefore ex-directory. Finally I did manage to contact our ambulance station direct, said an ambulance was not required, but made arrangements for the lady to be taken to the ambulance station, so that the paramedic on duty could assess the situation. Surely a phone number should be available so that somebody not too badly hurt, and with own vehicle, need not take up an ambulance (999) or an unnecessary trip to Kendal or Lancaster. Wendy Morphet

JANUARY WEATHER

Generally a chilly and breezy month with only 2 days when the temperature reached 50F. We had 18 days with maximum temperatures reaching 40'sF, 11 days 30'sF and 2 when it just made 50F. On the 7th Jan the temperature stayed below freezing all day with a maximum of 31.8F. We had some hard frosts at night with 10 nights when the minimum temperature did not get out of the 20'sF. the lowest minimum temperature being 18.3F.

Due to the winds we had some truly low wind-chill readings. On the 30th January, when we had gale force winds, a windchill of 0F was recorded!! On that day, around noon there were gust which did





structural damage. I know as I had a shed roof blown off which crashed down on my kennels, fortunately the dogs were out at the time. Mysteriously the recorded maximum wind strength recorded on that day was only 28.6 mph from the south. Now my damage was sustained from an easterly gust, confirmed by a large Christmas tree and pot that was also blown over. Did we have a mini twister that confused the anemometer?

January lived up to the rhyme by bringing us some snow. On the 3rd January and again on the 28th the fell tops were covered with a white end to the month due to heavier falls on the 31st January. Generally the pressure was fairly high throughout the month, which coincides with the cold Arctic air being drawn in from the continent, and the low temperatures. In spite of the cold we had blue tits visiting a nest box on the 5th January and snowdrops flowering in sheltered spots. The daffodil bulbs had pushed well through by the end of the month and some shrubs were showing green tips to their buds. (as I write this, mid Feb, the sap was running in sycamores I cut in the hedge yesterday)

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MARCH GARDENING

The intensely cold weather of last month has polished off one or two of the least hardy plants in the garden and has made others look ragged and untidy. March is a good month for taking stock because if things are going to grow away and recover they should be showing signs of it now with new buds breaking, from the base if not from the tops of plants. I also choose this month to do any pruning of slightly tender plants - Penstemons, Lavender, Sage *Lavatera* etc. assuming that the coldest weather is over.

After all this pruning and tidying I like to spruce up beds and borders by mulching over with spent mushroom compost (this goes on all the borders except those which contain Ericaceous plants - Rhododendrons, Azaleas, summer flowering heathers Witch Hazel etc.), well rotted horse or cow manure, garden compost or bark chips. I usually use mushroom compost if possible because it is sterile and therefore provides a weed free surface to my borders for much of the year (although perennial weeds such as couch grass and ground elder will of course grow up through it.) Compost can be spread across the top of herbaceous perennials, but do beware that you do not mulch young trees and shrubs too deeply as a soggy layer of compost next to thin new bark can cause it to rot and die and kill the whole plant. Mulching always makes borders look neater and, should we have a hot dry summer (it is good to live in hope!) it will help to conserve valuable moisture in the soil.

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EUROPE

They are at it again! Those of you who own a horse know by now that you will have to have a passport for your animals. No it is not so you can take them on holiday it is so that all drugs administered to the animal can be recorded. Now where could such an idea have come from? You've guessed it, straight from Brussels. In their wisdom the commissioners have decided that as horse meat enters the food chain on the continent that all horses must carry a passport in future. Now there is no indication what will happen to all the horse meat that ends up on the table which comes from outside the EU. Now the logic of all this seems to be that soon every chicken, duck, pheasant, rabbit etc. which could end up on our dinner plate will be destined to have a passport. Could be a bit tricky for every pheasant shoot to record for each bird they shoot.

Another pearl that has come from the same source is that farmers will no longer be able to bury fallen stock on their farms in case water courses become polluted. Now how the disposal is carried out and who pays is not sorted out yet. Even the incinerators which might do this task are facing possible shut down if they do not reach a certain temperature. After incineration the ash has to be disposed of in set sites.

Would it surprise you that the best year for farmers earnings, in real terms, was 1973. Now what happened that year in this country? We entered the so called common market and the average earnings for farmers in the UK have dropped ever since to record low levels so much that, on average, they did not earn the so called minimum wage in 2001.
