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CUMBRIA WILDLIFE TRUST Squirrels

"Where can I see a red squirrel?" The answer is "Most likely on your bird feeder, or someone else's. Otherwise in a wooded gill like Taythes or Hebblethwaite or Hobdale Beck, but you will need keen eyes once the leaves are on the trees, and you have more chance of seeing one early in the morning, perhaps even on Castlehaw."

For the past 9 years we have been monitoring both red and grey squirrels in the Sedbergh district. Our sightings have been recorded on computer by Roger Moore. From these records it seems that the red squirrels are holding their own, though whether they have actually increased it is hard to say. They have not



been seen recently in some localities where they were previously present. On the other hand there have been a few sightings in places where they have not been seen for some years. All this points to the importance of regular monitoring if we are to have a true picture of how things are, and we are grateful to those who keep us up to date with their sightings. Mrs Judith Walshe at Whitbeck (20182) collects sightings from Garsdale, while Colin Armitstead (20319) or myself (25476) are glad to have records for the reds of the district.

In spite of all our efforts to control the numbers of grey squirrels moving into the area there are still pockets in Dentdale, Cautley and the Lune valley from which they could spread more widely if they were not controlled by shooting or trapping. Some people may wonder if this is necessary. Grey squirrels are engaging small animals which can be interesting to watch but they can do a lot of damage to fruit, plums, raspberries, strawberries, and, in towns, to property itself. Moreover there are now so few places like Sedbergh where there is still a small residual population of red squirrels that many of us believe we have a duty to do what we can to protect them. It seems certain otherwise that they will disappear from this district as they have done from almost the whole of England, and the grey squirrels will take over.

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BOOK TOWN

Some Comments on the Sedbergh BookTown Committee's recent study.

The implications of this report on the future character of Sedbergh are enormous and I believe its recommendations would, if carried out, cause irreparable damage to the town. I hope the following comments will shed some light on the realities of the situation, and explain why I find the scheme proposed in the report both dangerous and unworkable.

The report was written by one of the originators of the theory of the European BookTown, which became fashionable in the late 1990s as a means of regenerating failing local communities under particular conditions which appertain

mainly to certain small north European towns, by attempting to tap into a sector of the global tourist economy The idea has not transplanted well to Wigtown, despite large infusions of public money, and even less so to Dalmellington – the two Scottish examples - and it is now generally accepted that the idea is quite inappropriate for small market towns such as Sedbergh which are not decaying, have none of the infrastructure or cheap property suited to the reception of a mass tourist market, and where an influx of such tourists would destroy the very peace and quiet which attracts the more discerning and affluent visitor. It draws together some useful, if imprecise, statistical data regarding tourism in Sedbergh and the district, but

the conclusions of the study are often contradictory, many are applicable to any one of hundreds of similarly-sized towns in the country, and a large section is taken up by a rambling and irrelevant defence of the booktown as the last bastion of the secondhand bookshop.

There is, however, a basic contradiction within the report which is far more serious. On the one hand it tries to convince us that a book town "branding" for Sedbergh will attract the wealthier, more "up-market" tourists who will bring money to the town, and on the other admits not only that it is based on the European model where the average spend is a mere £3.50 to £5 per head, but that bookselling businesses of

the kind it proposes to bring to Sedbergh are hardly ever economically viable anyway I would suggest that the more affluent and cultured tourists are never going to be attracted by offering cheap goods, even less so by businesses struggling to survive.

And what are these books, to be priced at no more than £5? The great majority are the detritus of the book trade – secondhand paperbacks, unwanted novels, book club editions, ex-library volumes and out-dated text-books, all on their last journey to the paper-bank and virtually unsaleable. Does Sedbergh really wish to be filled with shops, or more likely, and even worse - un-manned

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units, trying to dispose of such stuff? How many tourists must visit the town each year to generate a sustainable income for each of the ten to twelve booksellers envisaged in these units?. If the Hay on Wye example is followed, where, according to the report, 34 dealers require 500,000 visitors annually to make a living, Sedbergh would need up to 150,000 impecunious browsers to be tempted off the M6 every year to fill our roads and clog up our Main Street. The author of the report is reported as saying elsewhere that to cope with this influx he envisages extra parking for 500 cars which "would not be a problem".

The only way to attract the more "upmarket" book-buying tourists which the report envisages, would be to open

shops full of good quality collectable books, but these are precisely the sort of books which are not readily available. Good books are not like groceries, to be ordered in from a wholesaler on a whim. By their very nature they cannot easily be sourced or priced, even with the help of the Internet, and it takes many years experience to deal in them successfully. Book towns have, on the other hand, become seen as "the flea-markets of the book trade". This is why no small town full of good bookshops in England – and there are several, such as Lewes or Ludlow – wishes to be associated with the term. It would be a dubious honour indeed for Sedbergh to be the first.

In fact, the report accepts that most of the so-called bookdealers likely to be

attracted would be either part-timers with another job, folk taking early retirement or complete novices, who fancy the romantic thought of dealing in books in a beautiful location. Such individual aspirations are often wholly admirable and some of the best specialised book businesses in the country have started in this way. But most professional full-time dealers in nearby towns are opposed to this scheme because they know that extra competition from concentrated numbers of such casual traders who are not knowledgeable about prices would drive up those prices at local auctions. We ourselves do not deal in the cheaper books, and we rarely attend auctions, as we buy almost entirely from private

sources throughout the country. We would therefore be unaffected by the socalled "competition", but having a retail outlet makes us more accessible to those clients who wish to bring their books to us or to inspect and collect books ordered through our catalogues or websites. Nonetheless, if the booktown scheme were to come to fruition we would have to close our shop in Finkle Street, since large numbers of tourists browsing our shelves on a daily basis would degrade our stock unacceptably through constant handling. We would in fact consider re-locating to another town, even though this would be a sad personal decision, born and bred as I was in

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Sedbergh.

Richard Booth, founder of the Hay on Wye BookTown (the fore-runner of all book towns) and Honorary Life President of the International Organisation of BookTowns, condemns this study as "total rubbish" and suggests that the author's theory of booktowns was invented solely for the purpose of obtaining grants. He has already expressed his thoughts very forcefully to the Book Town Committee and to the Chamber of Trade in an open letter earlier this year: "Having spent twenty-two years creating the BookTown of Hay-on-Wye ... can I express my total horror at the appointment of Mr. Seaton [the author of the report] to promote and advise Sedbergh as a BookTown? The chaos he

caused in Wigtown, Scotland's first official BookTown, was so substantial that we are only just beginning to sort it out ...". Whatever the internal politics of the Book Town world may be – and we risk getting into very murky waters here – the opinions of a man of Richard Booth's stature in the book trade cannot simply be ignored.

I dislike having to criticize so comprehensively any plan which apparently aims to bring more prosperity to the district, and would have been happy to support and advise on any sensible project. We have been dealing in antiquarian books here in Sedbergh for fifty years, and it does seems a little strange that at no time did the Book Town committee consult us. Advice has



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apparently not been sought from any other experienced booksellers, nor from either of the two trade associations. The P.B.F.A. (Provincial Book Fairs Association) recently held a Book Fair in the People's Hall but discouraged the display of any publicity for the scheme at that event. The A.B.A. (Antiquarian Booksellers Association), the senior trade body of which this firm is a member of long standing, likewise has not been informed or consulted, and their President endorses my views entirely.

Throughout this district there are numerous excellent specialised bookshops and dealers who already perform the function of attracting affluent and discerning book-buyers to the area in considerable numbers. It might have been



more sensible to build on this nucleus rather than ignoring and even antagonising them. Sadly, much effort and taxpayers' money has already been spent on this ill-considered scheme. I hope it will not be taken any further. *C.G.Hollett*

(A true story of country folk and their fight for a mill)

Episode 2 The story so far: In October 1992 Pennine Tweeds at Far field Mill which is on the Garsdale Readjust outside Sedbergh closed down. It occupied the third floor of a four storey mill. This was the end of 160 years of weaving at the mill. A public meeting was held in November 1992 to find out if anything should or could be done about it.

Should the mill building be allowed to eventually become derelict? Could the looms be saved? Did people in Sedbergh want to see something done, and if so what? The newly formed committee had to start talking; to everyone they could think of.

We were standing outside the Headmaster's office. It was the Sedbergh School Headmaster's office. However old you are, the stem "Come in", when you have knocked on the headmaster's door, gives you a sinking feeling. Tony Johnson, was not easily intimidated and he was quite equal to the situation. We were of course warmly welcomed by the Headmaster and it was not long before we had the assurance we were hoping for. Sedbergh School, the biggest employer in the town, would support any attempt to rescue the mill at Farfield. He would even second one of his staff to come on the Committee. So Richard Thomas became involved and eventually became the Trust President.

After some persuasion. Tony Johnson who lived at Farfield, had agreed to be chairman of the steering committee. Tony wielded a firm hand and warned us not to presume everyone would want the project to go ahead. There would be many problems and it was vital at this stage to listen to everyone, those against as well as those who were enthusiastic.

We approached the other schools. Settlebeck High School welcomed the idea as an educational opportunity appearing on its doorstep, while the Primary Schools in Dent and Sedbergh were already planning in their mind's eye educational visits.

The Parish Council obviously had to be talked to. They are a well informed group of people, with much experience and they

were elected to represent the views of the town. They are not given to being over enthusiastic, but they had been concerned for some time about the future of Sedbergh. The idea of some kind of development at Farfield fitted in well with their proposals for the town set out in the recent appraisal entitled 'Sedbergh 2000'. Their approval was wholehearted but was it a real possibility? The words 'pie in the sky' escaped the lips of one councillor in a private conversation. Yes, maybe. There were more people to talk to. The Lookaround was used to invite comment and John Whitehead, the Sedbergh Partnership Officer based at the Community Office, contacted businesses, local quangos, government bodies and

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local authorities.

A visit to a Chamber of Trade Meeting, a much more relaxed occasion, led to a promise of support. For the Chamber, to increase tourism was vitally important, and they thought that some kind of development at Farfield might do just that. There were just one or two members who ran high street shops who had reservations. Farfield was not in the centre of Sedbergh. Would it take trade away from the town? Most disagreed but only time would tell if that fear was a real one.

The most important people to be consulted were the residents and business people at Farfield itself. Many had turned up at the public meeting. There were already on-going problems because of the was access, as on the single lane

mixture of residential properties with industrial activities and some felt the site was very untidy. These people believed that if the buildings fell out of use there would be more dereliction. The majority were very anxious indeed that something should be done. Eventually five people from four of the Farfield households became trustees.

Crucially the Yorkshire Dales Planning Authority had to be consulted. It was then their policy to keep industrial buildings in industrial use. Although they had some time previously allowed conversion of some buildings for residential use that was no longer to be allowed. They were also anxious for some tourist expansion in the Sedbergh area. The main problem

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entrance ,track, cars coming into the site could not see those at the other end setting off to go out. There was many a curse from drivers as cars, commercial vehicles and tractors coming in had to back out onto the main road to allow other vehicles to get out. The Dales Authority decreed that there could be no change of use without an access improvement.

Numerous other people were consulted and comments were invited in the Lookaround. The results were discussed at meetings held every fortnight in the Community Office. Seldom has that office resounded to such heated discussions, to the expression of such doubts and the explosion of such enthusiasm. As some-one later commented, it was more Vicar of Dibley than Corporate Boardroom.

There were so many things to consider, not least of which was what could or should be done with the Mill. At the next Public Meeting it would be necessary to offer some suggestions, as well as some ideas on where the money would come from. One way of finding out was to look at what had been done elsewhere.

The first step would seem to be to go

and find out. Mr and Mrs Johnson went off to Waterside Mill at Settle. Bryan Hinton went off to Elliot's Fine Fabrics mill at Galashiels and the Secretary set off to see the restored mill at Gatehouse of Fleet. We all reported back.

Then there was Allenheads. Thirty miles from Hexham, the nearest town, Allenheads was a lead mining village with the present population of only 160 people. They formed a Village Trust and within six months had raised £80,000. By the time the project was complete they had raised £600,000 and created a community centre, an exhibition area and craft workshops and they had restored the old water powered pump engine.

If Allenheads could do it, why not Sedbergh? Here was an exemplar project. If Sedbergh wanted to restore Farfield Mill and put it to a useful purpose, it surely was not impossible. The Committee decided to recommend that the project should go ahead.

Would the next public meeting support the Committee? Was Sedbergh ready to embark on the project? If they did, would it actually turn out to be 'pie in the sky'? Time would tell.

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POLICE REPORT

From this month, Lookaround will be reporting on various Police related things. The reports will not always be doom & gloom but will be designed to make our place a better and safer place to live.

Long Lane is fast becoming a problem area with vehicles and pedestrians. The Zebra Crossing has been installed for the use of and the safety of people, especially children going to and from school. It is illegal to park on the zig-zags of the Crossing and will earn you 3 penalty points on your Licence and a £60 fine if you do. All the vehicles that park outside the school cause a hazard for vehicles passing through the area as well as those emerging from Garsdale Road. The biggest thing that does bother me though

is the amount of children and parents that do not use the Crossing but cross nearby or even cross between cars as they wait at the crossing. Accidents become Statistics. DON'T BECOME A STATISTIC.

It used to be that the summer months were the times when people went away on holidays. This is not now the case and many people go away throughout the year. If you are leaving your home for a short period, here are some tips for you to think about. Cancel the milk being delivered; cancel your papers; have a relative or friend call at the house on a regular basis to remove post from behind the door; get them to open and close curtains at irregular times; use time switches to put lights and the radio on at irregular times. Pass details to the Police



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which include the following information:- your name and full address, telephone number, when you leave and when you return, the name, address and telephone number of the person that has a key for your premises and the address and telephone number (if possible) of where you will be for your holiday. This information should be either typed or put in BLOCK CAPITAL LETTERS. (The Police are not permitted to hold keys for you). Then have a good relaxing holiday.

Two recent incidents have occurred in the Sedbergh area that are worthy of note. On Wednesday 16th April at about 2.45pm, two males parked their vehicle at the entrance to the Auction Mart. They then went to a house on Station Road and forced the front door open (which was locked). The occupant was in the garden and heard the noise and on entering the house, the two offenders ran out to their car and drove off into towards the town centre. Did you see these persons or the vehicle?

The second was a Burglary and Theft at Dent Craft Centre. Sometime between 1130 pm on Saturday 12th and the morning of Sunday 13th April, persons forced open a window at the Centre and

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BEEKEEPERS

Sedbergh beekeepers held their 7th Annual General Meeting on March 10th. Thirteen members attended and all the business was smoothly conducted. The Chairman, John Tallon, was able to report on a very successful 2002 for the club, and anticipate an even better 2003, weather permitting, with our first Summer Conference. The Committee were re-elected without any changes.

Sedbergh beekeepers were again well represented at the Sedbergh Spring Show on 5th April. Our display stand in the Masonic Hall gained a commendation from the judges, and we met a number of possible new members. Although we would have liked to see more entries in the honey classes of the Home Produce section, the standard achieved was high.

Tommy Brooks gave a talk and led the discussion at our evening meeting at the Friends' Meeting House on 7th April on the do's and don't's of carrying out the first inspection of the hives after the long winter season. He pointed out the importance of choosing the right weather, not an easy task with the extraordinary ups and downs of temperature and lack of

rainfall in the last several weeks. He highlighted the importance of checking that the queen has been laying her eggs in large numbers and that the workers have been able to find sufficient fresh pollen on which to feed the young larvae as they hatch out. Also that there is sufficient honey left in the combs from last year to feed the whole of the growing colony, and that there are no signs of disease. Either a shortage of food or the effects of a bee ailment can have very serious results at this time of the year, as beekeepers aim to achieve the largest numbers of healthy foraging worker bees to coincide with the time that the flowers and trees blossom and produce the nectar

from which the bees make their honey. The first inspections, and taking the correct actions, can make all the difference to the size of the eventual honey crop.

We have two meetings in May. We shall be visiting Furness beekeepers at their Spring Convention on 10th

May, and Bill and Marion Smith will be our hosts at our first apiary visit of the year, on 24th May, at their apiary in Garsdale. You will be most welcome to join us. *Malcolm Fraser-Urguhart*

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MAINTAINING HEALTHY JOINTS

Joints are not just isolated articulations, but an integrated part of the whole, affecting and affected by our general state of health. In particular the blood provides nourishment and moisture for the joints and removes waste products. Thus healthy blood and good circulation promote healthy joints and conversely malfunctioning joints impede circulation and stagnate the blood.

The quality of the blood depends upon nutrition, digestion and metabolism. In Chinese Medicine, the blood is said to be adversely affected by worry, anxiety, stress and lack of sleep. Good circulation depends upon appropriate exercise. In other words if you want healthy joints, look after your general health. Foods which specifically treat blood deficiency are meat (in small amounts), fish and eggs (prefer free range, organic products where possible), as well as rich vegetable foods such as pulses, dried fruit and certain oils.

To maintain good joint function a combination of external and internal forms of exercise is best. External exercise is what we normally think of as exercise: sport, swimming, walking and running. Internal exercise is designed to move and regulate the body's internal Qi (energy, pronounced "chee") and includes yoga and T'ai Chi. It is best to begin working with a teacher. For T'ai Chi in Sedbergh and Dent contact Ian McPherson (015396 20972), for yoga in Sedbergh contact Deyna Hirst (015396 21556) and for yoga in Dent contact Laura Clare (015396 25572). In these disciplines movements are made slowly and with awareness, always remaining within the natural capacity of the body (which is different for everyone). But what to do once joint trouble has set in? Acute injuries should be rested and may need conventional medical



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treatment. Alongside this consider homeopathy (arnica is a well known selfhelp remedy for injury, shock and trauma) or acupuncture which can be helpful in reducing pain and swelling, speeding recovery and restoring good function. Many chronic joint problems are the result of an old injury and correct treatment at the time can avoid problems later on.

Many of us suffer from long-term joint problems and there is much that we can do alongside any conventional medical treatment we may be having:

- regular relaxation sessions help with pain and stress and can encourage the muscles to relax. Muscle tension is often a factor in joint problems and pain and tension can become a vicious circle.
- if you have a problem in one joint it is very important to keep all the other joints moving. Fingers, toes, wrists and ankles can all be exercised sitting down and rythmical movements in these areas can be beneficial for joints further along the limbs. If your problem is with the lower limbs, exercise the arms and shoulders and

vice versa.

- many problems arise from over-use.
 If you can, take a rest from the activity which causes the problem.
 For small-movement repetitive strain injuries it can be beneficial to make large movements with the limbs and for overuse of the large joints try making small, gentle movements well within the pain-free range.
- use massage to improve circulation in the whole limb and in addition to treat tender areas around the joint itself. Do not exert more pressure than is comfortable.
- yoga or Tai Chi can be very helpful. Do not feel that you cannot do anything because you cannot touch your toes or stand on one leg! Many movements can be performed sitting or lying. Laura Clare specialises in therapeutic yoga and works with individuals to develop a yoga programme adapted to their needs (015396 20972). For chronic joint problems this would typically be a series of movements coordinated with the breathing.
- acupuncture is often used for joint problems. The approach is to reduce pain, promote circulation in the channels running through the joint, to revitalise the body and calm the spirit as appropriate in each individual case. The treatment would vary according to whether the joint is affected by cold, damp or heat.

DIALECT DIGEST

One way the religious significance of this time of year is commemorated is by special foods. Everyone knows hot cross buns (which were once sold hot in the streets), but how many people still bake a simnel cake, traditionally eaten on the fourth Sunday in Lent, Mothering Sunday? It's a rich fruitcake, decorated with eleven balls of marzipan representing the Apostles, without Judas. In some parts of Yorkshire, the custom is to bake Easter biscuits, thick and rich, with dried fruit and candied peel. Then there are the eggs - not the expensive chocolate ones, more box than

egg - but pace eggs, hardboiled hens'

eggs, painted in bright colours and rolled

down grassy slopes on Easter Sunday or Monday. This tradition is said to represent the rolling away of the stone from the tomb of Jesus. If the eggs reach the bottom without cracking, it's a sign of good luck. There are also pace egg plays, with historical themes, still performed in some areas by brightly-dressed mummers. The word 'pace' comes from the Hebrew word for Passover.

And even in the days when folk worked every hour of daylight. Good Friday in the countryside was always solemnly observed.

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SEDBERGH SCHOOL

Understandably, there has been some alarm caused by press coverage - both local and national – of the SARS issue (often exaggerated or inaccurate) and I am aware that there may be some residents who are unsure about Sedbergh School's own policy.

Very few of our pupils actually live in either Hong Kong or mainland China and of these, some spent their holidays in Europe whilst others followed the 10 days quarantine requirement I initially recommended. For the latter, their holidays have been completely spoiled and I can now only hope that a busy term here in our beautiful county can at least make up for some of that.

The following is a letter sent to parents which, hopefully, will clear up the many rumours and misconceptions that are always associated with these types of incidents.

Throughout the holiday period, I have been in regular contact with the appropriate medical authorities and the parents and guardians of our Hong Kong boys and girls, as concerns over SARS have grown. At all times, guidelines laid down by the national and international

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Thus, in my message of 3 and 8 April, a period of quarantine was a requirement prior to returning to School.

In the final days of the Easter holiday, the World Health Organisation, the Medical Officers of Schools Association

and the Department of Health have advised that Hong Kong students who have been given a clean bill of health should be able to return direct to their Schools. Although this further advice was conveyed to our Hong Kong families on 17 April, my understanding is that those pupils for whom it was applicable

are already serving their quarantine

is well, our School Doctor, Christine Hunt, will be carrying out detailed checks on all our returning Hong Kong students and will maintain close vigilance thereafter. If she has concerns, then arrangements for isolation are in place.



You will appreciate that the story of the past month has been confused and difficult, especially for our Hong Kong Sedberghians to whom we all extend our concern and sympathy. I hope that we shall all be able to begin the Term together, with the interests of

both the United Kingdom pupils (together with the Sedbergh staff and Community) and their Hong Kong colleagues properly served and safeguarded.

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LOST OPPORTUNITY

Following the foot and mouth epidemic the Government and other organizations have created pockets of funding to help the rural areas of Cumbria.

It is not always easy to access these funds and someone always has to take on the responsibility for making all the phone calls, reading all the documents, inviting the right people to come and discuss what is being requested.

Through the good offices of the Sedbergh Chamber of Trade the Western Dales Futures group was formed following a public meeting at which Sedbergh, Garsdale, Dent and other Parishes were represented. Western Dales Futures took on the job of finding those who would be prepared to push projects forward and they are having some success.

In some cases it is the Parish Councils that have to take the lead, although the work may be done by other individuals or groups such as the Western Dales Futures. One particular scheme, Vital Villages, has to be applied for and backed by the Councils. Voluntary Action Cumbria sent a representative to explain the scheme, details of which were sent to Sedbergh, Garsdale and Dent Parish Councils. Put simply, the proposal was that the three Parish Councils should each apply for the £5000 available to each of them. The money would be put together and used to employ one local person to talk to all local organizations, from football clubs and playgroups, to residents organizations and the churches to find out what is needed and to access any funding that might be available.

Local organizations already do much for

themselves and the amount of money raised for charities locally is quite incredible. However it all takes time and effort, time willingly given, but there are not always enough people around to do all that is needed. People need to earn a living and cannot always find time to do much voluntary work. To be able to pay to have one local person dedicated to seeking help and to direct those already involved where they may best find help cannot be a bad thing.

Sadly it is not to be. Despite all efforts, the Parish Councils of Sedbergh, Garsdale and Dent, who would need to co-operate to make this a reality have chosen not to take up the opportunity.

I say 'sadly' because this is entirely a personal opinion. (This is not written on behalf of any organisation.) There will be others who view this very differently. What is important is that people should be aware of the decisions taken on their behalf.

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MAY GARDENING

Spring has come early for many plants this year and bushes and trees are showing their first flush of beautiful new foliage. I love the mixture of different fresh, bright greens which can be seen all around us and which show off the spring flowers to great advantage.

Some trees and shrubs are grown specially for their brightly coloured leaves and, on deciduous plant, the colours are best seen as the new leaves unfold. Many Acer species and cultivars are grown for their foliage. The dwarf 'Japanese Maples' are an obvious choice but there are also superb larger trees which make eye catching features in a larger garden.

Acer negundo 'Flamingo' -a coloured form of the 'Box Maple' has beautiful cream/pink/pale green leaves born on greenish stems. The new, young wood also has a white 'bloom' which gives the tree a light, bright appearance. The best foliage is born on the new, vigorous stems so this plant is often treated as a coppice or pollarded plant, being cut back hard every 3-4 years. This keeps it down to a reasonable size—it is potentially a very, very large tree.

Another neatly sized plant is a form of sycamore—Acer pseudoplatanus 'Brilliantissimum'. This has beautiful new foliage which is a unusual bright shrimp pink in colour. It is a slow growing tree, rather mushroom shaped when mature. Its main drawback (in my opinion) is that as the foliage matures it turns a rather sickly pale green, so I love the plant in spring but hate it in summer. Definitely not to place in a corner of a garden, hidden from view, but where it can be visited at the right season. EH

Lancashire and Cumbria. We are growing fast, and with support from key partners to include: North West Arts, Lancashire County Council, Lancaster City Council and CVR we have extended our touring circuit from 4 venues to 18 for this spring tour.

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FARFIELD MILL ARTS & HERITAGE CENTRE

The Centre at Farfield has just completed its first full year of operation and it is time to take stock. Open seven days a week from Easter to the end of October and at weekends for most of the winter, the visitor numbers have been very close to those predicted. From April 2002 to March 2003 there were approximately 14000 in total, including course members and visitors to the cafe.

It is not easy to calculate very accurately the effect on the town centre at Sedbergh. Clearly many people stop at Farfield who do not stop at Sedbergh. Many visitors to the YDNP Information Office are directed to Farfield either by car or by following a beautiful footpath map that has been drawn up for us by Susan Garnett. What is clear is that since the Centre at Farfield opened, the number of visitors to Sedbergh recorded at the Tourist Information Centre has increased by 10,000.

The steering committee in 1993 certainly did not imagine that after 10 years of work by that committee the restoration work would still not be complete. This year, at last sees the final





stage of the work on the building about to be completed. The Trust will soon begin work on the development of level 4 and finish the landscaping of the site. There will be more workshops, another exhibition area and practical activity areas for community use. There will be an expansion of classes in traditional skills such as weaving, spinning and rug making as well as contemporary arts and crafts including pottery and painting.

In the meantime, if you go down to the mill, you will find that each month there will be a new exhibition of contemporary arts and crafts. There is an exciting season ahead of us. And if you have not been yet, it is time you did. Most Londoners have never been inside the Tower of London. Farfield Mill represents Sedbergh's future as well as its past and we hope that it cannot be said that most of those living in Sedbergh and district have never been inside their own mill at Farfield now it has been restored.

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SEDBERGH & DISTRICT HISTORY SOCIETY

There was a good turn out for the final meeting of the winter programme held on March 19th in Dent Memorial Hall for the lecture on 'Historic Railway Structures in Cumbria'. Gordon Biddle, a transport historian with a number of publications to his name, illustrated his talk with a fine collection of slides highlighting a wealth of detail from the railway infrastructure in the region. The Victorian railway engineers certainly had a way of getting things done during the golden age of steam, 2000 miles of track between 1826 and 1844 and 15,500 miles by 1880 was an extraordinary rate of progress by modern standards. Some of their finest engineers worked on the local line from Ingleton to Lowgill. The Middleton bridge still spans the A683 'on the skew' with a fine segmental arch in rock faced stone intricately lined with bricks, cheaper and easier to use. The logistics of erecting the bridge over the River Rawthey, built in cast iron with very fine gothic detail and a single span of 120 feet, was guite a feat; similarly the Lune viaduct of the same span with 3 supporting arches in local sandstone and the enormous strength in the red sandstone piers of the Lowgill viaduct.

The Smardale Ghyll viaduct, now a footpath, was built by Sir Thomas Bouch of Cumberland, the first Tay Bridge being his downfall. The S & C Smardale viaduct at 120 feet was the highest built in its time.

The variety and standardisation of station design was highlighted. Grange station on the Furness line was one of many built by Austin & Paley as the town grew up round the railway as a resort and seaside watering place.

Mr. Biddle referred to the impact on the local community of the railway colonies which sprung up during the construction. During his vote of thanks Tony Hannam read extracts from a letter posted in Dalton in Furness in 1845 to father from son working on the construction of the Furness line which gave an insight into working life on the line.

Settlebeck's approach to the war in Iraq As I plan my second whole school assembly on the Iraq war, I'm very very aware of the heavy responsibility we carry as educators (both teachers and parents) to help our students make sense of what often seems like a senseless world When we are bombarded with extreme and conflicting visions and information, with propaganda and spin, with horrific images of the suffering of innocent people caught up in this war alongside images of terrorist atrocities and a few extremist Muslim clerics preaching hate, it is vital that our students are properly informed, given access to the evidence, helped to appreciate all sides of the argument and differentiate between prejudice, assertion and the facts. At Settlebeck time has been provided in assemblies and IBV (Issues, Beliefs and Values) lessons to enable students to explore the issues, give their views and listen to each other. We will continue to strive to provide Settlebeck's students with a balanced account of the facts of this conflict as it unfolds, in order for them to make up their own minds on the rights and wrongs of the situation, but at



the heart of our teaching will be the principle that this is not a racial or religious issue; there is no fundamental tension between Islam and Christianity or between the Arab and Western people. This is a war borne out of extemism and a failure of politics, and our duty will continue to be to offer our empathy and support to those innocents who have caught up in this conflict. Ultimately it will be on the quality of relationships with the Iraqi people, once the conflict is over, that the justice of this war will be judged. It will be in the peace to come that the Arab world will judge whether this war was invasion and occupation or liberation and freedom. Dave Smith

WEATHER

March Weather. Its official. March was the sunniest March on record, so says the Met Office. As was January and February was the sunniest February since 1988. The early part of the month produced some much needed rain with 2.4 inches in the first 11 days but none there after. In fact there was a shower on the 24th but not enough to trouble the rain gauge. Temperatures were unbelievable for March with only 7 nights below freezing with a minimum of 26.8F. 9 days the temperatures reached the 60's with a highest of 68.2F. Again it was a windy month but no severe winds we often associate with March. The highest gust recorded on the 24th at 24.2mph. The lowest gust was 7.8mph. on 15 days these winds were blowing form a North Westerly direction. With a settled month's weather the pressure was expectedly on the high side.

During this pleasant spring weather the natural world has been active also. Primroses and violets have added colour to the hedgerows, blackthorn has blossomed, with the sunny days the bees have been working it, so you sloe gin drinkers should have plenty of fruit come the autumn to make your tipple. Butterflies have been active as have bats and hedgehogs. Towards the end of the month thrushes and blackbirds were feeding young so lets hope they avoid the attentions pf the magpies. The golden show of daffodils continued and towards the end of the month the gold of dandelions gave the bees much needed pollen. If this weather continues we can hopefully look forward to the return of our summer migrants \odot

TEN YEARS AT THE CHAIR WORKSHOP

On Gala Day the Chair Workshop will have been open for 10 years, despite road closure during taking up the cobbles in Main Street, illness, family difficulties and the Foot and Mouth year. The workshop has become established as the centre for chair reseating and seating craft supplies in the north. 75% of the chairs come from Cumbria, Yorkshire and Lancashire. The remainder comes from all over the country.

The fascination of running the Chair Workshop is that I never know who or what will come through the door. Interesting people and a variety of chairs and sofas, often rare, with unusual histories, come to the shop. It is surprisingly similar to my previous work as a General Practitioner, when every patient and telephone call could be a new and unexpected problem. Both are to do with restoring function. My daughter has always referred to the line of battered chairs as 'the illies'. Then there are all those people from the town who come in and shout "it is only me!" but who is 'me'? The call may be about a chair, a piece of jewellery for repair, tools for sharpening, Town Band matters, a generous invitation or a chat and a piece of home-made cake.

The Chair Workshop continues to develop. Thanks to Neville Allen I have a new website with a gallery showing the range of my work (www.chairworkshop. f9.co.uk). There is also a full price list so the mail order side of the business is increasing. People seem to have great difficulty getting supplies of unusual materials or even simple things like

natural rope. My daughter plans to join me in the shop and grandson, Hugo, is already practising hard, sorting out tools, hammering and threading.
