
The monthly council meeting received a presentation from Maureen Lamb regarding the former Udales premises in Main Street and the possible involvement of the **Buildings Preservation Trust.**

Planning applications were all recommended for approval and it was reported that the decisions relating to the Udales application had been deferred for one month by YDNPA Planning to allow time to consider the submission from the Cumbria **Buildings Preservation Trust.**

Following a further lengthy discussion it was resolved that the Council would support the latest application relating to the former Auction Mart site subject to a number of conditions which were submitted to YDNPA planners.

The Car Park committee brought forward a number of changes to the running of the car parks in relation to the issue of passes and the arrangements for Market Days. These are the subject of a separate submission by the Chairman in this issue of Lookaround.

The other main item for discussion was the drainage problem at the football field. In view of the likely cost of remedial works this was put off until the end of next season. However 30th July. the Council invited the Football Club to appoint a representative to the working group to help improve communication between the Club and colinrobertshaw@talktalk.net or at the the Council which will hopefully help in reaching a satisfactory resolution to each Wednesday.

The turnout was 54.4% making it one of the highest turnouts in Cumbria and in the whole of the north west. It was a tight result, clearly every vote did count. For Cumbria as a whole the new council consists of 38 Conservatives, 24 Labour, 16 Lib Dems, 5 Independents and 1 People's Party. Nationally there were strong swings towards the Conservatives with Labour and the Lib Dems losing all the councils which

they were defending.

At the Annual General Meeting the new Conservative group leader, Jim Buchanan was elected as Leader on what is called the "Strong Leader" model for local government. That means he will serve as leader throughout the four years without facing re-election on an annual basis. He then appointed a Deputy Leader and Cabinet under the new framework. Stewart Young, leader of the Labour group is the new Deputy Leader and Cllr Buchanan named a nine-member Cabinet consisting of five Conservatives, three Labour councillors and one Independent.

My good friend Roger Bingham was elected Chairman of council and also

appointed to the Cumbria County Council place on Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority. The previous member, Roger Bird did not seek reelection to Cumbria. Within North Yorkshire the Conservative Party made further gains and now hold 48 out of the 72 seats on the council. Two members of YDNP were defeated, former chairman, Lib Dem Steve Macaré and Labour member from Selby, Steve Shaw-Wright. We will be holding a "bit of a do" for Steve Macaré, he was a good chairman and a good friend to Sedbergh, Garsdale and Dent.

Since my last article in April the new application for a Spar Retail Outlet with Health Centre on the former





auction mart site has been granted by the Planning Committee. There were many improvements on the previous application which meant that I and my colleagues on Sedbergh Parish Council were able, with reservations to give our support. I think there is a tendency during the febrile atmosphere surrounding a contentious application to exaggerate both the good and the harm that a particular proposal will bring. I sincerely wish the applicants and their supporters well with their permission. I think they could have handled things differently and hope that future applicants will bear that point in mind.

My first Neighbourhood Forum as your county councillor will be held at Dent on 30 June at 7.00 pm. The main item will be the Gypsies and Travellers and the mayhem which their annual visit generated once

again. Things cannot continue in this way. I have taken every opportunity to raise the prominence of the problem whether with William Hague's Chief of Staff or David Cameron himself. It is certainly true that the joint working group which has met for over two vears now has not made the difference which we would have liked but it is not true to say it has achieved nothing at all. But, enough is enough. I am much persuaded of the benefits of injunctions on fields which have been broken into, we saw that at Devil's Bridge and at the former auction mart site. The county and district staff all worked incredibly hard. I do not like criticising anyone but if the police do not intervene when fields are broken into, barns doors are smashed, people are intimidated going about their lawful business it can only lead to a feeling of despair in the resident community. Contrary to the press releases coming out of Eden this year's Appleby Horse Fair was not a success it was a travesty and for some residents of our parish a catastrophe.

The other major issue is that of Highways. I know there will be changes in the way these matters are handled and I intend to take a more proactive role, through the Neighbourhood Forum. I will write more about this in my next article.

Now I am district and county councillor I will be able to bring together issues which require both councils more easily than before. I intend to continue being a hard working councillor for all of the

SEDBERGH AND DISTRICT **HISTORY SOCIETY**

In spite of the inclement weather between twenty and thirty members visited St Oswald's Church, Thornton in Lonsdale on the first trip of the summer. Canon Hunter gave a very interesting talk about the history of the church and the village. He told us that although the first church on the site was built in the thirteenth century only the tower remains from the Norman period. An extensive renovation in the Gothic decorated style of the 14th century was undertaken by the Lancaster firm of Austin and Paley in 1870 but tragedy struck in 1933 when a fire destroyed the church, leaving it 'open to the sky, silent and gutted'. Fortunately, the survival of Austin and Paley's plans for the nineteenth century building enabled the present church to be constructed as a replica of the earlier edifice. Canon Hunter was able to draw similarities between St Oswald's fortunes were intertwined with the and St Andrew's in Sedbergh. For example, he noted that there was evidence of earlier windows constructed in the Palladian style in

both churches. At some stage in mediaeval times the administration and revenues of St Oswald's Church had been given, as often happened, to an abbev.

It is difficult to date the first settlement in Thornton. A rare 11th century grave slab which is decorated with flowers and vegetation rather than a human form provides the earliest evidence on the church site but 1/4 mile to the south east of the church Romano-British remains predate that memorial. Evidently, Thornton was a much more significant and wealthy place in past centuries than it is today. At one point it paid a higher poll tax than Skipton. Canon Hunter explained how its wealth and prestige of several important families. After the Norman Conquest the de Mowbravs became the dominant family in the area and it

is probable that they rebuilt the church in the 11th century. Another family, the de Thorntons had achieved a position of high status by the 14th century. However, after the defeat of the English by the Scots at the Battle of Bannockburn where Gregory of Thornton had fought in Edward the Second's army, Thornton in Lonsdale fell upon hard times due to marauding raids by the victorious Scots and a series of bad harvests. In and gradually the number of spite of these difficulties a rebuilding of the church in the Gothic style began, probably incorporating a more defensive tower. When the Black Death hit Thornton in 1347, wiping out half the population, including patrons and masons, the building was marriage certificate of Arthur Conan only partially completed.

Canon Hunter continued his chronological survey in the sixteenth century when the parish became part of the Chester diocese during the Reformation. The same century saw the start of parish registers which have given a picture of the developing community of Thornton in Lonsdale over the last five hundred years. He described how the custom

of charging fees for burials in the church building itself developed in the 17th century. The estate of the Redmaynes who were now the leading local family was sequestrated for their support of Charles 1st in the Civil War and Lady Sarah Redmayne fought to have it returned. Over the next century the Tathams and then the Foxcrofts became the most important landowners in Thornton churchgoers dwindled as the number of local Nonconformists grew.

Our visit concluded with a conducted tour of the church and the churchyard. Canon Hunter showed us various manuscripts including the Doyle. Outside he introduced us to some of the interesting inscriptions and unusual monuments.

Canon Hunter gave a really varied and stimulating presentation that introduced us not only to the history of Thornton in Lonsdale's beautiful church and churchyard but also to the locality and to some of the individuals who have lived there over the centuries.




ROME AGAIN!

Over a dozen people from Sedbergh, several from other parts England, one from France and two from the Republic of Ireland had a splendid day in Rome recently. The day began with a guided visit inside The Colosseum, that amazing building dating from the first century AD where gladiators fought for the entertainment of Emperor and beautiful Italian guide Simona, who then led us, in glorious sunshine, up the Palatine Hill, perhaps the most important of the Seven Hills of Rome. This is where all the wealthy citizens of Rome had houses before the Roman Empire began. Several centuries earlier it is where the Iron Age huts were, including the one where Romulus, founder of the city, was reared by a shepherd after he and his twin brother were rescued as babies from the River Tiber. On this hill are the remains of the palaces of Roman Emperors such as Tiberius and Nero. From it we had superb views of the Circus Maximus where once the chariot races (remember Ben Hur?) took place, and of the Ancient Forum with the remains of its Senate House, Temples and Basilicas. We could see the place where the body of Julius Caesar was cremated and where once stood the prison where St Peter and St Paul were kept prior to their execution. So much history right before our eyes....

In the afternoon we moved forward through the centuries, and, after a short coach tour of the sights of the

Eternal City, we found ourselves in St Peter's Square, confronting the facade of the largest church in Christendom, crowned by Michelangelo's dome. With a temperature well into the 80s, we looked at the chimney of the Sistine Chapel whose signals tell of the election of a new pope, admired Bernini's embracing colonnades, saw the window from which the Pope people. We learned so much from our blesses the crowds in the square and imagined the martyrdom of St Peter in the first century.

> This was one of seven great days spent in central Italy centred on the attractive spa town of Fiuggi. Another highlight of our week was a visit to the amazingly beautiful Gardens of



Ninfa, created by the English wife of an Italian aristocrat amid the ruins of a city abandoned in the sixteenth century because of malaria. About ninety years ago, trees and shrubs were planted, and today the deserted city of Ninfa has become one of the most romantic and beautiful gardens in the world. It is a place full of birdsong, a veritable haven - with lakes, clear running water and plants of every kind.

The town of Palestrina was another fascinating, newly-discovered treasure, not on the "tourist trail". We had heard of the sixteenth century composer of church music of the same name. We visited the fascinating house where he was born

We did not realise that the town of Palestrina was the seat of an ancient shrine to the Roman goddess Fortuna. We were able to scale the five terraces up grand staircases to the oracle where once stood a golden statue of Fortuna to whom animals were sacrificed in pre-Christian times to procure the goddess' favour or receive her guidance. A mind-boggling experience.

We had the traditional Pizza Margarita followed by Italian icecream in an Irish Pub and a delicious regional meal in a medieval hill-top town, not to mention wonderful meals each day in the family-run hotel. We had a fascinating talk by a local historian about our holiday area in Etruscan times and heard stories about how invading barbarians led the local tribes to abandon the plains and build their homes high on the tops of the pointed hills, with strong fortifications which remain today. And we enjoyed a piano recital on the Sunday evening by two talented young ladies, graduates of the Academy of Saint Cecilia in Rome.

It was another unforgettable week, the eighth Tour arising from the Italian classes at Sedbergh. Another is planned for September - already full - and we hope to make our tenth visit to this fascinating part of Central Italy in May 2010. Some Sedbergh people have chosen to make as many as six of these tours - they always contain so much of cultural and gastronomic interest. George D Handley

EUROPEAN IDENTITY

David Burbidge said in an article in Lookaround that an EU grant had been applied for. He must surely know that as far as the UK is concerned there is no such thing as an EU grant. The UK is a net contributor to EU funds. During the period 2000-2006, the latest figures available, the UK donated 27.80 billion euros NET, after rebate, whereas Spain received NET 44.84 billion euros. In other words we are paying to subsidise our competitors. These figures can be checked at http://ec.europa.eu/budget_the EU official website. This is as near as one can get to EU figures as they have not had their accounts signed for 14 years!!!!! Even if a "grant" is received HM Government has to match fund it so we taxpayers have paid twice for the privilege.

Apart from massive costs, £14 billions per year net, that sort of

money would build a brand new hospital every fortnight, of which we could make good use in this region especially in view of the proposed NHS cutbacks!!! The legislation that pours out of Brussels, at the rate of 8 new pieces per week, is crippling this country. 80% of Westminster time is simply rubber stamping EU legislation. Just to maintain this legislation costs, we the taxpayers, £134 billions per year!! Now that would go a long way to solving the national debt. It is EU directives that have destroyed our postal services by breaking up the Royal Mail monopoly (EU directive 2002/39/EU &97/67/ EEC) and British Rail (EU directive 91/440/EEC). Furthermore the Post Office spent £1billion setting up payments for pensions etc. which contributes 12 % of sub-postmasters' income. However under EU law this has to go out to tender and if lost could result in a further 3000 post

JULY GARDENING

The first flush of Hybrid tea. Floribunda, Shrub and Climbing roses should now be underway, and will hopefully be followed by a succession of large colourful blooms for weeks to come. It is always important to remove fading blooms so that the plants do not put any of their much needed energy into the production of fruit and seed, and to hasten the growth and opening of new flowers. The Rose gardener at Harlow Carr used to cut off great stems of flowers still in bloom on Monday mornings in order to ensure that the plants grew on swiftly and were at their best for the following weekend when most of the visitors would arrive. This treatment is far too drastic for me in "my" gardens as I want to squeeze every last drop of colour and fragrance out of each bloom. I usually give my roses a light prune at the same time as dead heading. I cut back the old stems to a healthy bud about halfway down each stem to keep the plant within bounds and to encourage the formation of new stems.

Roses are hungry feeders, and a dose of high potash Rose fertiliser now will make them flower on into the late summer and autumn and will ripen up the new growths making them tougher and less susceptible to frost damage and dieback. Even with this treatment some hybrid teas struggle and fail on the thin stony soil in the Firbank garden and it is the tough old

cultivars of *R.rugosa* and rampant climbers such as *R.filipes* 'Kiftsgate', *R.* 'Summer Wine', *R.* 'American Pillar and *R.* 'Seagull' which go on from strength to strength. Others are almost worth treating in the same way as bedding or cut flowers – as a

temporary splash of colour and beauty. Top in this category for me is *Rosa chinensis* 'Mutabilis' (now renamed *R. x odorata* 'Mutabilis'), a china rose with

TREATMENT OF LOW BACK PAIN

A thoughtful neighbour put a newspaper cutting through my letterbox recently, which informed me that acupuncture treatment for low back pain is to be made available on the NHS. This is very good news as it improve the functioning of the lower will provide an alternative to painkillers and anti-inflammatory drugs. Acupuncture not only addresses back pain, but can also be : loosening tight shoulder muscles beneficial for the person's general health. Thought the article did say, that it was not yet clear how or when funding would be made available, so you may have to wait a while.

The first priority, in designing such a treatment, is obviously the pain in the lower back. Acupuncture points which address this include points close to the lumbar spine, points slightly further out from the spine in the waist area and points in the large muscles in the hip area. circulation in the lower body generally. If the person had sciatica the involvement of the legs would be obvious, but even if there is no pain radiating down the legs, there are important points on the legs which back. These are principally points in the calves and around the ankles. As the shoulders and hips work together, would also form part of the treatment.

Chronic or recurrent low back pain always occurs against a background of some kind of weakness of the lower body. External weakness in the muscles, tendons and ligaments may be addressed by exercises to strengthen these and improve circulation. There are many ways to do this: exercises may be prescribed by a physiotherapist but the regular practice of yoga, Pilates or Tai Chi can also be effective. One of the best exercises for maintaining the health of the lower back is walking uphill and here we are ideally placed to do this.

There is also the question of internal weakness, that is, weakened functioning of the internal organs of the body. This often shows itself as more frequent or difficult urination or possibly as constipation or diarrhoea. Other organs may also be involved, for example if the heart is not working well, circulation to the muscles will be impaired. A good acupuncture treatment takes all this into account. There are acupuncture points either side of the spine, relating to all the major organs of the body, and I often

However, Thomas

Gorst, who regularly organizes the wrestling bouts at Killington Sports, was told recently by John Morgan of the Lakeland Sports Promoters Association that he had seen a reference to Killington Sports in a from 1843. Whenever it started, the tradition lives on healthily and is regularly supported by local running clubs and athletes from as far as Keswick, Penrith, Appleby, Ingleton, and Lancaster.

Competitors of all ages entertained the hundreds of spectators who turned out to enjoy the usual packed programme of events at this year's Killington Sports, - once again

blessed with fine weather. Traditional Lakeland sports such as fell-racing, running and Cumberland and Westmorland Wrestling were interspaced with fun events such as egg-and-spoon, tyre-, potato-, threelegged and sack-races, pillow fights and egg throwing. COUNCILLORS CORNER

Well it's good to be back after taking a short break from these articles over the election period. First, Peter and I would like to offer our congratulations to our District Council colleague Kevin Lancaster who was elected to Cumbria County Council at the recent Hopefully the Travellers and Settled local government elections as the member for the Sedbergh and Kirkby Lonsdale Division. We wish him well in his new role (and now over to you on the state of the roads Kevin!). We equally offer our commiserations to our own Lib Dem candidate Fenner Pearson who fought a hard campaign ably assisted by local volunteers and activists and who lost to Kevin by only 13 votes. Across the board Lib Dem Councillors increased their representation on the County Council to sixteen and the majority of these members represent South Lakeland. This is, of course, a tribute to the work of our MP Tim Farron without whom none of this would have been possible. As ever, now that the elections are over the real task of working hard for the whole of the electorate goes on.

Despite the elections the challenge of the annual incursion by Travellers continues. Notwithstanding the amount of preparation undertaken by all the agencies involved throughout the year, 2009 once again presented really serious difficulties for local residents: trespass and unauthorised grazing, harassment and intimidation, criminal damage, obstructing the highway and public footpaths, using the countryside and edges of towns as well as people's gardens as public

toilets etc., etc. were much in evidence and, if anything, proved to be even worse than last year. Even accepting that the problems are caused by a very small minority of what are otherwise law abiding Travellers, enough is enough. Community Respect Group will continue to meet during the course of the year but this time we must learn from the lessons of this year and have all systems fully in place before the first arrivals in 2010. The ultimate sanction would be the threat to end the Fair altogether although this might be difficult bearing in mind the legal implications of Fair Charter rights etc. Another would be to reduce the Fair in size and scope so that it once again became simply a Horse Fair rather than the multifarious event that it has become over recent years. Nor must we forget that we are living in a free society committed to respecting the rights of minority groups. The former president of the Czech Republic Vaclav Havel once said: "the strength of a country's democracy may be judged by the way that it treats its Gypsies".



MAY WEATHER

As the seasons progress temperatures, as expected, continue to climb up the thermometer. This month was the first without a frost. In fact on only 3 nights did temperatures: dip into 30sF with a low of 38.5F. With on the trees. The bluebells, greater the wind chill factor added we still had: a eleven nights effectively at or below freezing. All maximum temperatures made it into the 50sF with a high of 80.1F at the end of the month!! I thought my sensor was playing tricks until I checked it on the old maximum and minimum thermometer.

Atmospheric pressure reflected this improvement being average or above throughout the month. It was also a breezy month with all maximum gusts recorded being in double figures with a high of 24.4mph. Rainfall came in patches with 3 separate 5 days dry spells finally totalling 3.43 inches

May is a truly pretty month with colour in the hedgerows and gardens together with the fresh green leaves stitchwort and lady's bedstraw make a colourful display whilst in the hedgerow the May blossom gives us a second display as the blackthorn fades. Around the garden the colour comes from the azaleas, Spanish bluebells, bistort, early lupins, Rosa rugosa along with several shades of pink and white of the ornamental cherries, the mauve of wisteria, the orange balls of buddleia globosa and the first roses towards the end of the


month. The oak beat the ash by a long way this year so let's hope the old rhyme true and we "only get a slash" and the promised long hot summer. We could do with one to get some hay, get stock into good condition and the ground to dry out before the next wet period. Butterflies have been noticeable by their absence. The ones which hibernate and are therefore on the wing early, such as the red admiral and small tortoiseshell haven't been around in our garden. I've seen one painted lady; we have apparently had a number migrate from the continent during the warm spell at the end of the month. A few small whites make up the remainder. We have had no

frogs in the pond and only a few newts. Slugs and snails are about in profusion once again. May is the best month for bird song but you have to be up early to get the best with the dawn chorus. The blackbirds have got their first clutch away in the shippon but the magpies took yet more collared dove eggs. Feeding the chickens one morning I was aware of a disturbance in one of our Christmas trees and turned round to see a sparrow hawk take of with a blackbird in its talons! If there is a decline in house sparrows it is not around here. Apart from those feeding around the bird feeders there are always a few that get into the pheasant pens bur seem unable to get back out.



One possible solution may be to reduce the width of the carriageway here to a generous single lane, giving priority to traffic leaving Sedbergh. It would also serve to slow down the irresponsible minority of drivers who presently enter the town at an unsafe pace. Having slowed the traffic down perhaps a reduced speed limit should apply for the town centre.

WIND TURBINES

Update on Wind Turbine applications in the Kendal Low Fells and the Lune Valley

Many people are not happy with the idea of wind turbines covering our beautiful hills as they are expensive, inefficient and need backing up by conventional power stations all the time so that our lights do not go out when the wind stops.

As many of you will know, the Armistead Public Inquiry took place between April 28th and May 6th in Kendal. It seemed to go well and we were supported by over 50 witnesses. However, Government are now so persistent about renewables that it is impossible to say how it will go. We

are currently waiting for the Inspectors ruling which should appear in the next 3-4 weeks and will no doubt be headlines in the Westmorland Gazette when it happens. To put our case forward we raised almost £17,400 and would like to thank anyone who donated / contributed or supported in any way a splendid effort in just 7 weeks. Unfortunately, Whirlwind Renewables have also lodged an appeal against the SLDC decision to turn down the Sillfield application on land just 1.5 km from the Armistead site. So here we go again - a second Public Inquiry. The Sillfield (Endmoor) Inquiry starts October 13th and will last up to eight days. There are,

SEDBERGH & DISTRICT HISTORY SOCIETY

visit to RYDAL HALL on 6th June. On a blustery and wet afternoon 13 members met at Rydal Hall to be greeted by Tom Attwood, who had overseen the restoration of the gardens there between 2005 and 2007. He described himself as the Head, and only, Gardener. Rydal Hall, together with 34 acres, now belongs to the Dioceses of Carlisle, having been purchased by them from the Fleming family in 1970. The setting is deliahtful.

Tom gave a brief history of the gardens, which had been designed in 1909 by Thomas Hayton Mawson for Sir Stanley Fleming, the then owner of the Hall. Only old photographs and 'concept' drawings survived to help Tom in the restoration work. It was one of the smallest-scale gardens Mawson designed and it bore the

ideas, especially in the use of precast concrete. However, it is not certain that the finished garden was all the work of Mawson as it may have been partly that of a local builder or contractor. There was some reconstruction of the garden in the 1920s and its decline dates from the 1940s, when the Hall was leased to tenants who could not afford to maintain them. In its heyday the garden would have been tended by three or four gardeners.

The decision to restore the gardens was made in 2000 and five years of preparation followed, including raising £500,000 from grants etc. Tom explained the practical problems of restoration and replanting. It was fortunate that some of the original urns survived, together with a mould for the balustrade. As to planting he had to balance new against old varieties of plants and was fortunate signs of his style and of his innovative in that some old roses and a fine

A very important part of the work was the involvement of volunteers and student horticulturalists from Myerscough and Newton Rigg. Also, plants were sourced locally where possible. The restoration was completed on time and under budget.

Tom took us on a tour of the formal gardens, explaining as we proceeded. We saw the restored croquet lawn, rescued from the attentions of Herdwick sheep and footballers. The original was one of the earliest in the north of England. Then we were shown the informal 'quiet garden', beautifully planted, and with a stream flowing through a

small pond. Further along we came upon the summer house, newly and finely re-panelled, and with a breathtaking view of the waterfalls.

Finally, Tom took us to see the community vegetable plot, with its fine new greenhouse, on the site of the original 1750s vegetable garden. Varieties of old northern apple trees have been planted in an adjoining orchard where bees are hived.

Tom's parting advice was to consult Mawson's book, the Art and Craft of Garden Making.

On behalf of us all Richard Cann thanked Tom most warmly for giving us the benefit of his knowledge and expertise.

Auction Mart site development – Sedbergh Parish Council view

Elsewhere in *Lookaround* I am sure that you will have read about the recent decision of the YDNP Planning Committee to approve the revised plans for the development of the old Auction Mart site at Sedbergh. Throughout the planning process the Parish Council has been portrayed as being against the development of a new Health Centre on this site. This is untrue. The Parish Council have consistently supported the need for a new Health Centre. The problem was the likely impact of the new Spar Store on the longer term vitality and viability of the Main Street. The original planning application, to which the Parish Council objected in December 2008, contained no mitigating measures. As a result of the stand taken by the Parish Council the revised application allowed for trading to continue in the existing store for at least two years and other measures which will be of benefit to the town. This revised application provided a better balance between the health needs of the town and its economic future and it was welcomed and supported by the Parish Council at the YDNP Planning Committee meeting on 8th June.

CUMBRIA WILDLIFE TRUST

Our Local Reserves: Smardale Gill
This unique reserve is situated
about one mile south of Kirkby
Stephen and can be reached via
Newbiggin or the Smardale hamlet
itself. It occupies a three and a half
mile section of disused railway which
once ran from Tebay to Darlington. At
the northern end, the reserve also
includes steep wooded slopes of the
gill carved by Scandale Beck whilst
south of the viaduct the character
changes to open rolling countryside.

Because of the abundance of flora and fauna found here, the reserve has been designated a Site of Special of herb species such as bloody Scientific Interest.

by blue moor grass, rare elsewled Britain. Amongst this grows a new flow of herb species such as bloody cranesbill, birds foot sedge, cor

Evidence of man's activities in the area, long before the coming of the railway, is abundant. The remains of a Romano-British settlement can still be seen on the lower slopes of Crosby Garrett fell. Smardale Bridge was originally built for the pack horses of the 15th century. Old charcoal pitsteads are visible testimony to managed woodland and a metal-smelting industry.

The railway was started in 1857 to transport coke from the coalfields of Durham to the furnaces of Barrow and the west coast. This route required a splendid viaduct constructed in 1860 of local sandstone and using lime mortar produced from the nearby lime-kilns. The line closed in 1962. In 1990 the Northern Viaduct Trust carried out major repairs making it safe for visitors to the reserve.

Cumbria Wildlife Trust is managing

the track-side areas where birch, willow and hazel have colonised the banks. Primroses, bluebells, ramsons and many fern species can be seen in spring in the older more diverse woodland areas which are also frequented by roe deer and red squirrels. Bird species include redstart, wood warbler and pied flycatcher in the summer with buzzard, treecreeper and sparrowhawk in evidence all year round.

The grassland areas are dominated by blue moor grass, rare elsewhere in Britain. Amongst this grows a number of herb species such as bloody cranesbill, birds foot sedge, common rockrose and wild thyme. Common spotted orchid, fly and fragrant orchids also grow on the grassy slopes of the embankments and cuttings.

The grass attracts a rare butterfly, the Scotch Argus. Its eggs are laid on the leaves of the blue moor grass, a staple food of the caterpillars. Adults can be seen flying in late July to early September. Smardale is one of just two sites in England where the butterfly occurs. Others to look out for include common blue, northern brown argus and dingy skipper. The Trust is managing the grasslands by scrub removal and light sheep grazing to maintain the rich flora and invertebrate fauna.

A wheelchair and pushchair friendly track follows the old railway track from Smardale to Newbiggin.



SEDBERGH SCHOOL

Hinton's Record Run

17 year old Sedbergh Schoolboy, Tom Hinton (SH), not only completed a marathon fell run on Friday, he did so in what is believed to be a record time by a school boy: he took just 6 hours and 44 minutes from the top of Wandale to the summit of Winder. The 28 mile course, designed by Alan Evans in 1985, incorporates all 31 peaks higher than 1500 feet in the Howgill Fells/Brant Fell, which represent a combined climb of 10,000 feet.

The course record is 4 hours and 49 minutes, which is held by senior, Hugh Symonds, a teacher at Sedbergh School. The previous

record time for a schoolboy is believed to have been 8 hours and 6 minutes, which was achieved by Simon Madge in 1990, the Captain of running at Sedbergh School, followed by Andrew Brown, who completed the run in a similar time in 1991.


