

#### **DENT PARISH COUNCIL**

n addition to the August Parish Council meeting, a public meeting was held in Dent at the end of July about the extraction of timber from the Littletown plantation. The full Council minutes are published as usual on the Dentdale website, www. dentdale.com.

#### Littletown Plantation

About 40 people attended a meeting on July 28th in the Memorial Hall about the felling, extraction and replanting of the trees on the Littletown plantation. The meeting was addressed by Jim O'Neill from the Forestry Commission, Phill Hibbs, the Yorkshire Dales National Park Trees and Woodlands Officer and Steve Dresser from Euroforest Ltd,.

Jim O'Neill explained that parts of the plantation have already blown down, and its age means that there is : 07831 821397 now a requirement to fell it completely. This will happen over the next few months and the timber will be taken out of the Dale over Stonehouse Bridge. A six-wheeled lorry will make up to five journeys a day between the plantation and the Dent head viaduct, where the timber will be transferred to a larger vehicle and taken out via the Ingleton-Hawes road. The contractors, who had already carried out trial runs to establish the feasibility of their plans, intend to complete the extraction by May 2010 at the latest. Wherever possible, the timber movements will be timed to avoid the school bus run and any other known busy times. When the extraction is over, the lower anybody else.

Just bear in mind the appointment is not just an honorific one, governors are expected to work damned hard. The fact that our local schools are so good is a testament amongst other things to how hard the governing bodies do work.

**JOSS LANE AND LOFTUS HILL CAR PARKS** – Once again we are coming around to the time of year when Sedbergh local permits have to be renewed. No doubt there will be some complaints about paying £35 per year or £52 per year for over night parking but in truth it represents incredibly good value for money. Yes, the parish is more than breaking even on the car parks but again that is down to the hard work of those people most closely involved. We still have drainage issues on Joss Lane and the more observant will have noticed the red spots on some of the parking places. This is to formalise the arrangements for market days so some cars can park in the areas which are not needed for the market. One disappointment has been the ingenuity which one or two have used to get around the original common sense rules. This means that this time you will have to sign a form on receipt of your parking stickers and

the rules have regrettably had to be tightened.

**PLAY AREAS** – Both Sedbergh and Kirkby Lonsdale have benefited enormously from the public spirited nature of groups of people who have done so much to advance the cause of children's play areas. At one of the very first county council meetings councillors were told of a pot of £12,000 capital money for each division. The catch was that it had to be on one use and allocated before September. I have decided to spend my pot on the two play areas at Sedbergh and Kirkby Lonsdale. My intention is to keep the scheme simple for the first year. I know of improvements wanted at both which



I have had several meetings with the Ambulance service recently. People with more minor conditions are still being taken to Lancaster Hospital when they could be so much more easily be taken to the Westmorland General Hospital. We estimate that about 50% of the ambulance trips from this area down the M6 to Lancaster are unnecessary. The problem seems to lie with some rather out of date protocols that the ambulance service works by but I am fairly sure that we can sort this out and reduce the amount of time many people from places like Sedbergh and Dent spend in an ambulance before they are treated if they are unfortunate enough to have an accident.

Finally, as you know I like to keep these columns focused upon the work we have been doing that is of immediate benefit to people who read



Lookaround, however, a few weeks ago we received a note commenting upon some articles in Lookaround that mentioned the European Union and asking what my position is on this issue. I could take more than my allotted space on this issue but I will try to be brief:

I am in favour of European Union membership, I cannot see much alternative to it in these days of increasingly international crime, the need for international trade to get this country back on its feet and concern over climate change issues. An organisation which has resulted in us having constructive negotiations countries who not long ago had nuclear weapons pointed at us cannot be all bad. However, I do believe that the EU is badly run and that the current Government does not itim@timfarron.co.uk. do any of us any favours in the way it approaches negotiations over many

issues. Take the recent move to electronically tag sheep as an example, if the Government had entered into discussions over this issue at the proper time and place we would never have reached the position we are in currently where we are having to fight a rear guard battle to stop this unnecessary expense for our farmers. In addition the Government does use the EU as an excuse for many of its own failures. An example of this would be the recent battle we have been fighting to have local Mountain Rescue Teams made tax exempt like other charitable organisations. The EU was the reason the Government gave for not agreeing to this measure and as a result we have had to spend time finding out from the EU Commissioner responsible that they are not to blame before we can apply pressure to the correct organisation the Government!

I am, however, in favour of a referendum on EU membership to clear the air, the relationship between the EU and this country has been allowed to become so poisonous that we can never hope to get into the driving seat and start to take it in the direction that would be of most benefit to us.

A couple of queries have arisen recently so hopefully the following will clarify any misunderstandings:

 When you ring 999 for an ambulance, the Ambulance Trust will automatically contact the First

Responders, depending on the nature of the medical emergency. First Responders are not alerted to all emergencies (for example, young people under the age of 12 or road traffic accidents). You do not have to mention to the emergency services that you would like the involvement of the first responders – they are automatically notified. First responders are likely to get to the scene before the ambulance arrives because they are locally based and they remain on the scene with the patient until the ambulance arrives.

- First responders are called out only by the ambulance service first responders are not able to be called out other than through the ambulance service.
- If the patient does not want resuscitation, then the patient must have already signed a Do Not Resuscitate Order, which will have to be re-signed on a regular (for example, monthly) basis by the patient and doctor; this order must be presented to the first responders as they attend.

I do hope this clears up misunderstandings that may have arisen, but if anyone still has concerns or indeed is interested in becoming a first responder themselves, please contact the group secretary (John Sugden 25303) or Chair (Jenny Pilgrim 25560).

#### A NIGHT OF DISCOVERY

Ancient Egypt in the People's Hall ack in 2001, in my professional capacity as a vertical transportation (lift and escalator consultant), I received a rather odd phone call from an author, Roy Bainton, who lives in Mansfield, Nottinghamshire. He'd been approached by a couple of retired, mechanically-minded chaps, John Ellis and Jim Smith, who had spent several years working on an innovative new theory on how the ancient Egyptians built the last of the Seven Wonders of The World, the Great Pyramid at Giza. John and Jim had commissioned Roy to write a

book about their hypothesis, and he

was having difficulty with the mathematics and the logistics of lifting heavy weights.

The subject of the pyramid began to intrigue me, and I met these people in Mansfield on the way back from a meeting at the Space Centre in Leicester. Before long, I'd been drawn into this arcane world of wonder, with model pyramids, questions about lifts, ropes, wheels and masonry. However, due to the difficulty in finding an archaeologist willing to support us, the work became sporadic, with long periods of inactivity, and Roy Bainton and I almost gave up several times, until a breakthrough in York in July 2008, when John and Jim successfully



demonstrated their ideas to the University's archaeology faculty.

At long last, the highly unusual book which will reveal all, The Spirit In The Wheel, is being published, and as we are England's Book Town, the launch of this work will take place as a special event on Thursday September 24 at 7.30pm in The People's Hall as part of the Festival of Books and Drama.

In tandem with this factual book Roy will also be launching his new adventure novel, Cartouche which is loosely based on the same scenario – pyramid building.

The second half of the evening, which Roy has entitled 'Young, Blonde, Buxom and Beautiful' will be

a light-hearted look at the fraught world of a modern 'jobbing writer' — as Roy says, 'sadly, we're not all J.K. Rowling...'. So if you've ever wanted to be a writer, come along and pick up some tips. There'll be a bar, refreshments and a book stall, and you'll be the first people in the country to be able to have a signed first edition. Looks like a good night — so book early!

There'll be nothing dry, dusty or academic about this show, which will follow the books using music, audiovisual material, and the author/presenter Roy Bainton is an amusing and entertaining raconteur.

controlled performance. ## YORKSHIRE DALES NATIONAL PARK

aterwheels could be turning again all over the Yorkshire Dales National Park if a scheme to generate electricity is backed by landowners and residents.

Nearly 50 potential sites for small-scale hydro-electric units have been considered in a study commissioned by the Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority (YDNPA). (There are 3 listed in our area:- Rash Mill, Sedbergh School/Millthrop Mill & Cautley Farm. Ed)

Authority members have agreed to spend up to £3,000 to arrange seminars to promote small-scale hydro power to National Park landowners and communities groups.

Kendal-based Inter Hydro Technology (IHT) Ltd was asked to carry out a feasibility study on 49 potential sites.

It estimated each site's potential power outputs and its economic viability, and gave a preliminary assessment of any regulatory and environmental barriers to development.

More detailed work involving environmental impacts and constraints is required to make a full assessment of the sites.

The report concluded that there were many worthwhile opportunities for hydro power in the Yorkshire Dales National Park and the economic viability of some sites may be improved on by further

investigation. For example, there are several sites that could become more viable if landowners were able to undertake some of the construction themselves.

Several landowners, developers and local communities have already shown interest in the study. To respond to this, the Authority intends to host one or two seminars about small-scale hydro power in the Dales later this year. The Authority is also looking at how it can best support the development of potential schemes.

# **HEALTH UPDATE**

Flu jab season not far away! ollowing last year's successful trial of the Saturday morning seasonal Flu clinics we propose to repeat the process. At this stage we only have scheduled deliveries for the seasonal Flu immunisations and have no information as to when the Swine Flu immunisations will be available. As a reminder seasonal flu immunisation is offered to all those over the age of 65 along with health & social care workers, patients in at risk groups and those caring for the immuno-compromised.

We will be running 3 Saturday morning clinics on the 26th September, 3rd and 24th October. We don't mind which day you turn up to but would ask that folks with surnames beginning A-G arrive between 9 and 10am, surnames H-Q between 10 and 11, with surnames R onwards between 11 and 11.30. Last admittance will be at 11.30. We will of course try a pick up any stragglers as quickly as possible within our usual working hours. The seasonal flu vaccine order has been increased a little to reflect a generally increased uptake, along with a larger fridge in the practice to store the vaccines. Last winter was pretty rough in the flu stakes so immunisation for the at risk groups is always recommended.

With regard to the Swine Flu immunisation programme you will know as much as we do at the moment. It is anticipated that the vaccine will become available in

October/November with target groups including persons aged 6 months to 65 years in seasonal Flu at risk groups (not asthmatics), Health & Social Care workers, pregnant women, carers of the immunocompromised and also patients over 65 in the seasonal flu at risk groups. We have trained extra personnel to administer Flu immunisations this year and feel confident in being able to provide this service to the locality.


On Monday morning we were all invited to visit Settlebeck. The school has helped a lot with French resources for Mary Happy School, and Alison Brown, Head of

We met Dr Greene who was most interested to compare notes on the two schools. Alison showed us round the school with its well kept buildings. its IT, library and technical resources, so much better than the African school. But the exchange of ideas was interesting for both.

Mary Happy School has 1100 pupils aged 3 to 16 on 2 sites in a poor area of Nairobi. Mary and Richard started the school 12 years ago and soon realised the need of a home for some of the poorest children and those who Languages has made some links with lost parents. The Upper School is 4

storeys high, Both buildings are built of concrete and breeze blocks, with a summer term they have an stone staircase outside the building which would never pass our Health and Safety standards! The Upper School is 4 storeys high. There is no assembly hall, gym, workshops, labs or library. They do now have a computer room as enough computers have been donated for them to teach basic skills. School Assemblies take place outdoors and have to be postponed if wet! Playtimes are staggered as there is not enough room for all in the concrete playground. Each class goes by bus once a week to a playing field for games. The Settlebeck teachers realised how privileged we are here.

It was the first time Mary had seen a secondary school in the UK. Alison

explained that, at the end of the Alternative Curriculum Week, where this year the children have a chance to learn Theatre Skills, First Aid and even Circus Skills. We watched the Circus Skills in the hall with interest, where children were learning to balance on a large ball and walk a tight rope! Alison pointed out that this was definitely not part of the usual curriculum! Mary had a go on the tight rope! Kendi and Jeremy tried out a tennis racquet outside where children were playing on the court. Mary marvelled at the courts and the playing field. She would like to offer her pupils an Alternative Curriculum, maybe one day she will.



In the afternoon we held an 'At Home' in Kings Court so supporters of the school and Kidzone could meet Mary. We were quite overwhelmed by the number of people who came. There weren't enough chairs for everyone! Simon helped Mary answer questions and Howgill WI presented her with enough knitted square blankets to cover all the Kidzone beds! They will really make a big difference and brighten up the children's living space. They still need sponsors for Kidzone, particularly monthly donations however small, because this enables them to budget. They also appreciate single donations and put this money into a fund for the

children's outings. These are very much needed, otherwise the children stay on the school premises the whole time and have only a small concrete yard to play in. as they live on the Lower School site. It has been quite a struggle to set up Kidzone because promised funding did not arrive. Now, at last, most of the basic costs are covered but more is needed to add to the children's quality of life.

### **COUNCILLORS CORNER**

s I observed in my last year, matters relating to during August: councillors and officers are either away on holiday or staying at home and "lying low". So I have relatively little new to report this month.

You may be interested to know that recently a draft Report was published looking into possible changes to the Sedbergh Conservation Area boundaries. Some of you will have attended consultation meetings or been on the guided walks which were organised to look at the existing boundaries on the ground. The report, albeit prepared by private consultants, was commissioned by the the YDNPA. I have asked for hard copies of the Report to be lodged at the Community Office and the Library in Sedbergh but so far I have yet to see them there. If you are having difficulty in accessing a copy please let me know and I will email it to you. The Report goes into considerable detail on the history, topography and built environment of the Town and as such makes very interesting reading. It is accompanied by a couple of maps showing the proposed boundary change recommendations in detail.

Every year the Oversight and Scrutiny Committees of SLDC (I am a member of Resources O & S) set up a number of small "Task" groups to look in depth at a number of issues that neither the full Council nor the

parent Committees have the time to do full justice to. These groups meet Lookaround article this time on a regular basis and usually after about eight to ten meetings have SLDC tend to go fairly quiet i enough evidence on which to base a full written Report. The Task Group can call witnesses, ask to see documents and make site visits etc. This year I volunteered to be a member of the Visitor Information Task Group whose remit is to look at how South Lakeland can be made an even better place to visit and the various ways in which information about the area can be more fully and effectively communicated to our visitors. As well as traditional ways such as Tourist Information Centres we shall also be looking at the use of websites, signage, inter-active street technology (such as touch screens) and accommodation accreditation. If anyone has any ideas about this please let me know.

Completed bus and foot tour of Cumbria for Patagonia friendship link July 2009

tarting from Penrith Methodist Church on Tuesday 7 July, Martin Dodds used his pensioner bus-pass and his feet (and the occasional offered lifts) to visit 15 chapels scattered across the county whose initials spell out

PatagoniaCumbria, finally finishing at Arnside on 30 July. Martin lives in Sedbergh and is co-ordinator for the partnership link between the Cumbria Methodist District and the Patagonia Region of the Methodist Church of Argentina.



Numbers at each place varied depending on local commitments on the day and the time that I was able to go. With a small group we had the chance for more detailed conversation, with a larger group there was the opportunity to reach more people. Altogether a rewarding and useful experience.'



House. On Saturday Martha Airey, who was Dick's housekeeper used to put the fire on and bake and when she had finished we could use the oven and Mum used to bake bread. cakes and finish off with a big rice pudding with raisins in. We kids used to lie on the biggest rag rug in front of known as the First and Second car, the fire until it died down - who needs television?

Where we had lived previously, I don't think we ever saw a postman; in : Garsdale he was a very important part of our lives. Two who come to mind were Mr Bert Arthurs and Tommy Hill who was tragically killed further up the dale, in the snow I seem to recall. They brought us letters from my Dad who was in the forces, and most importantly my packs of foreign stamp approvals, on which most of my pocket money was spent. I read almost anything I could -'Just William' being among my favourites (I still have some!) and Enid Blyton's Sunny Stories which Phyllis used to get from somewhere.





#### **TEXTILE MILLS**

by George Ingle

he thousands of people who visit the Dales today are often unaware that this beautiful area used to support a thriving textile industry, and that large mills employing considerable workforces – especially children - stood in popular spots like Malhamdale and Aysgarth.

George Ingle is the author of Yorkshire Cotton, in which he brought to light the part played by cotton in Yorkshire's history. This new book,

based on over fifty years' research, shows how local cottage industries in the Dales such as hand-spinning, weaving and knitting were superseded as mechanisation and industrialisation took on the large-scale supply of textiles of different kinds for the mass market.

The author gives the background to the development of over seventy mills in the Dales and explains how they frequently changed from spinning one fibre to another. These mills are described from their foundation to their demise, with illustrations where possible. Only one is still in production.

Sites covered include the areas around Skipton, Settle and Sedbergh, Wharfedale and Littondale, together with the Washburn Valley, Wensleydale and Swaledale. Information about the firms, child labour, and hand-loom weavers' riots is included as well as details of the buildings, the machinery in them and their power sources.

"Textile Mills" contains 191 pages, over 70 photographs and illustrations and Map





#### **COMMUNITY OFFICER REPORT**

ver the last month the Sedbergh, Dent and Garsdale area has seen low levels of reported crime. The police have received one report of theft from a commercial premises and a report of an attempt of 'ringing the changes' in one of the local shops, this is when a customer attempts to confuse the shop assistant by asking for change in order to receive more money in change than was originally handed over. A message was successfully sent via the Text alert System to update the other shops and cafes etc.

A snowball system has been set up for the Dent shops, Cafes and pubs which is linked to the Sedbergh Text Alert System. This should help to ensure a link between the two places is maintained to help to protect local businesses.

I am still receiving a small number of complaints regarding the problem of dog fouling; this appears to continue in certain area, particularly on more secluded walk ways. Please be aware that a fixed penalty notice of £75 can be issued to dog owners who fail to clean up after their dogs, this is enforced by SLDC (South Lakeland District Council).




