DENT PARISH COUNCIL

Much of the November meeting focused on finance, and decisions were taken about car park charges, the allocation of grants to local organisations and next year's budget and precept. Full details, including the budget, are published on the Dentdale website, www.dentdale.

Budget and Precept

The council approved the budget for 2010-11 at the November meeting. Excluding grants and the car park income, this year the council's expenditure will be just over £10,300, and next year this is expected to rise to over £13,600. The two main reasons for this are increased staff costs, because the Clerk's ever increasing work-load means we need to increase his hours, and increased spending on the playing field next year to carry out the improvements mentioned above.

The council decided that in the present economic climate it should not increase the amount residents pay through their council tax. Instead, the extra expenditure will be covered by increasing the car park charges and by drawing on reserves.

Car Park Charges

In approving next year's budget, the council considered the present structure of car park charges, and decided to retain the present arrangement of free parking for residents. While the all day charge for non-residents will also stay the same at £4.50, the two hour charge will be

raised from £1.20 to £1.50, and the annual permits for holiday cottage owners will go up from £60 to £65. These changes will take effect from mid-December.

Car Park Lease

The meeting agreed to renew the lease for Dent Car park for a further five years when the present one expires at the end of March next year. The rent will remain unchanged, at £3,000 per year. This is a relatively low rent compared with the amount charged for other local car parks, and by the time the new lease ends in 2015, there will have been no increase in rent for 10 years. Although the parish council had tried to persuade the National Park to

lease the car park rent-free, this was always going to be unlikely, and so it was felt that what was proposed was the best deal available.

Grants

The council was presented with a problem when it came to allocating grants to local organisations, as there were 22 applications for grant funding this year compared with thirteen in 2008, and the amount of money available had not increased.

The council decided that its procedure for allocating grants needs to be reviewed to cope with this level of demand, and so a group has been set up to make recommendations before next year's application round. For this year, the council applied an



across-the-board percentage cut to organisations that had received a grant last year, and limited new applicants to £100. There were three exceptions made to this: the Allotments Association received £400, because the provision of allotments is one of the few things a parish council is obliged to do; the Sedbergh and District Community Office received £400, as the council had agreed to support it some time ago and the situation had not changed; and the Great North Air Ambulance received £300 because it was felt it provided such a vital service for the dale.

As the lack of mobile phone coverage in Dentdale makes it difficult particularly for visitors to contact the emergency services, the parish council agreed to try and persuade BT to reverse its decision.

Playing Field

The playing field committee is currently looking at two issues: how best to combat flooding, and whether improvements can be made to the pavilion. A business plan is being produced, with input from Dentdale

Show committee who have offered to help with funding if a suitable scheme can be devised.

Payments to Councillors

Parish council members decided once again not to claim allowances for their work in the coming year. This means that although the council employs and pays three staff – the Clerk and the two Car Park Administrators – none of the councillors, including the Chair, are paid for what they do.

David Hartley

David Hartley, the vice-chair, resigned from the council at the end of October, after five year's service to the community. This included chairing the car park committee and

SEDBERGH PARISH COUNCIL

The latest council meeting was held on Thursday 29th October at the People's Hall. Full minutes can be read at the Community Office in Sedbergh. Below are some of the items discussed.

Car Parks

The meeting agreed that as from April 2010 the Car Park charges will be increased as they have been held at the same level for three years and cost increase every year. The one hour charge will be scrapped and the following changes made. Two hours will increase to £1.50, the three hours will increase to £2.50, four hours will decrease to £3.00 and all day will increase to £4.50. It is hoped that this will raise sufficient income to cover increased costs and will encourage tourists to stay a little longer and spend a little more with local businesses.

It was reported that The Producers Market had had a poor season partly due to the weather and a decision will be taken in November as to whether it is viable to continue with it.


Planning

No objections were made by the council to any of this month's planning applications.

Concern was once more expressed about the poor state of the vacant shop at 37-39 Main Street and a letter is being sent by the Chairman to the head of Yorkshire Dales Planning Department, asking that urgent action is taken to ensure this listed building is put into good order.

Town Centre Traffic and Footways Project

There has been an inaugural meeting with interested parties including representatives of Cumbria Highways and Yorkshire Dales National Park, Our local MP Tim Farron was also in attendance. It was agreed that Sedbergh had been neglected and that there were many issues to do with highways, parking, road safety, signage, pedestrian access etc that needed addressing and that the best way forward was firstly to conduct a public consultation. This was carried out in the first week of November and a steering group will meet shortly to look at the responses and produce a brief for a new plan to be drawn up



for the Town Centre. The Parish Council would like to thank all of you who took the time to let us have your views.

Queens Gardens

It is the intention of the Parish Council to set up a Friends of Queens Gardens group with a view to getting together a project to restore the Gardens to the original Thomas Mawson design. We hope to have more details in the next edition of Lookaround so if you are interested watch this space.

Playing Field and Playground

The council has spent a significant sum of money to improve drainage of the field for the new season and so far it seems to have worked with



teams having a much improved chance of playing after wet weather.

Cllr Lancaster has arranged for a grant of £7000 from Cumbria County Council towards the erection of a new play fence between the playground and the football field. This will improve safety for younger children especially and will provide a significant new play experience for them. It is hoped that work on this project will commence shortly.

The next meeting will be on January 29th (Provisional) at 7.30pm at the People's Hall committee room. Members of the public are welcome and there is always an opportunity usually around 8.30pm for you to participate. The confirmed date and agenda will be posted in the Parish notice board and Community Office a week before the meeting


COUNCILLORS CORNER

On the 9th November I attended the AGM of the Community Office in the URC Hall. It was very disappointing that only six people turned up for the meeting as David Ramsbottom does an excellent job in managing the office and deserves all the support that we, as a community, can give him. I have always been a vocal supporter of the Community Office as not only does it provide a focal point for the interests and activities of local

residents (housing as it does the Parish Clerk's office, the YDNPA Ranger's office, a weekly planning surgery, a Cumbria County Council / Barnardo's child support unit, the History Society Archive etc., the list goes on....) but also has the advantage of being centrally placed and next to the TIC, and alongside the Market and Joss Lane Car Park which it plays its part in helping to run smoothly. Needless to say it could not operate without the volunteers who man (and woman!) it five days a week. The business at the AGM was mainly concerned with streamlining the existing constitution but also considered the future of the building itself which belongs to Yorkshire Dales.

And still on the subject of TIC's, the other major issue occupying my time this month was the closure of Kirkby Lonsdale's Tourist Information Centre and the negotiations around its possible re-opening. At a specially convened meeting of the Kirkby Lonsdale Town Council on the 26th October, local businessmen Mike Marczynski and Robin Sadler outlined their proposals for re-creating the TIC. After a vigorous debate the Town Council resolved to support their recommendations by providing a grant of £5,000 for the next three years on the clear understanding that SLDC played its part and also provided grant funding (the amount to be negotiated but hopefully £15,000) initially for a similar period. In the meantime the South Lakeland Cabinet had effectively decided to

cease running its remaining TIC's in the District (namely Kendal, Windermere and Ulverston) from October 2010 but after a member "call-in" and an Interim report submitted by the Visitor Information Task Group which I Chair, the Cabinet revisited its decision and decided to extend its period of involvement until March 2011 and held out the possibility of continuing to give support grants to TIC's for an indefinite period. This was a very successful outcome (although more is still hoped for) and shows that "backbench" Councillors can genuinely apply pressure on, and effect the decisions of, the Executive through the Scrutiny process. It also has a

I commend to you the 10:10 campaign which aims to get as many people as possible to reduce their carbon emissions by 10% in 2010. Still on the subject of Scrutiny, I was very pleased to be part of a Cumbriawide group of Councillors and officers which spent a day visiting the House of Lords to examine the way, as a revising Chamber, it conducts its business, and through its system of Select Committees holds the government to account. We visited a Select Committee in session and then attended briefings by members of the Lords' and Commons' Clerk's Departments and also by the Chair of the House of Lords' Science and Technology Committee. COUNCILLORS CORNER

After a fortnight away on relatively sunny Crete back to temperate but wet Sedbergh. As I write this there are flood warnings throughout Cumbria and both district and county staff are working to limit damage to property. I was in Kendal for Full Council this morning and for once I think we can safely admit that the flooding has been worse over at Kendal and Ulverston that at Sedbergh. Having said that the Lune under Lincoln's Inn Bridge was as ferocious as I have ever seen it. Sandbags are as usual available from up again as we have had two reviews SLDC depots. But, any such actions are only necessary because of more long term failures in planning. For instance, becks which fill up with stones need regular dredging and we

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do have some like that in Sedbergh and Dent. If you know of places which are regularly prone to flooding you might mention them to me and I will see if there is anything which can be done on a more long-term basis.

BOUNDARIES AND BORDERS. COUNTY AND DISTRICT - There has been a lot of talk about the boundaries of county divisions and district wards over the last month. I was rather surprised when this rose in South Lakeland and one in Cumbria in the last ten years. It is asserted that county divisions are not equal in size and perhaps there are too many county councillors. I can't say I am convinced, Sedbergh and Kirkby Lonsdale seems to be large enough as it is.

BOUNDARIES AND BORDERS, YORKSHIRE DALES NATIONAL

PARK – The consultation on the boundaries of the two Cumbrian National Parks is probably of more immediate concern to more people locally than the internal boundaries of the districts and county. This review

will impact on Middleton and Barbon in this division and possibly Casterton. I guess it is unlikely to affect Kirkby Lonsdale itself as Kirkby is on the west side of the Lune: I don't think they are likely to include anything on the west simply because, if they did, where would they stop?

I have had some fun with my Yorkshire Dales colleagues when this has come up in the past, pointing out that the candidate areas were NEVER in Yorkshire but in Westmorland. The fact that they find that comment bizarre shows a lack of understanding of the people and culture of the Lune Valley.

Some have suggested that I support inext year – as does the chairman of the extension of the Yorkshire Dales. That is untrue, I have always been sceptically neutral and have tried, with limited success to put forward the issues addressing the Westmorland parishes. I would like to think that those affected will have the final say although I suspect they won't. I can assure you that in myself : 015396 20800, 07980 844 695, and my fellow elected representatives kilanc@kilanc.demon.co.uk, Fellgate, you have strong representatives. But, to bite the bullet: if I lived in Middleton, where my dad was brought up, would I want the park extending? No, I wouldn't.

GYPSIES AND TRAVELLERS – This is still the most important item in my county division. There have been various meetings over the last month. Again, to the outsider there must seem to be a lot of duplication. The Chief Constable and the MP have both been over again. Today, Ray

Cole, the chairman of the Police Authority, asked me if I could arrange a day so he could come over and look at preparations for Appleby 2010 for himself. When I was on Crete there was a lot of anger caused by the press release which accompanied the Eden District Report on Appleby 2009. It was suggested that there had been no problems and everything had gone brilliantly. People had every right to be angry about that but the report itself does mention the situation in Sedbergh and Cautley albeit far too briefly. It does recognise that the Rawthey Valley is where resources need to be placed the Police Authority.


fortunate to have three institutes in our locality, each excelling in its own area and activities.

The Parish Council has agreed in principle to a supplemental lease to increase the Hall footprint and to amend the original lease to allow us to build on the car park. It has requested regular updates of progress before releasing any monies to us.

Our Architect, Barbara Hartley, has provided the People's Hall Committee : the People" so we are making plans with a schedule of fees, which have to be paid in order to create and submit our application to the YDNP planners. These include: a bat survey; contaminated land survey; YDNP legal fee; PH solicitor's fee; YDNP planning fee; all totaling about if fundraising activities. 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BOOKWORM

What I have been reading this month.

'Diplomatic baggage' by Brigid Keenan(Memoir)

This is a lively and humorous book about the adventures of a fashion journalist who marries a British diplomat and has to settle and survive brought up by a distant aunt and in places as varied as Brussels, Syria, Mongolia and the Caribbean. I found it quite funny in parts as well as : number of issues on the impact of giving an insight into the country from what was quite a common practice at the rather privileged position of a diplomat's wife.

'Pitmen Painters' by William Feaver (Includes lots of glossy photographs of the paintings)

I bought and read this obsessively over 48 hours having been inspired by the play of the same name. He is portrayed as a Northumberland pitmen keen to learn about art and were soon producing paintings that were records of their daily life in a style that challenged contemporary views of what was considered art.(The paintings are

'A Daughter's Journey' by Lyn Andrews (Fiction)

This is the rather heart rending story, written at a fast moving pace, of what happens in the life of a young Irish girl who was sent in the 1950s to be uncle because her own parents were too poor. The novel raised for me a various times and may have occurred in our own family history e.g. loss of attachments, the power of secrets and discoveries after a person's death.

'The Great Lover' by Jill Dawson (Fiction)

Based on aspects of the poet Rupert Brooke's life and his interaction with a maid called Nell where he is a lodger complex but attractive character from a particular class background whereas Nell's experience of and expectations from life are very different. There are some mysterious moments! RM

OCTOBER WEATHER

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


The Church was full to capacity for our Remembrance Service in November.

KILLINGTON AND DISTRICT SUSTAINABLE ENERGY TRUST

In next few issues of Lookaround, one of the Directors (Trustees) of The the consequences are enormous. Killington and District Sustainable Energy Trust (K-SET) will write about some aspect of global warming that is even more limited. Many crops and of particular interest or concern to them. In this issue. Nick Chetwood (their current chairman) has written about climate refugees.

Global Warming – The Big Picture.

The earth's climate is changing, and changing at a rate that has exceeded most scientific forecasts. Some families and communities have already started to suffer from the negative side of climate change,

of a new beginning.

For the United Nations High Commission for Refugees, UNHCR, Scarce natural resources such as drinking water are likely to become some livestock are unlikely to survive in certain locations if conditions become too hot or dry, or too cold and wet. Food security is an immediate concern in many parts of the world.

In some cases whole populations will be simply flooded out of their land. According to the latest scientific evidence sea levels are expected to rise worldwide by between 60cm and forced to leave their homes in search : 100cm. If this happens, the Maldives



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Islands in the Pacific Ocean will be underwater displacing its entire population of 386,000. Vast areas of much more populous countries such as Bangladesh, China, Vietnam and Egypt will also be inundated. In Bangladesh alone, 17% of the countries landmass is expected to be submerged in the next 40 years making at least 20 million people homeless.

For those countries with money, most of the problems that climate change brings can be overcome with elaborate and expensive solutions like tidal barriers and sea wall defences but not so for the worlds poor. As usual they get the hammering.

And these problems are not something for future consideration. Not at all. Human displacement is already happening now. For example, flooding in Kenya of a Somalian refugee camp recently lead to 12,000 refugees loosing their shelter. It also prompted some 80,000 other people to move to safer locations.

Of course it's not just flooding that is the problem. Add to flooding, hydrometeorological disasters - think of New Orleans hurricane or the recent mud slides in the Philippines: environmental degradation - think, for example of desertification of once arable land in Africa and armed conflict where people fight for the



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resources to survive.

Numerous efforts have been made to predict the number of people who will be obliged to move as a result of climate change. Current estimates seem to range between 250 million and 1000 million. To put this into context, the UNHCR currently manages 10 million refugees and has partial responsibility for another 20 million internally displaced people. Even if we take the lowest estimate of 250 million, we are talking quantum leaps in the numbers of people who will find themselves in the forceddisplaced category.

Now, this is all pretty gloomy and depressing I know. But we can do something to prevent the worst from happening. The world has it in its power to limit global warming to 2°C by 2050 if we all pull together. Agreement at next month's world conference at Copenhagen is absolutely crucial.

K-SET is striving to do something to i much as those with skills and help be part of the solution and not part of the problem. We have exciting and exacting plans to reduce our carbon emissions. We even want icom to become a 'beacon' where we show : and help other communities how to make similar progress. However we need more support – not necessarily financial (though that would be vey welcome) but more in the way of willing helpers. We need people who are able to see the problem; are prepared to grasp the nettle and to then get involved. If you are that sort of person, please contact us. People with no expertise and only a small

YORKSHIRE DALES NATIONAL PARK

Fresh call for affordable housing sites: A fresh call for possible sites on which to build affordable housing has gone out to landowners and organisations in four areas of the Yorkshire Dales National Park.

Despite a good response generally to an appeal launched in January by the Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority (YDNPA), there were few sites put forward in the Sedbergh area, according to Peter Stockton, the constrained and will not go through to Authority's Strategic Planning Officer.

"The bigger villages are the best places to put new housing in the National Park because they have the best range of services up and running planning requirements.

and are a focus for local housing need," he said.

"That means the existing services and through them the local economy – will benefit, and they are nearby so people can walk to them rather than having to use vehicles which saves them money and is more environmentally friendly."

The original appeal for sites throughout the National Park did result in a number being put forward in the four areas but some are very the next round of selection.

Each site must be large enough to accommodate at least two homes and will have to meet a number of

Yvonne Peacock, Chair of the YDNPA's Housing Working Group and Member Champion for Forward Planning, said: "We have launched this second appeal to see if there are any other locations that landowners could put forward in the four areas.

"We want to be as certain as we can be that we have the best range of available sites – the best options – to look at."

Half of each site that is finally chosen will be used for affordable housing in perpetuity. The remainder will not have to be affordable, but will still be restricted to occupancy by people who need to live inside the National Park.

Landowners have until Friday, December 11, to put forward sites within the four areas and details are available on the Authority's website at www.yorkshiredales.org.uk.



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
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CHURCHES TOGETHER

MAKING A WILL

Whilst some people may be reluctant to make a will – either because they think its something they can do when they're older, or just because they don't want to contemplate their own death – everyone wants to make sure their loved ones are looked after. Making it your choice

Making a will means that you choose who deals with your affairs after your death, who looks after your children and their future and who receives what proportion of your estate that YOU want them to have. You also need to pick someone to be your executor – someone you know and trust to deal with your financial affairs after your death. This is often a family member or friend – or one of



THE SYMBOLS AT YOUR DOOR

In the 1930s in Italy people were encouraged to write slogans on their houses. Not any slogan they liked, for this was Italy during fascist times and that would have been dangerous; it needed to be one of a prescribed set of phrases drawn from the sayings of Benito Mussolini. Over the years many of these have been painted out; some, typically on crumbling farm buildings, remain just visible, while some have been carefully restored, and it can make a very rewarding pastime for anyone of a nerdy disposition who visits Italy to try and seek them out.

My favourites appear on rural houses:

"The land never lets you down, it is nobility"

"You need to give fertility to every clod of earth"

and my absolute favourite:

"People who abandon the land are condemned to decadence".

A small number of Italians long for the resurrection of Mussolini – we've met and spoken to some who do – and possibly this accounts for the loving restoration of the slogans, or maybe it's because there are those who, like me, find the phrases so amusing it would be a pity to let them disappear.

It might seem strange that anyone would want to see the return of a preposterous-looking little chap in an oversized tin hat as prime minister of their country, but nostalgia can be a very powerful thing, and I am reminded of the political leaflets

showing a picture of Winston Churchill that are poked through our doors round about election times; this too must be nostalgia for a very long time ago – nostalgia and amnesia make a fine pair of sisters.

But there's nothing wrong with remembering images from the past, and for those who are interested there is a website to remind you of some English ones: http://www.icons. org.uk. I especially find the history of the bowler hat intriguing, as it passed from gamekeeper's protective headgear, through working-man's chic, to city gent's uniform, to object of ridicule (note this is in England, separately from Northern Ireland), over a period of about 100 years.

The Italian slogans aren't really iconic, though; not like the bowler hat or Routemaster bus or – according to icons.org.uk – Jennings Brewery! Do we have any symbols that show we can do nostalgia even more stylishly than the Italians can? One possible candidate is the famous advertising poster that shows a picture of a tearful bull looking at a jar of Bovril with a caption saying, "Alas! My poor brother!" That dates from way back – it could never exist now.

Are there any others similar? I wonder whether anyone, including the people who periodically push pictures of previous prime ministers through my postbox, might find it a stimulating Christmas challenge, to try and come up with some possibilities to beat the Italian ones.

APPLEBY FAIR 2010

Many Townsfolk in Sedbergh may be blissfully unaware of the mayhem caused by certain persons attending the Appleby Horse Fair. The trespass November 2009 in Sedbergh, initiated on the Auction Mart site this year may have made the problem more obvious the Chief Constable and his senior to folk. Generally, except for an occasional horse blocking Main Street, or some light fingering in the shops, townsfolk are not disturbed too much. Incidents of gates and fences destroyed, the stealing of crops, unlawful trespass, public displays of urination and defecation, intimidation, threats and drug use have been documented.

anyone who can help us, MPs, Councillors and council officials, Police, etc.

A meeting was held on Friday 13 by Tim Farron, MP and attended by officers, council officials and representative residents. We heard what is being planned for the 2010 Fair. Policing is to be improved with 8 officers assigned and a police post installed at Strait Bridge. The local authority management, both at SLDC and CCC is to be upgraded with a senior official appointed to oversee the whole area and ensure the relevant legislation is fully applied. If there is any breaking of the law it will be strictly enforced by the police.

Dr Gina Barney of CRAG Last Year of Appleby New Fair? **Abolition Move By County Council** Committee

Westmorland County Council will be recommended at its meeting today to abolish Appleby New Fair.

The Roads and Bridges Committee had been urged by its Standing Sub-Committee to consider restricting the area and duration of the fair, but reference was made to possible difficulties in enforcing such restrictions.

The Roads Committee then

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discussed an alternative suggestion that the County Council should abolish the fair.

The clerk emphasised that it would not be possible to enact either proposal before this year's fair.

"POLLUTION OF COUNTRYSIDE"

The Committee held that abolition would be in the public interest. because of the present pollution of the countryside due to the lack of sanitary facilities and traffic on the approaches to the A66 road.

The horse fair was originally part of a more general stock market held many centuries ago in the centre of Appleby, but horse dealing was

eventually moved up to the site known as Gallows Hill or Fair Hill.

The ancient charter fair is supposed to be restricted to two days, but, in fact, it extends to between a week and ten days. It is estimated that 2,000 to 3,000 people attend it each year in June. These include gypsies, tinkers, general dealers and horse dealers from all parts of the north.

Dr Frank Madge, the North Westmorland District Medical Officer, congestion near the Fair Hill itself and in his annual report de-scribed the fair as "a serious nuisance" as a result of road- side camps on the Roman Road and the Long Marton and Dufton roads.

Yorkshire Dales Housing Development Plan

Second call for Housing Sites in Grassington/Threshfield, Hawes/Gayle, Reeth & Sedbergh In January the National Park Authority invited landowners to submit expressions of interest to develop land for housing. Whilst there was a good overall response, the range of suitable sites submitted in the four main service centres of Hawes/Gayle, Grassington/Threshfield, Sedbergh and Reeth, was rather limited.

These four centres have the widest range of services available in the National Park to support new affordable and local needs housing. The Authority considers that there may be further sites to investigate and would like to hear again from landowners. It may be that you missed the opportunity in January so this is a second chance to submit a site for consideration.

The Authority expects 50% of each site to be developed by housing that is affordable to local households. This will be delivered through partnership with a housing association or some other mechanism that will secure its affordability in perpetuity. The remaining 50% will not have to be affordable, but will still be restricted to occupancy by households that need to live inside the National Park. The Authority does not anticipate permitting any new wholly unrestricted open market housing.

The Authority is looking for additional sites that are located within or on the edge of Hawes/Gayle, Grassington/Threshfield, Sedbergh, Reeth and which are large enough to accommodate at least 2 homes. Sites will also need to meet a number of other planning requirements such as impact on the surrounding landscape, safe highway access, and availability of essential services.

If you have already submitted a site please do not resubmit it. It will either already be under further investigation or may already have been dismissed. The Authority's website has a list of the sites that are currently going forward for further investigation.

Please note that submissions cannot be treated confidentially as the Authority will be inviting public comment on all sites received. Submitting a site will not constitute a formal commitment by a landowner to sell or release land.

- Ranunculus: from Rana = frog. The plants usually grow in froggy (damp) places.
- · Acris: acrid. Bitter tasting.
- Davidia: after Mr. David, a French missionary.
- Campanula: A little bell as in campanologist.
- Agapanthus: from Agape = love and anthus = flower.
- Dahlia: after Mr Dahl.

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- Gloriosa grandiflora; a glorious flower with very large flowers.
- Pteris (bracken): wing shaped leaves – as in Pterodactyl.
- Osteospermum: from osteo = bone as in osteopathy and sperm = a seed.
- Pyracantha: from Pyr = fire as in funeral pyre and akanthos = a thorn.
- Scabiosa: from Scabies = itch the plant being a remedy for skin diseases.



The holly and the ivy, when they are both full grown

Of all the trees that are in the wood, the holly bears the crown

as lily flower

And Mary bore sweet Jesus Chris to be our sweet Saviour

The holly bears a berry, as red as any adapted solution to survival in winter. blood.

The holly bears a prickle, as sharp as from the leaves during a period of any thorn.

The holly bears a bark as bitter as any gall.

The Holly tree is an evergreen with hundreds of species, and probably thousands of varieties, which bears its berries (if you are lucky) right up till Christmas, which makes it entirely suitable for interior decoration. What would be the delight in bare twigs? The holly bears the blossom, as white: The glossy and elaborately curved leaves are not only a gift for making decorative arrangements but represent an advanced evolutionarily The thick cuticle prevents water loss time when water is relatively scarce due to being frozen or at least difficult to transpire since it becomes fairly viscous at low temperatures. In a

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prickles reduce the amount of foliage lost to herbivores. Earlier in the year small white flowers (presumably attracting their pollinators) precede the berry development. The religious symbolism of blood, crown of thorns, and perhaps a bitter bark – (I have found no scientific confirmation of this, nor am I prepared to brew the "tea"!) is entirely obvious. Of course, we must remember that most of the symbolism we now associate with the season. Naturally it is a ground Christian Festival probably predates it hugging plant being very tolerant of by several centuries. The Celts had a shade used by gardeners to provide Holly king and an Oak King who were twins who essentially took it in turns to rule the year with the Holly king coming to the end of his reign after the Winter solstice. For the Romans, advantageous when one considers

Holly was used to honour Saturn, god of agriculture, during Saturnalia, another festival of the Winter solstice. The Druids furthermore believed that holly's pointed leaves provided protection against evil spirits. In the carol above "The Holly and the Ivy", it is bizarre that so little mention is made of the Ivy despite it, too, being an evergreen plant that bears its leaves throughout the winter ground cover and to crowd out weeds. Again, their leaves are well covered by cuticle to avoid excess water loss. This is even more



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their success in climbing the "deserts" Christmas as well. It is a of our walls with relatively little stem to provide a xylem conduit to replace water transpired from the high surface area of foliage in times of drought. Judging by the activity of insects around my ivy covered wall, whenever there is a warm day, even in late autumn, the inconspicuous flowers retain their desirability by scent. Their berries also are retained well into the winter to disperse their seeds, to say nothing of increasing their decorative usage by Christmas florists. The North Americans view it as an invasive weed! Ivy has strong links to the God Bacchus who was undoubtedly involved in Saturnalia! Mistletoe is associated with

hemiparasite of many species which sends roots out to penetrate the tissues of its host drawing material from both its phloem and xylem. However, it also has actively photosynthesising leaves who provide nutrition. There are several species and most of the plants sold in our shops derive from the American species (Phoradendron flavescens) but the genuine British species (Viscum album) has the sticky white (and poisonous) berries and is normally parasitic on apple, and rarely on Oak. The Druids greatly valued the Oak derived Mistletoe. It bestows life and fertility, protects against poison and acts as an


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aphrodisiac. It is associated with the Goddess Frigga, the goddess of love. (As we know her son, Baldur, could not be killed by anything on earth until having almost circular cross section Loki realised that Mistletoe did not grow on the earth so could be used to cuticle to further reduce water loss. fashion a dart to kill him with.) Understandably with this range of attributes, kissing under it is likely to have great effects – so much so that in some cultures it has to be burnt on Twelth Night, lest all those couples who have kissed under it are coupled for ever!

Christmas trees have a variety of botanical sources but are mainly Firs. These are yet another xerophytic group (plants who are adapted to

show text book adaptions to water stress. A low surface area to volume ratio of their leaves is achieved by "needles" well covered by a waxy Even their stems are covered by a layer of needles akin to the feathers or fur surrounding the limbs of cold climate animals. Even with all these adaptions, the interior of a centrally heated building is a bridge too far and most species lose their needles at an accelerating rate. You can reduce this by providing a humid atmosphere and some water for the stump/roots. Even those with roots have a low survival rate. A fir destined for the cope with low water availability) who : Christmas trade takes some 7 to 8



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years to grow into a 6 foot tall tree within commercial plantations having been sown from their seeds carried inside their cones. Many layers of pagan traditions are embedded in its current history, some of which have been replaced by Christian mythology. For example St Boniface cut down a local Oak tree worshipped by his potential congregation in their pagan rites, but in its place from within its roots grew a Fir tree to represent Christianity to his newly converted congregation. The tradition of erecting and decorating a Christmas tree seems to be earliest documented in the 16th Century in Germany (Alsace). This custom seems to have remained largely

German up until the early 19th Century when it began to spread via the nobility to other royal courts. Unsurprisingly with Britain's royal family uniting with Hanover the custom came to Britain and in 1832 Queen Victoria writes of her delight as a 13 year old with the two Christmas trees on display in the drawing room. In days of yore, the erection and decoration of the tree was confined to Christmas eve involving the whole family. In turn it was removed on the day after 12th Night (at the risk of bad luck). Unfortunately retail "necessity" sees Christmas decorations up as early as September.

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SEDBERGH & DISTRICT ART SOCIETY

On 13th November, society members enjoyed an entertaining demonstration by Frances Winder.

Frances emphasised that while she preferred local landscapes, she wanted to paint them with a " twisted " view rather than strictly representational, hence her favourite method of making a tryptych. This she proceeded to demonstrate.

She cut her chosen photo into three pieces, not all of the same size, and then arranged them in an off set way. Her prepared paper was divided into three with tape, and she proceeded to add patches of oil pastel to the panels in what at first seemed to be a rather haphazard way. It soon became clear that she knew precisely what she wanted, so that when she then added continued to use the cloth to define gouache, each panel successfully showed the essence of each cut up piece of photo, with sea, sky, light, dark, and liveliness. When Frances stripped off the tape, it was like looking out of three windows at different parts of the scene. Magic! In her words she was "searching for the gap between realism and abstraction."

Next Frances demonstrated watercolour painting, working with wet on dry at first, then as it dried, adding layers and layers of colour, with plenty of water to run down for reflections. Again in her words, "imagine transparent scarves with different patterns laid on top of each other."

Her approach to using acrylic was

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something of a surprise. She used a cloth to lay a wet wash of colour into the canvas, to give it a "key". She areas and add colour, which she mixed on the canvas to create a background. This was then ready for more detailed work with a brush. Frances also suggested cutting up credit cards (old ones!) to paint with . especially for sea, reflections, surfaces of buildings, and blocks of colour. A useful tip was to have a stay wet palette, either a commercial one. or home-made, using a container with wet blotting paper covered with greaseproof paper, covered with a lid. And her palettes were very messy----altogether an interesting evening! Our next meeting is entitled "Powerpoint Presentation", with David Lyons --- different again! SEDBERGH & DISTRICT HISTORY SOCIETY

The North-Eastern Railway 1854-1923 by Henry Wilson

Henry Wilson, who runs the specialist Main Street bookshop on railways and other forms of transport, delivered an authoritative and informative talk on the North-Eastern Railway from its conception in the mid-nineteenth century during the great railway building age to its final demise in 1923 when it amalgamated with other smaller companies to form the LNER (London and Northeastern Railway). During those seven decades it grew from operating 700 miles of track to over 1700 route miles, encompassing an area from

the Number in the south to Berwickupon-Tweed on the Scottish border in the north, and from the east coast westwards to Carlisle, Kirkby Stephen and Tebay (this section of goods line being the closest the NER came to Sedbergh); and it also owned and ran 40 docks, numerous stations, locomotives, carriages (the passenger vehicles all carrying the NER's distinctive pale green livery) and wagons which, in the earlier days, had been the property of individual mines, quarries, steelworks etc.

In fact, from the time of the worldfamous first railway line between Stockton and Darlington, built in 1825, throughout the remainder of the

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passengers that the multitude of early railway companies benefited from: iron ore, coke, coal, limestone and steel, for example, were key commodities in the north-east. By the end of the massive expansion of railways in the 1840s London was now connected to Bristol. Birmingham, Liverpool, Manchester, York, Newcastle and Berwick and in 1854 three of the larger northern companies, (1) the York, Newcastle and Berwick, (2) the Leeds Northern, and (3) the York and North Midland Railway joined forces to form the NER.

Under the initial stewardship of manager Captain O'Brien the NER

19th century it was goods rather than grew steadily, absorbing the Stockton and Darlington railway, for example, in 1865. Yet those early days were not without their problems: costs were rising, there was little departmental co-ordination, and there were disputes with Hull docks where the merchants felt that their rightful trade was being diverted away to the Tyne, Wear and Tees ports. It was only under Henry Tennant, manager from 1871 to 1891, and more especially Sir George Gibb (1891-1906), that the company made pioneering strides with its enlightened and innovative policies: graduates were recruited into its management structure which now had clearly defined responsibilities(the Traffic

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
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Department, for example, being divided into Operating and Commercial sections, with the latter sub-divided into passengers and goods). Under Gibb in particular American marketing systems were introduced with detailed research and 1901 Class T and the 1906 Smith studies being carried out into population statistics, catchment areas itime; its grand architectural station and passenger traffic, even to the point of making special bargain offers to passengers for selected trips. In addition, the NER was the first company to officially recognise Trades Unions, much effort was expended on recruitment and training, and bonuses were paid to staff: indeed, throughout its existence the NER never failed to pay an

annual dividend to its shareholders. During these times of prosperity the company developed a distinctive corporate identity, its green liveried locomotives such as the 2-4-0 'racehorse', the 1886 Class E, the compound all withstanding the test of designs such as Newcastle Central and Darlington Bank Top; its pioneering coaches, such as the 1904 'Open Lavatory Composite' which had end vestibules and gas lighting; the 1908 Dining Car; its own 20-ton hopper style wagons; and, in 1904, the development of electric trains (though these were not brought into full service until much later in the



century). Meanwhile the company increased the size of wagons, introduced snow-ploughs, developed more efficient trans-shipment of goods, and encouraged larger loads through competitive pricing. Alt this was made possible not only through creative management but also as a result of a succession of longstanding chief engineers such as Fletcher (1854-83) and T.W.Worsall.

By the time that A.K.Butterworth became manager in 1906, introducing its largest and strongest constituent as he did a more popular manmanagement style, the NER was firmly established as one of the foremost railway companies in the country, but within a few years, from 1913, it underwent a period of Turmoil railway company, but also how it had and Transition', as described by Henry Wilson. The onset of World War I on the one hand created great pressure on all railways for the movement of people and goods, yet on the other many lines, stations, and

above all ports in the north-east suffered from intense bombing: skilled manpower was depleted through recruitment into the forces (though 'womenpower' largely took over); and there was a lack of rolling stock. Then in the twenties, there were further problems with the coal strikes. By 1923, under the reorganisation of the country's railways into larger regional units, it became part of the new LNER - but certainly part.

Henry Wilson's thorough and fascinating illustrated talk revealed not only how influential and important the NER had been as a pioneering evolved into a benevolent monopoly for its employees, shareholders, and the citizens of the north-east in general.

So, I set the remote back down on the table, get some towels and wipe up the water.


