COUNCILLORS CORNER

On the 24th March I attended a meeting of the Local Area Partnership at Barbon. As ever the meeting was a good one and as usual it provided an excellent opportunity for Parish, District and County Councillors and YDNPA members supported by officers to be present in the same room to discuss current issues of interest to all the Parishes contained in the LAP area. In the case of the Sedbergh and Kirkby Lonsdale LAP this means the eight parishes of the District Council ward plus Firbank and Killington. Because the County Council are in the process of reducing its expenditure because of the constraints imposed by central government cut backs this will inevitably lead to a lessening of the resources both financially and in manpower terms that the County will be able to provide to the LAP. This is unfortunate at a time when the LAP is just beginning to develop its effectiveness in dealing with shared issues at a very local level. Another of these shared local issues is the Appleby Horse Fair which affects a significant number of local

parishes but particularly Kirkby, Casterton, Barbon and Sedbergh. The latest meeting of the Travellers and Settled Community Group (now a committee of the LAP) was held on the 5th April and was essentially designed to put the finishing touches to the planning for this year's event. Plans are basically the same as for last year with a few tweaks learned from experience during the 2010 Fair.



To a large extent there will continue to be zero tolerance for breaches of the criminal law with nevertheless a growing understanding that the event will only pass off peacefully if the cooperation of Travellers is obtained by keeping them fully informed of the situation on the ground which in most years changes guite rapidly from day to day. This means an increasing use of The Travellers Times as a forum for communicating information as well as a growing use of social media such as Facebook and Twitter which is proving very effective for this purpose. There was a drop-in session for members of the public wanting to know more about this year's plans at Sedbergh on the 11th April. From one point of view the public attendance for this was very low (compared to last year which attracted a packed house) but from another perspective this probably indicated that residents were so satisfied with last year's efforts to deal with the local consequences of the Fair that they didn't feel it necessary to turn out in large numbers to this year's drop-in.



Keeping all parties fully informed is the key to the whole operation and this, I hope, we shall continue to do this year both before and during the Fair itself.

There was, however, a packed Memorial Hall at Dent on the 4th April when a large number of number of local residents turned out for the Annual Parish Meeting. This is the closest we get to direct democracy in the country and I was delighted that there was such a high turn out. The Parish Council presented a very full and clear Report of its activities this year, which were remarkably many and varied, and this was followed by two challenging talks on the present state of NHS reforms given by the Practice Manager at Hawes and by our own Dr. Lumb. The presentations provided much food for thought and it is clear that in Cumbria we are considerably in advance of other Health Districts when it comes to planning the way ahead for the commissioning of services by the proposed new GP lead consortia. It was a measure of how concerned people are by the proposed reforms

that there were many questions asked after the close of the presentations. One piece of very good news is that the new Sedbergh Health Centre is likely to be up and running by the beginning of next year.

With warmer days and the approach of Easter thoughts start to turn again to the influx of tourists over the Summer months. I chaired a meeting of the Sedbergh & District Tourism Initiative on the 22nd March and we invited along David Collier as local Broadband Pioneer to give us an update on the progress of the proposal to bring Superfast Broadband to our area. We also invited him to help us to prepare a tourist strategy acknowledging the increasing presence of technology in our lives and this he kindly agreed to do.

Finally on a lighter note I attended the annual Spring Show on the 2nd April and was once again amazed by the high standard of the exhibits and the amount of energy and work put into it by the organisers and exhibitors. We must never forget how fortunate we are to live in such a vibrant community as ours - one which was putting into effect the Big Society long before it was thought about by national government! COUNCILLORS CORNER

LIBRARIES CONSULTATION: In my February article I referred to the future of libraries in Cumbria. Although I thought I was only stating the self-evident that earned me a stern rebuke from on high. I had inadvertently pre-empted an intended public consultation of which I was unaware. Therefore, I report that the first stage of a two part consultation on the Library service in Cumbria is now beginning. Details are available at Sedbergh Library and on the county website. I will say no more, lest I be accused of interfering further. FORESTRY ROUTES: Another consultation concerns forestry routes in Cumbria. Initially I was interested because of the problems caused by forestry lorries on the small lanes to the north of Kirkby Lonsdale. However, forestry routes also affect Garsdale and Dent. I received confirmation today that the closing date offered on the county website, May 4 is for guidance only. This will eventually come before the South Lakeland county local committee. But, it would be helpful if all affected parishes consider the issue as soon as convenient. If you wish to respond as an individual it would help if you sent me a copy of your submission. APPLEBY NEW FAIR: As chairman of the Gypsies and Travellers' Respect Group I represented you at a meeting organised by the Sedbergh and Kirkby Lonsdale LAP on behalf of Cumbria Police, SLDC and CCC.

Our plans for the forthcoming Appleby New Fair were explained to representatives from Lancashire, North Yorkshire, Lancaster and Craven and very well received.

We have also had the final meeting of the Respect Group itself prior to this year's fair. We hope that the posting arrangements will be less visually intrusive than last year, whilst still meeting the legal necessities. We now have a permanent Traffic Regulation Order in place and that will greatly assist the forces of law and order in dealing with the event. However, there are several "emerging issues" connected with the fair both in Casterton and here in Sedbergh. If



things run as well as last year it will be down to the extraordinary hard work of district, county and police officers.

SATURDAY BUS FROM DENT STATION: In its recent form the Saturday Bus Service, run as a county council service was for many reasons unsustainable. For one thing the statutory fair scale meant that even if it was full every time it would still have made a loss. For comparison the Wednesday service operates without any subsidy. I have been working with Dent parish council and others from the community to try to secure a different service, not run by the county. I hope that one way or I do hope Dr Lumb's presentation will

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another the county will put £2k in to set up the new service. Whether that has to come out of my own pot or another and whether it can come out of my pot have yet to be determined. HEALTH SERVICE REFORM: The Annual Meeting of Dent Parish generally has a more stimulating agenda than most of its ilk and this year's was in many ways a classic, both entertaining and informative. The presentations from the two doctors, one from the Hawes practice and William Lumb from the Sedbergh practice should be required viewing for anyone before they pontificate on the proposed health service reforms. find its way into these pages in the future. it should.

BETTER HIGHWAYS: As yet there has been little evidence on the ground of the "Better Highways" programme rolling into action. I still get too many frustrated emails and phone calls. However, because I know what is beginning to happen I do see evidence that the world is achanging. As yet, our local workers, "Team 20" are still dealing with the Winter maintenance backlog. But, there is some of the new work as well. As the short-term backlog is reduced we will see a dramatic reduction in highways response times.

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DENT PARISH COUNCIL

The April meeting was shortened because it followed the Annual Parish Meeting, but nevertheless it was able to discuss the Saturday bus service, the Dent conservation area management plan and developments regarding superfast broadband. A full account of the two meetings is contained in the minutes, published on www.dentdale.com (follow the parish council link) and obtainable as a hard copy on request from the parish clerk.

Annual Report 2010-11 The parish council's annual report for the year April 2010 to March 2011 was presented to the annual parish meeting. The report contains reports on the work of the council and its committees, as well as accounts of the other bodies on which the parish council is represented. The report can be downloaded from the Parish Council pages at www.dentdale.com and a copy of it can be obtained from the parish clerk.

NHS Reforms

The annual parish meeting was also addressed by Dr William Lumb from the Sedbergh Medical Centre and Clive West from the Central Dales Medical Practice, Hawes on the subject of how the proposed NHS reforms will affect Dentdale. Fiftythree people heard how an ageing population and costly medical advances were happening at a time when no extra finance is available. The speakers suggested that changes such as treating patients closer to home and the integration of primary and community care could provide possible solutions to these issues.

Saturday Bus Service

As reported last month, the Saturday bus service from Dent Station to Kendal was selected by Cumbria County Council as one of the services it was proposing to cut. Since then, the parish council has been promised funding from a number of organisations, including the National Park. Dentdale Show. Dent Music and Beer Festival and the Friends of the Settle Carlisle Line. Dent and Sedbergh Parish Councils have also pledged funds, and so it now looks as if it will continue to run over the summer at least. A long term solution also looks promising, and discussions to achieve this are taking place with the Dales and Bowland CIC - the organisation that funded the extra journey last summer.

Superfast Broadband

As reported last month, work continues on preparing a joint bid with Garsdale for funding for a superfast broadband network in the two dales. We continue to be optimistic, and by the time the next Lookaround is published, it is likely that we will have a clearer idea of what is going to be possible.

Dent Conservation Area The April meeting approved the parish council's response to YDNPA's suggestions for the management of Dent Conservation Area. Although a number of the actions may include community participation, progress on implementing the management plan will largely depend on whether there is any funding available for it. *Next Meetings*

The next parish council meeting will be at 7.30pm on May 9th in the Sedgwick Room, when there will be a public forum at about 8pm. This meeting, like all parish council meetings, will be open to members of the public.

SEDBERGH MEDICAL PRACTICE

Given the volume of blood tests that we have to take-for improved monitoring of existing disease, more comprehensive population screening or the transfer of work from Hospital to Primary the processing of sample and results has to be as efficient as possible. In working out how to handle the 150 individual test results we receive daily the core aim is to ensure that patients remain informed at all stages of the process. Handling such a volume means that we cannot offer personal advice on every result, nor on the 15-20% of results requiring further action.

All results returning to the practice are received in an electronic inboxaccessed by a group of staff (avoiding problems with absence) several times daily. The normal results are commented on and filed, with the abnormals being routed to the responsible clinician for further action. Depending on the implications of any abnormal result there will either be a personal phone call from the doctor/nurse or a personalised contact from reception to arrange follow up action. Of course some patients may well have questions that the receptionists cannot answer and there is always the option to arrange a phone call with a doctor/nurse. With our new ability to track samples and results and find missing tests, no news from the practice is good news! We will not get it right 100% of the time-but we aim to and would welcome feedback, both good and bad.

Increased blood testing in part

comes from population screening for various conditions including cardiovascular disease. We try and ensure annual background screening for patient's on repeat medication as part of the review process. Otherwise all patients aged 35-75 should have a basic review every five years. This is a large piece of work that we are working to gradually. Currently we will only inform patient's if their screening indicates a need to make changes. Going forward individuals will be enabled to access their own medical record over the internet-allowing for complete transparency in healthcare activity. The practice is committed to being as open as is practically possible-just that being small makes

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it more difficult at times to make progress.

We discovered last week that Sedbergh Medical Practice has the highest trust rating for the Doctor seen (91% definitely- MORI National Patient Survey 09/10) in the South Lakeland area. Whilst this is pleasing our score for recommendation of the Practice to others is lower (80% definitely) and we sit in the mid-range in relation to other practices. Whilst 80% is still above the South Lakeland (72%) and National (62%) averages, the difference is noteworthy and we are keen to understand what the practice can do to improve our recommendation rating. All feedback on the subject would be welcome-as

improving our recommendation rate means that we are providing the kind of service that the population of Sedbergh values.

As part of the engagement process we are holding a public meeting on Monday 9th May at 1930 People's Hall Sedbergh to offer an update as to the new build project and explain how health care will look in Sedbergh in the 21st century-innovation built on a core of traditional high quality NHS care. There will also be the opportunity to explore how the proposed structural changes to the NHS (commissioning) will make a difference in this part of Cumbria. It would be good to see you there. *Dr William Lumb*

Approval was given to set up a company limited by guarantee to handle the contractual aspects of the Hall's redevelopment.

Hall Redevelopment

The Fundraising Subcommittee has applied for some £250,000 of funding from six charitable bodies. We await the results of their endeavours.

To date the local community has raised just under £10,000 from donations, events, quizzes, etc. We have spent about half of this on planning fees, bat surveys, spatial surveys and quantity surveying fees. Although small sums in comparison to bids made to the various Grant Funders, these monies are very, very important as they display to the prospective funders the positive intentions of the townsfolk to redevelop the Hall.

MARCH WEATHER

An unbelievably dry month! In fact it was the driest March for at least 60 years or the driest on record depending which version you read. With only 1.2 inches it was certainly the driest March I've ever recorded! With 19 days with maximum temperatures over 50F it was also quite a warm month too but cool at nights with 13 days with below freezing minimum temperatures. The maximum temperature recorded was 64.4F on the 24th. The lowest minimum was 21.7F on the 8th. Nor did we have much in the way of winds, certainly not the usual March gales. On only 2 days did we have winds over 20mph with a maximum of 24.2mph on the last day. On only 4 nights did the wind chill not go below freezing so the lack of cloud cover allowed cool nights. Atmospheric pressure was high during the first and third weeks.

The warm dry spell was ideal for those who lambed during the month. It also helped with a growth of grass. This was obvious when the sheep were not totally cleaning up every last strand of hay. Hopefully we will have better grass growth than last year. March is guite a yellow month around the garden with the continued flowering of the daffodils and later with primroses and cowslips and at the very end of the month the first celandines. There has been increased bird activity around the feeding station and also on the nesting front with the crows, rooks and jackdaws very active. The blue



tits have visited the nest boxes and the blackbirds have started building in the shippon. In spite of the dry weather it hasn't been difficult to keep patches of mud for the birds to use to build their nests. I saw my first swallow on the 28th of the month. This cock bird, usually the first to arrive, turned out to be "our" cock bird and he proceeded to roost in the dogs kennel each night! Pipisterelle bats have been active on the milder evenings no doubt chasing the flocks of midges that have appeared. One or two butterflies have been active as have the bees. The hives are guite well advance with capped brood in two and guite a lot of stored pollen.

TIM FARRON MP

As we know there are many ways in which things work differently around here, compared to the rest of the country. For me one of the important differences is the fact that I was elected by well over half of the people who voted in the last election. For the majority of MPs this is not the case. Most of them get elected into Parliament with more people voting against them than for them. This does not seem right to me and is the key reason why I support the change in the voting system that you have a chance to express your opinions over in the Referendum on Voting Reform on May 5th. I believe firmly that the system we

have currently is in large part responsible for the expenses scandal we saw in recent years, people who do not need to have most of their constituents voting for them really do not need to worry too much about what the majority of them think. There are many arguments put around in favour of leaving our electoral system as it is: that the new voting system is too complicated, that it costs more, that it leads to weaker Government. Almost all of these are without much foundation and some of them are frankly patronising (how difficult is it to rank your choice for MP using 1,2 and 3 as opposed to putting a cross in a box?). Anyway you have your choice on May the 5th, please use it

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wisely.

As a hard working MP with the support of more than 50% of my constituents as ever I have been putting in a lot of effort on your behalf and, as seems to be increasingly the case under the new Government, we have been seeing a reasonable amount of success. We have seen an extra £26 million in funding being given to the NHS in Cumbria, despite the pressures on Government spending. This makes it more likely than ever that we will be seeing the creation of a new radiotherapy unit in the Westmorland General Hospital. Incidentally, I was really pleased to be able to come along and see the official start of building work for the new health centre in Sedbergh. I think that when it is completed this will be a massive benefit for the town and something I am pleased to have played my small part in helping to make happen.

We have seen a u-turn on the plans by the County Council to close some of our bus routes, a Government inquiry has supported my concerns about the proposals by the banks to abolish cheques and about 1,500 people living in South Lakeland no longer have to pay tax as a result of the last budget.

However, there is still much work to be done so, with your support, I will be fighting the County Council's plans to reduce the library service (particularly the mobile library which visits many people in these parts of the Dales), the reduction in pay for Teaching Assistants, the ridiculously low incomes of farmers and even the

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BBC's plans to reduce the service we get from Radio Cumbria. The list goes on but I could do none of it without your support.

YORKSHIRE DALES NATIONAL PARK

Hudson House – future assured by National Park Authority decision Members of the Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority (YDNPA) have abandoned plans to pull out of a contract that might have caused the closure of a community office in Swaledale.

The Authority currently rents space in Hudson House – the community office in Reeth – to run a National Park Centre (NPC) and Tourist Information Centre. The contract expires in January 2013 and the YDNPA proposed not to renew it as part of a drive to cut costs following a reduction in its grant from Government of nearly £1.9m (or 31 per cent) including inflation over the next four years.

The move was one of a raft of costcutting proposals in a draft budget that was put out for public consultation.

But Members decided to ensure the future of the office by renewing the contract and continuing the Authority's presence there. The amount the Authority will spend on the NPC and TIC in Hudson House will be reduced from £28,000 to £20,000 and the money to continue operating from the building will be found by cuts to other budgets, Members decided. Carl Lis, the YDNPA's Chairman, caid: "We have listened to the

said: "We have listened to the concerns of people living in Reeth and further afield who value the community office as an important facility in the town, and we have decided to try to find money from other projects so that we can renew the contract.

"Although there are problems with the performance of the National Park Centre compared to our other NPCs, we have been told that our involvement in the whole Hudson House venture is critical to the longterm survival of this valuable community resource.

"Obviously the decision will mean that we have to find savings elsewhere in our budgets, but Members decided it was a price worth paying."

"We asked people what they thought about our budget proposals and we have listened and acted on their responses. At a time when so many public services and facilities are under threat, it is important that we give as much support as possible to the communities within this beautiful National Park."

The cooperative has a community fund that will be used to achieve the dreams which Eladio and his fellow farmers once thought were out of their reach.

'I hope one day we will have a school on this land, clean water and latrines,' says Eladio.

Eladio knows that transformation is possible. He is driven by the example of a nearby community, where Gustavo Adolfo Talavera and the members of the Los Alpes cooperative have been supported by Soppexcca for 12 years. In that time, they have successfully worked to establish a school and a health centre for their community.

The hopes of the people of La Paz del Tuma are hopes held for the whole community. Eladio works every day towards his dream of a purpose-

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CUMBRIA LIBRARIES

Time for change? Ideas for the future of Cumbria's libraries

Cumbria County Council has launched the first stage in a conversation it wants to have with you, our residents, about the future shape of the county's library service.

As you may be aware, across the UK councils have been consulting with the people they serve about the future of library services. These consultations have frequently begun as a result of reductions in library service budgets which have prompted councils to consider the closure of branches.

In Cumbria councillors have chosen not to reduce the budget for the library service in 2011/12. However, with council budgets under pressure we must be confident that all services are delivering best value. Added to this is the fact that nationally and locally library visitor numbers have been dropping (a 20% decrease in Cumbria since 2005). We think it is time to change Cumbria's library service to reflect the needs of the people of Cumbria better.

A public discussion booklet explains more about the review of libraries and summarises some of our suggestions for improvement. It also asks for your ideas and opinions on the future of libraries and gives details of a range of opportunities for you to get involved. This is available from Sedbergh Library.

We have also set up a dedicated consultation website where you can share your ideas and opinions with us and fellow residents. Go online to cumbria.gov.uk for more information.

We want to involve you right at the start, before the council has firm proposals and well before any decisions are made.

This first stage will last until 30 June. After that the council will review all the feedback it has received and take a decision as to whether to progress to a second stage of more formal consultation on specific proposals for change. This second stage will probably take place between September and November.

MAY GARDENING

Early May is a good time of the year to create a new lawn, either from seed or turf, or to do some renovation work on an old one. The soil is warm and usually dry enough to make it easily worked, but retains enough moisture for speedy germination and rooting.

Good preparation is essential: the lawn will hopefully be in place for many years, so it is worth getting the right levels and eradicating as many perennial weeds as possible right at the start. Where strong growing weeds such as Ground Elder are present the most effective treatment is to spray with a Glyphosate based weedkiller, otherwise the weed will grow up very happily with the grass and use the new lawn as a springboard from which to leap into other parts of the garden.

The best lawn preparation involves digging over the whole site, raking as level as possible, treading down the soft soil to firm it, and then re-raking to produce the final smooth surface on which the lawn will grow. Be prepared to look ridiculous at the treading stage. You will have to waddle along, taking small steps, heals firmly down, to ensure that not square inch of soil is left un-firmed. Derisory comments from friends and neighbours are usually most successfully dealt with by inviting the onlookers to come and join in. They soon find other things to do elsewhere.

When growing a lawn from seed or



turf choose the right type of grass for your situation. I usually go for something containing a dwarf Rye grass as this makes for a robust hardwearing sward. Always apply the turf or sow the seed directly onto the prepared soil. I have occasionally seen lawns grown on a layer of levelled builders sand. This is a quick and easy way to level a site but it invariably results in weak grass growth and a fine crop of lawn weeds, especially Dandelions, which thrive in the sandy layer.

Lawn seed is applied at the rate of 1oz (a handful) / square metre I find it best to mark the area out into strips using canes or string and then apply the seed whilst walking backwards down the rows. Gently rake the area over to cover most of the seed and expect to see the first results in 2-3 weeks.

Turf is best applied from a wide wooden plank which will spread the load over the newly prepared bed. Make sure that the turf edges are well butted up together as turf always shrinks after laying and will dry out very easily along any gaps. With good moist soil conditions new roots should grow within 3-4 days and you will soon have a fine new lawn.

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GREASE

An American Teen Romance Blossoms at Settlebeck presented by Settlebeck High School 6th, 7th and 8th April.

We saw Grease on the first night so I confess I was expecting some minor mishaps. Were there any? Let me see ... an occasional over-long pause in the first few minutes while the young cast got into the swing. It was a pleasure to notice how they supported each other in those moments, and how quickly they picked up the flow again. There were one or two brief initial wails from the sound equipment, speedily corrected, and for the remainder of the performance the sound system worked so perfectly it was unnoticeable (no mean feat on the first night!) Most of the singing was very good, although I wished the chorus would have sung up more at certain points to support the lead singers – maybe first night nerves kept them quiet. It must be pretty hard to put on a musical with such a young cast -the songs are demanding even for older, more

practised voices. Maya Leighton, who played Miss Lynch, also sang beautifully from the musicians' corner to support Sandy, which was a thoughtful and effective way to enhance the performance.

Nick Inman, in the lead as Danny Zuko, successfully projected smouldering sex appeal with just the right amount of misunderstood vulnerability, whilst Amelia Hunter as Sandy was touching and infuriating as ingénue. Her transformation to 'rock chick' in the last scene was suitably (and humorously) startling. Between them, they occupied the stage confidently and the boy/girl relationship enactments were amusing, absurd and shyly romantic by turns.

The Pink Ladies, led by Betty Rizzo (a feisty performance by Imogen Clark) alternately comforted and clawed cattily at each other, and led the 'T Birds' up the garden path as only teenage girls can. The T Bird's gauche camaraderie (including a few realistically vulgar gestures!) and their well- accented dialogue made for excellent balance between the two



groups. Adam Roberts' Kenicke balanced his laconic role as Danny's best friend with his (at first) apparently offhand relationship with Betty. He showed credible confusion and doubts about the perennial uncertainties which fears of teenage pregnancy bring, and he and Imogen together added deeper, more realistic notes to the romantic angst of the musical.

Teen Angel (Beth Hewitt) and Frenchy (Molly Preger) need a special mention for their 'Beauty School Dropout' number as does the cameo performance of the king of sleaze Vince Fontaine, played by George Brettle.

The supporting actors and chorus of singers and dancers performed enthusiastically and focussed so well on working together, it was a pleasure to watch. The song and dance routines showed careful choreography combined with energy and talent (and a lot of practice that must inevitably have been done before that first night!) There were some excellent dancers, who had the chance to show their skills off in the

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Prom sequence. The set was well managed, simple and effective, always carefully lighted and complemented by a moody and evocative backdrop design. The musicians, directed by Joanna Brennan, gave a faultlessly judged performance which never swamped and always supported the cast. The whole evening's entertainment ran very smoothly – the best evidence of all the hard work put in from everyone involved, and a credit to the producer and director, Gillian Rea.

(historical fiction)

Slow gruesome start; the narrative then develops into another angle on the Tudors and Henry V111 in particular. Thomas Cromwell's life and the 'divorce' issue take up the main substance of this 650 pager. I found it confusing (many of the cast are called Thomas) and tedious a lot of the time but I persevered and felt fully versed in Tudor politics and the role of the church at the time when I reached the end. 3. Kate Fox : 'Watching the English' (popular science) The hidden rules of English behaviour eg why do all conversations begin with the



weather ? and why is tea believed to have miraculous properties? are analysed by Kate Fox an Oxbridge anthropologist. You can dip into sections on why the

English are preoccupied with avoiding embarrassment, mobile phone etiquette, ineffectual moaning and the values of modesty, fairplay and courtesy. Quite interesting and the book certainly gets you peoplewatching !! Bookworm RM

CUMBRIA WILDLIFE TRUST

Victorian Naturalists

The Sedbergh and District History Society invited the local support group of the Cumbria Wildlife Trust to join them for a talk by Dr Trevor Piearce on "the heyday of natural history". Dr Piearce is Senior Lecturer in Animal Ecology at Lancaster University.

Apparently natural history became a national obsession in Victorian times. Many popular books were published containing sketches from zoos and hand coloured illustrations of various plant and animal species. These were often sold as individual prints later. These books, for example a five volume work on shells, were very

popular and encouraged their readers to go out collecting to the detriment of the many species they extolled. Several modern authors have written about this period: Lynn Barber, David Elliston Allen and R B Freeman amongst others.

Several clergymen wrote popular natural history books at the time. The Rev.John George Wood produced 46 titles in the "Common Objects" series.

This popular hobby provided an escape to the country from the grime of the cities and the growth of the rail network gave easy access. It was healthy exercise and a cure for boredom. In the era of cheap and abundant domestic help, ladies had time on their hands to assemble

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collections of seaweeds, shells and all sorts of wildlife. Much of this was displayed under glass domes or decoratively arranged in collages or even (as illustrated by Maggie Smith in "Downton Abbey"), worn on elaborate hats. They even made a modest contribution to literature on the subject. Margaret Gatty, daughter of Nelson's chaplain, produced a book on British Seaweeds in 1863. Pamphlets were issued on what to wear on expeditions. The protection of attendant gentlemen was essential. These fair creatures ravaged the shorelines using crowbars and other rock moving implements to collect their specimens.

The abolition of a tax on paper encouraged an even greater flow of mass produced books for example "A Year at the Shore" by P H Gosse which enticed even more eager collectors to the seaside. The collages and private exhibitions grew of pinned insects, birds eggs and many species now under protection by law.

A Victorian "David Bellamy" character was Frank Buckland, son of a clergyman. He had moved careers from surgeon to zoologist and was an unofficial publicity officer for London Zoo. He embarked on some interesting projects. He exported salmon eggs (from the Lune) to Australia, trout to New Zealand and cultivated oysters. He kept pet alliagtors, fed on puppies and mice and experimented with exotic additions to the British diet, for example, elephant trunk.

Clubs and societies of naturalists proliferated, usually meeting in pubs. The "Naturalist" public house in Prestwich for instance and the Black Cow Botanical Society. These meetings and various naturalist magazines provided an exchange of information on a wide range of subjects. These societies were cheap to join and inclusive. Mention is made of "the pleasure of women on summer field excursions" (in the nicest possible way one hopes). The Liverpool Naturalists Field Club had 700 members in 1867. Competitions were held for the greatest number of species collected on expeditions. There was frequently a ladies prize for the best wildflower bouquet!

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Improvements in photography and microscopy followed. Wildlife was studied at home and in hides in the field. More books were produced on how to do it all.

There were hazards for participants. Skua attack and crinoline entanglement were examples. William Williams, a famous botanical guide, met his end falling over a cliff. Advertisements for collecting equipment appeared in various publications. Climbing irons for egg collectors, blowpipes for shooting small birds, pin sticking gear for insect collectors young and old, books on taxidermy all encouraged collectors to deplete our wildlife reserves. Canon Tristram of Durham

Cathedral, "The Great Gun of Durham" eventually amassed 20,000 specimens of birds. He later became a Vice President of the RSPB. The Great Auk became extinct in 1840 but the lesson was not learnt.

Charles Waterton 1782-1865 was a noted taxidermist and eccentric. He survived plague, earthquake and shipwreck and is known for wrestling a South American alligator. He experimented with nature's poisons notably on a donkey which had to be revived by tracheotomy and bellows. Nature was preserved for sentimental reasons but it was many years before the Fur and Feather Club became the RSPB. Ladies were beginning to become

better known as naturalist writers. Beatrix Potter, Theresa Llewellyn and Arabella Buckley all produced books.

With the era of Darwin came changing perceptions. Recognition of order and sequence influenced studies. Kew Gardens and London Zoo held many species. Could they all have fitted into the Ark? The study of fossils introduced evolutionary ideas.

Many naturalists produced works on what is now Cumbria. Mosses and ferns were popular topics. Collectors were paid to strip the countryside of ferns which then appeared in the ubiquitous collages, as pottery and glass decoration and even as miniature replicas of the Crystal

Palace. The Rev Hilderic Friend, a former missionary in China, ironically, died from prussic acid poisoning when attempting to make metal plates from ferns.

Later photographs of society excursions show fewer beards and more ladies. The conservation movement was beginning to grow. Meanwhile there had been an enormous loss of species in a period of about 150 years. However we have a valuable legacy in the many museums and collections, records and books of the time still available for study today.

Dr Piearce was thanked most warmly for a very informative and entertaining talk. Susan Garnett



NEIGHBOURHOOD FORUM

North West Ambulance Service NHS Trust

Paul Bradshaw gave the Forum an outline of the background to the Service's plans to become a Foundation Trust.

Based in Bolton with regional offices in Liverpool, Preston, Manchester and Carlisle, North West Ambulance Service is the largest in the country covering 5,400 square miles and a population of 7 million. Its 5,186 staff handle around 1.1 million calls and from these they initiate around 900,000 responses per year from one of 114 ambulance stations. In addition to 24 hr emergency response, the service also provides patient

transport, major incident management and event support (e.g. football matches and major sporting events). The service aims to be about more than just getting to people quickly in an emergency. It is also about ensuring people are treated in a safe and clinically sound manner and having staff who are trained to the highest possible professional levels. This would mean patients receiving the most appropriate treatment and not just being taken directly to hospital if that was not necessary. Maintaining service levels in rural areas will be a key aim, however a review of facilities will be needed based on the suitability of premises and their location. New



stations may be required to reflect current and predicted population centres.

Becoming a Foundation Trust will enable the service to build on the strong community links it already has and will give it greater financial freedom and the ability to plan more specifically according to local needs. It is a membership based organisation, with a Council of Governors appointed by the members and a Board of Directors, making a Foundation Trust directly responsible to its staff and the people it serves. The service is currently seeking feedback from the public, partner organisations and members of staff on these plans. Claire Benson, Project Manager for Love the Lune, addressed the Forum, giving an outline of the project, and what it has achieved so far. Currently based in Kirkby Lonsdale, the project aims to link all communities along the Lune valley for the benefit of residents and businesses, by attracting more visitors and new businesses to the area thus increasing economic activity and making the area more sustainable. The many very small communities in the locality find it hard to be self



sufficient individually but can thrive by

combining resources. The project is a Social Enterprise scheme where any profits generated are put back into the communities involved to help keep services alive.

Premises have been secured at 24 Main Street in Kirkby Lonsdale for 18 months and, alongside the Tourist Information centre, a "Made In Cumbria" outlet will open at the same location, to help generate further income for the project.

Through local consultation, nine issues were identified as priority areas for action, including provision of more activities for young people, better use of the Institute's facilities, broadband access, sustainability of retail activity along with increasing the local tourism market share, green energy schemes and protection of the local scenery and environment.

Various steering groups are already at work looking at the provision of public toilets and how to reinvigorate the market in Kirkby Lonsdale. Sedbergh Townscape Initiative This is a joint project involving Sedbergh Parish Council, the Yorkshire Dales National Park, Cumbria County Council and South Lakeland District Council.

It stemmed from various issues, including traffic, parking and access to facilities, which either individually or collectively were beginning to have a negative impact on the quality and vitality of the town centre.

The first task for the members of the project board was to commission designs for the improvements to the whole town centre area and suggestions for solutions to traffic management issues. The draft proposals were presented to local people in December 2010, receiving a reasonable response.

The plan is that the bulk of traffic will be directed away from Main Street, with improved crossing places and

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remodelled junctions on other routes. The Joss Lane area will be improved as a central open space, likewise the area in front of the church.

Although much of the funding has been pledged it is intended that the planned scheme will be carried out in manageable phases as and when funding is made available, any necessary planning permission is gained and Highways works can be scheduled. The first actual phase of work, where all the street name plates will be replaced, will be completed very soon.

Neighbourhood Policing Team John Stephens, Community Sergeant for Sedbergh, Kirkby Lonsdale and Milnthorpe, updated the Forum on the latest local issues. Thefts of fuel and scrap metal are on the increase; fuel suppliers can give advice on how to keep your fuel secure and any scrap should be kept locked away or disposed of promptly. For further advice contact the local Crime Prevention Officer, Terry Belshaw. Theft from vehicles continues to be a problem but is difficult to detect so remember to remove or lock all valuables away when leaving your car or van.

The Road policing unit is still actively monitoring motorbike activity

in the area.

Appleby Horse Fair

Sgt Stephens is also responsible for supervision of those travelling through the Sedbergh and Kirkby Lonsdale area on their way to and from Appleby Horse Fair. Measures for this year will be broadly the same as 2010 with a few minor adjustments.

Local Area Partnership

The Local Area Partnership offers great scope for local decision making on where and how available funding should be spent. Funding for the 2011/12 financial year has already been secured form South Lakeland District Council and a decision on the level of funding support from Cumbria County Council is awaited.

SEDBERGH BOWLING CLUB

In June 2011, the Bowling Club will be celebrating 100 years of existence. The following information has been compiled after much research by Kevin Lancaster and Elspeth Griffiths.

Kevin has found mention of a bowling green in Sedbergh in 1717 and it was situated in what is now known as Footer View Gardens.

As far as we can ascertain the first recorded mention of the idea of forming a club dates from a Parish Council Meeting of the 14th April 1906 when Warwick Pearson Boustead proposed and John Staveley seconded that Messrs W Gordon Bathgate, Thomas Punch

and John Bowness be appointed to a committee for the 'proposed bowling green'.

Mrs Upton Cottrell Dormer was approached about situating it in Queen's Garden; she was said to be 'quite in favour of this' and would assist the council in making a bowling green.

By the end of October no tender had been received but 'Mr Mawson or one of his men had been looking at the place'.

In a letter of 22nd February 1909 Mr Upton wrote to the Council: 'For the purpose of forming a club and making a bowling green I shall be pleased to give a piece of land at the back of Queen's Gardens 40 yards long by

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21 yards wide and would remove and re-erect the boundary wall round the additional ground free of cost'. This was considered a most generous offer and on the 8th March a Public Meeting was held at which it was unanimously decided that a Club be formed. Names had been collected of 95 willing to join and subscriptions were not to exceed 5 shillings a year. Mr Upton's offer was unanimously accepted.

The first meeting of the new committee was on the 29th March 1909 and it was resolved that it be made a 'Crown Green' of 9 inches and Mr H Metcalfe was instructed to take off the sods carefully and stack them as this turf was to be relaid. A letter had been received saying that there was no reason why, under Mrs Dormer's grant of land to Queen's Gardens, the Parish Council could not provide a Bowling Green nor why 'building for the more convenient use of the ground should not be erected on the new grounds ... granted by Mrs Dormer'. However, the dry weather meant that it was not possible to lay the sods and so the ground was to be sown with best lawn seed instead and, by the end of September, the Chairman reported that this had been done.

In April 1910 Mr Bathgate reported that a number of people would not subscribe until they saw what was being done but now that the green was practically made he did not think there would be any difficulty. The next month the Committee requested that play commence as early as possible.



In June, 31 members had been secured and the Chairman asked that the green be opened for play on the 1st August. However, this did not happen and it is not clear why there was a delay in opening. In March 1911 at a special meeting of the Parish Council an application was handed in on behalf of the Bowling Club asking the Parish Council to let to the Bowling Club the land at the back of Queen's Gardens at a small nominal rent and the Club undertook to manage it and to keep it in order during the season. Resolutions were passed that the Bowling Club be let on a yearly tenancy with the Parish Council reserving the right to nominate six free members on proof they could not afford the fees; the annual rent was to be one shilling (5p), the agreement was drawn up and signed on the 29th March 1911. This is why we are celebrating the centenary of play this year. The signatories for the Club were L. S. Greenbank, D. Gillespie, G. Hall and T. B. Iveson. This was witnessed by John Havgarth Club Secretary who was also the clerk to the Parish

Council. An Ad Valorum legal stamp of six pence was stamped on the document and dated 29th November 1911. The Club holds a copy of this document.

Relevant Dates for the Club By 25th November 1912 water was laid to the green (and presumably turned off immediately because of the danger of freezing!)

The formal conveyance of the land to the Parish Council by Mr John Upton was not confirmed until the 15th September 1913. It was a condition that this land could only be used as a bowling green.

In 1915 a Right of Way was granted from Station Road to the gate at the east side of the Green. In 1917 the Club sent a letter to the Parish Council asking the Council's views on a question of Sunday bowling. They unanimously decided against it.

In 1919 Mr Hall proposed that the question of Sunday bowling be put to the Parish Council again. This was opposed by all members present except for Mr Hall and Mr Shepherd. In March 1915 it was reported that like almost every other Club they had been affected by the war. No less than 13 had offered their services and of that number 9 were now serving their country and it was hoped that each one would return safely and that 'before long we might see them merrily trundling their woods across





the green'.

By 1917 16 members had gone to war and one to munitions work. Two members had fallen, Sgt Mason and Cpl Park who was a keen player and a regular attendant at the green.

Sgt H L Mason was killed in action in France on the 8th October 1916. He was a member of the Duke of Wellington's Regiment, the son of Mr and Mrs J. Mason of Main Street, Sedbergh. He was aged 28. His name appears on the Thiepval Memorial as he has no known grave.

Cpl Herbert Park was drowned at sea on the 1st January 1917 when the boat HV Ivernia was torpedoed and sunk 93 kilometres from Cape Matapan when she was carrying reinforcements for Egypt. He was a member of the Cameronians (Scottish Rifles). He was the son of Mr & Mrs Park of the Folly, Sedbergh. He was aged 24. He has no known grave and is commemorated on the Mikra Memorial in Greece.

The other members who served in the 1914-1918 war were :- Major Upton, Lt W Hague, Lt C E Taylor, Sgt B Horsfield, Pte H Bainbridge, Pte G Bainbridge, Pte T Cragg, Pte T E Dakres, Pte E Pennington, Pte C Sellers, Pte A Tedcastle, Pte F E Ward. Of these Privates Dakres and Cragg died in service of their country.

CUMBRIA WILDLIFE TRUST

It is not the farmers' fault. It really isn't. These days the farmers are between a rock and a hard place: the human population is thriving, despite the terrible efforts on the part of nature and of politicians to reduce it. We all need feeding and we all want to go into the countryside for refreshment; what's more we want cheap food and we don't want to pay to enjoy the countryside; all of this is changing things on the farm. Life there has to become ever more efficient; strolling about with a dog and a shotgun tends not to be seen as very modern or democratic, nor do most farmers have the leisure. This is a great pity. The quality of our countryside and the pleasure we get from it, whether we be tourists or farmers, depends on selective control. What we are experiencing outside nature reserves and keepered sporting estates (of which there are fortunately still very many: a recent estimate put the total area at over 7,000,000 hectares in our islands) is survival of the fittest; which means survival of the predators.

Over the last 50 years there has been a 30% increase in broadleaved woodlands and currently the planting and restoration of hedgerows by farmers is running at 5,000 kms a year! Yes, we can point on the other hand to the increase in early cuts for silage and to the (ever-decreasing) use of herbicides and insecticides: all essential to the production of cheap food; but this is to attribute the loss of so much bird life glibly. Most of our local farmland is not subject to this



and yet we all are aware of an impoverishment of our bird-life. We applaud the control of the Grey Squirrel ... rightly. It is not just that it is a foreigner and that we want to defend our native Red Squirrel against it. It is much more serious than that. Like cats, but even more effective, they can reach nests from ground level to tree tops, and they do. Combined with Magpies, Carrion Crows, Sparrowhawks and Kestrels (ves. I'm afraid so, much though we admire these handsome birds) they can effectively wipe out all the other bird species in the area.

All the hard work that is going into Grey Squirrel control is absolutely essential, and not just to preserve the Reds. We need, however, to extend our attention to the other predators, and not get too excited and pleased when we see lots of dashing hawks about. The pleasure that we get from the countryside is largely due to the presence of hosts of small songbirds. In parallel with the increase in Crows and such, there has been a marked decrease in the numbers of Skylarks, Tree Sparrows, Song Thrushes, Corn Buntings and Bullfinches.

In an illuminating article (www. songbird-survival) Professor Roy Brown of Birkbeck College traces the inverse ratios of local populations of Skylarks and Wrens competing with Hedgehogs and Stoats, Blue Tits with Brown rats. Robins. Blackbirds and Whitethroats with Grey Squirrels, and all hedge-nesting birds with Cats.

What he doesn't explore might be more important for us in our glorious neck-of-the-woods: we need to find out what the ratio of Curlew, Redshank, Snipe, Golden Plover is to Foxes and Badgers, as well as Crows. (The Badger seems to be more a scavenger that a predator ... but the court is out; as its range

spreads in our uplands, it must inevitably find ground-nesting birds with eggs worthy of its attention)

What is certain, however, is that agriculture has a negligibly negative role in the richness of our surroundings compared with nature itself. There is no easy scapegoat. We must cast our net much wider and ask who will keeper the open country outside the reserves and the game coverts: the Hunts, for sure, but they cannot control everything. Perhaps we can usefully build on the lead being given by Red Alert and related focus-groups. There are people out there who, if invited, would willingly go after the crows ... but who will invite them? JWGC

YDNP

housing development plan unveiled A new document has been

published to boost affordable housing in the Yorkshire Dales.

The Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority (YDNPA) has launched its new Housing Development Plan with the aim of delivering sites for affordable housing over the next 15 years.

The plan has already been amended following consultation on a draft document last summer and the Authority is now inviting formal representations in preparation for an examination by a planning inspector, probably early nearly next year.

The plan allocates 34 sites for development, ranging in size from two houses up to the largest site – on the edge Sedbergh – for 30. Fourteen earlier sites have been dropped following local consultation, although four new ones have been added.

Peter Stockton, the YDNPA's Strategic Planning Officer, said: "If all 34 sites were developed, there would be enough land for 230 new homes. "The Authority would expect half of these to be affordable homes to rent or buy, probably through the involvement of a local housing association. The other half would be open market housing, albeit with a legal agreement restricting their occupancy to households that need to live or work in the National Park."

Anyone with an interest in housing and local planning policy is invited to make representations about the plan in the form of a statement of support, a comment, an objection or perhaps all three.

The plan and its supporting documents are available for inspection on the Authority's website www.yorkshiredales.org.uk/ housingdevelopmentplan or at local libraries and National Park offices.

A response form is available with the plan and should be returned by noon on May 16. The Authority will consider the representations received and decide whether it needs to make any further changes. The representations will then be passed onto a planning inspector who will hold a public examination and decide whether the plan is fit for purpose or not.
