#### **ELF AND SAFETY**

During the war the army used to carry out manouvers on Millthrop Fell I remember the Brengun Carriers lining up to wash their tracks in the 'Clatter Beck. as soon as they left we used to rush onto the fell to collect empty bullet cases for scrap, sometimes a blank was found intact the powder was removed to make a firework. A prized find was a thunderflash [an overgrown firework that resembled a stick of dynamite], the finder then had the doubtful privilege of counting up to ten before throwing it after us, we then became soldiers under fire. Thunderflashes could and did cause injuries.

Another prized find was a miniature parachute from a flare. This could be weighted, rolled up and thrown into the air for another short life, but the most prized find of all were live bullets. These could be clamped in a vice or in our case wedged in a wall and fired by striking the detonator with a nail thus putting sheep in danger from the pointed end and the striker from the detonator at the other end. Even this was not dangerous enough. A fire would be lit and clips of five bullets thrown in while we took cover and tried not to lose count as they went off. Somehow we survived more or less intact.

So you see a game of football with a hard ball, conkers, snowball fights, or three legged races didn't seem at all dangerous! *Henry Sowerby*

Certainly I am feeling a lot better now I have removed them from my diet. Turning back to local politics, one of

the big stories of the last eighteen months has been the Localism Act and the consequent changes to national planning policy. There has been some concern, particularly in the Daily Telegraph, once a Tory paper, about the new presumption in favour of sustainable development. Not all of it is soundly based. In fact the presumption in favour of development is a reworking of the situation which prevailed prior to the changes in the 1980s. To my mind it is at the very core of the proposal and if it does not go through then the whole change will be pretty well nullified. When the present situation was brought about, that an application will be determined according to the development plan, unless there are material considerations to the contrary it was intended to give certainty. Unfortunately the reality has been that it has taken power from members and given it to officers as they have the power in effect to determine what the development plan savs. What effect will the changes have on the existing Local Development Frameworks and allocations policies? In truth that will be determined in the courts but my

guess is that there will be challenges even when allocations have gone through all the steps to implementation.

Last night we had one of the most interesting SLDC meetings of my time on the council. The subject was the Land Allocations element of the South continuing.

Lakeland Local Development Framework. There were 100 members of the public and about a dozen public speakers present, all, to a greater or lesser extent opposing some part of the allocation. This will now go to an examination before an inspector who will eventually produce a report.

However, just as significantly, confirmation of the Cumbria Wind Strategy was tacked on to the meeting. This was a grave mistake as I have no doubt that it was this Strategy which allowed Armistead to gain permission on appeal, contrary to the wishes of the vast majority of Lune Valley residents. Last night I led against this confirmation. Last year, when we were debating whether the Lune Valley should become part of the Yorkshire Dales many residents cited their opposition to wind turbines as a reason for supporting the proposal. I always said that that was not the right way and that the right way was to change the Wind Energy Strategy.

I was not surprised when the controlling group voted unanimously for the Land Allocation Policy. I have to say I was astonished that any of them would have voted for the Wind Strategy – in fact they all did. No doubt the unanimous opposition of the main opposition party on South Lakeland will already have weakened it a bit, but I felt that I was honouring an explicit and an implicit obligation to my electors when I voted against its

Meanwhile, another inspector has begun his Examination in Public of the Yorkshire Dales LDF. I was not able to be there but those who were commented favourably on the brisk and businesslike manner in which he was conducting the meetings.

As you will be aware the White Knights group has been successful in purchasing 72 Main Street and it looks as if the parish will soon be the owners of Joss Lane Car Park. Yesterday afternoon we had a long meeting looking at the future of Loftus Hill Car Park and we are now close to having a proposal which I and most of my colleagues will be happy to be associated with.

#### **COUNCILLORS CORNER** From Cllr Evelyn

It's a huge relief that the Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority has agreed to sell 72 Main Street, which houses the Community Office, the History Society archive and the Tourist Information Centre, to the White Knight Company group of residents so the town has time to raise the money to buy the building for itself. The meeting on Devember 13th at which the YDNPA member's agreed to accept the White Knight offer was a real cliffhanger. With the snow sweeping in from Siberia we didn't know whether we would actually get to the meeting or be stuck in a snowdrift in Garsdale. But the weather was not quite as bad as forecast and we made it but the hail was rattling so loudly on the glass atrium of the meeting room that it was sometimes difficult to hear the speakers. The argument swung back and forth, some members resolutely against selling it at a discount, some passionately in favour, and it was not clear until the final vote of 16 to 1 with one abstention that we knew the building would be secured for the people of Sedbergh.

It was also a relief that we had a reasonable evening for Sedbergh's Christmas Late Night Opening. As long as I have been in Sedbergh the evening has been either bitterly cold last year the band had to retreat





indoors for the carols because their instruments froze - or howling wind and rain. This year the rain stopped just in time and people were able to really appreciate the great street entertainment, mulled wine and hog roast as well as all the shops decked out for the festivities.

Looking forward to the New Year we have got funding from the Local Area Partnership for four new gazebos for the market which can also be hired out for other events. (If you want to hire one contact Andi Chapple at the Community Office). In February the Sedbergh Literary Trust will be holding a weekly Wednesday coffee morning at the United Reform Church

hall next to the market in Joss Lane with an event called "Tales from the Market Cafe". Local people will give a series of short talks on books which have changed their lives.

#### From Cllr Ian

Under normal circumstances the full Council of SLDC meets only about once every six weeks or so. In the next couple of weeks however we are having two meetings in quick succession. On the 18<sup>th</sup> January we are meeting to consider and adopt the Local Development Framework and the Allocation of Land documents which make provision for development in the District right up to 2025. The meeting on the 18<sup>th</sup> is a

vitally important part of this process. To cut a very long story short (the Agenda in front of me is one and a half inches thick and comprises 327 pages) the proposed housing allocation across the whole of the District has been set at 6000 houses of which 35% will need to be affordable. Once approved by Council there will be a further six week consultation period and then the full documentation will go for Public Examination by a Government Inspector. I would strongly urge anyone interested in the fine detail to visit the Council's website (www. southlakeland.gov.uk) to view the documentation which has been posted there. Readers should note that this will not affect the Parishes of Sedbergh, Dent and Garsdale as being in the National Park they are subject to the YDNPA's own Housing Development Plan and which is this very month being scrutinised by a Planning Inspector during the course of a Public Examination. Planning is very much in the air at the moment with the National Planning Policy Framework also currently being the

subject of national debate. At the end of the day the main concern of course is to provide accommodation for local people at prices they can either afford to pay either by outright purchase or by way of rent.

SEDBERGH

The other Council meeting was on the 24<sup>th</sup> January when Members considered a referral to them by the **Resources and Partnerships** Overview and Scrutiny Committee of a Members Call-in in respect of proposed changes to the Car Parking Fees structure across the District. One particularly controversial aspect is the introduction of night time charging. As a member of the Overview and Scrutiny Committee I voted in favour of this referral as I personally was not particularly happy about what was being proposed. So it is now up to the full Council to decide whether to refer it back to Cabinet for further consideration. Watch this space!

Wearing my Yorkshire Dales Member's hat I had quite an adventure on the 10<sup>th</sup> January when I was asked to attend a meeting of Muker Parish Council to bring them

up to date with current activities in, and changes to, the Park Authority. After what I can only describe as a challenging journey from Nateby to Muker along Swaledale in the rain and mist I was warmly welcomed by four of the five members of the Council along with their Clerk in the Literary Institute (which had a wonderful log fire burning in the grate). The meeting began at 7.45 pm and I was kindly asked to go first in view of my journey back to Sedbergh.

I began by explaining the key issues currently facing the Authority namely: financial and administrative restructuring, the Housing Development Plan document, the

work needed to prepare a new National Park Management Plan and the Governance Review at present under consideration. I also highlighted the Authority's current priorities following our meeting on the 13<sup>th</sup> December and then went on to point out possible sources of funding for local and Parish Council projects. I emphasised the wish of the Authority to engage more proactively with local people and councils and especially to identify those areas where the Authority can help or work with the Parish Council more effectively. What I had to say was received very positively and I was assured that the current relationship between the Authority and the Parish

Council was much better than it had been in the past not least because of the work being done by those Authority Members living in the area. I was then asked questions about the following:

1. Would the Governance Review mean a reduction in Membership of the Authority? I explained that this was not a proposal currently on the table and that, indeed, if the proposed extensions went ahead this could mean more Members rather than less. I also went on to say that in future "Parish" appointments would probably be made by the Authority itself from anyone resident in the Parish on the

recommendation of the Parish Council.

2. This led on naturally to a question as to whether the proposed extensions would be likely to go ahead. I explained the timetable and said that a Public Enquiry looked inevitable in view of the objections from various public bodies. I also explained in a little more detail the proposals in respect of the Western and Northern extensions and the Orton Fells. It would be fair to say that there was not a ringing endorsement for the proposed designations! There was even a suggestion that Sedbergh itself and the Howgills should not be in the Park at all as it was not "proper Yorkshire Dales". I gently pointed out that Sedbergh was old West Riding, was part of the historic Wapentake of Ewcross and its credentials to be in the Park were as good as anyone else's! An interesting perceived cultural divide here perhaps?

The visit as a whole was very useful and gave me a further insight into how different each Parish Council is and that they have very different ways of working. By the time I left, the mist was coming down so I had an equally "interesting" journey home this time via Buttertubs and Hawes! Evelyn and I may be contacted at any time on:

I remember teaching that these latitudes were known as 'the Roaring Forties, the Furious Fifties, and the Screaming Sixties', - rather descriptive names. Paul's voyage out to South Georgia from the Falklands, when he was travelling with the prevailing westerly winds, was relatively calm but returning in an easterly direction was very rough. Indeed the departure from the islands was rather precipitate as the weather was driving huge and dangerous icebergs into the bay at Grytviken, a former whaling station, where their ships were anchored. The captain thought it best to be off!

The pictures Paul showed us were thrilling – translucent blue icebergs against grey skies and sea; towering mountains, misty and snow covered, disgorging their glaciers into the sea; Shackleton's grave; wonderful wildlife, fur seals, elephant seals, penguins, and a nesting albatross only a couple of feet away. Indeed he likened it to the Garden of Eden, innocent and trusting creatures at every turn. Many thanks indeed Paul for this wonderful insight into an island on which none of us are ever likely to set foot.

#### TIM FARRON MP

Happy New Year. I know it seems like a long time ago now but I hope that you had a great Christmas and are well settled into 2012 despite the ridiculously wet weather we have been facing. Getting out on to the land must be a nightmare for farmers.

Given the Christmas break taken by Lookaround I have quite a lot to update you on so I will be fairly brief on a number of issues.

Let's start with the good news. I was so pleased that after all the work by lots of people, some of them very generous, the YDNP made the sensible decision and agreed to sell 72 Main Street to the community of Sedbergh. I hope that now the building is effectively owned by the town many exciting uses will be found for it that really help the town to develop and prosper.

The campaign to get a radiotherapy unit to the Westmorland General Hospital is going well. At the last count we had over 8000 signatures on our petition which is brilliant. I have been touched by the number of people who have been prepared to share their stories of being treated at Preston or Carlisle Hospital. However, we cannot afford to be complacent, we need as many signatures and stories as we can manage so if you have not signed the



petition yet then please please do go to my website (www.timfarron.co.uk) and register your support. Also, please put the 3<sup>rd</sup> March in your diary as we are planning a march through Kendal in support of the campaign and we need as many people to come along as possible. Again if you check my website you will find more details.

The hospital has taken a lot of my time over the past few weeks as we hear more and more stories of the dreadful situation at the Morecambe Bay Hospitals Trust which runs the hospitals at Kendal, Lancaster and Barrow. There have been a succession investigations leading to highly critical reports on the treatment patients can expect to receive from the Trust. Several senior people have left but the Chief Executive remains and we have still to hear what the plans are to sort the problems out. I am holding a series of meetings with the trust and the CEO and have written to the Prime Minister to keep the pressure on to sort things out. It was fantastic to learn that

Killington Sustainability Energy Trust had been successful in their application for funding to help in their plans to build a weir across the Lune to generate electricity. Chris Hulne, the Climate Change Secretary, was full of praise for their proposals to produce secure "home grown energy". I shall do all that I can to help ensure that the plans come into reality.

Finally, I am working hard to try to ensure that Cumbria becomes the first rural area to have 4G, the next generation of mobile phone transmission. In theory 4G provides high broadband speeds without the need for an expensive new cabling. It seems to me that this can bring more benefits to rural areas than it ever will in cities where there is plenty of "fixed" network capacity.

#### **DENT PARISH COUNCIL**

The December meeting took decisions on grants to local organisations and the budget for the next financial year. The minutes of the meeting, together with a detailed breakdown of the budget, will shortly be published on www.dentdale.com (follow the parish council link) as well as being available as a hard copy from the parish clerk.

#### **Budget**

In setting the 2012/13 budget, the council considered the following:

 In the current financial year, the Council is expecting to draw on £3,615 from its reserves in order to balance its books, and this should be avoided next year.

- The payment of VAT has resulted in the car park's annual costs increasing by about £3,5000. This reduces next year's projected car park surplus to £2,005, below the £3,000 that the council considers appropriate.
- Any profits from the car park should be used to finance community projects and not to subsidise the council's running costs.
- Each year, the amount raised from the council tax, the level of car park charges and the amount budgeted for expenditure should all keep pace with inflation.
- The overall amount available for grants to local organisations

should remain at around £3,000. The council decided:

- to increase the precept in 2012-13 by 5.2%, in line with inflation. This will cost a Band D household an extra £1.93 per year, or 16p per month
- not to charge residents for car park permits
- to raise the short stay car park charge to £2.00, and to consider at the February meeting whether to extend the period from 2 to 3 hours
- to keep the all day charge at £4.50
- to increase the cost of permits for campervans, B&Bs, holiday cottages, second homes and business vehicles from £70 per year to £80, with effect from 1st January 2012.

#### Saturday Bus

Before Christmas the council applied for a grant of £41,800 from the Dales Integrated Transport Alliance (DITA) to continue the Saturday bus service for another three years until Spring 2015, during which time it is hoped to make it **JULIE NOBLE GARDENING** Friendly and Efficient Gardening Services



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financially viable. The application has been considered by DITA, but a decision on it has been delayed until the results are known of a transport needs survey which they have commissioned for the whole Yorkshire Dales area. The present funding for the service, which the parish council raised from a number of sources, will run out in March, so if the Saturday bus is to continue it is important that we have a definite decision before then.

As reported before Christmas in the parish newsletter, the National Park will be setting up a Bluetooth point at the entrance to Dent car park so that visitors can download information about both the village and walks in the dale to their smart phones. The council approved the installation of the necessary equipment for this, so that it can be working in time for the new tourist season.

#### **Next Meeting**

The next parish council meeting will be at 7.30pm on February 6<sup>th</sup> in the Sedgwick Room. It will be open to members of the public and there will be an opportunity at about 8pm for anyone to raise matters of concern. Future meetings will be on the first Monday of each month, unless it is a bank holiday, when they are on the second.

The church silver sparkled on the altar table during the Midnight service on Christmas Eve and the main service on Christmas Day. The crib with its wonderful figures, the bright Christmas tree and the glorious flower decorations added to the ambiance of all the services.

A little girl called Ellie brought much to a recent Sunday morning service when she was baptized. Through her own initiative she asked the Vicar if he would baptize her a request he readily agreed to. Everyone in the church that morning wore smiles, just as they had the previous week when the Sunday School children went to



the altar rail for a blessing wearing their Three Kings outfits, celebrating Epiphany.

It will be "business as usual" when workmen from Brown and Whittaker of Ingleton move into the church at the beginning of February. Screening off the East end 8feet high panels will attempt to keep the dust and mess transferring to the rest of the church as much as is possible whilst extending the raised area of the chancel into the nave, creating a new stone platform. The plan is for a new, moveable communion table to sit on the platform during services. This will be easily moved to one side when concerts and other performances are held. At the same time two rows of pews will be removed from the nave and some of the pews in the side aisles turned through 90degrees to face the new platform. A disabled ramp will be provided in the North aisle. New lighting and improvements to the existing lighting are planned to follow after Easter when this first flush of work has been completed.

During this time services will be taken facing the West end of the church. The communion table will be placed in front of the tower door and the congregation will sit on the red plastic chairs (we do have cushions) around the font. We shall use the piano for accompaniment, as the organ will be wreathed in plastic for protection.

The plans for this work are on display inside the church should you



wish to see in greater detail. Unlike the work going on at the old Auction Market site you will not be able to look over the wall and see what is happening due to the presence of the screens.

The biggest change this year will be the retirement of the Vicar in June. Many of you will have known of Alan's plans but now it is official and his resignation has been sent. Finding a replacement seems a daunting task as Alan has served faithfully and sincerely amongst us for 26years. We have to agree that he is fully deserving of the chance to hang up his dog collar, perhaps swopping it for the dog lead belonging to Nero the family poodle, the two of them going for long country walks together in their new surroundings.

#### SEDBERGH & DISTRICT HISTORY SOCIETY

Lowther Castle and Gardens The visit of Andrew Mercer, the Commercial and Project Director of the Lowther Castle and Garden Trust, drew a large audience. Mr Mercer gave a lively illustrated presentation of his experiences in managing this huge restoration project, remarkably his first.

Some background history: Edward I in 1283 granted hunting rights to the Lowthers which marked the foundation of the Lowther Estate. John Lowther, the 1<sup>st</sup> Viscount Lonsdale, rebuilt Lowther Hall on a grand scale in the late 17C and this has been handed down over the centuries to the present 8th Earl. The main body of the castle burnt down in 1725. The present structure dates from about 1814 and incorporated some stone from Shap Abbey. It reached its peak in 1903, but was abandoned in 1936 before being requisitioned by the army in order to develop a secret tank weapon for use in desert warfare. When it was returned to the 7<sup>th</sup> Earl he decided to dismantle it. Many people from far and wide gained bits of Lowther, some now being returned. Chicken and pig farming along with forestry were developed and the gardens abandoned.

English Heritage carried out emergency repairs in 1999 and in 2006 the Northwest Regional Development Agency recognised its potential to the local economy as a



tourist attraction. The trust was established, grants obtained and in 2010 restoration plans were finalised and the project kicked off.

The gardens were established in the late 17c on a truly grand design. A remarkable etching dated 1700 gave an overhead view of the gardens at their peak as though taken from a hot air balloon! The same infrastructure of paths and long straight avenues has survived and now 130 acres are being tackled to re-establish their former glory. The long limestone escarpment facia is being rebuilt and a much older retaining wall, probably Roman, has been discovered. The ground is very fertile and the Japanese garden, the rock and rose gardens, some designed by Mawson, are reappearing. Extensive clearance of woodland areas is progressing. Two hundred 350 year old yew trees line ancient avenues. The apple and

pear orchards are being re-instated and the neglected grass progressively cut, although the discovery of some great crested newts has hampered this.

Of the grade 2 listed buildings the Earl's aspiration was to leave the castle facade as a monument; to rebuild it would be hugely expensive. The structure needed to be made safe however and £0.5m has been spent on scaffolding alone. So it is a balancing act as to what is affordable. The stable courtyard now houses a shop, a café and a sculpture gallery. The use of local craftsmen, along with apprentices has been a priority. Many local families have a personal history of ties with the castle and are being

very generous with information.

The 2012 season will see all these areas open to the public. The landscape is stunning and visitors will be allowed to freely wander in the grounds, to see all the gardens requiring over 2 hours.

This is very much work in progress and Mr Mercer's lively presentation was exciting and breathtaking; what a magnificent project this is for locals and visitors alike. In thanking the speaker Tony Hannam predicted a Society visit in the Summer Programme and was pleased to have noticed 24 summer houses scattered around the garden to provide shelter from the elements.

#### TIMING IS CRUCIAL

During the winter, I like to read something "improving" and one of the books I chose this year is optimistically entitled, "The secret of eternal life". It is a translation of an ancient Chinese text and reflects a sophisticated world view, based on observation of natural phenomena.

I haven't yet learned the secret of eternal life (I'm still working on it) but I did learn that the Chinese love to use examples to stand for universal principles. For example the interrelationship of the active (Yang) and passive (Yin) principles which govern life as we know it are described as: " metal and wood jointed together", "tortoise and snake encoiled", "heaven and earth peacefully entwined", "crow and rabbit in a single burrow". This has made me think more carefully about some of the sayings we have inherited in Tai Chi. For example, "to





move to the right first move to the left". After years of trying to follow this rule, it is now clear to me that it is but an example of a more abstract principle of movement.

Talking of movement, in recent years, I have seen a member of my own family becoming increasingly less mobile and trying to understand how such a process starts. It strikes me that there are two things that can happen to the way a person moves, which can only lead to future problems. The first is swaying from one foot to another while walking. In normal walking the weight remains central and the body twists about its axis as each foot in turn takes the weight. (Another example of Yin and Yang in action.)

The second thing I have noticed is that people attempt at the very difficult act of hauling the body along using the limbs (most obvious when going upstairs). The leg muscles are designed to move the leg, not to move the weight of the whole body. When we walk, it is as if the centre of gravity moves along and the legs simply move to support our weight. If you put your foot up a step and then
attempt to haul yourself up, you will struggle. The weight should already be moving upwards and forwards as you move your foot, your front leg then momentarily supports your weight in the new position. So, if you can, avoid swaying and hauling.

We shall be looking at the way we move in move more detail in the Spring Term Wild Goose Qigong class (Mondays 10.00, URC Hall). Also, alongside our usual exercises for good health, we shall be learning a short sequence particularly suited to the transition from winter into spring.

One of the things the "everlasting life" book made very clear, is that for good health it is essential to gear our level and type of activity to the time of year. The traditional Chinese calendar (of which we are only really familiar with the animals – the year of the dragon started on January 23<sup>rd</sup>), like the Christian calendar is partly solar and partly lunar. Midwinter, midsummer, the equinoxes and the beginnings of the four seasons divide the year into eight solar sections. Autumn and winter are regarded as relatively more Yin (passive) and





spring and summer more Yang (active) and these eight points of the calendar are transitions. The 4<sup>th</sup> of February is the beginning of spring, a time to come out of the rest and recuperation of winter and move towards being more active. At the spring equinox on 21<sup>st</sup> March, the tipping point from Yin (passive) into Yang (active), we shall be moving into the six month period of maximum activity.

A similar analysis of time of day is also helpful. For example, midday is the point of maximum Yang. At this point the Yin starts to grow, reaching maximum at midnight. Having a short rest after lunch can support this process and thus improve the quality of sleep at night.

concert and service in the URC. Lastly may we thank all who kindly donated time collecting and all who donated to the poppy appeal. Many a mickle makes a muckle.

You may or may not be aware that <u>all</u> the money from the poppy appeal goes to helping current and former service personnel. The cost of administration is covered by the

Membership fee (currently £13.00 pa. £1.00 of which is returned to the branch towards the cost of local administration). I understand that nationally The Royal British Legion spends more than £1,000,250.00 (yes one and a quarter million pounds Afghanistan. a week on welfare.)

A new £8 million research centre has opened which will study the effects of roadside bombs on British soldiers.

The Royal British Legion Centre for Blast Injury Studies at Imperial College in London will also devise new equipment to protect personnel.

Improvised explosive devices or IEDs are the biggest cause of deaths and injuries to UK troops in





Scientists at the centre will study the effects on the whole body of blasts "right down to the cellular level."

#### **Blast simulator**

Blast injury studies have been conducted at laboratories at Imperial College for some time, and the facilities there already include a blast injury simulator.

The centre also hopes to devise new combat boots which can transfer the impact of an IED from the heel to the shin bone, for example, which they believe could result in fewer amputations.

Improvised explosives are the leading cause of injuries and deaths to British soldiers in Afghanistan

The centre will also be investigating "blast lung", the most common cause of death among soldiers who survive the initial explosion. Symptoms include severe bruising, bleeding and damage to blood vessels in the lung.

The majority of the money for the new centre is coming from the Royal British Legion. The organisation believes technology is already saving lives, but that more can be achieved.

"People are surviving injuries they wouldn't have survived five years ago as a result of all sorts of improvements," said Chris Simpkins, Director General of the Royal British Legion.

#### SIGHT ADVICE SOUTH LAKES SEDBERGH GROUP

For people with sight problems A special party was held in January, replacing the function that should have been held in October 2011 and was cancelled. The celebration was the 10<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Audio and Large Print Lookaround. Everyone who had been involved in the production of the audio version or the large print version was invited.

It was held in the United Reform Church room which was looking very smart and welcoming with its new renovations, décor and carpets. The chairman, Gordon Axford, welcomed everyone and congratulated Dennis and the team for all their enthusiastic work over the years. Gordon proposed a toast and the candles were lit on a lovely celebration cake. Dennis was asked to blow out the candles and he responded to the toast with a short account of the origins and history of the group.

Thanks were given to people and groups who had helped to start what was initially called the 'Talking Lookaround'. These included



Margaret McClure from Sight Advice South Lakes and John Ross and Bruce Carnaffin from the audio version of the Westmorland Gazette. Both Sedbergh School and Settlebeck School were remembered for all their involvement and support over the years.

It was observed that the visually impaired people of Sedbergh and district were unusually lucky in having both large print and audio versions of the local newsletter. Local newspapers with a voluntary audio team are not unusual but the production of a large print version is quite rare. The audio version involves many people in it's creation, but Dennis is entirely responsible for all

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## SEDBERGH & DISTRICT HISTORY SOCIETY



On 16th November, Mrs Susan Dench, formerly of Cumbria County Council Archives and currently President of Cumbria Family History Society gave a talk to Sedbergh and District History Society entitled, "Cumbrians on the Move". She based her talk on documents used in an exhibition at Carlisle Record Office in 2004, giving examples of people moving within Cumbria, from Cumbria to other parts of England and from Cumbria overseas. The examples were mainly from Cumberland but Susan had found a document in the Lowther archive which mentioned carriers going to Sedbergh and Dent

and she gave the copy of this to the Society.

Poor roads impeded travel in the past but the roads were improved after the 1745 rebellion and the coming of the railways made a big difference in the C19th. Susan listed the reasons why people might travel (such as for work, to school, for a health cure, on holiday, for military service, etc.) and gave many examples from documents. Travel within Cumbria.

Examples of travel for holidays in the nineteenth century included letters describing a holiday at the prestigious and exclusive resort of Allonby. After the coming of the railway, Silloth too was developed as a resort and larger numbers of people went there. From Silloth it was possible to take day trips to Scotland, Ireland, and the Isle of Man. The Silloth Gazette listed people staying there and noted where they came

from. Most came from within Cumberland but some were from Yorkshire or Scotland. Outside Cumbria

When people sought poor relief in a parish which was not their birthplace, a removal order would be made and a pass given to allow them to obtain food and shelter in the parishes through which they passed on their way home. Examples included John Borroskill from Bolton near Wigton who had fought with the Royalist army at various civil war battles all over the north of England but later, as an out of work agricultural labourer, sought poor relief in Yorkshire and was liable to be sent back to Bolton. In the late C18th Jane Miller was

found begging in Boroughbridge with 5 children and she was "removed" to her stated place of origin, Wigton. <u>Overseas</u>

Many people migrated from the poorer areas of Cumberland to North America but an interesting example of a Cumbrian living in Europe in the C18th was Thomas Wilson of Bewcastle who was a merchant and ships chandler in Leghorn (Livorno) in Italy, a free port known as the "English Factory", where cargo could be landed and stored free of tax. Thomas' Will showed that his wife and family remained at Bewcastle but that he had at least two illegitimate daughters in Italy.

He was awarded the first Conductor Fellowship with the BBC Singers. He is now Musical Director of the King's Camerata and Da Chiesa baroque ensemble, and Principal Conductor of Manchester Chamber Choir, and conducts operas for companies including Eastern Opera, Opera North and English Touring Opera. He has broadcast many times on BBC Radio 3 including at the BBC Proms. Justin is married to Bibi, an opera

#### FEBRUARY GARDENING

Now that the winter frosts, rains and gales have swept the gardens clear of deciduous leaves and revealed the bare "bones" of the structure of our borders, it is a good time to have a look around and see whether any unwanted plants are lurking there. The most usual interlopers in my garden (apart from the dandelions, creeping buttercups and other weeds) are tree seedlings which have managed to secrete themselves in amongst shrubs and in the midst of herbaceous plants in the mixed border. Those growing alongside bushes have sometimes managed to get away with two or three years growth before they raise their heads above the height of the "chosen" shrub and are revealed.

In my experience, the most common unwanted tree and shrub seedlings in local gardens are Ash, Sycamore, Sallow (Goat Willow) and Elder. The first two can be a real nuisance because they put down deep tap roots in their early years, often underneath walls, or beside paving, and these roots are hard to dig out

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once they get a hold. Sallow has a much more spreading root system, so is easier to remove, but it does grow very quickly and searches out drains which it can invade and block with a fine mesh of branching roots. Elder is not generally difficult to remove as it has a fairly shallow, soft root system, but it is also fast growing and can overshadow its neighbours if not kept in check.

Those seedlings or young trees which are difficult, or impossible to dig out by the roots can usually be finished off by applying a dose of SBK Brushwood killer. Late February or early March is a good time of the year to choose as the sap is beginning to rise and the roots to begin growing. Choose a dry, frost free day to do this. Cut the stem of your unwanted seedling as close to the ground as possible and immediately paint the undiluted herbicide directly on to the cut surface. Large seedlings may need more than one application, but this method does usually work in the end. Elaine Horne

A new addition to the documents we hold is the Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority's latest version of their Housing Development Plan. It's got details of areas where new housing could be developed. The report (along with the Townscape Initiative report and much more) is in the Parish Council office here at 72a Main Street. We also have the forms for the Parish Council/SLDC shop front improvement grants – these are small grants to improve the look of your shop (if you have one). Application deadline is 1 March.

Other interesting material we currently have includes leaflets about a possible Credit Union for South Lakeland; credit unions are community savings and loan cooperatives which avoid a lot of the problems of big banks. They need people to pledge support to show the FSA there is a demand for a one; please come and have a look and think about sending in the (nonbinding) pledge form.

The Wednesday market has been building up quite well over the last year or more, and we are going to be making an effort to increase the number of stalls (and customers!) this month and next. Depending on the week, you will find fruit and veg, bread, cakes, pet supplies, fish, meat, eggs, Indian food, lightbulbs and light electrical goods on sale. Do come and have a look. While you're there, come into the Office to look at our sale of the eco-friendly cleaning products we carry – some of the more esoteric stuff sells slowly and we want to encourage people to try it. So please do!

Lastly, we can now take your CD and DVD discs (not the packaging, please) for recycling. We will be passing them on to the RSPB who have worked out something useful to do with them.

#### NOVEMBER WEATHER

#### SEDBERGH & DISTRICT ART SOCIETY

The speaker on 9th December 2011 was Anthony Barrow, who chose to demonstrate a still-life.

His dynamic personality set the scene for an entertaining session, which he promised would not last



more than two hours, because he wished to retain spontaneity -and he certainly did that.

His choice of materials was gessocoated 1400 gr. lining paper, acrylic paint, and large brushes. He had a useful tip - use plastic meat trays as palettes - after a build up of dried paint, simply peel the paint off and reuse the tray.

A large photo of a pile of fruit was his subject, which he thought of as a group rather than individual fruit, so he began, using a variety of colours, to scribble in an abstract background, using the negative shapes of the group. The fruits themselves were tackled with shape in mind rather than detail, noting the reflected colours from neighbouring fruit, using colour perspective at the bottom to lead into the painting, and dealing with shadow before texture.

Anthony emphasised the need to keep standing back to see his work from a distance.

It became obvious as he worked with immediacy that he was right when he said, "I just love painting". *Val Finch*

#### BOOKWORM

What I have been reading this month .....

<u>The Swan Thieves by Elizabeth</u> Kostova (fiction)

Man attempts to slash a painting in an American national gallery, remains silent and is ultimately referred to a psychiatrist. This is a superb plot blending mystery, art history and psychology and it is tantalizingly told by Kostova. On the journey the reader visits France, learns about French impressionism and the complexities of motive. It is an absorbing read on the impact of sadness, obsession, creativity and mental illness.

The Magnet North by Sara Wheeler (travel writing)

If you enjoyed Frozen Planet then this book will be of interest. Wheeler roves across the Arctic lands of Alaska, Russia, Canada, Greenland and Finland using all manner of transport entering the spirit of the landscape and lives of the people she meets who live there - often a mix of transient scientists and long established communities. Traditions and technology have previously clashed and there is the potential for more conflict as resource interventions and climate change impact on the Arctic environment and the people who depend on it for their livelihood.

<u>At Home by Bill Bryson (non fiction)</u> Wrapped around the theme of Bryson's own home - a rectory in Norfolk - he writes entertainingly and knowledgeably on many aspects of home life especially design and functions of rooms but inevitably covers associated topics of eg history of salt, servant duties, inventors of household items, architects. So a good source for quiz questions !Most of the time it is a fascinating dip-into read though probably doesn't need 632 pages. RM Bookworm

#### SEDBERGH & DISTRICT ART SOCIETY

Due to the illness of the arranged speaker we were fortunate Ron Ablewhite was able to join us at very short notice. Ron gave an entertaining and informative talk and demonstration in watercolour. Having been a professional artist for 18 years we were able to learn a great deal from his experience and his portfolio of prints which he brought to show the range of subjects he enjoys to paint. He stressed the need for painters to enhance their observational skills and said sketching and painting should where possible be done from life, and photographs should be used only as reference and backup material.

As one of his highly detailed works would take too long to complete in a demonstration he chose a study of a winter tree with an ivy clad trunk.

He normally uses 300lb Saunders Waterford paper which does not need stretching, Artists quality Windsor and Newton paints and Proarte prolene brushes, mostly using a rigger which is a long bristled brush with a fine point.

Ron used a limited palette of yellow ochre, cadmium yellow, raw and burnt umber, light red and cobalt and ultramarine blue. He explained his technique carefully as he painted laying in a base wash in light tones and gradually building up the texture and form of the tree with darker tones and varied brush strokes.

Ron's talk contained a lot of information which was useful to all

levels of experience and ability. The next meeting is the society's AGM on10th of February and it is hoped there will be a good attendance of members.

NEIGHBOURHOOD FORUM From the Meeting held in Kirkby Lonsdale on 22nd November AGE UK SOUTH LAKELAND

VILLAGE AGENTS Penny Pullinger, from Age UK South Lakeland, started by thanking the Sedbergh & Kirkby Lonsdale Neighbourhood Forum for the grant it had previously awarded to enable the Village Agents to purchase large format games and an indoor curling set. She had brought some of the games to the meeting, including the curling set, and everyone was invited to have a go before they left!

Penny then spoke to the Forum about the Village Agent scheme and in particular about the work of the local Agent, Linda Greensmith who covers Sedbergh and Dent. Agents are paid for 10 hours work per week, but in reality most of them devote quite a lot more time to their work which breaks down into three main areas.

They are an excellent way of, at least partly, solving the issue of making contact with and getting information out to those in more isolated rural areas.

The Agents first commitment is to work with any individual over the age of 50, and their families/carers who require help to access basic information on what services and benefits are available to them and which may help an individual enjoy a better guality of life.

Agents can also help with filling in forms but for matters which require more detailed knowledge or will take a considerable amount of time they can also call on the back up service of Age UK Community Officers based in Kendal, who will be able to spend more time working on an individual case.

The Agents second area of focus is to improve general well-being. This is done through support for individuals and also by organising groups that meet regularly such as lunch clubs and book clubs. There is in Sedbergh a regular tea club will be starting at the Bull. Age UK also promotes happy and active events such as Café D which is aimed specifically at supporting those with memory problems or dementia and their

carers. This meets regularly on Thursdays at the Institute in Kirkby Lonsdale from 2pm - 4 pm.

Although Age UK South Lakeland has now secured funding from various sources which will allow the Village Agent programme to continue for at least another 5 years, there is a great need for more volunteers to help out, especially with some of the activities, and, for instance, delivering magazines. SEDBERGH & KIRKBY LONSDALE LOCAL AREA PARTNERSHIP

The last meeting mostly considered Highways issues. Kevin Lancaster

has had a productive meeting with Steve Gibson and Keith Masser from CCC Highways team and most issues raised can and will be resolved sooner rather than later. A member of the audience queried the quality of some Highways work that had been done recently.

Aside from the Local Area Partnership, Cllr Lancaster has also been looking at directing funding to various local traffic issues such as "Not Suitable for HGVs" signs on the Barbon Road.

APPLEBY HORSE FAIR Rob Kitchen, Streetcare Client Officer, from South Lakeland District Council is responsible for overseeing the transit of gypsies and travellers



through the Kirkby Lonsdale and Sedbergh area on their way both to and from the Fair. At a meeting held earlier on the day of the Forum, dates for the various measures to be put in place for the 2012 Fair had been agreed.

The Traffic Regulation Order will come into force on 27th April 2012. It will be applied to all vehicles whether they belong to a local resident or someone passing through the area. The posts will also be in place from 27th April. It is hoped they will be slightly less in number than last year as they will be spaced 10 yards apart although they may be closer together in key areas. The boulders will be put in place before the Bank Holiday weekend of 7th May.

Scrogg Bank and the other temporary sites in South Lakeland will open on 28th May. Cote Moor, which is in Eden, will not open until 3rd June but from 1.00 pm in the afternoon rather than 5.00 pm in the evening. On 7th June, the date the Fair starts, all the South Lakeland sites will shut. Scrogg Bank, and the other sites will re-open again on 11th June and will



shut finally on 17th June. This final closure will be strictly enforced, especially in the Kirkby Lonsdale area.

Bank Holidays for the Queen's Diamond Jubilee fall on 4th and 5th June just before the Fair starts. Anyone planning a special event in the area of the A683 over this period who thinks that their traffic/parking may be affected by additional traffic for the Fair should contact Rob Kitchen at

Information will be placed in local press, and on relevant websites, and will also be communicated through Parish Councils.

> NEIGHBOURHOOD POLICING TEAM

PCSOs Karen Dakin and Rachel Thomas cover the Sedbergh & Kirkby Lonsdale area for the Kendal Rural Neighbourhood Policing team. The current community priority and a focus of police time is Anti Social behaviour around the People's Hall in Sedbergh. The most recent incident involved criminal damage after the 5th November Bonfire and Firework Display.

During 2011 all Police forces in England and Wales will be changing their individual non-emergency numbers to a single, easy to remember number: '101'. This will eventually replace the current 0845 33 00 247 number - indications are that Cumbria Constabulary will be able to use '101' from 12th December 2011 but continue to use the '0845' number until the change is widely publicised.

BROADBAND Jock Cairns from Dent is the local area's Broadband Champion for the Connecting Cumbria project. Cumbria County Council has delayed the announcement of the preferred supplier for faster broadband services in the county until January 2012.

Improvements to the availability of broadband in rural areas is the main focus, with the project reviewing the best ways in which this can be achieved. There is still concern that the target speeds are unimpressive and unambitious and will still be much slower than the EU target of 30 megabits.

GRANT APPLICATION An application from Dent Memorial Hall Trustees was heard and supported with an award of £1000 being made.

After a drive down the muddy roads of Eastleigh, Nairobi, with potholes the size of large ponds two feet deep or more, past the stench of burning rubbish at the roadside, we arrive at Mary Happy School surrounded by its high walls topped with broken glass. Again I go through the small door in the strong metal gate and up the flight of chipped stone steps to the two converted classrooms which are home to the 23 Kidzone girls.

The knitted square blankets on the double bunks brighten the rooms. They now have colourful stacking chairs and tables for meals and homework. But, as the girls get bigger space is very limited and we hope

they will soon be able to move into a new building. Finchley Catholic High School have begun raising funds for it. Unfortunately much more is needed than we could raise in Sedbergh with our 'Coffee Mornings'! Sofie tells me how much she enjoyed her Birthday Party this year. Josephine and Askar talk about Helen Beare's visit and how they love playing the recorder. Mary Kanini, the Manager, later arranges for them to play to me. They still play well even though they have not had as much help from the teachers as we hoped. Helen is looking into ways they might get some regular teaching and practice.

Jo Lyons, a volunteer from Simon's

parish in Potters Bar, has come with money she raised for outings for the girls. So we visit the Railway Museum and make several visits to the swimming pool with swimming lessons. Ann, Josephine and Sophie can now swim a width of the pool, and several others are almost there. Twice we go to City Park where small monkeys roam free and snatch food from visitors when they get the chance. We see a family feeding one with slices of bread from a loaf, until another monkey comes up and snatches the whole loaf, wrapper and all! Another one runs off with the ball the girls brought with them.

One day we go on the Safari Walk in

the Wildlife Park, a wooden walkway

high above the ground where we can observe pygmy hippos, crocodiles, rhinos, baboons and zebras. The girls eagerly read the signs about all the animals. We have a moment of alarm when a baboon, about four feet tall, strides along the walkway rail near us. Then he jumps down! The girls all scream and run. Fortunately the baboon is more frightened than they are and runs off. We have a word with them about wild animal etiquette!

On this visit I have two main aims, firstly to properly catalogue and set up the Gloria Dawkins Library for the girls, and secondly to teach some of the girls to knit, with the wool and needles donated by Sedbergh people.

The Library has been used for storage due to lack of space, sacks of rice, cans of cooking oil as well as old exercise books and assorted toys clutter the shelves and floor space. We are allowed to remove a redundant sink from the room and replace it with shelves whilst the food goes to a new cupboard just built in the kitchen store. Helen Beare's



great-niece Lucy, an eighteen year old gap year student has come with me and is a great help in reorganising the 600 or so books. We start to catalogue them in sections by author, and show Ann, Askar and Josephine how to continue. These three girls are very capable and have already started a simple borrowing system. We decide to keep jigsaws in the library so they are accessible, also colouring books and videos.

The girls love knitting. We start them off with just 12 stitches, the three youngest only 4, so they can make a multicoloured scarf for a doll, or a small bag. Askar makes hers about 4 ft long and wears it herself! The young ones, Carol, Patricia and

Winnie, make their rather wavy 4 stitches into bracelets. We don't have any short needles left for Patricia so we start her off with 2 pencils! She manages! I had no idea there are so many ways to get a knitting stitch wrong! The girls are really keen. Some of them even bring their knitting with them to the swimming pool!

The girls now go to their relatives in holiday time, this is Kenyan government policy, the aim is to get them to leave children's homes and go back to family. They have now traced relatives for all the girls. The most remarkable story is Jane's. She and her mother lived on the street and when Jane was 6 she was taken

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to a children's home, losing touch with her mother. This was in 1998. Her home was closed in 2005 and she came to Kidzone when it opened. She is now 18 and a boarder at High School where she does very well. In the meantime her mother has been given some training and with another woman runs a small clothing stall in the Mathare slum, where they rent what they call a house but we would call a corrugated iron shack. Jane and her mum have been reunited and Jane is so happy.

There is a younger Jane at Kidzone and her picture appears on the cover of 'The Recorder Magazine', winter 2011. This is a national publication and Helen Beare has written an article about her week at Kidzone in July when she taught the girls to play the recorder, and give a concert in front of the whole school. Quite an achievement! A copy of the magazine can be seen in Sedbergh Library.





Please continue to donate any spare double knitting wool, not anything thinner, thanks. Kath Winn has now knitted 23 blankets! Sedbergh ladies have knitted a pair of brightly coloured legwarmers for each girl. Any **simple** patterns and **short** needles up to size nine would also be useful and can be left at the Community Office. Anything we cannot use will go to the Charity Shop unless the donor requests otherwise. Sandra Gold-Wood is organising a Coffee Morning for Kidzone at the URC rooms on Wednesday February 29<sup>th</sup>. The main objective is to raise money for a spin dryer which is much needed for bedding in the wet season. This year has been very wet. I was unable to visit Nyumbani this year as they had a measles outbreak at the home. I had a long chat with Protus, the manager, who tells me the older girls are all doing well with their courses and some now have jobs. #### **CUMBRIA WILDLIFE TRUST**

Re-introducing species into our countryside. Our duty ... or ... let bygones be bygones?? Wolves in Cumbria's forests?

White-faced darters in Foulshaw Moss?

We all probably regret losing species from our countryside but should we make positive efforts to reintroduce them back again? Is it worth the effort (and money) to carry out the process successfully? Essentially the reason that species move out of an area, or even go extinct, is down to habitat change or loss. Red Squirrels have become rare (although happily making a bit of a comeback locally) due to a mixture of factors such as the arrival of the non-native Grey Squirrel and its associated virus that Reds are not resistant to, allied to a loss of much woodland. When we include the interference of humans such as inappropriate killing of birds of prey and climate change, then it is not surprising that many species are being lost from our countryside.

One Cumbrian case study is the reintroduction of **Water Voles at Warcop**. Loss of riverbank habitat and competition from the introduced mink has caused populations to plummet. Cumbria has one natural population near Alston, but despite wide ranging surveys all over the rest of Cumbria, no other population has

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been found. Cumbria Wildlife Trust has sponsored a reintroduction programme of voles into Warcop on the MOD estate. The land managers agreed to modify the habitat to improve the potential for success this work included ditch restoration and pond clearance. The animals had to be collected from the South of England, and then bred to a suitable population size and carefully (and slowly) allowed to acclimatise to their new surroundings. Lastly they had to dig their way out of soft-release cages, taking up to several days, then they had to negotiate extensive ditches and a network of pools and lakes to establish a territory. It is too early to tell if the population will establish itself but early signs are hopeful.

Another Cumbrian project forming part of the Cumbria Biodiversity Action plan, has been the reintroduction of the White-faced Darter into Foulshaw Moss. This rare species of Dragonfly only exists in ten locations in England, so any extra populations would be very valuable. The decline of the species in the UK has mainly come from the significant loss of its lowland raised bog habitat, as a result of afforestation, commercial peat-cutting for garden compost and lack of sympathetic management. Early signs this summer were promising with adults emerging from the introduced larvae and eggs. A rather sadder tale is the case of the Red Kites introduced into Grizedale Forest. This species was

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very successfully introduced into southern England with sightings now becoming common. However in Grizedale two of the 60 birds released over the first two years of a three year project have been found shot dead. The first batch of 30 were released in 2010 and 20 survived the first winter, in line with natural mortality. Since the two shot birds were found in distinctly separate areas, it is possible that there are people who still believe that they represent competition to human rights to shooting and hunting, despite it being clearly established that they are scavengers rather than predators. What of the future? Beavers have



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been introduced into Scotland on a five year trial to see if they not only can survive but can improve the habitat that they live in by creating a new pattern of wetlands which will support many other species eg otters, as well as contributing to flood relief. However are we ready to reintroduce Wolves? On the plus side they would contribute to the population control of the red deer and to the tourist industry but on the downside, they will kill some farm animals and people still have an engrained fear of them (Little Red Riding Hood). They have been reintroduced into Yellowstone but there is still controversy and the Federal Government are considering

allowing them to be hunted out despite initially agreeing to their successful reintroduction in the 1990s.

Undoubtedly we will see many other species disappear from our countryside as man's influence continues to modify our environment. Along with many other problems, prevention is better than cure so we must look after the species we have, rather than have to go to the vast effort that is required for a successful reintroduction.

Look out for details of a local CWT talk in February on the re-introduction of Red Kites to Grizedale.

#### SEDBERGH ORCHESTRA'S 'SPRINGTIME CLASSICS' CONCERT

The next Sedbergh Orchestra Concert differs from the previous ones in various respects. The first thing to note is that it will be taking place on a Sunday, not on a Thursday as has been the custom. You will see elsewhere in Lookaround that St Andrew's Church is currently having internal alterations to make it more user-friendly for concerts and in particular in readiness for the forthcoming Sedbergh Festival in June. This means that our concert, planned for Thursday March 1st, cannot be in the Church, although we shall still be able to have our regular Thursday rehearsals as usual in the Church room. Fortunately, the Thornely Studio, adjacent to Guldrey Lodge, is able to accommodate the concert, but on Sunday, March 4th instead and so we shall have our 'Springtime Classics' concert there on that date.

There is a freshness about truly Classical music which seems to be particularly appropriate for Springtime. This is the first occasion when all the music we shall be performing is from the Classical era. The composers represented are Austrian and their lives spanned the years from 1732 to 1837. The programme starts with Mozart's Overture to the opera 'Cosi fan Tutte'. (The whole opera is being performed soon at The Theatre by the Lake and a Pepperpot group is going to see it on February 28th). Next will be the Trumpet Concerto by Johann Nepomuk Hummel. In this, our conductor, Peter Crompton, will be the soloist and, in true classical style, he will direct the orchestra from the trumpet - a new experience for us. Hummel was a good friend and an almost exact contemporary of Beethoven. Although he is rather overshadowed by Beethoven, his concerto is a fine work which is very jolly and well worth playing - and hearing!

Unusually, there are two soloists in this programme. Rebekah Hendrickse, a 'graduate' of the primary-age Pepperpot Music Makers orchestra and more recently a student at Settlebeck High School, is now in the sixth form at Queen Katherine School, Kendal. She will play the beautiful Andante in C for flute and orchestra by Mozart.

Lastly comes Symphony no.101 by Haydn. This has a nickname, like so many of Haydn's 106 symphonies. Written towards the end of his life, when Haydn was in London, it is called 'The Clock' because of the repeated 'tick-tock' which is a feature of the second movement.

The concert is very reasonably priced at £6 and those aged 18 and under come free. Tickets can be bought or reserved in advance by phoning 015396 21196 or emailing yantethera@gmail.com. Otherwise tickets will be available at the door on the night.

#### **PEOPLE'S HALL**

Redevelopment News In September we reported in Lookaround that the Fundraising Sub Committee had been able to raise £50,000 for the sports changing facilities. Since then we have been reviewing our ambitious plans.

We do not seem to have any great expectations of obtaining major lottery funding or any other significant monies until the Olympics have come and gone. And the economic climate is obviously not good. So the Planning Sub Committee has been looking at other (cheaper) redevelopment options.

In November we reported in Lookaround that we were drawing up

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plans for the refurbishment of the changing rooms. We found that the current size of the building is too small to achieve modern sporting standards for two sets of sports changing rooms. This gave us the lower cost idea to expand the lower level footprint towards the road by 25 feet or so. Once this was suggested we decided there was space on top of this lower extension to place a brand new ladies and gents' toilet facility at the main hall level. The entry to the back of the hall would then be through a spacious lobby area and the toilets would be accessible from the main hall.

So what goes around comes around. This is where it all started five years ago – new and improved toilets!

#### So how to fund this?

The Fund Raising Sub Committee has recently been able to secure matched funding from the Bradbury Trust of up to £150,000. The rub is the "matched" part. Even some of the sports funding, mentioned above, is matched funding. We do have some monies in our redevelopment account

raised from the small and larger fundraising efforts already made by us all over the past few years, but not enough. And of course we will start more fundraising activities. The Parish Council have also offered support. Watch this space.

#### Holly and Ivy event

#### YORKSHIRE DALES NATIONAL PARK

Sedbergh building sale welcomed Development plans for Sedbergh were given a boost on December 13th after Members of the Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority (YDNPA) decided a vital town centre building should be sold to the community.

The Authority voted to accept an  $\pounds 80,000$  offer from a local consortium for 72 Main Street, which houses a community office, information centre, the local History Society archive and other facilities.

Local community leaders told the Authority that buying the town centre property was an integral part of the Sedbergh Townscape Initiative (STI) as it would 'unlock' opportunities to obtain funding.

The Authority decided to sell the building and the open space next to it after its budget was cut in the Government Spending Review, forcing a raft of savings including redundancies.

Originally the Sedbergh and District Community and Heritage Trust wanted to buy the property but could only to raise £30,000.

The situation prompted a world-wide response, according to the Authority's Chief Executive, David Butterworth.

"Obviously we were acutely aware that the proposed sale on the open market caused some concern among some groups and organisations in the town" he said.

"However, we did everything we could to help the Trust raise sufficient

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cash to buy it – giving it first option on the purchase for 12 months, and then delaying the sale to give it even more time to raise the money.

"There has been a diverse response to the sale proposal, with letters coming in from as far away as Australia and France, and the Members' decision today clearly shows we have listened to what people have said.

"We had budgeted for a £130,000 income from the sale of the property so we will obviously have a £50,000 shortfall that we will have to make up with savings elsewhere."

The building has been bought by the White Knight Group – a local

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consortium that has undertaken to sell it on to the local community when funding can be obtained.

Authority chairman Carl Lis said: "I am very pleased that the building will be going back to the community, allowing the town centre development to go ahead.

"Despite some erroneous and unjustified comments about the Authority by a few individuals – who have used this matter as an opportunity to attack us – I really must praise the majority of respondents who have really impressed me how positively they have engaged with us in trying to find a mutually beneficial solution to this

#### matter.

"We really have tried to do everything we can to help. The Authority always tries to carry out its work in a way that will assist the economic and social well being of local communities and I'm glad that the sale has seen a satisfactory outcome for everyone concerned."

Touched by his gesture, she graciously accepted his gift. A fitting end to a most splendid occasion.
