### **COUNCILLORS CORNER**

#### Cllr Evelyn

This April marks the first anniversary of the Food Hygiene Rating Scheme. Restaurants, pubs, cafes, hotels and food retailers are given a food hygiene rating from zero to five when they are inspected by a food safety officer from South Lakeland District Council. This is a national scheme run in partnership with the Food Standards Agency to ensure that the same standards are met across the whole country. Establishments that score highly tend to display the distinctive green and black stickers on the outside of their premises while the more lowly scorers are usually more discreet about their shortcomings. You can check out your favourite eatery online at www. food.gov.uk/ratings.

The present system replaced an earlier scheme, Scores on the Doors, which was a Cumbria-wide initiative and which had been in operation since 2007.

South Lakeland District Council has so far rated 1638 premises across the

district. In Sedbergh and Dent the results for the LA10 postcode are pretty good. Out of the 45 premises inspected there were no zeros (urgent improvements necessary) and only one establishment scored a one (major improvements necessary). There was one two (improvements necessary) and three scored a three (generally satisfactory) but the vast majority, 88 per cent, scored a four or five (good and very good) with most in the top category. Enjoy! *Cllr Ian* 

I referred to the forthcoming Appleby Fair in my last article. Yesterday (18th March) we had a further meeting of the Travellers and Settled Community Respect Group. As usual all the agencies involved with the planning for this year's Fair were represented and elsewhere in this issue you will find a timetable listing the dates when particular actions or events are scheduled to take place. The Group continues to be very concerned regarding the arrangements to be made at the Kirkby Lonsdale loop road by the A65 which is designated as an official stopping place for -

Travellers on their way to the Fair. Under the Fair Protocol this site is designated as "Low Risk" which means that as things stand at the moment there is a limit as to what the Police can do, owing to a lack of funding and manpower resources, to enforce the limit on the number of Travellers able to use the site. In the light of this the Group tasked Cllr Lancaster and me to write to the Police Commissioner setting out the nature of the problem and inviting him to come and look at the situation on the ground. This seems a job tailormade for the Commissioner and we hope that such an approach will bear fruit and result in better enforcement during the event. Visit www. applebyfair.org to find out more about the arrangements for 2013.

One of the "perks" of being a District Councillor is the increased influence and leverage one has over getting things done and for achieving positive outcomes both for the benefit of the Ward as a whole and for individual residents. I, of course, am also a resident so it also gives me the opportunity of furthering my own individual concerns of a public interest nature. I have had a life-long interest in birds and have a particular interest in Swifts. This species is beginning to significantly decline in numbers and one of the reasons for this (there are other reasons as well such as food supplies in Africa where the birds over-winter) is the reduction in suitable nesting sites. Because Swifts need access to the roof spaces

of buildings this becomes increasingly difficult for them when older buildings are restored and refurbished, being not only made wind and water-tight but effectively Swift-proof as well their original access points being sealed up. Likewise in new buildings which are built so efficiently that right from the beginning there is no way at all into the roof space. For more details of the particular problems visit www.swift-conservation.org. What is required is intervention at the planning approval stage to give some measure of protection to the birds. It is not only Swifts that are at risk in this way, of course, but also other building dependent nesting species such as Swallows, House Martins, Starlings and House Sparrows.

This is where I come in! Because of my involvement with the planning processes both at SLDC and the Yorkshire Dales National Park I have



been able to start working with officers of both of these Authorities to look at ways in which a greater measure of protection might be given. Under various EU Directives some bird and animal species are already adequately safeguarded - Barn Owls, Bats, Natterjack Toads and Cravfish for example. Their habitats are protected all the year around. For Swifts etc, however, their nesting sites are only protected under the general law for as long as they are in situ. Once they have left, the nesting sites may be destroyed or removed. What I am seeking to do is to arrange for specific environmental guidance from environmental bodies such as the RSPB, Cumbria Wildlife Trust and Natural England prior to planning permission being granted so that planning consents may be conditioned in such a way as to provide the required protection. This

will probably require amendment in due course to Local Plans and Planning Core Strategies to give the necessary legal force to the changes envisaged.

There is also quite a lot that developers and individuals can do as well on their own initiative such as installing Swift nest boxes into existing buildings or requiring "Swift bricks" to be installed into new buildings thus providing the birds access to inside and protected space. More information on boxes and bricks may be obtained from the following websites www.rspb.org.uk/thingstodo/ surveys/swifts and www.nhbs.com/ swift\_box.

All birds are wonderful and our villages and towns would not be the same without Swifts screaming low over our rooftops on warm Summer evenings. They are only with us for a short time each year (May to August) so let us all do our best to welcome them and ensure that they have a successful breeding season. It has all paid off and I suppose I felt confident about being the leader by the time I got to Danny Bridge. Road-running is my strength in running and I was feel in really fresh at this point." Jim Fisher, Race Organiser, said: "It was a very open race, more open than usual. There were ten runners in contention at the start and in an order



no one could have predicted. The ones we expected were all in the first dozen or so. There were no big surprises but the winner was a very sound contender. The conditions were perfect - occasional bright spells and a light, cold breeze. The snow had just melted off the course making it boggy underfoot and exceptionally slippery, however the breeze was helping. Casey was leading at Cautley and he held that lead but just as they came out on to Baugh Fell and Fitzner's Fence, Arthur Owen closed him down and he got very close. I thought he might take the lead at that point but, no it didn't change. Arthur was in close contention soon after Cautley. It was an exciting race."

Old Sedberghians Running Captain, Geoffery Watson, was at the finishing line. He said: "There were quite a few OS runners and walkers out this morning in different groups. There were about six in my group at 10.30am but lots of walkers too, 20 or 30. I ran in 1993 and 1994. 1993 was the year the record was broken by Charles Sykes, and 1994 was the year everyone got lost in the mist on Baugh Fell! It's always good to come back and see the race, to see how pupils' times compare these days with times before."

<b>TIM FARRON MP</b> I had a very pleasant wander around Sedbergh the other day, catching up with what is going on and seeing what people think I can help with. Clearly the merger of Casterton and Sedbergh Schools was the major issue at that point. Any change like this is bound to cause some concern, particularly as the school is so important to the town. I think the key thing that I can help with is to ensure everything goes through as smoothly as possible and we emerge at the other end with a stronger and even more successful school. However, if there are any issues that you feel I need to be aware of then please do get in touch.	The other concern, mentioned by a few shop keepers, was encouraging more people to visit the town and spend their money. Parking was mentioned but this is the responsibility of the town council now, however, I will have a chat with your District Councillors to see what I and SLDC can also do to help. I have had several meetings to discuss reducing the "national modulation levy" for hill farmers. Basically, as many of you know, farmers receive a single farm payment from the EU through the Government. However, it is not as simple as that, the Government takes a cut of these funds ( the "modulation levy" currently 19%) which it can use

for other rural improvement schemes. My argument is that hill farmers, in their role as custodians of the fells and dales, are already doing the things that the Government is taking the levy to pay for and so they should receive a reduction in the amount that is taken from their payments. I will keep pressing this issue until the Government see the sense of my point of view.

The consultation over the services the Morecambe Bay Hospitals Trust provide at each of the hospitals that they manage is well underway. You may have even attended the information event in Sedbergh. However, if you were not able to you should be able to collect a



questionnaire from any doctor's surgery or hospital that is served by the Trust, please do find one and complete it.

The budget, although not quite as supportive as many of us would have liked, did bring some significant benefits to this area. The raising of the threshold at which people pay income tax to £10,000 from 2015 is a very significant step and one that Liberal Democrats have been pushing for since before the last election. I calculate that this means that nearly 4000 hard pressed people currently paying tax will no longer have to do so when this happens. The abandoning of the fuel duty increase again is a help, particularly for those who live in more rural areas like around here for whom a car is a necessity. I estimate that a tank of petrol is now £7 cheaper than it would have been if all the planned fuel duty levy increases had happened. I know petrol and diesel is expensive enough but just imagine paying another £7. Finally, not just the abandoning of the increase in the duty on beer but an actual reduction. Our local pubs need all the support they can get if they are to remain central to our communities and this really should be some help. As ever if I can help with these or

Lookaround we have been able to secure enough funding to start Phase 1, which is the empty building and the fit out of the new side lobby. We have appointed MK Conversions of Four Lane Ends, Marthwaite, Sedbergh as our main contractor. We are delighted to keep the work in the town especially as the Town is so supportive with their donations.

The official start date was 25 March 2013. This is Lady Day in the church

finished well before Christmas, ie: by the end of August 2013. The first steps are to under pin the main hall as described in last month's Lookaround. This will happen from the Tuesday after Easter (2 April). In preparation to dig the big hole beside the path to the back door, work is to be carried out to the left hand side path for access to the Committee Room, kitchen and back stage. Users will be entering at the side of the stage and walking along the back corridor past the accessible toilet. The lighting and the pathway will be improved. This entry will continue until the new build has

### finished.

Other preparations are to move the main hall emergency exit from the right hand side to the left hand side of the hall, various safety and security fencing to be erected and various pavers to be removed. Then we will start digging!

There will inevitably be some disruptions and inconveniences whilst the work proceeds, but our aim is to keep the Hall open to all hirers. Please bear with us. If you have any

concerns please contact me.

We are now raising the funding to fit out the toilets (Phase 2) and the changing rooms (Phase 3) in the new build.

The Hadfield Trust has recently awarded us £2,000 towards Phase 2 and the Garfield Weston Foundation have awarded us £5,000 as I write. We are in discussions with another major funder for Phase 3. Several other funders have yet to make decisions.

In March we completed a leaflet drop which has accrued a number of donations, many anonymous for which the Committee sends their grateful thanks. But we continue ask those who have not yet offered donations to do so. Come and look at the big hole we are digging to prove we have started at long last!

We will also be organising some fund raising events which we hope you will support. These will include a People's Hall Literary Festival, a CPR challenge, a talk on bird migrations and the Football Club is arranging a

disco. And many other events are in planning.

### **HEALTHY EATING**

Chinese medicine offers a different view of healthy eating, and one that has much to offer to the current debate. It is clear that the way we eat in this country is not supportive of good health. The recently published recommendations (the ones that suggested that hospitals should serve up food which meets the standards expected of schools) don't go nearly far enough. "Working with the food industry" will merely maintain the unhealthy status quo. The only thing which will really help is if people cook their own food, thus making the food industry a lot less profitable.

To contribute to the discussion, I have decided to make available the healthy eating guidelines I offer to my patients and these are listed below. They are based on easily understood principles arising out of observation of the way the body reacts to different ways of eating.



1. Eat fresh, home-cooked food. Avoid regular consumption of manufactured foods of all types: ready meals, pizzas, pies, crisps, sweets, biscuits and so on. Eat food prepared at home, starting from basic raw ingredients. Freshly prepared food is better for health than food designed to have a shelf-life. 2. Eat a variety of different types of food. Have different types of food at each meal and from one day to the next. Avoid, for example, having the same thing for breakfast every day. This ensures you have the range of nutrients you need for good health. 3. Breakfast like a king. Make breakfast the main meal of the day. eat a wide range of different types of food, including some protein and vary your breakfast from day to day. The digestive system is at its strongest in the mornings - food eaten early in the day will be more easily digested and absorbed. By eating a wide range of different foodstuffs in the morning, you will be giving the body the nutrients it needs for the day ahead. Avoid over-reliance on foods of low nutritive value such as packaged cereal and toast. 4. Lunch like a prince. Whenever possible have a proper cooked meal

at lunchtime. The digestion and metabolism are still working well and nutrients are needed for the remainder of the day. Again, vary what you eat at lunchtime, to be sure of obtaining all the nutrients you need.

5. Dine like a pauper. Eat less in the

evening. The digestive system is not designed to cope with large amounts of food in the evening and eating late can lead to digestive problems and poor sleep. As the body is inactive at night, food eaten in the evening can lead to storage in the form of weight gain.

6. <u>Avoid eating too much cold, raw</u> <u>food.</u> This includes raw fruit and vegetables and any food or drink taken straight from the fridge. The reason for this is that it slows down the digestion and metabolism. The body has to supply extra energy to warm the food to body heat and to "cook" the raw food in the stomach. Warm cooked food is easier on the digestive system – be kind to yourself! In Chinese medicine "cold, raw food" is very often cited as a cause of disease.

7. <u>Avoid too much sweet or greasy</u> <u>food.</u> Excesses of sugar and fat are difficult for the body to process cleanly – and as we all know, they tend to lead to weight gain and longterm disease.

8. <u>If you have digestive difficulties or</u> <u>problems of mucous, overweight or</u> <u>fluid retention, avoid too much dairy</u> <u>produce (particularly milk, cream and</u> <u>cheese) and wheat flour (bread,</u> <u>pasta, pizza, cakes, biscuits,</u> <u>pancakes, Yorkshire pudding etc).</u> In a damp climate, such as the one we inhabit, our bodies are slowed down by the atmospheric damp. Certain foods, notably dairy produce and wheat flour, have a similar effect on the body, which is called "internal damp" in Chinese medicine. (Try cooking with rice flour; prefer rye bread and Ryvita to ordinary bread and biscuits.)

9. <u>If you have problems with</u> <u>overheating (hot flushes, hot at night,</u> <u>irritable, outbursts of anger, red face,</u> <u>red eyes) avoid alcohol and spicy</u> <u>food.</u> Curry spices, ginger, cinnamon and garlic are all hot in nature, and can have a long term heating and drying effect on the body. Alcohol is also heating, especially spirits and fortified wines.

### CUMBRIA WILDLIFE TRUST GO REDS!

In the late 19th century, a few grey squirrels were imported from America to Britain as ornamental additions to gardens and, as the saying goes, the rest is history! Their descendants have since displaced our native red squirrel throughout most of the English mainland where they continue to be a pest to farmers, foresters, bird conservationists and householders.



So why do we have red squirrels in the north of England in spite of the constant incursion of greys? The simple answer is 'People Power,' because it is certainly not by chance or accident that they are here

Peter Bullard of Cumbria Wildlife Trust can clearly remember a Red Squirrel Group meeting more than twenty years ago, when the predictions were that there would be no red squirrels left in Cumbria by the turn of the millennium. What they had not understood was the incredible passion and hard work from a network of volunteers across the landscape, all determined to conserve our iconic native red squirrel by controlling the quickly invading greys.



In the early 1990s, the V. Rev. Ingram Cleasby tried to persuade people in Sedbergh that the way to help our reds was to cull the greys not a popular concept at that time. Fortunately, enough of us listened to him so that he was able to set up a network of grey control which has gone from strength to strength as part of the Sedbergh Red Squirrel Group. It is only because of this work by volunteers around the area that we have never lost our reds squirrels and that they are now thriving.

Sedbergh RSG now extends towards Kirkby Lonsdale, thus restricting the 'flow' of greys not only

locally but through Cautley into the Kirkby Stephen area. Together with the continuous local grey control, the result is that Sedbergh is having far fewer grey sightings but, encouragingly, many more red sightings, some reds even being spotted in the town itself.

The colour variations of both<br/>species can sometimes confuse<br/>identification. Reds squirrels are<br/>usually reddish-brown with white<br/>bellies and chests, but they can also<br/>vary from nearly white to nearly black<br/>gre<br/>with many multi-colours in between,<br/>especially when they are young.bla<br/>Re<br/>you<br/>the<br/>gre<br/>sign<br/>015<br/>go<br/>usually not in the summer. The much

larger greys never have ear tufts and they can nearly always be identified by a white 'halo' around their tails caused by each hair having a white tip. They are usually grey with reddish patches, but a completely white one was found in Sedbergh last year (not albino) and there is news of black ones further to the south.

Red squirrels in Sedbergh still need your help. Sightings are important to the group and to the national picture for understanding red distribution and greys threats. The first phase of refurbishing the centre is now almost finished with the central heating and new windows installed. Any further work will have to wait until funds can be raised to do it – however a good start has been made as a result of the Lottery funding.

If you haven't been in to see what has been done, then please do come and have a look round. The centre still provides information for visitors, but now with the community office located there a wider range of information is available for local people. Books and gifts can be bought so do make use of the centre.

The grant obtained from the Lottery and another from DITA, an organization which promotes rural transport, has enabled two part time people to be appointed. Janey Hassam, a local person whom some may know as Janey Fletcher, will be managing the centre and Andi Chapple will concentrate on transport, the market and other issues. Sedbergh Community Interest Company (CIC) will be responsible for making sure that the centre becomes self sufficient, as grants are becoming increasingly difficult to obtain.

A new form of charitable body has recently been established by Parliament called a Charitable Incorporated Organisation (CIO). The



current charitable trust and all those involved with saving 72, Main St consider that a CIO will best meet the needs of the community and so work is underway to establish a CIO. This will be the body that will own the building on behalf of the community, once sufficient funds have been raised to buy it from the White Knights.

As can be seen a lot of work has been going on behind the scenes. Thanks go to all the volunteers who have been running the centre since last October and to those who have organized the improvement works. It is important to emphasise that, apart from the two part time posts,

everyone else involved works entirely on a voluntary basis.

CRAG has been liaising with the various agencies to ensure the travellers to the Appleby Fair are properly managed. Last year 2012 there was some considerable "taking advantage" by the travellers, particularly at Devils Bridge where the local caravan park had customers leave owing to intimidation. There were also several infractions in the Sedbergh area. The reason for this was that last year some of the arrangements were too relaxed. This was mainly to appease residents (the settled community) by reducing the use of posts, notices and boulders, in order to reduce the visual impact; and the lowering of police activity to move on travellers where they were occupying unauthorised stopping places.

This year the Management Team of the main agencies (County Council, SLDC and the Police) are reverting back to the stricter 2011 protocol.

A new initiative will be the attendance of officers from the main agencies at the Sedbergh Information Centre, 72 Main Street from 11.00 to 12.00 daily (time to be confirmed) to meet residents with concerns such as unsocial and abusive behaviours, field invasions, unhealthy littering, etc.

**SEDBERGH & DISTRICT HISTORY SOCIETY** The Society met at Settlebeck High School on Wednesday 6 March to hear a talk by Jennifer Holt on the recently discovered diary of Thomas Fenwick (c1729-1794) of Burrow Hall, near Kirkby Lonsdale and Nunriding in Northumberland. As a landowner and for several years M.P. for Westmorland, Fenwick travelled extensively. The parts of the diary that have survived cover the last twenty years of his life. They show Fenwick to have been an astute observer, with a curiosity displayed in his many a curiosity displayed in his many comments on agriculture, wildlife, and natural phenomena, including the direction of the wind, the daily variations of which seem to have particularly fascinated him. Fenwick's systematic recording of what he ate, how he slept, and the people he dealt with convey vividly the rhythms of the day-to-day existence of a man constantly on the move. As part of her broader interest in the history of the links between north-west England and the rest of the world. Jennifer Holt has undertaken the formidable task of editing the one million words of the diary. The first two volumes appeared recently (very handsomely, as publications of the List and Index Society), and the remaining two are due out in the coming year. The published volumes, which were on display at the meeting, and Jennifer Holt's illuminating talk showed how valuable the diary will be at many levels. These include work on



Fenwick's own biography and his family history, in which the litigation that set him and his Catholic sister-inlaw Ann Fenwick (née Benison) of Hornby Hall at odds, is one of several intriguing episodes. As Jennifer Holt's talk showed, the history of the Fenwicks is confusing, complicated by the frequency with which members of the family adopted the name Fenwick in adult life: Thomas Fenwick himself was born Thomas Wilson. But the diary's reach extends far beyond Thomas and his family. On a broader canvas it will stand as a major new resource for the history of our area and northern history more generally. All who are interested in these subjects will long be indebted to Fenwick's careful recording of his experiences and to Jennifer Holt for her skilful editing of such a voluminous work. Robert Fox

### A NEW STONE CIRCLE?

I have been interested in the stone circles in Cumbria for a number of years. It is said there are some 50 stone circles in Cumbria of different shapes and types, including some of the earliest stone circles in Britain. The stone circle at Castlerigg nearby Keswick is probably the most well known. Since the 1960s, the names Aubrey Burl and Alexander Thom have become synonymous with stone circles as they have attempted to place all the stone circles of Britain in context and to explain their purpose.

For some time there has been one missing stone circle that these experts have been seeking. This would be the fourth in a ring sequence of starting from Gamelands at Orton, the so called Druidical Judgement Seat at Appleby and the "pillow mounds" at Mallerstang. Where is the one to the south?



Imagine my surprise to find what appears to be the remnant of the missing element of the ring. This is just to the south of Rawthey Bridge on the A683. When I say remnants there is only half a circle visible (see photo) as the other half seems to have been used, as often happens, to make the roadway. The stone circle was not there some 10 years ago so why it has become visible now? This will require further research.

I thought your readers would like to share this discovery as it could well become a popular site to visit in the future.

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### WESTERN DALES BUS

The new Western Dales Bus driven by trained volunteers will start operating on 18<sup>th</sup> May by running the Saturday service to connect Dent Station with Dent, Sedbergh and Kendal.

We are now able to move ahead thanks to the welcome backing of Cumbria County Council, who are loaning us a 16-seater community bus, and we have sufficient money to continue this service for the coming year. The summer Sunday service from Dent Station to Sedbergh will be running again too, and this year it will also link Dent and Sedbergh to Hawes on a circular route, going out from Sedbergh through Garsdale and



returning via Dentdale. This will give passengers four hours in the middle of the day to explore Hawes.

The survey delivered to every house in the Sedbergh and surrounding LA10 5TD postcode areas recently has had an excellent response so far and when we start collating the answers we expect the answer to be a resounding "Yes" to our plans. This will give us actual "evidence of need" to approach the Big Lottery Fund for further money to expand the service.

The survey has had a further benefit, in that we have people offering their services as drivers. This should mean that we can expand our services more quickly into Kirkby Lonsdale and the Lune Valley, as well as covering the Dent and Sedbergh area.

In the interim, much background work is underway; organising the central hub at Sedbergh, finalising timetables to co-ordinate with the Settle to Carlisle line, defining operating procedures and generally complying with the regulations needed to operate a community bus service.

We're also planning an official launch of the service by our local MP, Tim Farron, on 8<sup>th</sup> June at Dent Station. If we don't see you there, we hope you'll support us at other times by travelling on the Western Dales Bus!

### YORKSHIRE DALES NATIONAL PARK

new group for young volunteers Young people are being given the chance to learn new skills in the fantastic setting of the Yorkshire Dales National Park.

The Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority (YDNPA) has launched a Young Rangers group aimed at 11 to 16-year-olds who have an interest in the outdoors.

Catherine Kemp, the Authority's Outreach Officer, said: "The response has been amazing – there have been so many wanting to join that we are full up. And they all live either in the National Park or nearby.

"It isn't surprising really because young people are very aware of their environment and have a good understanding of how fragile it can be. They are all really enthusiastic and we aim to develop their interest and help them understand and appreciate the special qualities of the National Park and learn about ways to protect it."

Ian McPherson, the YDNPA's Member Champion for Promoting Understanding, said: "The National Park Authority already does a lot of work with children in primary schools and with adults, so the aim of the Young Rangers group is to provide a focus for young people who are in that middle age range.

"They will be learning all sorts of practical skills and general knowledge about the natural environment that will hopefully help them in their school work and in their development as individuals."

#### APRIL GARDENING

One of the first plants I encountered when I began my career in Horticulture was *Berberis darwinii*. Whenever a consignment of plants arrived at the garden centre, it was my job to write out labels for every plant and then attach them around a convenient part of each. Having written *Berberis darwinii* out fifty times I went along to the holding area to find the relevant shrubs and quickly discovered the most dominant characteristic of *Berberis* – they are exceedingly prickly and very difficult to tie anything onto.

There are several different species, and cultivars of Berberis, some deciduous, some evergreen, some with spiny leaves and others with spiny stems. Berberis darwinii, an evergreen shrub which hales from the mountains of Chile and Patagonia has prickles on both, and being of an easy dispossession makes an excellent formal, clipped, or informal, dense hedge which will dissuade animal and human interlopers. Berberis darwinii bears bright orange flowers in April - not everyone's favourite colour - and is usually in full bloom just at the time when the bright pink cherry blossom is out. It clashes with this most disagreeably so the two are best kept as far apart as possible. A second evergreen hybrid, B x stenophylla which has yellow flowers makes a similarly good barrier as does Berberis julianae (from China), which looks far more benign



than the previous two shrubs but actually hides inch long, needle sharp spines, amongst the long narrow leaves. This one was by far the most painful plant in the Garden centre to attach a name tag to and consequently gets my vote as the most effective and dissuasive hedge plant known to the gardeners of Britain.

Some of the deciduous species also make good deterrents. *Berberis thunbergii*, *B. x ottawensis*, *B. wilsoniae* and *B. vulgaris* (our native "Barberry) all grow easily in our well drained soils and the first two of these have dark red leaved forms. *B. wilsoniae* bears numerous red berries and fine autumn colour at the end of the growing season. All have pale yellow, scented flowers in Spring. *Elaine Horne* 

#### YORKSHIRE DALES NATIONAL PARK

New cash to put more power lines underground in National Park

More cash has been set aside to get rid of unsightly overhead power lines in the Yorkshire Dales National Park.

And residents and visitors are being asked to suggest areas where cables should go underground in the next few years.

Ofgem, the regulator of the electricity industry, is in the process of allocating funds for the undergrounding of more power lines in National Parks and Areas of Outstanding Natural Beauty.

Thomas Harland, the YDNPA's Planning Policy Officer, said: "We

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haven't received confirmation of our final allocation from Ofgem yet, but I think we can confidently estimate it to be about £3 million.

"It takes a long time to plan an undergrounding scheme. This is because it's hard to find a line that doesn't create some challenges – whether due to cost, disruption to local communities, wildlife, archaeology, or for technical and logistical reasons.

"This means we need to start working with the power suppliers to plan the next set of schemes as soon as possible – so we'd like to hear suggestions for lines that should be targeted.

"We can't make any promises because it is common for any combination of the above challenges to undermine scheme feasibility. However, once we've got some ideas,





we'll sit down with the electricity companies and see which ones they can take forward."

As part of an existing £1.8m fiveyear scheme, the YDNPA has worked with power suppliers on projects to put a number of overhead lines underground, including some from Dent Station to Cowgill.

And dozens of prehistoric flints hidden for thousands of years were unearthed during the first phase of a £300,000 project with Electricity North West on the Malham Moor Estate. Work was put on hold so archaeological students from Bradford University could investigate



further. The Malham scheme will see 23 electricity poles removed and overhead powerlines replaced with 2.2km of underground cable.

Other schemes that are on-going include lines in Upper Wharfedale from Deepdale to Beckermonds. Ann Brooks, the YDNPA's Member Champion for Sustainable Development, said: "This is a very welcome initiative which, hopefully, will allow yet more undergrounding of



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electricity supplies within this National Park. I would commend Ofgem for their very positive contribution in helping to conserve the beautiful landscape that we all value and enjoy."

Louis Morton gave a helpful demonstration in acrylics, choosing a scene of a sunset over moorland. Louis brought examples of his work in water-colour and acrylics and discussed the various techniques used before demonstrating some of these in the painting chosen.

He works on a textured ground and then added a layer of gesso to the sky area and blended the colours directly into the wet surface using broad strokes. The hill and moorland were painted in dark tones to accentuate the brightness of the setting sun, and when dry, a palette knide was used to lay on the bright reflections in the moorland pools. He explained that the following day he would probably work over some areas using glazes and possibly some pastel.

This was our last meeting for the winter season and the Society's next event will be the annual exhibition at the end of August.

#### **FEBRUARY WEATHER**

Certainly our driest month for some time with only 2.34 inches of rain. It wasn't a February "fill dyke" for a change with less than half last year's total. On only 2 days did the maximum gust not reach double figures with a maximum recorded at 24.6mph. Only on 5 days did this maximum not blow from the North West. The wind chill took night time temperatures below freezing on all but one night when it just reached freezing. Daytime temperatures were relatively mild with the 3<sup>rd</sup> week in the upper 40sF and a maximum at 53.2F. Half the nights' were below freezing with a low of 23F.

The mild weather showed a spurt in the growth of bulbs with daffodils shooting up. On the frosty nights the leaves were all down on the ground the following morning but surprisingly they recover when the temperature rises. The snowdrops seemed later than usual but came into flower by the end of the month. Bird song has increased with various cock birds singing for territory as the night start to pull out. These include a thrush though I haven't had a good sight of him to decide which type he is. Some early lambs have appeared without Schmallenberg raising its ugly head apparently so far. There have been more apparently unexplained losses of bees as they appear still to have stores of food. We can only put it down to a cumulative effect of last season's wet summer and autumn.

On the field, we are getting through the games nicely with only 8 league matches remaining, which, at this stage of the season, is remarkable considering we have usually only played about 8 by the time night matches kick in!
