## SEDBERGH COMMUNITY SWIFTS

As I write this in May the first reports are coming in of sightings of swifts in and around Sedbergh. As you read this in June they should be in full numbers, screaming in gangs over the streets and bringing immense excitement and drama to our skies with their stunning acrobatic flight. Our swifts have returned to their homes, nesting in eaves and crevices high in buildings, and we are very privileged to have them. They return to the same nests year after year after the journey back from their winter feeding grounds in central and southern Africa. This journey can be arduous and inevitably some do not make it.

But the greatest threat to these amazing birds comes, sadly, from our home improvements which often block the entrances to their nests in the roof spaces under the eaves. The swifts return, only to find nowhere to rear their chicks, and another breeding pair will be lost. New building techniques mean that modern houses exclude them too. Swifts are in serious decline, by over 40% in the last 15 years, and *they urgently need your help.* 

What can we do? Firstly we need everyone to look out for swifts and report where they have been seen and where they fly up under eaves to nest. Secondly, if you are renovating your house, seek our advice as to how this can be simply done without losing nest sites. If you have ladders or scaffolding in place, please consider placing a swift nest box or two on the wall under the eaves. They only take a few minutes to fix securely, causing no damage to the house and potentially giving you and others the pleasure of hosting your own swifts for years to come. (Swifts are not messy and do not enter the house itself!) Houses need not



necessarily be old, although that is the traditional preference because of the nooks and crannies.

The recently formed group, **Sedbergh Community Swifts**, can give advice on all swift-related matters. We are also applying for grants and hope to be able to assist with good quality, hand-made swift boxes, and give full help and instructions for placement.

Many of you saw our stand at the Gala and stopped to talk to us. Sedbergh swifts are obviously very important to the community and we must not lose them. Sedbergh is an ideal town for swifts, with plenty of tall old buildings. We need to find out where they nest and do all we can to

increase the provision of new sites. Please help the swifts by reporting your sightings:

- Where have you seen "screaming parties" of swifts flying (often at dusk)?
- Where are the swifts nesting (you will see them zoom up into the eaves)?
- Do you have a location for a swift box?

In May I attended the Cumbria finals of the Young Enterprise competition, in my role as Chairman of South Lakeland District Council. This is a Europe wide competition designed to encourage a spirit of entrepreneurship amongst school children and to teach them the skills like teamwork, communication and financial acumen that you need to succeed in business. Small teams of six to a dozen or so pupils, assisted by business volunteers from the community have to set up a company,

elect a board of directors, open a bank account and raise share capital. They design a product or products which they then have to market. For the competition they have to compile a company report, set up a trade stand and then make a presentation.

The students at the finals put the vainglorious contestants in the Apprentice to shame. It was both impressive and inspiring to see the quiet confidence and competence of these 16 to 18 year-olds who were guite unfazed at giving a four minute public presentation to a room of 150 people. The winner – Digipi from the Nelson Thomlinson school in Wigton was quite exceptional creating computing guides for Key Stage 1

using a low cost, credit-card sized computer. Level Up Learning from Netherhall School, Maryport, was the runner up with an educational board game. They both go through to the regional finals in Newcastle where the winner will go forward to the UK final, which selects the team for the European final. But all of the six schools in the Cumbria final were outstanding with Kirkby Kendal and Queen Katherine School representing the whole of south Cumbria. Queen Katherine's team produced a colouring book featuring different places in Cumbria, including Sedbergh, which is now in stock at the Information Centre at 72 Main Street.

A £1.4 million affordable homes scheme for local people has just been completed in Sedbergh. The former **Cumbria County Council Highways** Depot at Guldrey Lane had been left vacant since the 1990s. Located within the Yorkshire Dales National



Park, the property had severe restrictions on what use the Park's planners would allow on site. Being well aware of the lack of affordable homes in the area, Cumbria County Council decided to offer the site to South Lakeland District Council's preferred RSL (Responsible Social Landlord) without offering it to the open market in order to achieve the provision of ten affordable housing units on the land.

Two Castles Housing Association have now completed this development using Esh Property Services to build the ten energyefficient homes. Each new home has been designed to complement local housing. Traditional building materials

such as slate and stone were used, whilst a number of energy-saving features such as efficient boilers and insulation will help to make the homes even more affordable.

On a completely separate note, and to echo what fellow Councillor Evelyn Westwood says, I would like to thank retiring SLDC Councillor Ian McPherson for his work over the past few years. He has always had a wry take on politics and the functioning of local democracy, and with his legal background, has excelled at getting to the heart of difficult planning matters. The role of Chair of the Planning Committee is one of the most onerous at SLDC, with several days of preparation and site visits

### TIM FARRON MP

With the Euro and District Council Elections taking place in May (thank you so much to everyone in Sedbergh and the surrounding area who made the effort to vote, the seriousness that we treat voting around here makes me very proud to be your MP) I have been spending much of my time knocking on doors. This is one of the parts of my job that I most enjoy. I love talking to people about their issues and seeing what we can do to help them. In fact if you ask any of the people who come with me they will tell you how frustrating I can be to go out with as they think I spend far too much time talking to people when I should be trying to get around as many houses as possible.

But it is really important that I get out and take time to hear what people are thinking and what is worrying them.

Over the past few weeks many people have been spontaneously bringing up the subject I mentioned here last month, that of the future of the Westmorland General Hospital. Clearly my concerns are shared widely and a great many of you have taken the time to sign our petition in support of the hospital. In the month since my last column the Hospital Trust has published the results of a national survey of cancer patients in England asking them how they rated the treatment that they had received. 100% of those in the sample receiving treatment in Kendal felt that it was good or better. With this sort of support from the people who actually use the hospital the Trust really

should be investing in it and offering more cancer treatments there, especially radiotherapy, rather than thinking about pulling out from the site completely leaving patients with the prospect of long journeys down the M6 to Preston at one of the most vulnerable times in their lives. On top of this we have had the announcement from the new head of NHS England that the policy of closing small local hospitals that his predecessor was keen on pursuing may not be the correct approach and that the NHS needs to think harder about how it can support more hospitals like ours in Kendal.

If you have not signed our petition yet please please do so, better than

that please ensure that all of your friends and family also sign the petition, see it as your personal challenge to see how many signatures you can collect. You can find the petition (including a printable version) by going to my website.

#### BOOKWORM

'What I have been reading this month' 1. Norman Nicholson- The Whispering Poet by Kathleen Jones (non fiction/biography)

Possibly the greatest Lake poet since Wordsworth, Nicholson spent most of his life in Millom (1914-87). Jones' biography is a skilful, comprehensive and readable account of his life and the development of his poetry with the ups and downs of his reputation as a poet, hampered by ill health and not being based near London. He loved Cumbria, was a fervent environmentalist and defender of provincial life. This is a really good book for people who are keen on poetry and want to discover more about this great Cumbrian poet. 2. Dot by Araminta Hall (fiction)

Dot, who lives in a small Welsh village, wants to know who her father is. He left when she was 2. Her best friend is Mavis who is very good at maths. The book tracks relationships between parents, children and grandchildren and goes back and forth in time which can be confusing at times for the reader. The narrative, very astute on adolescent feelings, follows mistakes repeated though generations, which though small at the time have huge consequences on lives down the line.

3. The Wainwright Letters edited by Hunter Davies (non fiction)

A trawl through AW's life 1907-1991 via a selection of his many letters to friends, colleagues, fans and 2nd wife. This correspondence also shows how his famous guidebooks

developed. Davies adds some helpful background notes to the letters. An interesting book and AW's love of Kendal and the Lakes shines through from his earliest letters to the end. 4. The Goldfinch by Donna Tartt (fiction)

771 pages of a gripping story about Theo who, aged 13, escapes a bomb explosion in a New York art gallery visited with his mother en route to a meeting with his headteacher. The Goldfinch (1654) is one of several valuable paintings that go missing in the aftermath. Fast forward a few years, with both parents dead, Theo spirals down into a drug and undercover art crime world and his life unravels. Complex characters vividly drawn eg Theo's multi nationality school friend Boris and Hobie the furniture repairer who takes him in. Quite an exhausting but compelling read !

Dear Editor,

Here in Sedbergh we are lucky to have excellent recycling facilities in Joss Lane Car Park, which I'm pleased to say are very well utilised. On a personal basis, we are particularly fortunate to be a 2 minute walk from these facilities, as a result of which we recycle several times a week all of our waste paper, cardboard, plastic, glass and tin cans. However, it always shocks and

surprises us at what we find in the recycling skips. Just a few days ago, when using the paper skip, we saw metal cans and plastic bags containing newspapers. A while ago we even spotted a house plant (complete with plastic pot) which had been deposited in the paper skip !

Most times we use these facilities, we see general waste items which should have gone into the household grey bins, or garden items which ought to have been placed in green bins. It always surprises us that people have made the effort to visit our recycling facilities, only to use them inappropriately.

Being no expert in the recycling industry, I am sometimes dubious as to what actually happens to the contents of the recycling skips once they are full and taken away. Do the contents get sorted, with inappropriate items being removed prior to processing ? Do items actually get recycled, or does everything end up together in one huge landfill site ?

If any readers are able to confirm, it would be interesting to learn more about the above, and to receive confirmation that recycling is actually carried out correctly rather than the local authorities 'ticking the correct boxes' to make us believe that they are acting in an efficient, green way. #### JUNE GARDENING

There are many plants which I would love to have in my garden, but I have never attempted to grow most of them due to their partiality for a warm, sheltered, and frost free position on a deep rich soil. Fremontodendron californicum, a wall shrub with large, open, yellow flowers, Magnolia grandiflora 'Goliath' with leaves like a rubber plant, and enormous, fragrant, cream blooms, Romneya coulteri, a tree poppy with large, pure white crumpled petals, Fig 'Brown turkey' in the fruit plot and Asparagus in the veg garden would all be my choices, but I content myself by planting them in other's gardens instead.

There are plants though, which I so wish to enjoy in my own garden, that I resolutely keep planting them in one spot or another in the mistaken hope that if they know how much I really want them, they will put in the extra effort required and bloom and burgeon for me.

My most tried failures in this category are the Bearded Irises (hybrids from *I. germanica*), those wonderful, big, ruffled blooms in a host of colours, ranging from deep mahogany, through rusty red and orange to salmon and yellow to dark purple through rich blue to china blue and white, with the odd dusky pink, brown and black thrown in too. Some flowers are bicolours with Standard petals of one colour and falls of another, whilst others are plane colours edged with a darker shade. They are all beautiful, but in order to

thrive and bloom they need a position where their thick rhizomes can grow in the open on the surface of the well drained soil so that they are baked and ripened in the sunshine. We are far too damp and leafy in our garden for baking to occur and the sporadic warming which my Irises have endured only produces leaves and no flowers. I have had to resort to growing other, less fussy iris instead.

Fortunately there are several really good, reliable border species. First in to flower in my garden is *I*. douglasiana which has flat, open flowers of deep reddish purple over evergreen leaves. Then follow the *I*. sibirica cultivars – the tall old varieties with dark veined mid and dark blue flowers and the newer smaller I. 'Butter and Sugar' (cream/white) The "English Iris" (I. latifolia) which grow from bulbs follow on with rich, velvety blue flowers over stiff dark leaves and then the wonderful Black Iris  $-I_{..}$ chrysographes whose flowers are born on short (1ft) stalks. (This is always best bought in flower so that you can be sure that you are getting the true black colour form. There are purple, and black with yellow forms too)

Whilst none of these have the size and flamboyance of the bearded Iris, they still have the same beauty of form and detail and are well worth including in any border. *Elaine Horne*

## RED SQUIRRELS NEED YOUR HELP!

The Sedbergh area has been a red squirrel stronghold for the last twenty years, not by chance or good luck but because of some dedicated, hardworking volunteers. The Sedbergh Red Squirrel Group was started in the 1990s by the V Rev Ingram Cleasby who realised that the introduced American grey squirrel was quickly displacing our native red squirrel in the rest of England. He was one of the first people to understand that the only thing red squirrels need is to be free of greys - a concept that is now accepted by all the organisations involved in red squirrel conservation.

The larger grey squirrels outcompete our little reds for food and habitat, preventing breeding and eventually starving them or driving the reds out of their habitat. Grey squirrels have become a major pest in much of the UK, damaging young and mature trees by eating the bark and young shoots, decimating bird populations by raiding their nests and destroying crops such as cobnuts and fruit.

There is now a coordinated network of grey control and red conservation across Cumbria, Northumberland, parts of Durham and Yorkshire, with active groups in Scotland, Wales, N Ireland, Devon/Cornwall and Merseyside. Whilst paid contractors are now being used in some of the more remote landscapes, the success of this enormous conservation project depends on local action, especially from the volunteer Red Squirrel Groups. The result of this coordinated effort is that red





squirrel populations in these areas are no longer in decline and reds are now being seen in places where they have been absent for many years.

The continuing success of red squirrel conservation in the Sedbergh landscape depends on help from everyone in the community, residents and visitors alike. We depend on sightings of red and grey squirrels so that their populations can be monitored and the greys removed. There is always a need for help culling the greys so please let us know if you would like to be involved or if you are already doing so.

The local support group were delighted to welcome Paul Sweeting again to talk to us about South Georgia. Paul is chaplain at Sedbergh School and was Rector of the Falkland Islands and Territories in the Southern Ocean for three years.

South Georgia is a British Overseas Territory. It is 100 miles long and about 25 wide and its highest point is around 10,000 feet. It is very mountainous and fjorded like Norway with several natural harbours. Captain Cook circumnavigated it in 1775 and claimed it for the Crown.



In the 19<sup>th</sup> century whalers settled there. The cold fertile seas ensured a large haul of whales. Several stations were established now abandoned. Ernest Shackleton made his famous overland trek in 1916 across the island after his expedition's ship the Endurance was crushed by pack Ice in the Weddell Sea. A crossing of over 350 miles was made first by lifeboats to Elephant Island then by a further 800 miles of stormy seas to South Georgia and its whaling stations and the eventual rescue of the rest of the crew. He died of a heart attack here in 1922 during a further expedition.

In 1982 the Royal Marines took the islands back in the Falklands conflict losing helicopters and crew.

Paul was travelling in a supply ship, the "Gold Rover" which was taking provisions and fuel to HMS Glasgow on patrol around the islands. They were also supplying the British Antarctic Survey base at Grytviken. With him were the governor of the Falklands Howard Pierce (Paul officiated at his wedding) and Robert Napier, then chief executive of the

Worldwide Fund for Nature and former chair of governors at Sedbergh School. A South Georgia rat eradication programme was in progress. The bait was dropped in glacial valleys by helicopters. With the retreat of the glaciers there is concern that the rat colonies might reestablish themselves. Meanwhile ground-nesting bird populations were growing.

There were many sightings of the Southern Giant Petrel and Albatross. These huge birds can lock their wings in position to circle for long distances on the updraughts from waves.

Fur seals are also recovering from many years of culling for their fine oils. They are very friendly creatures when young but can get more aggressive when older. Large sticks were carried for protection when exploring. It will take longer for whale numbers to grow.

There were very well fed penguins like tellie tubbies finding it difficult to stand and Giant Petrel chicks as big as turkeys. Wandering albatross are benefiting from new fishing techniques making it less likely for them to get caught in nets when scavenging.

The BAS base had good facilities although the outdoor loo had an elephant seal on guard. There were 70 Chileans employed dismantling the whaling station ruins leaving more stable remains as tourist attractions for an increasing number of cruise ships. Asbestos and loose metalwork could prove hazardous for visitors. Paul took the service in the

settlement's church competing with a braying king penguin outside while the pedal organ, played by Robert Napier, progressed across the floor. There were many memorials to shipwrecked sailors and a library of mainly Norwegian language books.

A short expedition took them to Maiviken. En route they encountered pintail ducks, young gentoo penguins and dive-bombing skuas. Overaggressive seals were a problem and difficult to avoid when camouflaged by the undergrowth.

The journey back to the Falklands against the swell took two and a half days. Enormous icebergs are a real danger with most of their bulk below the surface and invisible to radar.

Paul was asked about the military presence there. HMS Glasgow is on patrol and a Hercules aircraft flies regularly over South Georgia and the Sandwich Islands refuelled mid-air by a DC10. There is mineral wealth in the area and the possibility of oil exploration and climate change will threaten wildlife species. 15% of wandering albatross are here with four species of albatross on South

Chance to play a part in National Park's future

People living in and around the Yorkshire Dales National Park will soon have a

chance to get involved in looking after it.

Following the local council elections on May

22, parish councils and parish meetings in the South Lakeland parishes of Dent, Garsdale and Sedbergh will be invited to put forward candidates to join the Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority to fill two vacancies.

Authority chairman Peter Charlesworth said: "This is a great chance for local people to play a direct and active part in helping to conserve and enhance the beautiful yet fragile landscape of the National Park and to help other people to understand and enjoy its special qualities.

"It's a fantastic opportunity for

anyone who cares deeply about the countryside and the local communities within the National Park."

A candidate must be a member of a parish council or a chairman of a parish meeting.

The closing date for receipt of nominations is June 16. If more than one nomination is received for a vacancy, there will be an election amongst the parish councils/meetings before the name of the successful candidate is then submitted to the Secretary of State for approval.

The Board of the National Park Authority consists of 22 members: 12 appointed from the local county and



district councils, four parish representatives and six 'national' members

#### CITIZENS ADVICE BUREAU

Bailiffs - new rules come into force From April, Bailiffs will have to follow new rules and processes when collecting debts.

The main changes include:

- Banning bailiffs from visiting at night
- Stopping bailiffs from entering a home when only a child is present
- Preventing bailiffs from taking necessary household items, such as a cooker or washing machine
- Providing greater protection from bailiff action for vulnerable people
- Making sure at least 7 days' notice of bailiff action is given and 7 days' notice before selling any belongings
- Compulsory training and certification for bailiffs
- A simplified fee structure, including set fees for each stage of bailiff action
- A responsibility to provide information at all stages of the process, with notices containing wording that is set out by law
- Distress for rent arrears has also been abolished, meaning that landlords can no longer use bailiffs to collect residential rent arrears

Citizens Advice has been campaigning for many years to improve the practices of Bailiffs; we will be monitoring the action of local Bailiff to ensure they abide by the new rules. If you're in debt, don't panic. Remember it is never too late to get help and advice from Citizens

#### **APRIL WEATHER**

A fairly dry month with a total of 2.04 inches of rain though there were only 8 dry days. Temperatures showed a general improvement on previous months, as to be expected, with several days, in the latter part of the month, reaching the upper 60'sF with a maximum of 68F. On the low side we had only 2 nights when the minimum went below freezing with a low of 27.1F. In fact towards the end of the month the minima were quite balmy upper 40F and one occasion of 51.3F. Again the windchill only resulted in 10 nights being at or below freezing. It was a fairly breezy month with only 5 days when the maximum gust did not blow from the North West reaching a maximum of 21.0 mph.

Spring arrived on 7<sup>th</sup> of the month when our "resident" cock swallow returned followed by his mate on the 12<sup>th</sup>. They soon took up their roost in the kennels and got to work adding white duck feathers to their old nest. Eggs were added by the end of the month, 5 in total. The "spare" nest has been commandeered by a wren who has added moss to the swallows' mud base. In fact the wren has done this to 2 other nests, a blackbird's in the shippon and another swallow's nest in the donkey shelter. A blackbird had built in a honeysuckle which is a recipe for disaster. A blue tit is sat on only 3 eggs by the end of the month. The wren is singing for all he is worth whether he has a mate time will tell. Late in the month two visitors were



calling nearby, a chiffchaff and for the first time in many years a cuckoo. On the warmers days a few butterflies were about namely orange tips and peacocks. I am still getting rats in traps so reducing the problem of damage to feed stores. I can assure that it did not rain between 2am & 3am during the month. I was on my lambing round which was fortunate as 4 decided to drop their lambs at this time of day and a couple needed some help. Two shearlings, producing their first lambs, decide to do so at the same time about 50 yards apart. Neither would let me get near until I manage to sneak up on one.

> Fortunately I was able to get the lamb out be she ran off and left it! I got her into the donkey shelter and went back for the lamb by which time she had

dropped the second! The other likewise left her lamb so I pulled one of the calf huts and runs around her so her second was born in "captivity". Fortunately both got over the shock and accepted their newborns!! The dawn chorus on the 5am visit was a sound to behold!
