SEDBERGH AND DISTRICT HISTORY SOCIETY

A Walk Round Bowes Village When you approach Bowes from the main junction for Barnard Castle on the A66 it seems to be a sleepy backwater and it is difficult to imagine that in the past it was an important busy staging post for mail coaches on the main road from York to Carlisle. However, we were to soon learn that it is one of the most interesting villages to be visited by the Society over the past few years.

Its main claim to fame stems from the much publicised visit paid to the village by Charles Dickens and his illustrator Phiz in 1838. However, as Cliff Brown, our tour guide pointed





out, the two men were only in Bowes for a few hours and although it is thought that Dickens probably based the school Dotheboys Hall in his novel, Nicholas Nickleby on the local Shaw's Academy, there are other more significant details to be learnt about local education. For instance, there were four schools and 700 pupils in Bowes during this period. One was an endowed school but the other three were part of a group of cheap boarding establishments in the north of England called The Yorkshire Schools.

Cliff led us up the main village street which was flanked by attractive old houses, and drew our attention to an uninhabited inn called the Ancient Unicorn which is said to date back to mediaeval times. He told us about a doomed love affair between the daughter of the inn's landlord and the son of a rival establishment, the King's Head. Cliff has researched the Bowes educational situation and he was able to identify two sizeable buildings as former schools. However, his most exciting discovery was when he realised that his own

garage was actually built on a school site. He showed us some of the finds from under the garage floor including marbles and slate pencils.

Although St Giles' Church has undergone several restorations in its history, it retains evidence of its (probably) Saxon origins and in the churchyard Cliff showed us the graves of people who had connections with the Bowes schools. He does not think that the 72 graves of Bowes schoolboys are necessarily symptomatic of the harsh treatment which some people have associated with the Yorkshire Schools, when the large numbers of boys and the general incidence of early deaths are taken into consideration. Two other



features of the village which are worthy of mention are the remains of a twelfth-century castle and a Roman fort. These would have been constructed to guard approaches to the Stainmore Pass, in a highly strategic border area with Scotland. All in all, we enjoyed a fascinating

afternoon which was mainly due to Cliff's knowledge of, and enthusiasm for his subject. Julie Leigh

Firstly a big thank you to Duo Cafe and Capsticks Insurance for their donations. They are much appreciated.

As many of you will have noticed we have planted up the beds on Main Street with bedding plants and let us hope that they last many many months and put on a good show.

You will have also noticed that work has begun at 72 Main Street (T.I.C/ Community Office) Originally we were just going to remove the large conifers and plants which were encroaching upon other plants. However because it is a sloping site this was difficult and it was decided to remove all and start afresh. We know that removing the shrub which encompassed the wall alongside the steps from the car park seems drastic but is has revealed a lovely stone wall which we feel wHI the most helpful for those needing a helping hand down the steps. Work in progress is not a pretty sight but we do hope you will be patient with us until the work is

complete. Those of you who pass the Fire Station will have also noticed that we have completed one of the flower beds which had been completely cleared, new soil put in, a weed suppressant installed and all new plants and shrubs planted. In total this has cost just under £700. We appreciate that this seems a lot of money but to remove long established conifers we had to

employ a contractor who of course we had to pay. Our committee then dealt with the purchasing and planting shrubs and plants and then laying gravel to hopefully keep the weeds at bay. We of course will continue to look after the bed. We now have to get the Local Authority who is responsible for cutting the small area of grass to undertake the work. When funds are available we shall be tackling the other bed as the conifers are coming to the end of life. We shall endeavour to carry out all the work this year when hopefully our efforts will be shown at their best next year.

Although some of the work we are undertaking seems almost vicious, in fact that is what we did to the four flower beds on Main Street a couple of years ago where the plants and shrubs were outgrowing their space and we hope your agree they are now looking much better and we thank



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those who have expressed their agreement.

Recently the Beavers helped clear weeds etc., from the border adjoining the grassed area at the T.I.C., for which we say a huge thanks-they turned up even though it was raining. A pity that a gentleman let his dog foul this area just before they arrived and failed to clear up -shame of you. How can we expect the young to act correctly if we do not set an example. Nevertheless a huge thank you to the Beavers and the senior staff for their help.

We are applying to various bodies for further funding to complete the work at 72 Main Street and also undertake the work on the second bed at the Fire Station and hopefully we will be successful and we can then continue with our projects when all beds will be refurbished and looking at their best.

DOGS AND THE LAW

Did you know.....

Dog Tags

The **Control of Dogs Order 1992** mandates that any dog in a public place must wear a collar with the name and address (including postcode) of the owner engraved or written on it, or engraved on a tag. Your telephone number is optional (but advisable).

You can be fined £5,000 if your dog does not wear an identification tag. **Dog Fouling**

Dog fouling is both socially unacceptable and a health hazard.

Dog fouling can cause the infection 'Toxocara canis', which can lead to blindness. Under the **Dogs (Fouling of Land) Act 1996**, if you allow your dog to foul, you must clean it up straight away. There are around 850 litter bins in South Lakeland that can also be used for dog waste.

If you fail to clean up after your dog you could be liable for an initial fixed penalty of £75. Persistent offenders will be taken to a Magistrates Court and face a fine of up to £1,000.

If you wish to take action against a dog owner who has not cleaned up after their dog, you should report this to South Lakeland District Council's Customer Contact Centre on 0845 050 4434. Please include the following information:

- The name and address of the person in charge of the dog, if possible.
- A description of the dog.
- When and where the offence took place

The evidence will be considered with a view to prosecuting the offender.

Sheep Chasing

Dogs (Protection of Livestock) Act 1953: Your dog must not worry (chase or attack) livestock (cattle, sheep, goats, pigs, horses and poultry) on agricultural land, so keep your dog on a lead around livestock. If your dog worries livestock, the farmer has the right to stop your dog (even by shooting your dog in certain circumstances).

YORKSHIRE DALES NATIONAL PARK

Consultation begins on planning documents

Consultation has begun on two documents that will guide the way planning decisions are made in the Yorkshire Dales National Park in the future.

The first is a draft Local Plan that will help shape development decisions in the Yorkshire Dales between 2015 and 2030. It is taking a fresh look at every aspect of local planning policy except housing – which was only recently reviewed by the Yorkshire Dales Housing Development Plan 2012 - 2025. Over the last 15 months the Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority (YDNPA) has been consulting about the planning issues and policy options that a new Local Plan should tackle.

This consultation – together with that on the National Park

Management Plan that was published last year – has identified the priority planning issues as creating highquality employment, developing tourism, holding on to local services, supporting land management, quarrying and re-using barns.

Peter Stockton, the Authority's Head of Sustainable Development, said: "The draft Local Plan proposes an agenda of growth to combat the risk of economic and population decline.

"In particular it aims to support young adults and people of working age to enable them to live in the National Park instead of moving away. We aim to do this by allocating more brownfield sites for business development and providing more flexibility to support farm and rural estate diversification.

"Another objective is to encourage more visitors to stay over night in the National Park by expanding camping and temporary visitor accommodation

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"In addition, the draft Local Plan supports a more considered approach to the development of indoor visitor facilities that are not directly related to the National Park's special qualities but are, nevertheless, important to a more rounded visitor enjoyment of the area.

"In discussion with parish councils, the document is also reviewing local green space around settlements. Areas have been identified that are of particular importance to local communities or which are key to village character, with the intention of protecting them from development that would harm their contribution.

"There has been a lot of recent discussion about the future of the thousands of traditional barns in the National Park. The Authority accepts that conversion of barns to new uses plays an important part in their conservation. The Local Plan is, therefore, consulting on a policy that would release roadside barns for residential or intensive new business uses."

Consultation has also begun on a new draft Planning Design Guide that will support planning policy and, at the same time, try to improve the design quality of proposed projects and encourage more innovative and sustainable development.

Carl Lis, the Authority's Member Champion for Sustainable

Development, said:

"These two documents are all about enabling local people and businesses to keep the Yorkshire Dales National Park a thriving area. Only in that way will we be able to look after the stunning scenery, exceptional heritage and wonderful wildlife that millions of people treasure.

"We hope people will find time to read them and give us their comments and suggestions before the deadline of July 28."

CHRISTIAN AID WEEK

in Sedbergh and District Many thanks from the Christian Aid committee to all who supported this year's big fund raising week by helping, attending, spending and direct giving. As there are still a few envelopes trickling in the House to House collection amount is not quite final but stands currently at £2506.32. However in reality this will be about £250 more because of those 132 people who were able to Gift Aid their donations meaning that the tax man will give Christian Aid that amount on



top of their donations. The shop raised £1178.10 and the Dent coffee morning total was £154.43 giving a grand total of £3838.85. It is, once again, an excellent figure for a small community.

Those who follow results in detail will notice that this is just under £600 down on last year's figure of £4430.68, which in turn was down about £200 on the previous year. The main drop was in the Shop takings, about £400 lower whereas the House to House collection and coffee morning were each about £100 less and this year there was no collection donation from a Church service. As the needs Christian Aid tries to meet are not diminishing, we'd like to restore the fundraising to previous levels and above so if anyone has any bright ideas to share, do please contact the committee and perhaps come along to one of our planning meetings (there are only about 3 each year so it's not a hefty time commitment). I would like to thank everyone who came out to vote for me on 22 May and so contributed to my success in being elected once again as Conservative councillor for Sedbergh and Kirkby Lonsdale. It was a good result and bodes well for the future in Sedbergh, Kirkby Lonsdale and Whinfell.

I am also delighted to have topped the poll for Sedbergh Parish Councillors again. Looking at the results it is very clear who Sedbergh residents wanted on their parish council. I would also have liked to have been the South Lakeland representative on Yorkshire Dales but not surprisingly the controlling group

ignored national guidance and chose party advantage over the wishes of the electorate.

Thanks to all my helpers, you made a real difference as did our excellent parliamentary candidate Dr Ann Myatt who as most of you will know works at Westmorland General Hospital. It is unfortunate that for the twelfth year running the Lib Dems chose to misrepresent all their opponents' positions on the hospitals in the area. They were all the more outrageous in my case because of my family's circumstances as those who have lived here any length of time will know. My parents always used the National Health Service and I would never dream of going private.



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Nevertheless, I cannot pretend I am anything other than very concerned that the Morecambe Bay National Health Trust has been put into special measures today. The Trust has been one prolonged agony ever since it was created. I had believed the latest set-up was beginning to work so this is an extra disappointment. Contrary to the words in my opponent's leaflets I will do whatever can be done to bring about the best solution for health throughout South Lakeland.

As District Councillor again I have been appointed back to the South Lakeland Planning Committee. Locally, the ramifications arising from the perverse decision of the previous committee to grant permission for the Killington windfarm are still on-going. I spoke against the application on that day and will continue to work with those who are seeking to have the decision overturned.

One change since two years ago is that the money once handed over to the Local Area Partnerships is now available for councillors themselves to give to local projects in the same way as the county councillor scheme.

Of course there is a lot less money than the county scheme, £1,000 per member. As county councillor I tended to support community halls and play areas and I am minded to help one similar project this year. Because of email scammers I have had no alternative but to abandon my old email address. Also there have been serious faults on my BT line for many months AND there is no realistic prospect of any improvement in broadband speeds on that line. But, when I was canvassing in Middleton I saw a van "InternetAnywhere" at a farm almost as remote as mine. So, after the election I signed up and I now have reasonably fast internet, 15 Meg plus

While recovering from my hip replacement operation I have been sorting out my scrapbook of mementos of my first year as Chairman of South Lakeland District Council. Looking back I realise it has been the most amazing year of my life. I have met people I never dreamed I would meet, including Her Majesty the Queen, and undertaken some enjoyable and some quite daunting activities.

Altogether I have been presented to four members of the Royal Family the Queen, Princess Anne, Prince Charles and the Countess of Wessex. I have attended several engagements in Carlisle Cathedral including a

moving service to commemorate the 60th anniversary of the Coronation and the Judges Service where there were several red robed judges. Best of all, though, was one of the graduation ceremonies for Cumbria University where the dignitaries formed a corridor and applauded the graduates as they passed through.

Most inspiring was probably the Cumbria Sports Awards dinner where the guest speaker was Jamie Andrew, a quadruple amputee who lost his hands and feet from frostbite after being trapped by unexpected bad weather in the Alps.

I have hosted several events myself on behalf of SLDC. We had a magical scene for hoisting the flag for Armed

The of the nuing and the umber of have been	although this latter activity is never straightforward, as the ownership of individual lamp posts is divided between the Parish and County Council. The replacement bus shelter on Station Road was completed in late April. The widening of the Main Street footway and the creation of a 'priority give way' system was undertaken at the end of May (both projects being substantially funded by 'Section 106 contributions' secured by the Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority (YDNPA) when planning permission was granted for the Spar development in 2009). The car park at the People's Hall was redesigned and enlarged with substantial work		
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and support from the Parish Council. These projects were only achieved after a lot of input from the Parish Council and particularly from the Chairman of the Planning Committee. During the year the Highway Authority replaced a number of outdated or defective signs throughout the town, in response to suggestions put forward by the Sedbergh Townscape Project (STP). Some signs were removed altogether. Work has continued on a number of projects, including the proposed provision of cycle stands in Main Street (also to be funded mainly by grants) and remedial works to the Jubilee Fountain, for which an application for listed building consent has been submitted by the Council. Meetings have taken place with the Highway Authority regarding outstanding signage issues and pavement defects. Ideas for boundary and access improvements to the People's Hall have been developed in partnership with the People's Hall Committee.

Following a favourable public response to the consultation exercise

undertaken in November, proposals for the creation of a new public space alongside the Information Centre have been progressed and discussions held with the planning and highway authorities.

Last year Queen's Gardens, after a lot of work by the Queens Gardens Committee, was added to the Register of Parks and Gardens of Special Historic Interest and the monument to Queen Victoria was listed as a building of Special Architectural or Historic Interest. Unfortunately the application to the Heritage Lottery Fund to obtain resources for a conservation and management plan for the gardens was not successful, so work has been continuing to find an appropriate source of funding.

Members of the planning committee spend a lot of time monitoring and commenting on all the planning applications, having visited the sites. They then make recommendations to the Council and prepare responses to be submitted to the YDNPA.

A five - year lease for the use of Loftus Hill car park was negotiated

and agreed between Sedbergh School and the Parish Council. Sedbergh School received £150,000 funding from Sport England, one condition of the grant being that a community use agreement was put in place. Consequently the Parish Council encouraged and supported the school in organising a public meeting to explain the situation and to encourage community groups to use the pool.

Parish Councillors also spend time liaising with other agencies, which have the powers and resources to carry out tasks, which improve the local environment. Building good relations, particularly with statutory agencies, is important. The SLDC Cabinet held one of their meetings in the People's Hall and Members of the Cabinet were impressed by a collaborative presentation led by the Parish Council Chairman, on localism in Sedbergh, showing how much has been achieved in recent years.

A number of voluntary groups have been supported by the Council during the year, including Cumbria in Bloom, which work hard to keep Sedbergh looking good and the Town Twinning Group which took a group of youngsters to Zrece, our twin town. The Parish Council is very pleased that, having given financial support both towards the extension of the People's Hall and to fund the purchase and development of 72,

Main St, both these projects have been implemented this year. Thanks should be given to all those people who are responsible for making this happen. Councillors also represented the town on other groups including the Neighbourhood Forum, the Local Area Partnership, Sedbergh & District Chamber of Trade & Commerce, Sedbergh United Charities and the Respect Group.

As this is the end of the four year period of the Council it is appropriate to carry out a performance review. To this end a table is appended to show the attendance at Council meetings, which members serve on which committees and which Councillor chairs each committee. An examination of the figures on the attached table indicates that, over the four year period, attendance at Council meetings varied from 39% to 100%. Six Councillors had attendance rates of between 85% and 100%, three were between 55% and 85% and two less than 50%, both with five consecutive meetings being missed, just short of the six, which could have resulted in

disqualification. The table relating to the committees shows that membership varies from not being on any committees, to being on three. Although the attendance figures for the committees are not shown they present a similar pattern to those for the Council meetings.

The Council was very ably supported over a number of years by our clerk Colin Robertshaw and so it was with sadness that the Council accepted his resignation last year. However we wished him well in his retirement and thanked him for all his hard work. We were very fortunate in being able to appoint Janey Hassam, who many people will know, as she was born and bred in Sedbergh. She has settled in well, is learning fast and has appreciated the support that she has been given by the Chairman and other Councillors.

With the concept of localism, over the last few years the scope, responsibilities and resources of the Parish Council have increased substantially. Consequently the work load of the Council has increased. Thanks must go to those Councillors who work hard on behalf of the community, giving their time and energy on a completely voluntary basis. Robin Pearson and Tony Jameson both reluctantly decided that for health and family reasons, they could no longer serve on the Parish Council, and so we wish them



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well. One of the most hard working councillors, Douglas Thomson, was not re-elected. Thanks go to him for all the stirling work he has done. Following the recent election we welcome three new councillors Margaret Brookes, Martyn Dawson and Ian Mc Pherson.

The Council has achieved a lot, has built up good relationships with other organisations in the Town and elsewhere and so together, hopefully, we can continue to make progress in supporting our community.

Questions/comments from members of the Parish

Several questions were raised and comments made by members of the public and a summary is noted below.

- The Rainwater Harvesting Scheme due at the toilets on Main Street has progressed and is due to be implemented in the next few weeks.
- Thanks were given to the Council with regard the pavement widening on Main Street. This forms part of the Sedbergh Townscape Project and further ideas for Sedbergh are ongoing.

The Main Street area has been earmarked for re-flagging in the current financial year. Concern was noted over vehicles using the pavements to park, but it is hoped that the positioning of the new cycle stands will help prevent this in common hot spots.

- The Council is unable to consider reopening the Public Toilets at Loftus Hill as the expense is too great. They were pleased to report, however, that by taking over the running of the car park on Joss Lane, they had been able to secure the public toilets there. Without this, both toilets would have closed.
- Attendance records for Councillors should be made available to the public.
- Efforts need to be made to engage with the younger/working age group of Sedbergh to receive feedback and input for future projects.
- Queens Gardens is now listed as • a Heritage Site and there are ongoing efforts and applications for funding to assist in

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improvements and restoration of the Gardens.

The Parish Council will continue to work collaboratively within the Community and maintain its 'can do' ethos. Members of the public were reminded that they are welcome at all meetings of the Parish Council, with public participation at 8.30pm at each.

TIM FARRON MP

Last month we had the last State Opening of Parliament and Queen's Speech before the 2015 General Election, this was essentially the announcement of the last legislation that this Government is planning to introduce.

So you can imagine I was very pleased to hear the Speech contain plans to introduce something going under the grand title of "Governance of National Parks (England) and the Broads Draft Bill". This is the legislation that will allow the Secretary of State for Environment, Food and Rural Affairs to broaden the people who sit on National Parks Authorities to include some who were elected by the people who actually live in the areas covered by the authority.

As many of you will know, in fact I have written about it in Lookaround

several times, I have believed for a long time that bodies like the Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority should be much more accountable to the people who live in the areas they manage. I know that many of the members of the authorities are local councillors and so have had to be elected but they have not been elected on the basis of what they want to do on the Authority, in fact they do not know if they will be on the Authority until after the election.

Living in Sedbergh or Dent you are well aware of the power that the authority has over the area and how it develops, what jobs can be attracted, what housing can be provided, decisions that have a profound effect on you and your families. It seems to me important that you should have a say in these issues through the ballot box and I rather proud that this should be happening in the not too distant future.

Whilst on the subject of the Queen's speech I was also pleased to hear the announcement of legislation to protect pubs from the large pub companies, redressing the power balance that exists between them at the moment. This is another issue I have been campaigning on for some time. We need to recognise that pubs perform a role beyond simply selling beer and food to people. They are often the key social hub of a village and if they close because the company who owns them is demanding too much rent or charging too much for its beer then the price



we pay is much greater than simply having to drive a bit further for a pint. Finally, I leapt at the opportunity to support a Parliamentary motion calling on the Government to reduce the VAT charged on tourism related businesses. The UK is one of only four countries in Europe that charges the same VAT rate on tourism activities (hotels, bed and breakfasts, attractions, etc.) as it does on everything else. Unlike the issue with mountain rescue teams where the Government is prevented from refunding VAT to them by the EU this is a case where the Government can easily change the VAT charged but is doing nothing about it. I will keep pressing them on this issue at every opportunity I have.

Fact File: Celebrating D-Day by Greg Tebbett and Zak Baines

The D in D day means • deliverance because deliverance means to make free and the Allied forces were freeing the French.

The 2nd world war began in 1939





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and D day was 1944 6th of June.

- In 1940, the French and English soldiers walked to Dunkirk to get a lift over the English Channel where hundreds of boats were assembled.
- Everyone who owned a boat were asked (on the radio) in Britain to go to Dunkirk to pick up the allied soldiers and bring them back to Britain.
- Normandy landings a.k.a. operation Neptune was the largest seaborne invasion in history.

The countries that fought for the freedom of France the 2nd world war were: United Kingdom, United States of America, Canada, Australia, free France, free Belgium, free Czechoslovakia, free Greece, free Netherlands, New Zealand, free Norway and free Poland.

- After a week there were at least a MILLION allied soldiers were at Normandy.
- On the 25 August the allied forces completely helped get back France.

- The Germans started to take over France at the beginning of May 1940
- The Americans entered the war in 1941, and by 1942 they and the British were considering the possibility of a major allied invasion across the English Channel.

Fact File: Remembering D-Day by Ben Robinson

- Day was on the 6th of June 1944.
- The "D" in D-Day stood for deliverance which means "make free".
- D-Day was when the Allied forces started to liberate France from the Germans.
- The reason that the British and the French forces invaded France was because 4 years earlier in 1940 the German army and air force pushed over 338,000 British and French soldiers back to Dunkirk beach in northern France.
 The operation planning started in
- The operation planning started in 1943.
- The man in charge of the D-Day landings (code-named operation Neptune) was planned for the 5th of June to fool the German defences.
- The countries with the allies involved in D-Day were: Great Britain ,America ,Canada ,The free French ,The free Greeks , Australia ,The free Belgians ,The free Czechoslovakians ,The free Dutch ,New Zealand ,The free Norwegians and the free Polish.
 In the retreat from Dunkirk

(Operation Dynamo) the radio in Britain broadcast to everybody who owned a boat to go to Dunkirk and pick up the soldiers.

- On the boat ride over the English Channel on the 6th of June, the British soldiers (lucky enough to ride in the United States' boats) were treated to rich food such as hamburgers and hot dogs.
- After the Dunkirk retreat , thousands of soldiers were packed on trains to get them away from the coast many of them were sent to the Manchester Baths to clean themselves and treat their wounds.
- France was liberated on the 25th of August 1944.

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BATTLE OF THE SOMME

1st July 2014 – 98th ANNIVERSARY Sedbergh man, John Airey, long time member of The Royal British Legion and former soldier, serving around the world with the Royal Air Force Regiment, has a deep interest in all things regimental.

Over the years he has created an impressive collection of memorabilia from many regiments, but especially his local regiment, the Border Regiment, later the King's Own Royal Border Regiment, amalgamated in 2006 into the Duke of Lancaster's Regiment (King's, Lancashire and Border) with the King's and the Queen's Lancashire Regiments.

On 1st July 2006, 90th anniversary of the first day of the Battle of the Somme, a Service of Commemoration was held at Thiepval Memorial to the Missing. This imposing memorial bears the names



of 72,194 officers and men who died in the Somme battle sector and have no known grave. Over 90 per cent of those commemorated on the Thiepval Memorial were killed in action during 1916. It is worth noting here that three Sedbergh men, who died during the following year, are also remembered on this memorial.

John perceived the idea of a distinctive tribute to the men of Sedbergh who fought and died in this notorious battle. He made a plinth to hold a personal Cross of Remembrance for each man which he placed at the Thiepval Memorial on that day, in order that Sedbergh could honour their own during this special Service of Remembrance.

With the centennial commemoration of the First World War starting in August, it seems appropriate to remind ourselves of the sacrifice these and so many other men made during the Battle of the Somme, 98 years ago. The names of Sedbergh, Cautley, Dent, Garsdale and Howgill men who died in action or of wounds after the Somme Battle are below.

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MAY WEATHER

May is a glorious month with everything fresh and green. Temperatures start to rise such that we had our first 70+F. The maximum was 75.6F(24C). On the cooler side we had our first month of the year without subzero temperatures though we did have a couple of nights with a ground frost, if you got up early enough! A minimum of 34.3F (1.5C) being the lowest. Although pressure was fairly high we had a generally breezy month with only 5 days when the maximum gust did not reach double figures. The strongest gust recorded was 20.6mph and the least 8.3mph./ Even with the wind-chill only 5 nights dropped below freezing. Although a reasonably dry month, by recent standards at least, we still recorded 4.24 inches of rain, enough to keep the mud going. We had a dry spell of 7 days during the 3rd week though there was some drizzle but not enough to trouble the rain gauge.

As mentioned earlier May is generally a splendid month with everything looking resplendent in new foliage of varying hues. Blossom has been very heavy this spring





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particularly the May blossom. The earlier blossom has resulted in a heavy crop on blackthorn, good for the gin makers, plums and damsons. Our apples and pears are looking a bit sparse fruit-wise but the jostaberries are loaded but I expect, as usual, the blackbirds will eat them before they get ripe. Even netting them doesn't seem to work as I then spend the rest of the time untangling the birds. In all the years the bushes have been there we haven't had enough for a meal! Buttercups are on the increase it seems judging by the number of bright yellow fields are the area. The conservationist will be happy! The cuckoo has obviously hung around the area this year as it can be heard from time to time. Pipisterelle bats are feeding most evenings around the sycamore trees. Oystercatchers haven't been as obvious, nor the curlew, this season. The house sparrows have had a good year judging by the number of young about. The wren continues to sing but I haven't seen any signs of a brood. The swallows and bluetits will be fledging soon. The latter are in all 3 nest boxes again.

SEDBERGH AND DISTRICT HISTORY SOCIETY

A Visit To Sprint Mill The second outing of the 2014 summer season was very different from our experience in Bowes Village. Apart from anything else, it was a rainv day, so it was fortunate that we were under cover for most of the afternoon. Furthermore, we were being introduced to one building this time - a timber mill that had been built in the mid 1840s on the site of a former mill which had been destroyed by fire. Although it is quite close to a village, it is situated in a beautiful wooded area close to the River Sprint which feeds into the River Kent and feels quite isolated.

Edward Acland who owns the mill with his wife talked to us about the history of his 41 years' association with it. At the start when Edward was working as a furniture restorer he rented the top floor of the building. Later he bought the mill which was soon in desperate need of renovation. Edward managed to obtain a grant of 80 per cent of the £180,000 cost of doing the work from Natural England and the mill was classified as a Site of Special Scientific Interest. As a result of the funding Edward has to fulfil certain conditions, for example maintaining the landscape, the river and the mill in a sustainable way. He also runs courses in rural crafts and hosts visits of schoolchildren and their teachers.

The mill is full of different objects that Edward has accumulated through the years. 560 drawers contain this vast array and the



contents are catalogued in a book from A to Z. Some of the items have been assembled and photographed to create works of art. Edward described his 'addiction' to collecting and storing things from the past as stemming from 'a passion for a kind of life that we have let slip a bit'. One of the things which became more and more evident during our time in the mill was Edward's love of hand tools of which he has a large collection. He demonstrated a sharpening saw and a treadle operated lathe which could be used for making chair legs. On the first floor of the mill, he showed us a Gilks turbine with its original machinery. He is keen to get it working again and attached to the mill race. Towards the end of the visit, Edward took some of us for a short walk along the riverbank to the head of the mill race. This beautiful stretch of the river which is rocky and fast flowing is home to the protected native crayfish.

Everyone said that they had really enjoyed the trip and thanks were due to Edward for giving us such an interesting overview of his life and work at Sprint Mill. Julie Leigh

JULY GARDENING

Potentilla bushes are a common sight in municipal plantings in parks and in carparks. They are hardy and undemanding, and rarely exceed their desired size and shape. *Potentilla fruticosa* is a British native plant which grows on the stony banks of the River Tees in upper Teesdale and it brings this hardiness into its garden offspring.

For many years yellow and white were the only available flower colours, but I do remember the excitement caused at Webbs Garden Centre in Kendal when I worked there in the late '70's when 'Red Ace', the first bright red flowered cultivar arrived in the nursery. This was followed by the lovely, soft pink 'Princess', and then by several other cultivars in the pink/red spectrum. 'Red Robin' is now recommended as the best of the red flowered cultivars as its flowers do not fade in the

sunshine. 'Pretty Polly' is a good deep pink fading to pale pink with an attractive spreading habit, and 'Grace Darling' is an improvement on the old 'Daydawn' with dusky apricot flowers. The Potentilla genus also provides a range of herbaceous perennials which make useful, low spreading plants in a small garden. My favourites are 'Gibson's Scarlet' which has rich blood red flowers, 'Miss Willmott' with cherry pink flowers, 'Etna' with maroon, saucer shaped flowers, 'Monarch's Velvet' with velvety deep red flowers with a dark centre and P. x hopwoodiana which has pink flowers shading to white with a rich red eye. All are good natured, and if happy in their chosen spot, will seed themselves around but not too exuberantly to become a nuisance. Elaine Horne
