

SEDBERGH ANNUAL PARISH MEETING

Chairman's Report 2014-15 Sedbergh Parish Council has had yet another very busy year. Unfortunately a lot of time and effort has had to be spent on trying to protect services rather than in developing and improving them.

The most notable of these was the campaign to try to save the banks in Sedbergh. Despite vigorous national and local lobbying, gaining support from all sectors of the community and presenting to NatWest a well reasoned and positive economic case for keeping the bank our efforts were ignored and dismissed out of hand. The only concessions which we were able to wring out of them was to have the mobile bank visiting twice a week and an agreement to leave a cash point in the Town.

The other very serious issue is that of the post 16 transport fiasco, a

matter which the Parish Council has been giving its support to those who have been leading the campaign to obtain a resolution to the matter.

Much of the work carried out by Parish Councillors is done through the various committees. The Policy and Resources Committee ensures that policies, which the Parish Council is obliged to adhere to, are in place and are followed and it also oversees the finances of the Council. The planning committee examines all the planning applications and makes recommendations to the Council, which if agreed, are passed on to the Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority, which takes the planning decisions. The Amenities Committee looks after the assets, which are owned or leased by the Parish Council, including the car parks, toilets, benches and some of the street lighting while the Queens Gardens committee has responsibility

for maintaining and developing the gardens.

In addition, individual Councillors liaise with a variety of outside agencies putting the case for resources and support for the Town, a recently example being the cycle stands and getting the County Council to repair the pavements, although as we all know that that went spectacularly wrong! Comments are also prepared about documents and proposals, which might impact on the Town, such as the YDNPA consultation on their Draft Local Plan and the Review of Housing Policy and Infrastructure Needs. This is often very time consuming and laborious, but can result in obtaining resources and improvements. The

GARSDALE PARISH COUNCIL News Brooms and Fresh Tea The evening started well, 27 attended the first parish meeting that Garsdale Parish Council has held for many a year. Tea, made from village hall water (explanation later), and biscuits greeted them. The projector was in place and all settled down to a night of celebration of the achievements of a rejuvenated parish council.

Annette Colton, chairman since last August, reported that from a low of having just 3 councillors, Garsdale now had a full, vibrant council of 7 councillors with an active clerk, the first time since 2010.

Chairman Annette then outlined the strides forward that had been made in Garsdale over the past few months. 1. Finally, fibre ducting was now being laid in the dale which will bring unique ultra-fast internet to Garsdale. 2. An extraordinary public meeting with Tilhill had been held to discuss the proposals for tree felling at






Dandra Garth. The meeting was very lively with many concerns being expressed and council was not at all happy with the attitude shown to local residents.

3. The unjust and unwarranted imposition of private water risk assessments by SLDC was of great concern. In a letter to SLDC, it was noted that there had been no consultation either with the residents or the council prior to "engineers" knocking on doors demanding to inspect their private water supplies. One resident commented on her experience at the hands of these "engineers" who appeared not to have a clue what to do and later received a report that their water



supply was extremely hazardous. Council is still waiting for a formal response to their suggestion that a much more informed local should be carrying out these tests and at a much more reasonable cost. Council vowed not to let this matter drop. 4. Representations had been made to YDNP to emphasise that future planning applications should be in favour of more residential and less holiday properties.

5. The village hall lease had finally been signed after 7 years, which had unfortunately attracted a solicitor's bill of £2000+VAT –however, this is offset by the Diocese forgoing the rent for the past 5 years. Chairman Annette explained that at the council meeting

in February, it was decided that signing the village hall lease offered by the Diocese was preferable to running up further solicitors' bills with a subsequent permanent increase in rent or even loss of the hall. On the plus side however, the stalwarts of the councillors and village hall committee had organised and installed a new water system in the hall costing around £100 since all the digging was done by volunteers, a fraction of the around £3,500 both originally estimated, and subsequently quoted in January from a contractor for a different solution. The hall now has virtually smell free water which we have all sampled in the tea!

6. Communications to the residents were paramount and Chairman Annette urged those who haven't already, to sign up via the website or through the clerk

(<u>ps.johns@btinternet.com</u>) to a new confidential database, allowing easier, quicker and less costly communications.

7. School transport for 16 to 18 years olds had still not been resolved.

SLDC have been derelict in their legal

duty to provide transport to schools or colleges from September for the now compulsory higher education. Unfortunately, there were no representatives of SLDC at the meeting to bring us up to date with any proposals and it appeared that this matter was heading to the courtroom.

The clerk then presented the accounts. The sterling efforts of the volunteers who had replaced the village hall water system for a fraction of the money that council had put aside, had rescued the accounts, so were still in a healthy state. Clerk commented that he might actually start drawing his salary!

Dave Ryall and John Colton presented a colourful, informative and very interesting update of the progress of FibreGarden. To date, four and a half kilometres of ducting had been laid but were at present being held up by the intransigence of BT in signing contracts to allow further progress. £482,000 was waiting to be spent on contractors, who had temporarily withdrawn, and was being held back by the bizarre situation of asking their competitor,

BT, for permission to continue. Residents were asked to lobby councillors and MPs to put an end to this unfair situation. Once contracts have been signed, the contractors would be able to return full-time to complete the first community led project, delivering 100mb of broadband to a rural community.

There followed the AGM and normal council meeting of which you can be spared the details (draft minutes will be posted on the website in a few weeks) apart from the sight of 6 grown men, down on bended knee, begging the sole female councillor to stay on as chairman, fare brought a tear to the eye!

The next meeting, buckets and all,

will be on July 16th in the fragrant-free village hall.

APRIL WEATHER

As often happens in April we had a bit of everything weatherwise! We didn't get a lot of rain, with half the days actually being dry, resulting in a total rainfall of 2.5 inches(65mm). We did have the odd cloud burst. Temperatures varied also from a high of 73.9F(23C) to a low of 25.5F(-3.5C). The added windchill to the night temperatures took them below freezing on all but 9 nights. The wind was from the North Westerly guarter on all but 2 days with a maximum gust of 28mph. It was a fairly breezy month with only 3 days not registering a gust of over 10 mph.

April is lambing time for me and many others. A time I look forward to with mixed emotions. When we scanned the 4 shearlings only had singles on board and I thought that could be trouble. It did in fact turn out to be so with very big lambs requiring much assistance. Any singles next year will be on starvation rations! I got the ewes carrying twins about right this year as I had far fewer problems. "Our" cock swallow was back on 8" and "his" hen a week later. I've heard a cuckoo for the first time for several years working its way up the river valley. The curlews seem to have moved on as they have been less obvious with their calls recently. They are usually the first to call as the first signs of light appearing over Wildboar Fell each morning closely followed by a blackbird and song thrush. A hen blackbird, which had hatched off 4 chicks, in the donkey shelter I found dead just outside. Although I fed the youngsters with some 32 worms during the day sadly they did not

We had some mysterious seedlings germinate in the grass under a red oak but The odd shaped cotyledons were nothing like oak and we certainly didn't see any acorns. Unfortunately we may never know what they might have turned into as the frost on the very cold night turned them brown over night. We shall have to hope some more appear.

well under way for this year's event from 4th to 10th June - see www.applebyfair.org. There was recently a pre-Fair drop-in event at Barbon Village Hall where representatives from South Lakeland District Council, Cumbria County Council and the Police were in attendance. There is very good communication between the three organisations to prepare for the event, putting up signs and posts, anticipating arrivals and trying to ensure that the movement of the travellers through the area goes smoothly.

The Appleby Horse Fair has been taking place since the late 17th century when a Royal Charter allowed a horse fair 'near to the River

Eden'. Some 15,000 gypsies and travellers gather each year to buy and sell horses and meet with friends and relatives. More than double that number of visitors come to see the Fair. In the Sedbergh & Kirkby Lonsdale area we see a mix of 'bow tops', the brightly painted wooden caravans towed by horses, and ordinary caravans towed by vehicles. Often the same family uses both forms of transport, one as a back-up vehicle for the other.

Scrogg Bank on the A683 to the east of Sedbergh is the main official site close to the town. There are also sites to the north at Rawthey Bridge on the Cautley Road and further south at Middleton Common and Devil's Bridge in Kirkby Lonsdale. On

CAR TRAVEL TIPS

As the holiday season is upon us, here's a couple of travel tips that may help you get about more easily. From 8 June, the DVLA is abolishing the paper counterpart of the UK photocard licences. All endorsements, such a speeding offences, will be held electronically. If you commit an offence you will still have to pay any applicable fine and submit your licence to the court, but endorsements will no longer be recorded on the paper counterpart. You can view your record online, or request a copy by post (see www.gov.uk and type 'View your driving licence information' in the



search box).

All of this means if you want to hire a vehicle, then you will no longer be able to show your paper counterpart or paper licence (pre- 1998). Instead you must obtain a unique access

citizens advice bureau code (which expires after 72 hours) from the 'Share your Licence' online service and give this to the hire company along with the last 8 digits of your driving licence number. Alternatively you can call DVLA on 09061 393 837 and

give permission for your driving record to be checked verbally by a nominated person/organization, but this may be difficult overseas or out of hours. A video explaining it all is available at <u>www.gov.uk/government/</u> <u>news/driving-licence-changes</u>





WALK FOR ANITA

After literally months of planning and preparation, on 22 April I took my first apprehensive steps on my 1,050+ mile journey to John O'Groats in memory of my late wife Anita, and in aid of Genesis Breast Cancer Prevention.

The weather for the first couple of days could not Lands End have been kinder. The Land's End "theme" village John O'Groats was happily empty and closed and after the obligatory photograph by the iconic signpost I set off under a cloudless blue sky but with a very brisk wind blowing off the sea. I followed the South West Coastal Path beyond the pretty Sennen Cove and at the end of Whitesand Bay headed inland via footpaths, farms and guiet lanes for the gentle introductory 11 miles to Penzance.

The weather gods smiled on me again the following day as I spent



most of it on the SWCP as far as Porthleven and then inland to Helston (famous for its Floral Dance). The scenery was stunning, though the constant steepness of the ups and downs draining. I'm told that this is Poldark country! I will not see the sea again until north of Inverness.

From Helston I followed lanes and paths (they all seemed to be uphill) to Truro and then on to Roche. Much of this was through China Clay pit and quarry country: scenic

Cornwall it was not. To avoid Bodmin Moor I then headed east via lanes and yet more steep hills to the market town of Liskeard and on the following day via the rolling Cornish countryside to the attractive hillside town of Launceston and a much needed rest day (and the chance to do some serious pasty tasting!).

The good news is that I covered just less than 100 miles. The bad news is



that I have at least 950 to go. Launceston - Nantwich

As I write this, (15th May) I have been walking for four weeks and have reached Nantwich in south Cheshire, a distance of just less than 400 miles. This sounds quite heartening until I remind myself that I still have over 650 miles to go.

Following my rest day in Launceston, I soon crossed the River Tamar into Devon . I naively thought it would be flatter than Cornwall ; it isn't, though the scenery is equally beautiful. With the weather largely fine, all I had to worry about was whether to put the jam or cream on my scone first.

My route took me via Bridestowe, Spreyton, Crediton and Sampford Peverell, all picturesque towns and villages with its deep red soil and not a dry stone wall in sight. I followed the Grand Union Canal to Taunton, through the Somerset Levels that were so badly flooded in 2013/14 and

over the edge of the Mendips towards Radstock and onto Bath.

From Bath I picked up the well waymarked, but hilly Cotswold Way towards Dursley, before striking off along the Severn Way towards Gloucester. It may be flat, but many of the field paths and footpaths are long or overgrown which can make for prickly walking if you are wearing shorts.

I stayed with the Severn – a quite beguiling river – via Tewkesbury and Worcester until I reached the Stourport basin, the start of the Midlands canal system. Firstly it was the quiet and exceptionally peaceful Worcesteshire and Staffordshire canal to Wolverhampton and then the famous Shropshire Union through Staffordshire and Shropshire (arable country ) to Nantwich and another much needed rest day.

The wettest day? There have been a few but none so bad as from Worcester to Kidderminster. I fear that as I approach the north- west it is not going to become any drier, though Lancashire and Cumbria may yet surprise me. If all goes to plan I will reach Kendal on June 1<sup>st</sup>.

I am still in one piece, though my feet are a little sore and my legs probably a couple of inches shorter. Many a person has stopped to ask me about the walk and to wish me well. I hope that my next article will have me reporting that I have reached the outskirts of Glasgow. Age UK offer a lot of advice and can potentially help people to apply for grants and benefits to which they are entitled, helping them to fill in forms to get Attendance Allowance and Blue Badges, to give just two examples.





One of our own members can bear testimony to this and has Linda to thank for it! Linda also runs the monthly Age UK lunch club in the Red Lion, a monthly cream tea, and a swimming club on Wednesdays; there's also a singing group that meets at Gladstone House. So if you're retired and would like to join in, please contact Age UK.

The book club met at Moira's house on May 14<sup>th</sup> to discuss 'Huracan' by Diana McCaulay, a Jamaican writer and environmental activist. #### **NEW BRIDGE PICNIC SITE**

The plan was to have a lovely picnic in dappled sunshine that also twinkled delightfully off the gently flowing river. Sadly a precautionary umbrella and a warm coat was needed for the supporters of the site that recently held a celebratory picnic!

The idea of creating the site was developed after talking to people seen picnicking in the layby or perched on the bank around the bridge. Many of them had just left the M6 and were on their way to the Dales via Hawes. Now they and local residents have a lovely site to start their holiday in the Dales'.

The site on the river bank has three picnic benches that overlook the river and can be accessed from the Town by footpaths. The plan is to manage the site with

#### **PEOPLE'S GYM SAVES SWIFTS!**

The exterior of the gym extension at the People's Hall is nearly finished – but did you know that an initiative to help swifts has also been included? You may have read in *Lookaround*, or seen our publicity, that Sedbergh Community Swifts (SCS) is urging people to create more nesting places for swifts in their properties. New buildings offer the best option of all, which is to incorporate special swift nest bricks into the walls - so SCS seized the opportunity to get this considered for the gym.

After discussion with Hall Secretary Dr Gina Barney, and Garsdale Design, it was clear that there was no reason why the swift bricks could not be installed. It was decided that four commercially available hollow bricks would be used, and the work started a few months ago to install them in the gable end facing Woodside Avenue. The facility to also play swift attraction calls has been included - it is believed that this, particularly in mornings and evenings, helps draw in the prospecting swifts that are looking for new nest places.

The picture shows the work in progress, with Gina Barney on the





scaffolding with SCS co-ordinators Tanya & Edmund Hoare. You can see the entrance holes to two of the bricks, which are beneath the barge boards at the gable end. What is especially encouraging is that swifts were seen that day flying and feeding high in the air above the playing fields, showing that this is a good place to try and lure them in.

Go along and have a look at what is going on, and consider how, with a little planning and co-operation, much can be done to help save our swifts. It is the loss of nest sites in the eaves and nooks and crannies of old buildings that has caused the serious decline of these remarkable birds over 40% in the last 20 years. Only by making places in our houses, offices and other buildings will we give them a future.

We are indebted to Garsdale Design for their enthusiastic support for the project, and for the donation of their time. The project was supported by the YDNP Sustainable Development Fund.

#### **3D Printing**


Settlebeck School and Kirkby Stephen Grammar School are rapidly gaining an international reputation for their expertise in applying innovative 3D printing techniques in the classroom.

Last month a group of European teachers and 3D printing specialists spent 3 days visiting the schools to see how their students are using 3D printing to improve their learning. Dave Jermy, Head of Design here at Settlebeck remarked, 'Students of all abilities and ages use 3D printing on a daily basis. The opportunity to realise a concept or idea quickly into a 3D product is an incredibly powerful teaching tool'.

Both schools are formulating new teaching resources and have been delivering 3D printer training to schools throughout the Northwest of England in an initiative funded by the Department for Education. Earlier this year Dave and Kevin Gough (from KSGS) were invited to take part in a European-wide study involving partners from Italy, Turkey and Spain. At the first meeting, near Milan, Dave and Kevin were invited to be the keynote speakers as they are currently spearheading the use of 3D printers in schools, an indication that British education in this technology is ahead of the game.

#### Music

Settlebeck School's music department has been awarded a £1700 grant by the Freda Trott Foundation to help us widen musical opportunities in school. This is a tremendous help towards achieving our aim of offering instrumental and vocal experiences to all students who want to take them. There is already a wide range of instrumental lessons available, including the option of shared guitar lessons at a much reduced rate. This funding will enable us to offer singing lessons on the

Two Lupton girls, Charlie Neate and Emilia Tyser ran the Wilson Run qualifier course at the beginning of May dressed in crocodile and zebra "onesies" to raise money for Restart Africa. Running in wet onesies is not easy!

Roger Strachan and Phoebe Hollings, who left in the summer, were working as a volunteer teachers in Kathmandu when the earthquake struck. Roger was in a restaurant at the time and hid under a table while "the building was shaking very violently and cracking" and felt he was very lucky to escape. He was interviewed on return by BBC TV and you may have seen the interview on BBC Breakfast or the news. He was one of the first arrivals back, and Phoebe followed soon after. The pupils and staff raised just over £1,000 for the Disasters Emergency Committee, and Roger and Phoebe both have their own Just Giving sites.

Colin Gunning, Housemaster of Evans House, returned from holiday on crutches. He jumped into a swimming pool and as he did so his Achilles tendon exploded. This was bad enough, but as he was literally in the wilds of Kenya it was 5 days till he could get to hospital to have it sorted. He is likely to be seen around the town on crutches for some time to come.

The tea concert advertised for 21<sup>st</sup> May in the Thornely Studio had to be cancelled, but it is hoped that there will be one in the second half of the term. These take place roughly once a term – tea and cakes are provided as well. Usually they give up and coming musicians, rather than the very best in the School, an opportunity to perform in public, and a good outside audience is therefore much appreciated.





#### **JUNCTION 37**


Some of you may remember that some years ago a member of my family had a particularly nasty accident on the A684 at junction 37 of the M6 involving a hit and run incident with a lorry. As a result of this I asked for people's experiences of other collisions here and I started a petition asking for some remedial works to be carried out at the junction to improve safetv.

Unfortunately life became rather busy and it all got put on the back burner, but in the intervening years we have witnessed the collisions continuing at this junction with the latest one that we saw on Saturday 4 April this year. As a result I thought I would finally do something about it and I sent a letter to Highways England with a copy to Tim Farron, setting out the problems and giving them all the suggested courses of action for improving the junction that people had given to me.

I have had an in depth response from an executive director of Highways England and I have summarised below what he had to sav.

Taking account of the incident in April and the historic personal injury accident record (going back to 1 January 2010) they are going to review the signs and road markings to see whether there is scope for improvements to be made.

He claims that it is very unusual for heavy goods vehicles to proceed across the A684 from one slip-road to another. I dispute this having had near misses on many occasions and I cannot see how he knows this is

unusual if the near misses are not being reported. However, he has asked the Traffic Officers who patrol that stretch of the M6 to confirm whether they are aware of this practice and he will speak with Cumbria Police. Once they have had these discussions they will consider whether any action is required.

Staggering the slip-road would make it more difficult to cross the A684 from one slip-road to another, which may in turn introduce manoeuvres that are less safe. My argument would be that we are trying to stop the practice of vehicles going straight across in front of other vehicles travelling on a straight A road subject to the national speed limit, which surely is the least safe practice.

They will take measurements on site to assess visibility at the junction and use this information to consider whether a STOP sign is feasible.

They will review the signs on the slip -road against current guidance to see whether there is scope for improvement, and consider whether the road markings need enhancing. They will also take into account the suggestion about having rumble strips on the slip-road.

They have no evidence to suggest that installing permanent cameras would be beneficial.

As Cumbria County Council is responsible for the A684 they will be relaying my comments on each of the following points to their highways department:

Worn red hatching; installing street lights at the junction; prohibiting heavy goods vehicles from parking in the lay-bys on either side of the junction; imposing a 40 mph speed limit on the A684 at the approach and on the bridge over the junction.

They will be in touch again following their assessment. I received a speedy response to my letter from Tim Farron who advised me that he had written to the Highways and Transport Manager of Cumbria Highways and will write to me again when he has received a response.

#### YORKSHIRE DALES NATIONAL PARK

New pot of money for community projects

More cash is up for grabs to provide a boost for business ideas and community projects in the Yorkshire Dales National Park.

A total of £140,000 is available this financial year either to help launch schemes or to provide a muchneeded extra push as they get on their feet.

The money is being supplied by the Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority's Sustainable Development Fund (SDF), which last year handed out just over £150,000 to 26 projects.

Andrea Burden, the Authority's Sustainable Development Officer, said: "The SDF is now in its  $14^{th}$  year of operation and has so far given out £2.3m to help more than 250 projects. That's a fantastic track record but we know there are plenty more good causes that could do with a hand.

"The project may only be in its early stages – just a string of ideas. That doesn't matter because the Fund is there not only to provide financial help towards the cost of physical



things like building work or equipment but also to pay towards help and advice to turn the ideas into a reality.

"Projects should contribute in some way to looking after the National Park's natural beauty, wildlife or cultural heritage, or they should promote opportunities for the public to understand and enjoy those things – while at the same time providing some local economic or community benefit.



"We will consider all projects – whatever their size – that have been submitted by individuals, businesses, community groups or voluntary-sector bodies."

SDF grants given out to projects in the last financial year included:

• £711 to Dent Parish Council towards the cost of resurfacing the Beech Hill car parking area in the village

The key dates for submission and determination of non-delegated applications will be set at the beginning of each year and made available on the SDF webpage at yorkshiredales.org.uk/living-andworking/sdf

During the last twelve months 18 individuals received awards ranging from £150 to £500 each and a total of £5, 895 was ultimately awarded. Examples of the requests received included a grant towards the cost of attending the World Scout Jamboree in Japan, costs of attending the National Youth Ballet Summer School, grants towards the cost of university courses, grants towards the cost of essential computer equipment for further education, and transport costs for attending college amongst many others. It is hoped that recipients of awards will provide some feedback after receiving their award to acknowledge the help they have had usually as a letter to the Bursar.



#### JUNK MAIL

The Junk on the Doorstep – do we want it?


How much of the mail which arrives on our doorstep goes straight in the bin – hopefully the recycling bin? Most of it is stuff we just don't want and didn't ask for. With so much information available online do we really need so many random leaflets and brochures? Buying goods online is so often followed up by advertising material/leaflets/brochures arriving in the post. Once it arrives on the doorstep we have to deal with it open it or chuck it, think about it. On average, Americans spend 8 months opening junk mail in the course of their lives.

So is it OK if we recycle it? All that

paper has then to be collected. transported, mixed with water and chemicals. It is then chopped up and heated to make a slurry which is cleaned, de-inked, bleached and mixed with water again. After all this, new recycled paper is made. Now this is a 'good thing' in that it is less polluting and uses less energy than producing new paper – but – if all this stuff wasn't printed and posted in the first place we wouldn't even need the paper in the first place. 'Reduce' comes before 'reuse' and 'recycle'. Most of the junk we get isn't printed on recycled paper and is therefore using trees.

If those of us who don't want it could stop it then the organisations that produce it would presumably stop

producing so much! A bit of time spent putting a stop to the vast majority of the pile could in the long run save you time. However, it is also important to be sure about what you are doing. Some of the 'junk' is useful and interesting but if this is only a tiny fraction of the whole and the information is available elsewhere, it could be better to stop the lot. A personal decision! Stopping mail addressed to you personally:

- 1. Tick the right box in order to opt in or out of receiving the mail in the first place.
- 2. Contact the sender and ask them to remove you from their mailing list. They must do this by law (Data Protection Act). Technically you should do this in writing (email will do) but I have usually found that a phone call will do the trick.
- 3. Alternatively just return the mail to the sender. Write 'unsolicited mail, return to sender' on the envelope and put it back in the post. The receiver will have to pay the postage. This should get the message through.
- 4. Register with the Mail Preference Service online - http:// www.mpsonline.org.uk to take your address off direct mailing lists and stop unwanted advertising material which is addressed to you personally. Stopping unaddressed mail – leaflets and brochures
- Register with the Royal Mail's Opt Out service - oddly not easy to find on their website! All you need to do is to email your name and address to

'optout@royalmail.com' and they will send you a form (as an attachment) to fill in and post back. This stops all unaddressed mail delivered by Royal Mail. You will still get election material which is not delivered by the Roval Mail


2. You may still get some from other distributors. To stop this, contact the DMA (Direct Marketing Association at yourchoice@dma.org.uk. They

will also send you a form to fill in. Finally you can get a 'no junk mail' sticker from

junkmail@merseysidewda.gov.uk - or even better make your own. The problem here is that your idea of junk may not agree with the Royal Mail's view!

hand in the field or the shippon, making butter, doing the milk round and taking animals to market. There's a chapter on sheep, with gathering, dipping and clipping. And, of course, there's haytime, with scything and raking, mowing with horse drawn machinery, making cocks and pikes in case of rain, leading in with cart or sledge and stacking in the moo.

In other chapters interviewees talk about their local church or chapel and the social life and the outings organised around them. They tell us about family life, their weddings, honeymoons and funerals, and the social life they enjoyed such as dances and potato pie suppers and local Fairs. If you want a traditional recipe for pig-foot pie, toenails and all, you'll find it here!

This is not a profit making venture. Everybody working on the book has given their skills and their time voluntarily, as of course have our interviewees without whom the project would not exist. We give sincere thanks to all concerned. We have pledged that any profits after production costs will be given back to our local communities.

#### SEDBERGH COMMUNITY SWIFTS

In June you should see swifts, with their magnificent scythe-shaped wings, flying high above town. Look up into the sky on a fine day near the playing fields on Back Lane or the Peoples Hall, and watch them swooping and swerving to catch insects (including lots of gnats and midges!). Maybe you are lucky enough to have them nesting near you: a good indication is if there are low-level screaming parties that hurtle past. The birds zoom around to show others that it's a good place to stop.

We have had the privilege to share our home at Lowgill with swifts for well over a decade - we inherited the colony which may well have been in

the cottages since they were built 150 years ago. Watching them has been a constant source of pleasure, and it could be yours too. We expect the chicks to hatch around the middle of June, so the adults will be going in

and out of the nests more often, bringing in food (on average about every 45 minutes) for their increasingly hungry offspring. Many people who talked to us at Sedbergh Gala found our *"What's the difference?"* poster useful, explaining the differences between swallows, house martins and swifts. A simple guide is: firstly, swallows and martins have whitish patches, while swifts have all-dark plumage, are larger and have longer

swept-back wings. Secondly, you can



see the nests of swallows in outbuildings and the cup-shaped mud ones of house martins outside houses under the eaves. But you never see a swifts nest as it is hidden high up in the crevices of walls or in eaves (they do not enter a house, the nest is in a cramped space in or on top of the wall, and they do no damage). And a real plus point is that swifts are not messy birds, unlike swallows and martins! Lastly. because of their tiny legs, swifts can't perch so a bird on a wire is not a swift.

Sedbergh should be a good place for swifts, with plenty of tall old buildings. But as you walk around, look upwards, and notice how many of the gables and eaves have been

mortared up during renovations, denying the swifts any nesting sites. Many people tell us how there used to be lots of screaming parties zooming around, and that often swifts could be seen darting into their nest holes, but how few there are now. It's just a case of swifts simply not featuring on the radar of most houseowners, builders or architects. But unless we act now Sedbergh is in danger of losing its swifts forever.

Swift-friendly repairs are not difficult and do not compromise the structure or insulation of the building. Putting up swift boxes, on newer properties too, is a good step to take so if you are planning any work or have scaffolding up, please use the opportunity, as they need to be as high as possible.

We usually have some boxes, and don't hesitate to get in touch for a chat, or for any advice and help. We are also happy to give talks.

Please help save our swifts and make Sedbergh, Dent and all the surrounding area swift-friendly:

- Tell us where you see swifts going into nest sites.
- Tell us where you see swift screaming parties
- Put up boxes, especially if you have scaffolding up
- Volunteer for surveying please get in touch, details below.

#### **TIM FARRON MP**

### WESTERN DALES BUS

The new Western Dales Bus service to Hawes from Sedbergh, Dent and Cowgill got off to a good start last month, and has been particularly welcomed by residents of Garsdale. The bus runs every Tuesday and picks up at the following times: Cowgill 0930 Dent 0945 Sedbergh Joss Lane Car Park 1000 Sedbergh Maryfell 1002. It returns from Hawes at 1330,

giving three hours in Hawes to visit the market and get a bite to eat.

As well as stopping at the places shown on the timetable, the bus will also pick up passengers all along the route. So if you want to catch the bus at the Pinfold caravan site, or anywhere in Garsdale, all you need to do is stand where it will be safe for the bus to stop, make sure you can be seen easily by the driver, and flag the bus down.

And if you enjoy a linear walk locally but don't want to return by the same route, the new Sunday service between Sedbergh and Dent Station could meet your needs. The Sedbergh Information Centre has some suggestions for how you can explore the countryside and surrounding hills between Cowgill and Sedbergh, and use a one-way trip on the bus to avoid having to retrace your steps.

Concessionary passes are accepted on all Western Dales Bus services, and full timetables are available from the Sedbergh Information Centre and the Library, as well as on the website www.westerndalesbus.co.uk.

## NEIGHBOURHOODALERT

Trading Standards have been made aware that Cumbrian residents are receiving unsolicited scam phone calls. The caller claimed to be from the 'Security Company' and then proceeds to ask various questions whether you own your property and have you paid off your mortgage.

Cumbria Police are also investigating a number of similar incidents. The cold call initially is by telephone and a free home visit and consultation is quickly arranged. Reports are that in some cases there is extreme sales pressure put on the householder. This company states that their security systems provide direct links to your local Police Station but no such system exists!

Our advice is if you do receive unsolicited or unexpected telephone calls always be on your guard it may be a scam. Never give personal or financial information out to anyone who cold calls. Simply hang up. In all cases if it sounds too good to be true it probably is.

Police are working with Trading Standards to identify those involved and investigate the conduct of these callers.

## NEIGHBOURHOODALERT

Fraudsters often target 'goods for sale' adverts on popular online auctions sites, so watch out whenever you're selling anything online.

How does the fraudster operate? The fraudster will contact the seller to say that they want to buy the advertised item.

The seller then receives what looks like a genuine PayPal email, to confirm that the money has been paid by the buyer into their account.

With confirmation of payment, the seller will then send the item to the buyer's address. The seller will later find that the PayPal email is fake and that the money has not been paid. The seller ends up losing out twice as not only do they not have the money, but they no longer have the item to sell.

- Check your PayPal account to ensure that the money has been paid in and has cleared into your bank account before you send the item to the buyer.
- Do not be bullied or rushed into sending items before you know that the payment has cleared – a genuine purchaser will not mind waiting a day or two for you to send them their item.
- If you are selling a vehicle, think carefully when selling to overseas purchasers – especially if they tell you they will send an extra payment for shipping – check that the funds have cleared before arranging this.

## TELEPHONE SCAMS

It has been brought to our attention in Lookaround Office that a Sedbergh resident was recently contacted by telephone and told that they had an outstanding bill and was advised to get money out to settle the debt by way of a 'UKash Voucher'. An eagle eyed member of the community saw what was happening, stepped in and saved the person losing £250. Not a lot but if they con 10 people, it's a lot of money.

If you have a genuine debt, you would not be put under any pressure to make a payment immediately. BGe warned and watch out for others who make succumb.

### JUNE GARDENING

One of the great pleasures of gardening is that of sharing favourite plants. Sometimes friends make "Discoveries" – plants which are not common in cultivation, and after a reasonable time, when they have thoroughly tested them out, they give bits to me and I make lovely additions to my own borders.

I have, in recent years, been introduced to several herbaceous perennials which are now safely installed in my garden plot. Some may not like the site here, but as they have been given, rather than purchased the disappointment if they fail will be aesthetic rather than financial.

I have several new Geums: G. 'Beech house Apricot', G.'Lemon Drops', and G. 'Hirterton Primrose' all of which have nodding flowers and are pretty in a quiet sort of way. They are very good tempered being low growing - around 1ft in height and spread, and need no staking. Alongside these I have 3 new blue flowered things. The first, Corydalis elata, produces mounds of soft yellow green foliage over which scented, electric blue flowers are born in early to mid summer. "False Indigo" (Baptisia australis) likes a well drained soil in full sun and produces stems 3-4ft tall bearing rich blue, lupin like flower spikes. Amsonia 'Blue Ice' has panicles of small, starry, sky blue flowers on 12-18 inch stems. It has a long flowering period from late spring to mid summer and likes to be in a sunny position Contrasting most beautifully with these blue flowers are the daisy

flowered cultivars of "Dyer's Chamomile" Anthemis tinctoria (now Cota tinctoria) 'Sauce Hollandaise' is a beautiful creamy yellow and 'E C Buxton' a clear lemon yellow. These do not always come through the winter here, but do grow readily from cuttings begged from the garden of friends who live in the sunny south (Lancashire!)
