### CAN YOU HEAR IT?

After a particularly volatile and bruising Parish Meeting in May, the stalwarts of Garsdale Parish Council have taken advantage of a meetingfree month (PC meets every 3<sup>rd</sup> Thursday bimonthly) to retire into their lairs, to lick their wounds and gird their loins, ready to sally forth with renewed vigour and enthusiasm to tackle the issues of the parish.

The imminent worries are the private water risk assessments and Post 16 transport. An entreaty to SLDC to allow a better informed local to be employed to carry out the risk assessments, rather than apparently uninformed and clueless Tobin employees, has yet to be agreed.



Further pressure is being applied to SLDC but in the meantime it has been reported that Tobin are still approaching residents. Until Council has received a satisfactory reply, the suggestion is to hold tight.

Similarly, no satisfactory proposal has been submitted by SLDC to settle their legal obligations to provide transport for 16 to 18 year olds to their colleges for compulsory higher education. Why SLDC are dragging their feet over this is a puzzle. Presently pupils are paying about £2.00 per day for transport and the "savings" made by withdrawing will be minimal. Why not just admit a mistake has been made, reinstate the transport and avoid a costly and

humiliating court appearance? The main road through the Dale continues to deteriorate. As an "A" road, it's condition really is appalling. Again the response from Highways at SLDC is hardly deafening. Parishioners may help by contacting the Highways Hotline to report all concerns, the more the merrier. Council will continue to apply similar pressure.

Although water continues to flow cleanly at the village hall, unfortunately, it also continues to flow via a leak under the floor. Presently this is being isolated and volunteers are being lined up on a rota basis to lay under the floor and stick a finger in the pipe to stem the flow until a more permanent solution is found. But on the other hand, life carries on as normally as possible in Garsdale. Summer is now with us and we all look forward to some sunshine. The sheep have been moved to higher pastures and the meadows have been left to grow, ready to produce silage for the winter. So, on a quiet day, away from the roar of the motorbikes, shut your eyes and listen. Can you hear it? That sweet sound of grass growing.

If an impact on the Tourist traffic is forthcoming for this year a solution will have to be found as of yesterday.

The improvements to the People's Hall at Sedbergh is dramatic and great credit must go to Dr. Gina Barney and her committee. The highlight of the Sedbergh meeting were the Crocodile Tears spilt by our County Councillor over the decision to charge 16 - 18 year olds where they require School Transport.

Local Authorities have a choice of where they can spend their monies. Sadly the local Authorities both District and County in this Area find their support in Urban Environments and subsequently it is Rural Communities, who suffer.

Kevin Lancaster and I are tired of hearing the same old story" We only see you at Election Times" We have decided to introduce " Help Desks" into our meet the Public Campaign



and will hold our first venture in early Autumn.

### **COUNCILLOR CORNER**

Last week both Sedbergh parish and Kirkby Lonsdale town councils met and the Appleby Horse Fair was not brought up at either. That must be a first for the June meetings ! The management of the whole event now seems to be in much more responsible hands and seven years of vigilance seem to be paying off. The "no nonsense" approach of our Police and Crime Commissioner, who made a bee-line to me for a debrief at a councillor event last week has greatly helped. Another strand has

been the improved horse passport legislation which makes it much more difficult for unregistered horses to appear, be traded and disappear. The scrap metal trade has also been transformed, do you remember the dealing station on the side of the A65, just about the North Yorkshire, Cumbria border ?

There has been relatively little activity on South Lakeland as the council settles down from the discontinuity of the national and local elections. For the first time in many years last month's Planning Committee was cancelled. This was partly because new members of the committee have to go through an induction process but mainly it was for want of business. This follows a pattern going back at least as far as 1992. In the run up to national elections potential developers refrain from submitting applications until the election result is known. If past experience is anything to go by now it is over and there is a stable majority government likely to remain in place for five years there will be nine or twelve months where the number of applications will greatly exceed the long term trend.

### TIM FARRON MP

This month I have been rather distracted by the campaign for leadership of the Liberal Democrats. The result will be announced on the 16th July and once that is out of the way, whatever the result, my time should get back a bit more to being my own. The key thing is that I hope you see my campaign to become leader as less about losing my time here in Westmorland and Lonsdale and more about being able to use my time to campaign more widely for the things that affect us here.

Already I have taken the opportunity that the greater level of media attention has brought to start to campaign against fracking in this country. I was really pleased when the last government announced that it was banning fracking from the National Parks and other areas of outstanding natural beauty but I think that we should go much further. There are too many risks attached to fracking and it seems to me that allowing it to happen is just further delaying our much needed move to adopt a low carbon approach to running the country.

My wider platform has also allowed me to more publicly attack the current Government's plans to force housing associations to sell off their houses. I am really proud of the number of affordable houses that we have seen built in the area since we started working on the issue. But there is so

much more that we need to do. The number of people come up to me in the street or talk to me about housing issues at my surgeries shows how desperately we need affordable housing. I am really proud that South Lakeland District Council has announced that one of their key targets is to build 1000 houses on affordable rents. The very thought that the current Government is proposing to make it so that these not just can but must be sold off at some point in the future, taking us back again to the point where there is not enough affordable housing around and even more needs to be built is madness. I can see no way that this can be justified and am taking every opportunity I can to ensure that the Government hears this message.

Of course there are many more things I am raising during my speeches around the country in the leadership hustings (you can find quite a few of them on my Facebook page), good schools, transport and healthcare for everyone, not just those in big cities, apprenticeships so that young people can develop useful skills that can give them the best start in life and earn money at the same time. The list goes on.

And despite rushing around the country speaking to party members there is still time to work on issues from Westmorland and Lonsdale that people want me to address. 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### WALK FOR ANITA LAND'S END TO JOHN O'GROATS



When I left off my update last month. I had reached Nantwich in south Cheshire. In increasingly disappointing, ie wet weather I walked on through the Cheshire Plain to the salt mining town of Northwich and then on to Warburton where I crossed the Manchester Ship Canal. briefly entering the outskirts of Salford before taking the Glazebrook Trail towards Leigh and the Leeds-Liverpool Canal via Wigan to just south of Preston. The downside of this route was having to walk through part of the outskirts and centre of industrial towns which sharply contrasted with beauty of the countryside where I had spent most

of the walk.

At Preston I picked up the Lancaster canal which is largely peaceful apart from where it passes close to the M6 and west coast mainline. I had more heavy rain between Garstang and Lancaster but at least it had dried up and the sun came out in time for to cross the magnificent Lune viaduct and pass the 500 mile mark. An overnight stop in Bolton-le-Sands before reaching the end of the navigable section of the canal at Tewitfield. But there are still stretches of water beyond Tewitfield and as far as Stanton Bridge and on the day I passed through there was a festival of Trailboats on the stretch near the Westmorland Showground. Trailboats literally small barges which can be transported by then lowered into the canal from a trailer. I ended that day at Oxenholme, pleased to be back in the familiar Cumbrian countryside.

From Oxenholme I followed the old course of the canal into Kendal before taking the Dales Way towards Bowness but veered off to Windermere and then the following day through a chilly and inevitably busy Ambleside to Great Langdale and the Cumbria Way (CW). The



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75 MAIN STREET, SEDBERGH LAIO 5AB 015396 22123 or 07967 638503 patchandfettle.co.uk weather gods took pity on me the next day as I had sun and blue skies as I walked over Stake Pass and then down to Langstrath and on through Borrowdale to Keswick. The views down to Langstrath with Skiddaw in the distance were comfortably the high point of the walk so far.

The weather was not quite as good as I hoped for the following day when I followed the CW around the lower slopes of Latrigg and then Lonscale Fell to the remote Skiddaw House. Inevitably before I reached High Pike the weather closed in , The cloud and rain came down and Caldbeck below was lost from view. I finished the CW in Carlisle and then took non too quiet lanes and the B7076 over the Esk to cross into Scotland near Gretna.

In the absence of any south-north paths or trails, I took a pragmatic route along the largely guiet B7076 (and its successors) through Lockerbie, Moffat and Abington to Larkhall. Thankfully this is also Route 74 of the National Cycle Network so there was frequently a welcome delineated cycle lane and occasionally a separate cycle path. Once north of Moffat the road almost completely devoid of trafficclimbs in height through magnificent scenery not enhanced by the dozens upon dozens of wind turbines of the vast Clyde Wind Farm.

I ended this leg by taking pleasant woodland paths through the Chatelherault Country Park and then by the waters of Strathclyde CP before having to negotiate a terrifying complex of roundabouts and road construction around J5 of the M74 in an attempt to pick up the Clyde Walk Way, which after yet more diversions, I eventually did. In danger of missing my train home for a couple of days of R&R (and washing), I spent the final hour and a half walking as fast as my very weary legs would take me through the east end of Glasgow , past Celtic Park and into the city centre.

I hope to report in next month's edition that I have reached John O'Groats; so only about 350 miles or so to go! ### SEDBERGH & DISTRICT COMMUNITY TRUST

Since we last wrote a considerable amount of water has flowed under several bridges and the Trustees have been kept very busy on numerous projects. The First Responders project 9s now a charity in its own right and has effectively flown the Trust's coop. Our congratulations and heartfelt thanks go to Andy Cobb and his team who have worked so tirelessly to bring this project to fruition.

At the other end of the scale the BMX/Skateboarding project is progressing well. 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### CREDIT UNION IN SOUTH LAKELAND

Credit Unions are savings and borrowing co-operatives which offer to all members of the community, including those who are excluded from traditional banking services, an easy way to save and to access reasonably priced loans.

They differ from banks and other financial institutions in that those who have accounts in the Credit Union are its members and owners, and they elect their board of directors in a oneperson-one-vote system regardless of their amount invested. In addition, after meeting the costs of running the Credit Union, all interest on loan repayments is either reinvested or is paid as a dividend to savers; nothing leaves the community.

Much of Cumbria already has access to such an organisation, and currently a group of volunteers is seeking formal approval from the Bank of England for the creation of a Credit Union which will serve the whole of South Lakeland.

This process is now well advanced and it is likely that services will come on stream towards the end of the summer.

Initially the operation of the Credit Union will be centred on Kendal with a phased roll-out across the District over the following couple of years. An employed manager will oversee and coordinate the operation of the Credit Union, but for much of its day to day work, from running the management committee to working directly with customers, it will rely on volunteers.

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### JULY GARDENING

The first flush of hybrid tea and floribunda and repeat flowering shrub roses should now be well underway and will hopefully be followed by a succession of colourful blooms for weeks to come. It is always important to remove fading blooms to promote new flower buds and prevent the plants putting much needed resources into the production of seeds. I usually take the opportunity to give my roses a light pruning whilst I dead head them. I cut back the old flowering stems to a healthy, outward facing bud (about half way down the stem) to encourage the bushes to "break" and form new flowering stems. I also give rose bushes a dose of fertiliser this month. Roses are hungry feeders and guickly exhaust the food supply in our thin soils. If we wish to keep them in flower through the summer and into the Autumn. (and even winter in a good year), we need to provide them with a fertiliser

which contains a high proportion of potassium, or potash. As well as encouraging flower bud formation this also has the added advantage of ripening and hardening stems, making them much more resistant to frost damage.

Many other flowering shrubs also benefit from high potash fertiliser, and an application at this time of year, on spring flowering shrubs, climbers and fruit trees should provide a wealth of flowers next year.

Ericaceous shrubs such as Rhododendrons and Camellias may also benefit from a good feed, particularly if their leaves are showing signs of yellowing. They need a different type of fertiliser – one which contains trace elements such as magnesium, iron and manganese. The nutrients are in "sequestered" or "chelated" form. "Plant tonic" and Sequestrene" are two readily available products which fit the bill. *Elaine Horne*

### DENT & SEDBERGH ORAL HISTORY SOCIETY

Telling it like it was

Members of the Dent and Sedbergh Oral History Society joined others from the North West in a Lancaster University oral history study day led by national and international specialists. Among the presenters were Anthea Boulton and Veronica Whymant from the Dent and Sedbergh Society.

Accompanied by her guide dog Sophie, Veronica gave a moving account of how, with the aid of special software, she as a severely visually impaired person, was able to specialise in editing and archiving recordings and transcripts of oral history interviews.

Anthea spoke of her experience, over twenty years, arranging the recordings of nearly a hundred Dent, Sedbergh and Garsdale residents whose memories stretch back to the 1920s and '30s. In a powerpoint presentation she played extracts from the Oral History Society's archive covering the dramatic changes in dales life, from horse to tractor in farming, from oil lamps to electricity in the home, and from pony and trap to the motor car.

In September the Society will publish the first of two major books, *Telling it Like it Was: Dent and Sedbergh in Living Memory*, edited by Anthea and Veronica. Drawing on the archive, they include extracts from no fewer than sixty nine current and



former local residents, the oldest born in 1905. They recall their childhood, schooldays, the old farming practices, church and chapel life, women's work, love and marriage, and how they entertained themselves before television.

There will be two special events to launch the book, the first in Dent Memorial Hall on Saturday morning, September 12<sup>th</sup>, and the second at Westwood Books, Sedbergh on the following Saturday morning, September 19<sup>th</sup>. Everyone is welcome to drop in and meet Anthea, Veronica and some of the contributors. Look out for more details in the September Lookaround.

Meanwhile, Lookaround has invited the Society to contribute a few



extracts every month. Here's a taster to whet your appetite!

"I learnt to swim in the river and there was about four pools around the area and a lot of youngsters, most of us, had swum in the river. And there was one in the Clews at Rawthey down below Settlebeck, the meeting of the waters in the Lune and Rawthey, and then there was quite a nice pool above Killington bridge which we swam in, and then there was Bond's Holme wood above Broadrain Mill. We swam there and we used to build a fire and go down and roast potatoes and what-not and end up having a feast. We were into our teens, the boys and girls as they were, there was nothing untoward and it's amazing really because there was no ... I mean they used to get dressed with towels round and sometimes towels used to drop and you saw what you shouldn't but nobody ever bothered ... "

### FRONT GARDEN MATTERS

Are you part of a growing front garden trend? Research by the Royal Horticultural Society has found that the number of front gardens being paved over in Britain has tripled in 10 years. The reason that this can be an issue for our communities is that paved gardens exacerbate flood problems. Concreting or paving increases the risk of flooding, the RHS said, since the impermeable materials typically used to cover a front garden cause water to run off into drains rather than be absorbed by the soil.

The Society is calling on owners to consider permeable paving and to use more potted plants when gardens

are already paved.

### NEIGHBOURHOODALERT

Action Fraud has seen an increase in the number of small to medium sized businesses being contacted by fake bailiffs requesting payments for a phantom debt.

The scam involves the business being cold called from someone purporting they are bailiffs working on behalf of a court, attempting to recover funds for a non-existent debt. The caller will then request payment by means of bank transfer and if this is refused, will threaten to visit the premises to recover the debt that is owed.

A range of different businesses are being targeted; including Nurseries, Manufacturers, Hotels and Taxi Services.

### **Protect Yourself**

- Confirm what the debt is regarding; bailiffs are only used to recover certain debts such as council tax, child support and compensation orders. Bailiffs are not used to recover debts relating to private advertisement; these would be collected by debt collectors. Debt collectors do not have the same legal powers as bailiffs and will not have special court authorisation to act. For more details regarding this, please look at the <u>Citizens Advice</u> <u>website</u>.
- Double check with the Court or originating company to confirm whether the suspects are legitimate; if you use a landline


make sure you hear the dialling tone prior to dialling as the suspects could still be on the line.

- Request details of the debt in writing to access its legitimacy.
- Do not feel rushed or intimidated to make a decision based on a phone call.

#### NEIGHBOURHOODALERT

Cumbria Trading Standards has received numerous reports of letters being sent to Cumbrian consumers which claim to come from the People's Postcode Lottery and state



that the recipient has won over £800,000.

A consumer reports that when he contacted the number on the letter he was told to send £1,900 and his winnings would then be paid into his bank account or he would receive a cheque.

These letters come from scammers and consumers should never send money or give out personal bank details or other information. If you receive one of these letters please report it to Trading Standards via the Citizens Advice Consumer Helpline on 03454 04 05 06 or visit www.adviceguide.org.uk

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warning residents in the Sedbergh and surrounding areas, of doorstep sellers.

There have been reports of sales people from a solar panel company using high pressure selling techniques.

The law gives rights to consumers in relation to doorstep selling, which is usually a 14 day cooling off period for goods and services over £42 (there are some exceptions). Reports received indicate that the sales people involved are pressurising consumers to waiver their cancellation rights.

If residents are considering having such works carried out at their homes, the best advice is to shop around and obtain quotes from local

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companies which may have been recommended, rather than agree to use an unknown company which may use very persuasive but dishonest selling methods. Remember

- Don't let uninvited doorstep sellers of any kind into your home
- Look out for those who are vulnerable within your neighbourhoods and family

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#### SEDBERGH & DISTRICT HISTORY SOCIETY Walk on Frostrow Fell

On the afternoon of Saturday, 23rd May, 15 members of the Sedbergh and District History Society met at High Branthwaites, Frostrow, to be warmly greeted by Barbara Hartley, her husband Derrick, and very warmly by their golden retriever Charlie.

The purpose of the visit was to explore an area (roughly 2 sq km) of the upper Frostrow Fells beyond Low and High Branthwaites (old farmsteads) in order to identify some interesting archaeological remains. Barbara, who guided us on the walk, had studied at Leicester University and had developed a keen interest in





archaeology. Some 10 years ago, having moved to High Branthwaites, she had set about exploring the open fells and, on her first dig, had immediately discovered items probably dating back to the Neolithic/ early Bronze Age periods: a scraper, a brown chert flint (originating, it transpired, from Derbyshire) and a stone polisher (from East Yorkshire). These and other artefacts were passed around the group in the parlour prior to setting out on the walk.

In fine, clear, sunny weather the group climbed the steep bank onto the open rough fell in a south-easterly direction, approximately in line with the bridleway which follows above the course of Holebeck Gill over towards Dent. The first stop was to look at a vaguely rectangular arrangement of stones on a slightly raised area, likely to be the site of a shieling, possibly of Viking origin, where shepherds would have made a rough shelter for their sheep and goats. In close proximity were two others, rounder in shape, but all three with excellent visibility of the hilly pastures. The third of these was next to the spot where Barbara



had used her spade for the first time as part of her archaeological project for the university, finding the Bronze Age lithics just beneath the surface.

After crossing Holebeck Gill two more possible shieling sites were pointed out, as well as a vague line of piles of stones which may have marked an old parish boundary. Climbing further onto the crest of Longstone Fell (OS name) we observed a series of larger clusters of stones, more circular or eliptical in shape, which had all the hallmarks of barrows, or burial chambers. Sited just below the crest of the ridge. probably too high for human habitation, these looked right across the Rawthey and Lune valleys to the Lakeland hills, a possible source of trade through the region of Neolithic stone axes. Also clearly in view on the hillside above us was the ring cairn, again an ancient burial site, actually marked on the OS map.

Our wanderings were not yet over. To the south, back in the Holebeck valley, we reached 'Dry Tarn' – not dry after a wettish spring – a hidden gem of water, seemingly artificially raised, cradled into the hillside. A couple of hundred metres lower down the valley lay another quite extensive area of rough scattered stones, quite possibly evidence of human habitation. This, together with a nearby mysterious semi-circular structure part-obscured by reeds, proved the intriguing culmination of our afternoon's explorations.

Back in Barbara and Derrick's house after nearly 3 hours on the open fell, we were generously treated to tea, cake and wine while ruminating over what we had seen. As Barbara had suggested, it would surely merit an organised dig at some point in the future.

#### SEDBERGH & DISTRICT HISTORY SOCIETY

On a perfect June evening a small group of members congregated in Kirkby Lonsdale market place at the start of a walk around the town. Before we set off, Mike Kingsbury



who was to lead the walk gave some information about our surroundings. He told us that a charter for Kirkby Lonsdale market had been granted in 1227. However, the market had only been on its present site since 1822 when it was created from the gardens of Jackson Hall (now the King's Head Hotel). Before that time it had been situated at the other end of the town where the old market cross now stands. The present market cross. although based on a much older design had been donated in 1905 by Rev. Llewellyn Davies in memory of his wife. Mike drew our attention to the King's Head Hotel which with its elegant Georgian facade is the oldest structure in the market place the other buildings having been



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constructed later in the nineteenth century and in the twentieth century. He also mentioned that we would see very few pre 18<sup>th</sup> century architectural features in the town centre, due to the fact that there had been two major fires in the town over the centuries. the most disastrous of which had destroyed much of Main Street in 1776.

Leaving the market place, we walked westwards up New Road which had been built in 1821by cutting through the site of the recently burnt down Rose and Crown Inn. On the left hand side of the road Mike pointed out a former Sandemanian Chapel which now houses the town's library. At the top of New Road is Abbot Hall Farm, one of the oldest buildings in the town. It was rebuilt in 1632 and retains some original features. Turning left, we walked part of the way down Mitchelgate which was originally the main road to Burton. We passed some small houses which were built in the 18<sup>th</sup> century as dwellings and workshops. A right turn took us back to New Road. Crossing the road, we entered an alleyway called Tram Lane This

led to the southern end of Main Street where Mike showed us a Grade 11 listed milestone. This informed us that we were 250 miles from London.

As Mike guided us back past the market place and along the shopping area of Main Street, he mentioned that only one building (the one which was now an ironmonger's and garden shop) had escaped the 1776 fire and the modernisation of the reconstructed street. We followed Market Street around to Fairbanks which had been the turnpike road to Kendal. Our route then took us through the churchyard and past St Mary's, the mediaeval parish church, named after St Mary's Abbey in York which had owned land in the town. A few steps from the churchvard Ruskin's View provided an impressive panorama of the Lune Valley on such a lovely, warm, still evening.

The final section of Mike's guided walk took us to the area east of Main Street. Street names like Swinemarket, Horsemarket and Cattlemarket indicate that this had been the trading hub of the town and the old market cross stands in a small square on Mill Lane. There is no evidence of the seven mills that had Apple Macintosh & iPad Help & Advice

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been situated on Mill Brow, a steep hill which leads down to a ford across the river. Halfway down the hill is The Old Manor House, a substantial dwelling with a 17<sup>th</sup> century decorated front and evidence of an earlier building inside. At the bottom of Swinemarket a narrow thoroughfare called Jingling Lane led back to the market place.

Thanks were due to Mike for giving us such an interesting evening. Even members who thought that they knew Kirkby Lonsdale quite well learnt a considerable amount about the history and layout of this attractive town.

To celebrate the recent successful OFSTED report, in which the school was judged GOOD in ALL areas, staff and governors of Grayrigg School treated the children to a fun day of circus skills with Hull based company "AVAGO CIRCUS". The school has been through a sustained period of improvement since being judged inadequate by OFSTED in June 2012. The new staff team and head teacher, Kirsty Cooper have thoroughly enjoyed the challenges of the last few years and are pleased



with the OFSTED outcome. Mrs Cooper said

"It has been an amazing journey and I can't thank the staff, governors and parents more for the loyalty and commitment they have shown towards our school. I love leading our unique small school, where no child is ever invisible."

School leaders were particularly pleased that the OFSTED inspection recognised the school's strength in developing the whole child.

"The head teacher knows every pupil at the school very well. She is highly ambitious for each pupil's personal development and academic achievement." OFSTED APRIL 2015 All staff agree that the challenges of



the last three years have been outweighed by the rewards of working with such wonderful children. In a letter to the children the head teacher wrote

"There are times when I have worried, there are times when I have even cried over the past few years but every time things have been hard, I only have walk into my classroom to know why the hard work is so important. After long, challenging (and a little bit boring) meetings with important people - it is you lot that have kept everyone going. You have embraced all the changes we have made and given us some great advice. Most importantly, you make every day at GRAYRIGG fun filled and fantastic."

The Ofsted also recognised how the school uses its rural location to get the best out of the children...

"Pupils experience a rich and vibrant curriculum. Learning outdoors, trips and visitors to the school capture the imagination of pupils. For example, caving forms an integral part of the science investigation for Key Stage 2 pupils this term. All pupils participate in weekly outdoor learning, usually in a nearby forest. This teaches pupils to assess risks in their own locality, while learning about science, natural history, geography and enhancing their skills in design and technology." OFSTED 2015

The staff and children had a wonderful day learning circus skills the children even managed to get

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their head teacher on the tight rope and a unicycle. Mrs Cooper said

#### SEDBERGH SCHOOL NEWS

The second half of the term is still occupied by exams, but the year begins to run down. Once the last year pupils have finished their exams they tend to go home, unless they have sporting or other fixtures to meet, returning only for the Leavers' Ball at the end of the month. Next year's officials such as prefects and captains start to move up to practice

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their responsibilities.

At the Prep School Year 8 (1<sup>st</sup> form for those of us still unable to cope with years) went to France for half term. This had an unfortunate effect for Mel Sproul and Elle Heathcote who both had starred at the Athletics District Trials and had an excellent chance of selection for the County Team. They were away in France at the time of the County Championships. But they are young enough to try again next year in the same age group. Also starring was Lydia Huby (year 7) in the Blackburn Festival of Music, Speech and Drama. She won her piano class with the highest mark across all the junior classes and came third in singing. She was elected sole representative of Blackburn Diocese at the national final of the Prayer Book Society's Cranmer Awards early in 2016.

In the week before half term the junior half of the upper School put on a production of *Killed*, a play about a boy who got lost in the melee of the battlefield in 1916 and was shot for cowardice. An effective end was the roll of honour played slowly down the screen (which included my great

uncle). Speech Day was the true beginning of summer - a perfect day with Sedbergh showing itself off to its best advantage, lunch on the House lawns, and sports in perfect weather. The speaker was Lt. Col. the Rev'd Nicholas Mercer who was Liberty Human Rights Lawyer 2012 for his work in high-lighti8ng human rights abuse during the Iraq war. Hw spoke about education as a right preserved by the Human Rights Act, and concern about its recall. Also on Speech Day there was an impressive exhibition by the Design and Technology Department, which included a table made for Evans House hall, and a coffee table for the Headmaster's study.

Despite the First XI's bad time during the first half of the term they emerged as T20 champions for the North West. They also beat Lancaster Grammar by 7 wickets. Winder won the house match by 7 wickets against Evans. The sailors, having had to battle with gale force winds earlier in the term had to content with almost no wind at all at Bassenthwaite. Three girls have been selected for the Junior Regional Performance hockey trials at Durham. Johnny Camplbell who won the Wilson run came second in the Hawkshead 10 k run in 34 min 43 sec. Alastair Crossdale and Alex Moon have been selected to the England under 18 rugby team on tour to South Africa, and Old Sedberghian Alex Wootton (left in 2012) gained his

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first full international cap playing in the Irish Rugby Sevens team.

William Ross won a gold medal and Charlie Bell won a bronze medal in the National Biology awards. Four pupils competed against 16 Northern schools in the Salters' chemistry Day and came second overall. George Wainwright is a finalist in the TDI Challenge putting him in the top six in the country for his outstanding DT project.

Once every year the School hosts a Minor Counties Cricket match, and this year it will take place on  $5^{th}$ ,  $6^{th}$  and  $7^{th}$  July, and with be Cumberland v Lincolnshire.

A combined force of almost 60 boys, girls, staff and parents from both the upper School and the Prep School volunteered for the Great Northern Swim in aid of the Great North Air Ambulance on 14th June. The ladies' team came first by three minutes, the mixed team second and the male team third. £4,500 was raised f or the Great North Air Ambulance. Powell House's Tug of War competition in aid of Hope and Homes for Children, their chosen charity, took place on the same day. As well as the tugs of war there were inflatables, penalty shootout, Zorb balls, stock, a tombola and ice cream, hotdogs and drinks. It was very successful and perhaps not surprisingly Powell House won. We look forward to a strong challenge from the Town next year. The event raised over £2,000 for the charity Hope and Homes

At the Prep School the successful Fayre took place, again on 14<sup>th</sup> June. And on 26<sup>th</sup> June they will host The Big Sing 2015 involving 6 local schools plus pupils from the Prep School. There will be some 300 children taking part. The Prep School is also putting on two performances of Romeo and Juliet on 26<sup>th</sup> and 27<sup>th</sup> June.

During the School Holidays there



are still events taking place. The CCF Army and RAF will be attending camp. Year 10 will be making a Battlefields Trip. There will be a trip to the orphanage the School supports in Kenya. The cricketers will be performing at the BOWS festival at Oakham, and A1 XI are taking part in the National North of England T20 finals at Netherfield. Then there is a cricket tour to Barbados. The Chapel Choir are making a trip to Paris. There is an expedition to Bolivia with the intention of climbing a volcano. The shooters will attend the Bisley Schools' Meeting, and the Imperial Meeting at Bisley. There is also a Rugby Tour to South Africa.

Once every year the School hosts a Minor Counties Cricket match, and

this year it will take place on  $5^{th}$ ,  $6^{th}$  and  $7^{th}$  July, and with be Cumberland v Lincolnshire.

The National Children's Orchestra will be here again between 7-15 August. This year it will be the under 13s and they usually give a free "concert" in Powell Hall on their last day, which is really their dress rehearsal for the concerts they will give elsewhere. #### SEDBERGH COMMUNITY SWIFTS

The weather in May and June has been unseasonably chilly, and there have been fewer parties of swifts seen flying around than we would usually expect at this time of year. But in July the swifts are feeding their chicks, so they will be going in and out of their nest sites more frequently, giving us a better chance of catching sight of them as they fly up to their nests in eaves. Swift nests are hidden in nooks and crannies on top of walls so the birds are never seen on the nest.

For the best view of them, go and see the pairs that are nesting in the eaves on the south side of Sedbergh School library on Loftus Hill. Stand in the car park and look up at the eaves and you'll see them swooping in at speed. There are could well be parties of screaming swifts hurtling around as well. The best time to go is morning and late evening, although as the month progresses, the chicks need more frequent feeding and you may see them throughout the day. (In June there were some sparrows nesting there too.)

The swifts that fly high in the skies over town are feeding on insects, much like aerial plankton, including troublesome gnats and midges! The screaming parties that zoom around at lower level are an indication that there may be nest sites nearby, and include non-breeding birds that are prospecting for sites for next year. As we stroll around the area looking

for nest sites, we'll be wearing these 'Ask me about Swifts' badges, so do please stop us and have a chat. And if you would like to help us, please get in touch (see below).

We need to preserve nest sites because so many have been lost during renovations of buildings, when the entrance holes in crevices, often unintentionally, get blocked up. We also are seeking places to put up swift boxes, let us know if you would like to do this - modern buildings are suitable too. And remember, swifts are not messy birds (unlike swallows and house martins!).

We must make the most of enjoying our wonderful swifts over the next few weeks because by the end of July, or early August, our swifts will be departing for their long migration back to Africa. Swifts are only here long enough to raise just one brood of 2-3 chicks, which is why it's so important to look after them. Having hatched around mid-June, the chicks spend 6

weeks in the nest before making that momentous maiden flight into the great blue yonder.

Don't hesitate to get in touch for help and advice, about what you can do: please help save our swifts and make Sedbergh, Dent and all the surrounding area swift-friendly:

We have at least one anonymous donor! There have been three donations into our bank account where we cannot thank the donor because they have not revealed their identity. May we take this opportunity of using The Lookaround to say a huge thank you to that lovely - and secret – person, and indeed to all our wonderful supporters.

Further good news is that the British Heart Foundation has given us the go -ahead to buy four more defibrillators at a reduced rate. We already have the required equipment to fill four more 'kit bags', but because we are only allowed to use North West Ambulance Service approved bags (which are in short supply!) we are still waiting to be in a position to set up five full sets of kit. And we have another pager sponsor.

So what's in a bag? (I hear you ask). A cylinder of oxygen, a variety of oxygen masks and tubes, bandages and dressings, a pulse oximeter – the thing they sometimes put on your finger in hospital. As well as taking your pulse it measures the level of oxygen in your blood.

Gloves, antibacterial gel, scissors and



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more - including maps.

We have been setting up maps of the area. Most of us think we know Sedbergh quite well, but our town centre is full of nooks and crannies, strange numbering systems and houses with names and no numbers. It all needs documenting. And that's just the town centre! Those of you in remoter spots are sometimes wellhidden up and down single track lanes. One of our jobs as First Responders is to speed the access of the ambulance to your property- not helped if we've just blocked the access ourselves, so we are trying to 'learn' our patch. One of the requirements of a First Responder is to undertake on-going training. Some

On training- we have recently bought a training defibrillator. This enables us to hone up our own training and to train others. Personally, I was curious about and possibly a little afraid of this machine which I knew was capable of doing something dramatic. We'll soon be out and about and showing it to you and your group or organisation, so you can see for yourself how simple it is to use. And it won't let you use it unless it is necessary to do so. I think that's probably what worried me about it. Again the contact details are at the end of this article.

It's probably worth mentioning that we can't 'Respond' to you as individuals! That doesn't mean we're not going to talk to you or help you, but it is a requirement that you have called an ambulance and they then call us. By the time you read this we will have at least one pager and more sre on order. We are called out by either the pager or telephone, having 'signed in' to show our availability. Although a team of nine or fourteen sounds encouraging, we still need more if we are to provide 24 / 7 coverage. 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## SIGHT ADVICE SOUTH LAKELAND

My name is Scott Hemsley and I am the Community Development Coordinator for Sight Advice South Lakes based at Stricklandgate House, Kendal. My main role is to visit people at home who are starting to struggle with their sight. I am able to demonstrate a variety aids to help people keep their independence.

Having effective lighting is a good starting point, as well as making sure there is good contrast in the house. I have some Daylight and LED task lights to demonstrate; I often get a "wow" when I turn them on as they can make a big difference. I have a range of easy to see phones and talking devices such as clocks. watches, mobile phones and Boombox talking book machines. If you have been to your optician, got the best reading glasses possible, and are still struggling to read small print, we have a Low Vision Clinic where you can access free magnification. If you are housebound, you can have a domiciliary visit from

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an optician. We run three Positive Step Groups each year which help people who have been newly diagnosed with sight loss find out which services are available for them. Sight Advice South Lakes has a well

established support group that meets at the People's Hall in Sedbergh on the third Tuesday of the month in the afternoon. It is good to talk with other people who have a sight problem and realise

that you are not on your own. If you are interested in any of the activities mentioned, or if you would just like a chat, please phone me on 01539 742633 (Monday to Thursday).

## MAY WEATHER

What a month!! It can be summed up as wet and windy! With 6.3 inches in total and only 9 days on which rain was not measured it was not a typical May. On the 2<sup>nd</sup> half an inch fell in less than  $\frac{1}{2}$  an hour driven by a gale It was extremely windy also throughout the month and although all bar one day the maximum gust was from the North West it was a cold wind. On the 1<sup>st</sup> of the month the wind chill took the over night temperature down to 21F (-6.5C)!! Everyday had winds in double figures in mph and 6 in 20+mph and many more in the high teens. Temperatures varied from a high of 70F(21C) to a low of 31.1F(-0.5).

Certainly grass struggled to grow and the sheep were eating it as fast as it appeared. Usually May is a very green month with all the new growth on the trees but this year the seasons are running about a fortnight late. The May blossom was only just bursting into bloom by the end of the month. A lady from Sedbergh school came looking for wild flowers unsuccessfully. Last year, at the same time, she got an armful. There was a good show of dandelions, eventually. The bees love these for their nectar and pollen. I have killed a few queen wasps but there haven't been hordes as yet. Butterflies are still a rarity. The sparrows have young in the nest though "our" resident was very late in getting started nesting. The Blue tit is sat on 9 eggs in a box in the yard. The blackbirds have eggs in a nest in the shippon. Lets hope the seasons catch up with themselves.
