COUNCILLORS REPORT

Politics is always odd in the lee of a general election and this year has been the oddest in my adult lifetime. With both Labour and the Lib Dems now being led by the MPs whom the Tory front bench would have chosen for the roles the strangeness continues. Nationally the timeframe will soon focus on May 2020 but at the grass-roots level the next round of local elections is always more pressing.

Meanwhile, it is good that there was very little business for the Respect Group when it met last week. As to whether the dragon of the Appleby Horse Fair has finally been slain only time will tell. Complacency is dangerous but we should not arm

ourselves for another 2008 if that is never to be repeated. Minor tweaking of the protocols is required but relatively little.

The South Lakeland insistence on risk assessing private water supplies remains a continuing sore. I asked a long series of questions at the last full council and received some comprehensive answers but, the mechanism set up by the EU and National government is not and cannot be fair. The district council is piggy in the middle. It has engaged contractors to carry out the assessments but ultimately it is the private supply owners who will have to pay. And, there's the rub. The contract was entered into on a basis of best value to the council, but there

was no assessment of value to the owners of private supplies.

By the time you read this Station Road should have been re-surfaced and work done for the parish to improve the garden in front of Joss Lane Car Park. Both 16 to 18 transport and broadband access for Dent and Garsdale remain topics of major concern.

Housing within the National Park will come under the spotlight as the latest Local Plan meanders its way through the official processes. That almost all of the hideous policies adopted in 1989 are to be axed must be good. That the body which is charged with looking after one of our most precious landscapes has spent a quarter of a century at war with its most progressive residents is not. There were times when I was on the park authority when I and others were threatened with court action if we approved much less contentious applications than some which are

dales and let them return to a more "natural" state, along with the reintroduction of wild boars and lynxs. For me, although it initially sounds exciting, this is simply naïve, it ignores the amazing work that our farmers do to keep the landscape around here as beautiful as it is. Allowing it to go wild, apart from putting many farmers out of work. would have massive consequences on our food production, our tourism industry and our countryside, most of them not positive. I would love the chance to meet up with Mr Packham and discuss this properly.

The day after the Show was the Torchlight Procession in Kendal and I was really proud to be able walk, along with my children, around Kendal as part of the Organ Donor float. There is a campaign to make Kendal the first organ donor town in the country with over 1000 signed up donors by May next year. I don't know if people from Sedbergh signing up counts towards the total but if you would like to become a donor don't let the fact that you don't live in Kendal stand in your way. NATIONAL PARK NOTES Unbelievably, almost two years on we are still waiting for the Government's decision as to whether or not to confirm the Planning Inspector's recommendation to extend the existing National Park boundaries to include the Northern Howgill Fells, the Orton Fells, the Leck Fells and the area around Barbon and Casterton. The Tory administration is coming under increased pressure from both national and local bodies and organisations to stop dragging its feet on this issue and it is hoped that the combined effect of a relatively new DEFRA Secretary of State and the fact that the MP for Penrith and the Borders, Rory Stewart, is the Minister now

responsible for National Parks will hasten a final decision. Until then local businesses (especially those in the hospitality sector) are unable to make long term plans for the future of their enterprises. The Cumbrian part of the Park as it stands at the moment ie Sedbergh, Dent and Garsdale were, until 1974, part of the West Riding of Yorkshire and the proposed new areas will take in parts of what were previously Westmorland and, in the case of Leck, still part of Lancashire. Whilst no-one seems to be seriously suggesting that Sedbergh and District should return to Yorkshire (it is in fact still part of the West Riding as this was never legally abolished) there are likely to be still further dislocations to county and

regional loyalties in the not too distant future if the move towards Cumbria becoming a Unitary Authority continues to gather momentum. This could mean Cumbria as it now stands en bloc becoming such an Authority or perhaps could mean a split between North and South or even East and West! There could be a very interesting debate ahead.

Connected with this theme is that 1st August every year is Yorkshire Day. This year it was celebrated in Dent and those of us who were there in the Yorkshire-flag bedecked streets of Dent Town heard the Yorkshire Declaration read out by a member of the Yorkshire Ridings Society and then had the "privilege" of singing all nine verses of Ilklev Moor Baht'At the Yorkshire anthem. It was a reet grand day out..... At the Sedbergh Parish Council meeting following this event I asked the Parish Council if it would be willing to organise a similar event in Sedbergh in 2016. The



Council had no objections to such an occasion happening but did not wish to take the initiative to organise it itself. Which was fair enough. Councillors asked me if I would be willing to take responsibility for organising it and I said that I would. So this is a call for volunteers. Pam explained the aims and objectives of the appeal, gave us an insight into its 'logistics', and paid tribute to all the different people who gave of their time and skills to provide the range of items each box contains. We were then tasked with packing these items into a number of appropriately decorated shoeboxes which would then be transported to Rumania before Christmas to bring a ray of hope into the lives of those children where none previously existed.

Last year 10,133 shoeboxes were

to be in individual glass cases were now largely displayed in large enclosed 'dioramas', grouped together with other creatures from the same environment. Of particular interest to us on our Centenary Day were two old bicycles, the pennyfarthing and the bone-shaker (we think,) which some of the original WI members might have ridden in 1915. We were puzzled as to how anyone could have actually got onto the penny-farthing, much less ridden it.

The museum is now part of Kendal College and is used by students for education and training, as is the Castle Dairy close by. 'Dairy' in this instance is probably a corruption of the word 'Dowery' and it is likely that

it was a dower house for widows of the barons of Kendal. The building is ancient, dating partly from the 14th century, and fascinating with a wealth of old beams and uneven floors, especially in the bedroom housing a four-poster bed, with a cupboard which leans in precariously towards it. NEWS FROM SEDBERGH MEDICAL PRACTICE

Once again this year, as well as the normal flu injections, if eligible we will also be offering the shingles vaccination and the nasal flu vaccine for children. We will be able to fit these in with the existing Flu clinics which take place at the surgery on Saturday 10th October between 9am-11am as walk in clinics.

If you are unable to attend the Saturday morning clinics we are offering a **walk in** service during our normal opening times **8.30am**– **6.30pm**, you may experience a short wait at busy times.

The patients eligible for the seasonal flu vaccination are those patients aged 65 and over on 31st March 2016, pregnant women, those patients aged 6 months to 64 years defined as at risk.

Children aged 2, 3 and 4 years old on 31st August 2015 (but not aged less than two or aged 5 or over) who





are not in the seasonal flu at risk groups are eligible for a nasal flu vaccination - these can be given in the Saturday morning clinics or alternatively please telephone the surgery for an appointment. **(01539 718191)**

From 1 September 2015, the **shingles vaccine** will be offered routinely to people aged 70, and the catch up will extend to those aged 78. In addition, patients who were eligible for immunisation in the first 2 years of the programme but have not yet been vaccinated against shingles, remain eligible until their 80th birthday. These groups are: people aged 71 and 72 on 1st September 2015; people aged 79. Other age groups will be introduced in future years to ensure that all patients aged 70-79 are offered the vaccination.

Flu clinics may be subject to change if delivery of vaccines is delayed.

FARFIELD HOW IT ALL STARTED (2)

In March 1997 we anxiously awaited the Arts Lottery's response to our latest bid for funds to restore the Mills at Farfield. We phoned them up. The reply was short and to the point.

Sorry we are not making any lottery decisions until May because of the election. Lottery decisions apparently had political implications!

I have just been looking at the very first article in the Lookaround in March 1993 about the Farfield project. It was about a splendid dinner at the Masonic Hall attended by 60 guests to launch our ideas about the future of the Farfield Mill building. It says that after the dinner, *"the audience was roused by a* fighting speech which not only made it clear that the cause was a worthy one, but that it would require the active commitment of Sedbergh people to save a valuable asset not only for the town, but for the heritage of industrial Britain." There followed a lecture by Mike Davies-Shiel explaining that it was in the Yorkshire Dales that the Industrial Revolution began and Sedbergh was at the forefront. It had at one time five textile mills but Farfield is the only mill not only in Sedbergh but in the whole of the Yorkshire Dales that is still in production after over 150 years. We really felt our project was about

Sedbergh, but during those years from 1993 to 1996 when we were busy trying to find the money we were



a very much aware that our committee was not really representative of Sedbergh. We wanted this to be a Sedbergh project, even though it was a mile and a half outside the town centre.

Sedbergh has a split personality. To many in the rest of England, Scotland and Wales, and even the Far East. Sedbergh IS Sedbergh School which owns three guarters of the property and land in Sedbergh. Apart from the school there are the offcomers (incomers?), many of them retired, like myself, but still with enough energy to want to do something for a place they really love and have made their own. Then there are those born and bred in Sedbergh, the Capsticks, the Metcalfes, the Woofs, I believe that at one time in the19th century something like 29 out of 30 of the pupils at Cautley school were called Woof. (Perhaps someone has Westmorland Gazette press cutting that tells this story.) We had asked Sedbergh School to find someone to go onto the committee and they had proposed Richard Thomas but we had not managed to find a real 'local' to join us so it became very important to involve the town. We approached the Parish Council. They were sceptical but very supportive. We could hardly blame them.

While we awaited news from the Arts Lottery we did not stand still. Hands up those who remember the 'Rural Challenge'? Not many I wager. I think Richard Ellis will remember it. It was a competition in 1996 for one million pounds, no less, to any community in Cumbria who could show they needed it for economic

development. Richard Ellis produced a magnificent publication with on the cover an inspiring picture of a voungster striding across the fells, a picture of hope. The Challenge project was initiated by the S&DBPT and we brought together the Parish Council and Sedbergh School (that was an achievement in itself) to bid for £1,000,000 to upgrade the Peoples Hall and the Community Office and build an athletics track on Sedbergh School land, Richard Ellis and Alan Pratt presented our bid to nine members of Cumbria Council who were undoubtedly impressed that without paid consultants we had prepared what they told us was the best presentation. However we narrowly lost out to Alston, who were

By May 1997 we knew the future of the whole project was in the hands of the Arts Lottery. We assembled round the phone and got them on the line. "The Farfield Project? Oh Yes. "Great idea! We love it! We are likely to support it but not I am afraid until after you have had the buildings restored, so do that first. Try again then". We were devastated. This was not just a loss of Arts Lottery money, it meant also the loss of half a million pounds from the Heritage Lottery and the ERDF because their money was dependent on us receiving the Arts Lottery grant.

At the next board meeting, our treasurer announced that the only

money we had was £3923.90 and we had loans of £4209 to repay. He very sensibly advised us to give up. It was good advice. We had hit a brick wall after four years work, and the hope we had raised in the community. We had to find a solution. It came in the form of a great supporter, Peter Sarginson, former principal of West Dean College, who knew well the world of grant giving trusts and enabled us to secure our first major grant towards the purchase of the building. We opened the doors of the untidy third floor of Farfield Mill and welcomed people in.

SEDBERGH COMMUNITY SWIFTS

While our swifts are in Africa for the winter we have a golden opportunity to create new nest sites for them ready for their return next spring. Many people tell us how there used to be far more screaming parties hurtling around Sedbergh and it would be wonderful if we could make Sedbergh once again a haven for swifts.

For birds that weigh only 40 gm $(1\frac{1}{2}$ oz) and make a roundtrip of 14,000 miles to breed here, surely we have a duty to help them. Most of us believe in helping wildlife and improving the environment, and now we have a practical way of putting this into action for swifts. Just caring won't change things – doing something will.

Although swifts' natural nest sites are in the crevices in older buildings, they do take to boxes. So we urge everyone to consider putting some up, especially if you





are planning some building work or outside decorating anyway. Modern properties are just as suitable. The best position for boxes is under the eaves or on gables, as swifts look for nesting places higher up on buildings. Doing this over the winter means that there would new sites for young swifts that are prospecting for the first

time next spring. We usually have a stock of special wooden boxes available and they are simple to fix on the wall. The Stimpson box we recommend is robust, and made by a swift enthusiast in his workshop. We are always happy to help and to discuss possibilities, so please don't hesitate to get in touch with us. If you are having scaffolding at your property, it would be a perfect chance to install a few boxes.

If you are having an extension built, or re-roofing, then consider installing hollow swift nest bricks into the top of the wall, as has been done in the gable at the far end of the new People's Hall gym. They are easily incorporated while building is in progress and do not compromise the structure or insulation of the property. Swifts seem to prefer these and all that is seen from the outside is an oval entrance hole. Please ask us for advice.

If you are lucky enough to have swifts nesting already, and repairs are needed, then please do this outside the nesting season of May to August. And most importantly, please don't mortar up their entrance holes – insulation of the building will not be affected.

Swifts are faithful to their site, returning year after year to the exact same place. But if their entrance holes get blocked up they cannot get in, and as they are not very adaptable, they become homeless. This is believed to be the reason for the serious decline in swifts – over 40% in the last 20 years.

- This is the ideal time to put up swift boxes, before the swifts return at the beginning of May.
- If you are doing building work especially if you have scaffolding, consider installing external or internal swift boxes.
- If you already have swifts, avoid doing building work while the swifts are here (May-August).

LIFE IN THE SLOW LANES

Driving the Western Dales Bus The August Lookaround published an account by Barbara Allwright of what it's like to be a volunteer driver for the Western Dales Bus. Here is a further section of her diary, describing some of her more recent experiences.

Saturday 5th August, morning shift: 564A to Kendal

A very autumnal start to the day even though it is only the beginning of August, but the day improved as I drove along. A lot of leaves turning red and yellow, bright red berries on the rowan trees – don't they know it is only the beginning of August? There are still lots of wild flowers out. In Sedbergh there were lots of people waiting to go to Kendal, but they all got on... Thank goodness, as I don't like leaving people behind. What a long queue for fuel at Morrisons when I got there - I decided to have lunch first which was a good choice as noone was wanting fuel then.

Sunday 9th August: 56AB to Cautley

Only two short runs but eventful. So many cars coming along Dentdale that I began to think I was driving the wrong way! Into Dent I followed a very slow Landrover and on the way down from the station an even slower flock of sheep. They must have escaped from a field as they trotted along and then went into an open field. A full bus from the station, with many passengers walking either to or from Cautley, but all of them safely picked up on the way back and delivered to the station in time for their train. The weather turned out better than forecast so they had had a relaxing (?) walk.

Saturday 22nd August, afternoon shift: 564A to Kendal

A pleasant run into Kendal and almost full on the way back to Dent. However on Lilymere corner we stopped for an accident. A motorcyclist had skidded and come off his bike. He was not hurt and someone else had stopped as well so we left him in good hands. It was not a UK plate and he must have been going slowly because he was not injured, just shocked. We carried on, quite full, and at Oxenholme we collected a family, pushchair and bags going to Sedbergh. On the last run back from Dent Station I had plenty of space on the bus – just one passenger.

Tuesday 9th September : 546C to Hawes

At last, a chance to drive on the Hawes run. I have been looking forward to this for ages. A brilliant day in Sedbergh but once we got to The Moorcock the weather changed to cold, overcast and generally not nice. Almost like going through a curtain. The market was all along the main road making the last part of the



journey quite slow. On the return we were expecting one passenger who didn't turn up, so we waited a while, but he must have had a lift home. Once we passed The Moorcock again out came the sun and away went the cold. Coming back seemed to take ages, there was a lot of slow moving traffic, cars, tractors, verge cutting lorries, people parking opposite junctions and at bus stops. But we were not deterred and arrived back only 5 minutes later than published. Sunday 13th September: 546B to Cautley

The mist that had settled at the bottom of the valley made it an autumnal start to the day, but it quickly cleared and by the time I got to Dent Station it had gone. Only a few passengers going to Cautley or Sedbergh where we came across the Sheepfest dragon and followed it along Finkle Street and up Main Street before losing it as it moved into the car park; we carried on towards Maryfell. Although dry and sunny lower down it became very cold and windy on the top of the hills. However all those dropped off were safely collected again and delivered to Dent Station.

couple of meadow browns in the field. I haven't seen any bats around our entry this year so far. Badgers are digging most nights in the field though we haven't seen much evidence of a fox around the chicken run as I had to bury and old bird that died. There are plenty of sparrows at the feeding station, some tits and a frequent nuthatch at present. The swallows were congregating on the wires as if they are ready for their journey south. My new swarms seem to be



progressing. Let's hope I can feed them up enough to see them through the winter. Around the country people are having to feed this month which is rather unusual. We often expect a June gap when the nectar flow is reduced and the queen might stop laying but it seems it is August this year. Further evidence being that there are few drones about as they have obviously been booted out already.

OCTOBER GARDENING

I have great plans, that next year will be the year when I conquer all the stray brambles and wild raspberry canes which have increasingly taken over the furthest reaches of the garden. In the meantime I shall concentrate on cutting back any trailing bramble shoots and raspberry canes that I find in the wrong place, and then turn my attention to the cultivated canes, and prune those so that they will be well ordered, and produce a good crop of berries for next year.

Raspberry canes are very easy and very satisfying to prune. The summer fruiting ones, which are the type which I grow, need to have all the brown, fruited canes – those which

show the side spurs which have born this year's flowers and fruit – cut back to ground level. This leaves space for the new canes which are green and straight and un-branched, to grow. If you have a multitude of stems, leave the strongest, tallest ones, and prune out and thin weedy ones so that all the growing power goes into those which remain. Autumn fruiting varieties (which do not quite get into the way of fruiting before winter strikes in this garden) are cut down to the ground in winter so that they produce a new crop of fruiting canes from the bare earth in spring. Apart from fruiting varieties, there are several ornamental species worthy of garden cultivation. Rubus 'Benenden', a fine shrub with arching



stems bearing large, pure white, saucer shaped flowers is my favourite and R. odorata and R. speciosa 'Olympic Double', both bearing deep pink flowers are also useful. R. *tricolor* makes excellent. evergreen ground cover, even underneath trees, and for winter stem colour, the "Whitewashed Brambles". R. thibetanus, R.biflorus and R.cockburnianus are hard to beat (although they can be quite challenging to prune) For the avid bramble connoisseur there are pink and double pink forms of the common bramble. I remember being presented with one of these by a keen member of the Northern Horticultural Society when I had charge of the arboretum and woodland at Harlow Carr gardens. Anxious that it might take over, I'm afraid to say that the garden Superintendent and I agreed that we would try to test it to destruction on a very difficult area of banking. We succeeded. Where to start with Ada Salter? She was a true radical, campaigner for equal rights, socialist, republican, pacifist, environmentalist, trade union activist and a leading light in the transformation of the Bermondsey slums in the early part of the twentieth century.

Born into Methodism, she became a Quaker in 1914. She and her GP husband, Alfred Salter, dedicated

their lives to the people of Bermondsey, London. They lived and worked right in the heart of that deprived community, having to accept the tragic consequences of their choice.

Ada broke through the glass ceiling of her time, becoming both the first woman councillor in London and then the first woman mayor.

Red Flag over Bermondsey explores both the private and the public lives of Ada from 1909 until 1922, interwoven with her beloved Ira Sankey hymns and her passion for Handel.

The performance lasts 65 minutes without interval. Doors open at 6pm for refreshments and the performance will start at 6.30pm. Please allow time for parking at the top of the lane and

WESTERN DALES BUS News

The new Lottery-funded Western Dales Bus has arrived, and will be undertaking its first service at the beginning of October. As well as being easily accessible for pushchairs and wheelchairs, it also provides a much more comfortable ride for passengers. And with two more seats than the previous bus, it is better able to cater for everyone who wants to use it on a Saturday.

At the same time as the new bus comes into service, some timetable changes are coming into effect from 1st October. The Saturday service between Dent Station and Kendal includes additional stops at Maryfell. Some of these are by request to the driver on the day, as is the last journey of the day at 1840 between Sedbergh and Dent Station.

The service to Hawes on Tuesday – market day – will also be running through the winter. It will continue to serve Dent, but not Cowgill, and will leave Hawes at 1300 instead of 1330. It will also stop at different places in Sedbergh, picking up and putting down at Morphets/Spar, the Library/ Dalesman and at Maryfell, instead of at the junction of Main Street and Joss Lane.

The summer Sunday service between Dent Station and Cautlev will not be running through the winter, however. It has been popular with visitors, particularly from West Yorkshire, bringing a number of them

COMMUNITY TRUST UPDATE

The skateboarding park project A public consultation on the skateboarding park project, has been held.

Letters and feedback questionnaires were distributed to about 60 households immediately adjacent to the field. Sixteen replies were received comprising two outright objections, four unconditional approvals and 10 which were either undecided or had reservations about the proposed location.

A number of Trustees armed with information sheets, petition forms and display boards, discussed the project with interested members of the community at the weekly market in the morning.

Subsequently a public meeting was held at Peoples Hall in the evening, attended by about 50 to 60 people. The project was explained, and the young people attending demonstrated the various uses of the park, followed by a question and answer session. The meeting concluded by agreeing



that there was general support for the project, although with significant reservations about the precise location.

The petition resulted in over 200 signatures in support. *Community Trust Awards*

Following requests from the public, trustees have decided to publish details of the distribution of proceeds from the charity shops to local organisations, on a quarterly basis. *Charity shops*

Fallen leaves - the Scourge of Sedbergh.

Did you know that.

In Sedbergh, for hundreds of years ,fallen leaves were removed by men using "brooms" and " rakes."

The menace of fallen leaves, of course, is that they are completely silent and so, today, old-fashioned, quiet attempts at dealing with the threat are not considered adequate. Hence, the latest anti-leaf systems which can fight the soundless invaders by directing continuous ear-shattering noise at them through powered leaf blowers.

Head of Sedbergh Fallen Leaves Unit (F.L.U.), "Decibel" Joe Blatter explains : "The leaves lie there without making a sound sometimes in clumps. As early as possible in the morning we send in combat squads .The leaves don't know what hits them. By making as much noise as possible and for as long as possible we are able to neutralise the danger - until the next time! We're aware that there could even be a risk to ourselves from the blowers, but it's something that we have to accept so that the people of Sedbergh can sleep safely in their beds (or not)".
