THE FUTURE IS BRIGHT THE FUTURE IS BS 381C No 539

As the Dale is having a bit of a spruce up at the moment with road repairs, verge tree removal and filling in some gaps in the walls, Garsdale Parish Council thought that it would be a nice idea to repaint the rather faded telephone box on the street. Clerk was duly instructed to ask BT for permission to carry out the necessaries and after trawling through mountains of 'customer help desks', none of which purported to help parish councils paint telephone boxes, clerk eventually found an obscure site about payphones and

sent off an email. Clerk was amazed that just 2 days later, a reply was received granting permission. What a result! We could get a couple of volunteers together one day and give the box a wash and rub down, slap a couple of coats of paint on and 'Bob's your uncle', job done.

However, reading further, apparently we had to comply with the guidelines set out in Appendix A, 'see attached' it said, and by the way, BT accepts no responsibility for anything. Fair dues, we thought, it's only a phone box and unless Doctor Who is in residence, what harm can come of it?

After downloading the 3 detailed pages of instructions, I have made a much abbreviated version: Step 1. Take photos Step 2. Cover all internal components.

Step 3. Remove all external vegetation and debris after advising the owner of such vegetation and debris, giving him/her the opportunity of removing it him/herself. No chemicals can be used and no damage to parent plants. A polite and considerate approach to the public shall be maintained.

Step 4. Sheet around the housing to prevent paint debris escaping work area, no doubt after erecting warning signs: 'Danger! Loose paint on the run!'

Step 5. Guarding and warning arrangements must be provided. Is there anyone who has a WWII helmet and an Enfield rifle who can stand



watch for us, and has anyone got one of those wind up air raid sirens? Step 6. Display conspicuous notices "Wet Paint – Housing out of Service". Dr Who will have to stay somewhere else for awhile.

Step 7. All waste to be disposed according to "Environmental Protection Act 1990".

Step 8. No paintwork to be stripped by chemical means, only by mechanical means agreed with BT with no risk of exposing any person to health risks. Methods should be in place to protect the public or operator from lead poisoning... we'll have to dig out that old deep sea diving gear out again with the breathing apparatus, then. Leave the site clear of debris at the end of each working day....and here's thinking we'll be done and dusted in a day, this could take all year!

Step 9. Ensure edges of the power guard are sealed to preclude ingress of liquid during cleaning and all surfaces to be clean, dry and free from corrosion. No painting in temperatures under 7 degrees. Better wait for a heat wave, then, as it rarely gets over 7 degrees in Garsdale.

Step 10. Do not paint door hinge straps or arm joints, whatever they are and paint to be applied according to manufactures' instructions, what, more instructions?

Step 11. Only external quality fillers to be used, compatible with the paint system, allowing adequate time for curing before painting abiding by appropriate safety precautions as indicated by the paint manufacturer such as "external use only, do not

Step 12. Sheet protection shall be applied to neighbouring properties and floor areas. Better order some more sheets then if we have to cover all the houses in Garsdale.

Step 13. Apply 2 coats of finish paint, housing to be first painted in BS 381C No 454 then one coat in red (Yippee, at long last!) to BS 381C No 539. Step 14. White to be applied to ceiling areas down to ventilation openings with a clean horizontal break line to corner pillars, black to external base.

Step 15. Remove all drips, except Dr Who, from glass, floors and pavements if they've managed to sneak past all that sheeting!

Step 16. Make sure all regulations are adhered to with regard to Health and Safety to others and yourselves especially in accordance with 'Control of Lead at Work Regulations 1998'. Step 17. Take photos.

TIM FARRON MP

A lot of my time this month has been taken up with issues raised by farmers. Now I know farmers can grumble a bit but in this case they really do have good reasons and one of the main ones is the Rural Payments Agency.

The more I look into the problems that farmers have with getting their payments from the Rural Payments Agency the more convinced I become that the Agency really isn't fit for purpose. Shambolic is one of the milder words I have used to describe the way that they operate.

Over the past 10 years we have seen over 300 farmers get out of dairy farming in Cumbria. That is nearly a third of all the dairy farms in

Cumbria. I know that there is meant to be a global glut of milk at the moment but surely we cannot afford to lose nearly a third of our dairy farmers over such a short period of time.

But to be frank who can blame them? Milk prices are simply too low for them to make any money. One of the key things that has been helping many of them through is the farm payments they are meant to receive from the Rural Payments Agency and so when this body fails to do its job then wouldn't you give up too if you were in their position?

Sadly, it's not just dairy farmers who are affected by the problems with the payments agency. The latest figures suggest that nearly 20% of all farmers have still to receive their 2015 payment. If you are unlucky enough to farm on common land (and quite a few farmers do in Cumbria) then you will almost certainly still be waiting for your payment as the Agency has decided that common land is more complicated and so will have to wait until all the other payments are sorted.

I have written one of my more strongly worded letters to the DEFRA Minister in charge asking him to sort things out. What makes it worse is the agency is pressing farmers to start to complete their applications for their 2016 money, but if they have not had a response to their 2015 application how do they know what to put into the one for this year? The man in charge of the RPA earns nearly £160, 000 per year, much much more than almost all farmers in

South Cumbria. For this I think farmers expect a much better service.

Away from farming another issue that I have been working on is the state of our roads. When the flood waters dried up we all noticed a lot of new potholes but despite all of their promises the Government has reduced the amount of money that Cumbria County Council will have available to repair them by almost £1 million compared to last year. If you pardon the pun that is a very big hole for the council to fill. I am doing all I can to help the council find the extra money that they will need.

possible about wider drainage networks leading down off the fells and across fields to understand the causes of flooding. The houses that were affected by Storm Desmond in Sedbergh were not located near the river but close to the culvert that runs from the playing field near the People's Hall, underneath the Doctors' Surgery and Spar and past Guldrey. There is ongoing work with cameras lowered down into the culvert to understand what may have caused the water to spring up in the Guldrey area. Similar work has been done around Loftus Hill.

However, there is probably a wealth of information contained in people's heads that might help the council

form a better picture of where water runs in periods of high rainfall. Landowners are the obvious first port of call to find out what happens on their own land but there may be other sources of information - former lengthsmen, people who work or used to work on the land, old maps of the railway and other documents.

The council will have a database showing where all the gullies (the metal road drains) are on the highways themselves and how these connect to carrier drains but there is missing information about what happens when the water is directed off the highway and across the adjacent farmland. Should anyone have information about this sort of drainage that they feel might help

PEOPLE'S HALL

CAN YOU HELP? THE PEOPLE'S HALL?? ... to keep the People's Hall open???

It will be seen from the report of the People's Hall AGM and the Management Meeting held the same day that the Committee has been unable to fill the vital vacancy of Treasurer

In 2005 the Hall Committee faced a similar problem just after I took over as Chair. The number of Trustees had dwindled to a number too few for the Hall to continue to serve the users in our community. An Emergency General Meeting was called in April 2005 of all the then users of the Hall with the message that unless new

Trustees came forward the Hall might have to reduce its availability or even close down. The users responded splendidly and full Committee membership was achieved. Some of those new Trustees are still serving, such as Anne Petyt, Kath Swift and Gina Barney (for Josie Templeman). And Sean Hobson has just retired.

The People's Hall is in a slightly different, but similar situation today. Although we have ten Trustees, their present commitments to the Hall and elsewhere does not allow us the fill the posts of Treasurer and Bookings Secretary from their number. We are therefore calling on two people in our Community to offer themselves for these tasks.

To help let me explain the tasks. **TREASURER**

As you would expect the Treasurer keeps the books, manages the invoices, payments, etc. just as treasurers of other organisations and bodies in the Town also do. The activity is continuous, but not intense and only fills a half page on the monthly bank statements. The most active time is at the year-end in September. To give an idea the turnover in 2015 was under £16.000. The "books" are currently kept in ledger form, but could easily be converted to spreadsheet form. This would be an ideal opportunity for anyone interested in acquiring spreadsheet experience as training is available. The work only concerns the General Account. The high turnover of the last three years (some £350.000) concerned with the Redevelopment Work is handled by our Secretary (Gina Barney).

BOOKING SECRETARY

The Booking Secretary "runs" the booking system. The task is: receives booking requests, checks them, gives provisional confirmation, issues an invoice, confirms the hire when payment is received and passes the payment to the Treasurer. The work is not intense, but generally requires a weekly activity. There are occasions when advice is given to hirers, usually new ones, regarding facilities and costs. This task could be part of the Treasurer's role. At the present time, day to day activity is focussed through the Sleepy Elephant, who act as the Hall's booking agent.

I am sure there are folk in Town,

who could help us. We make this appeal now and warn that we can only manage between us for a short time. If no help is offered we will need to call an Emergency General Meeting in June to find a solution, including closing the Hall.

If anyone wishes to discuss the tasks, please contact me, or our Secretary (Gina Barney on 015396 20790) or Elspeth Griffiths (on 20677), who we are grateful to for standing in at the moment, and she can give guidance.



For Morsheda's family living on low-lying islands in the Brahmaputra River, floods are a terrifying part of everyday life. Morsheda can't even count on having a safe place to call home: the single-room, corrugated-iron house she shares with her children has been flooded four times. She savs 'I feel very scared of the river. When I look at it I keep thinking "it is coming". If I could raise my house then I would feel much safer living here with my children.'

precarious life. They know that the floods will come again, and soon. But we can lift our neighbours like Morsheda to safety.

Just £250 is enough for a Christian Aid Home Safety Package. It could flood-proof Morsheda's home, raising it eight foot on an earth plinth, so that she has a safe place to rebuild, keep livestock and grow crops. It could also buy a goat, seeds and a wormery to help produce compost – all of which will give her a long-term income and a solid foundation for a new life.

Locally we have become more aware of the devastating impact of flooding on individuals and families and how much bit of help from others, known and unknown, can lift the spirits and raise a sense of hope in the bleakness of hardship. That kind of help is what Christian Aid is about.

We were all keen to take part in a





Members old and new were welcomed to Sedbergh Peoples Hall on the occasion of the S&DBKA 2015 AGM on 24th March . Club Chair, Enid Hastings began the meeting with an interesting overview of the challenges faced by bees and beekeepers across the country, with the weather being responsible for many of the problems encountered. Not surprisingly, Honeybees cannot forage in cold, windy conditions, let alone in the rain. A whole year of regularly inclement weather resulted in poorly mated queens, fewer worker bees and lack of nectar - it was being washed out of the flowers by



the never ending rain. In August warnings were issued by the British Beekeeping Association, informing us that honeybee colonies were starving. Their recommendation was to feed them early to ensure that they would be strong and healthy going into winter. Varroa mites & deformed wing virus remain a threat, while small hive beetle and the Asian hornet still threaten from across the Chanel.

The Lunesdale trophy, for the most successful number of entries in our annual Honey Show, was awarded to Kevin Seward.

The Novice trophy was awarded to Nick Fecitt, in recognition of a very trying first year of beekeeping.

The Elgin trophy, for our Beekeeper of the Year, was awarded to Tommy Brooks. Tommy does a fantastic job supporting the club & its members. He is always there at our coffee mornings at the URC with cakes made by his family and always prepared to help members old & new, sharing his wealth of knowledge & experience.

The Secretary gave her report on club events through 2015. We had a busy year including; our club supper at The Pheasant, Casterton, a talk from David Walmsley from Furness Beekeepers, many interesting apiary meetings, club BBQ and our annual coffee morning. Our show season kicked off with Sedbergh Gala, followed by a whole weekend at Country Fest, a lovely day at Sizergh Castle for their NGS day and the Lunesdale show.

Also in 2015, the club have

developed a new website, which is proving successful and Louise has set up a club Facebook page. Our beginners' beekeeping course was also a success, run over ten weeks at Barbon Village Hall, it gave new members a good grounding on which to start their beekeeping journey and older members a chance to brush up on particular topics.

The Treasurer reported our membership figures for 2016 in addition to the clubs financial standing and accounts for 2015. Purchases in 2015 included tables and a new observation hive. The observation hive has been a great investment and has attracted many visitors to our stand at the various different shows.

Officers were elected and AOB discussed.

We would like to be able to have a club Apiary (a place where bees & beehives are kept) in Sedbergh, where members can meet and which we can open to those interested in beekeeping, for a couple of hours on a Saturday/Sunday morning. Traditionally beekeepers paid land rent in Honey for the use of small parcels of land; alternatively we could pay a small annual rent.

Winter is over (probably) and the Wildlife Trust reserves have survived the floods very well. A little maintenance is needed but on the whole wild places are good at looking after themselves. It is the human habitats that suffer so badly in adverse conditions. Wild places are generally more resilient. The work the Wildlife Trust is doing, such as restoring bogs and restoring damaged peat in the uplands, is helping to keep rainwater on the land,

slowing it from cascading downstream into homes.

Now reserves are looking forward to Spring, the most exciting time of the year. Most reserves are open for everyone to enjoy. Our closest reserve is Burns Beck Moss near Killington. This little reserve of raised and valley mires provides a quiet habitat for many animal and plant species and is well worth a visit. A network of board walks allows you to keep your feet dry while you spot birds and butterflies and very pretty flowers.

Slightly further afield is Foulshaw Moss near Witherslack on the A590. The restoration of this large area of wetland is virtually complete, with boardwalks and viewing platforms.



SEDBERGH COMMUNITY SWIFTS

"They're back!" the message goes around when our swifts return once more in early May, after their epic 7,000 mile journey back from Africa. The joyful sound of the screaming parties as they fly high in the sky is truly a herald of summer, and it is often this that alerts us to their return.


If you are lucky enough to have swifts nesting in your house, please celebrate your good fortune. As someone said recently: 'If you wrote an advert for a house mate, you couldn't wish for better than swifts. They don't make a mess, are only around for 3 months of the year, and devour thousands of midges and other insects each day.'!

The breeding swifts are the first to arrive, homing in to the nest site that they haven't seen for 9 months. It is the prospecting swifts, those that are not yet old enough to breed (2-4 years old), that we are hoping to tempt to the various boxes and nest bricks that have been put up, and they tend to arrive later. They will be looking for nest sites for future years, and practise their technique by repeatedly flying up to entrance holes, and sometimes even clinging on to stonework or boxes for a second or so.

Eggs tend to be laid by the end of May, with chicks hatching around the middle of June and the young fledging at the end of July. Both adults return to the nest each night, which is why the hour before dusk can be a good time to spot them darting into their nest sites. Once the chicks have hatched the adults can be seen at other times of day too,

returning with throat pouches full of insects.

An excellent project has been completed at Settlebeck School, who are enthusiastic about helping swifts. with no less than eleven boxes being put up in 4 different places at the school. Because of the height, a scissor lift had to be used and we are grateful to Gary Allan who did the job admirably on a very cold day. The boxes are on a front gable overlooking the drive, on a side wall facing Maryfell flats, and on a gable at the back, above a balcony, overlooking the garden and tennis courts (easily visible from the public path between the tennis courts and the school). Three of the boxes are on the back of the Cottage.



overlooking the primary school playground, so the children there will be able to take part too. We thank the YDNP Sustainable Development Fund for supporting this project.

We now hope that the school children and staff will keep a vigilant eye on the boxes to see if any swifts are prospecting. Swifts, like all wildlife, are unpredictable, so the more people who keep glancing at the boxes, the better. If you are passing by it would be a great help if you could let us know if you see any swifts there – ring or email details below.

The same goes for the swift bricks at the People's Hall (in the gym's end gable, facing Woodside Avenue). Lots of folk use the playing field and playground, so keep looking up and tell us what you see.

We would also like to hear from you if you see any screaming parties of swifts anywhere, ie. low-level tightly-

knit groups of swifts hurtling past. They are an indication that swifts may be breeding nearby.

We are also still keen to discover more places – in Dent and throughout the district as well - where swifts may have natural nests, and we could do with more helpers. If you would like to

help, but maybe are a bit unsure about swifts, come along for a brief session watching the swifts that breed under the eaves at Sedbergh School library, facing Loftus Hill car park. Meet us in Loftus Hill car park on Thursday May 19th at 8pm (weather permitting). We

may also have a short walk to other sites, especially if it's fine. Contact SCS to check on the time.

As always, if you have any building work planned, please use the opportunity to put up swift boxes. The aspect (N/S/E/W) does not matter, so long as there is a clear fly-in (no big trees in front). We're happy to call round and advise if you wish.

We will be at Sedbergh Gala on Saturday May 21st, next to the YDNP tent, so do please pop along and have a chat.

WESTERN DALES BUS

Summer Services

Western Dales Bus is staring a new service this summer. On Fridays, beginning on 5th May, the bus will connect Sedbergh and Dent with Ravenstonedale and Kirby Stephen. On this route – numbered S4 – it will also connect with both the 1034 train from Leeds and the 1250 train to Leeds at Kirkby Stephen station.

The Tuesday service to Hawes – now numbered S3 – will continue as at present with slight changes to the

timings. From the beginning of May, the outward journey times are all 15 minutes earlier, so that the bus will now leave Dent at 0930 and Sedbergh at 0945, with the return journey leaving the Hawes Countryside Centre 25 minutes earlier at 1235. These changes will enable the bus to take passengers to Garsdale station in time to catch the 1302 train to Leeds.

On Sundays, the service between Dent station and Cautley – now called S2 – will be running again as it did last summer, with the addition of extra return journeys between Sedbergh and Dent at lunchtime, leaving Sedbergh at 1145 and 1615, and Dent at 1210 and 1645.

The Saturday service – now S1 – between Sedbergh, Dent station and Kendal will continue as before, but there will be a special Early Bird fare for those who travel into Kendal on the 0815 service from Sedbergh. See

By empowering communities and helping people to engage with and conserve their local wildlife, the new Meadow Links project aims to build 'stepping stones' between existing fragmented wildlife havens to enable the movement of species.

Local charity Yorkshire Dales Millennium Trust (YDMT) will work in partnership with Buglife, Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority (YDNPA), Natural England and community groups on this initiative to help wildlife thrive.

Tanya St. Pierre, Meadow Links project officer at YDMT, said: "As part of this project we'd like to work with community groups in the Yorkshire Dales to create ten flagship meadows. We'll help groups to create a wildlife meadow in their own community space, provide funding for equipment and 'Sow, grow and mow' practical training sessions to enable groups to maintain their meadows in years to come. So if you have a group of willing volunteers and an accessible public space about the size of a tennis court, we'd love to hear from you."

Homeowners and landowners are also being called on to help create 30 additional wildlife patches that will act as stepping stones at strategic points to extend the wildflower highways. These patches can be any shape or size, from linear hedgerows and verges to small back gardens, and

could incorporate bird boxes, hogitats (hedgehog habitats), ponds and wildflower areas to support wildlife.

Tanya added: "Since the 1930s we've lost 97% of the UK's hav meadows. Iconic Dales' birds such as the curlew have declined by 42%, 60% of England's flowering plants are decreasing and overall a staggering 60% of UK wildlife is declining. The wildlife patches will give nature a helping hand by connecting fragmented habitat and providing important feeding and nesting sites for our wildlife. Prizes will be awarded for the most innovative design features and best overall wildlife patch, so keep photo diaries of what vou've done!"

Conservation work undertaken

through the Meadow Links project will be mapped and recorded onto the ecological networks and connectivity GIS systems for the YDNPA and Buglife's national B-Lines database. This will help provide a clear picture of the work done, and the areas where further action needs to be taken to create a cohesive and resilient network for wildlife.

Paul Evans, B-Lines Manager at Buglife, said: "Here at Buglife we have mapped the existing network of wildflower-rich pathways – or B-Lines - that crisscross the UK's countryside, towns and cities. By creating new wildflower-rich habitats in strategically important locations across the Yorkshire Dales, the Meadow Links project will help to extend and



improve the national B-Lines network. helping our pollinators and other wildlife move across the landscape."

Meadow Links is an 18 month project that will run until October 2017, supported by the D'Oyly Carte Charitable Trust. It will form part of YDMT's celebrations to mark 10 vears of meadow restoration and education through the Hay Time project. So far the charity has helped to restore over 600 hectares of hav meadows across the Yorkshire Dales and Forest of Bowland, with another 55 hectares planned this summer.

Karen Griffiths, the Authority's Interpretation Officer, said: "For decades, lead mining played a massive part in the shaping of the landscape and the communities in the National Park.

"This free app, which has been mainly funded by Historic England, is an absolute must for anyone who wants to learn about the industry while they are actually walking around the sites. It's like having your own personal tour guide.

"Among other things, the app contains archive images, descriptions of the sites and OS location maps of key sites ranging from Grassington miners' cottages to the Old Gang peat store in Swaledale. There are also audio trails, walking routes, activities for children and useful visitor information such as places to eat, accommodation links, public toilets and car parks.

"Looking after these extensive industrial remains is not easy and we are grateful to Historic England for helping to fund so much of the conservation work carried out over the past 20 years. Recently this work

has been managed through the Yorkshire Dales Industrial Monument Management Scheme, which began in 2012 and is due for completion in 2016."

Yvonne Luke, Heritage At Risk officer at Historic England said, "The app is fun and easy to use with photos that help bring the sites to life so we think it will appeal to a wider audience than traditional history books. This is also our way of saying a big thank you to all the volunteers who have worked so hard conserving these fabulous landmarks in the Dales. Members of the Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority's planning committee unanimously approved a scheme to demolish existing buildings I number of conditions. and put up five local occupancy homes in Kings Yard in Sedbergh.

The plans also include the construction of a two-storey commercial building containing six units to be occupied by service sector businesses.

The meeting heard that the application had the support of Sedbergh Parish Council, South Lakeland District Council and Historic England.

The second application – for the conversion of a roadside barn at High Beeston Barn outside Kettlewell into a two-bedroom home for local occupancy – was also approved unanimously.

contained more flexible guidelines to promote local affordable housing and to help communities face the future.

"Members have been unanimous in supporting the new Local Plan and they are already using the more flexible policies that it contains to approve new housing and roadside barn conversions for local people.

"Schemes like the two approved today not only benefit local people who want to live and work in the National Park but they also support local jobs and so benefit the local economy."

The Local Plan, which is the Authority's 15-year strategy for sustainable development in the National Park, has been formally submitted to the Secretary of State for Communities and Local Government. An inspector has now been appointed to examine whether the Plan is justified by the evidence, conforms to national policy and is otherwise effective and fit for purpose.

The inspector will chair a series of public round-table hearings later this year with objectors and officers of the Authority and will then write a report of examination that will be published by the Authority, probably during summer. The Authority is hoping for a positive outcome so it can adopt the new plan and fully implement it to support sustainable development in the National Park.

B4RN

Broadband Update

Last month our broad brush account outlined the scheme. We can begin reporting progress now.

The beginning of everything is to get fibre up Barbondale from Casterton. The technical people call this setting up the "backhaul", which means making the link with the wider B4RN network to the south. Tim Wood is leading this effort and is working closely with the Casterton and Barbon groups, and with local landowners who are giving full support. Crucially, the resources for this work are now available which is substantial progress.

Permission has been received from Dent School Governors to place a

'cabinet' on Dent School property. This cabinet will house the incoming fibre and have a function equivalent to that of a telephone exchange. The exact site is being chosen at the moment.

There is important movement on the funding front, funding that is for the extended network. Applications are being submitted, and we should know soon how they are being received.

A final note on the finance side concerns local backing. To date, a total of £18,000 has been offered by people living in the dales, and this is before any invitation to give financial support has been put out. Belief in this project is coming through clearly; this cash is evidence, as is the extended team of 35 or more

volunteers now involved.

In preparation for digging, preliminary routing maps for the network have been devised. These will be used as no more than starting points for discussion between landowners and team leaders, so that the most convenient and the best routes can be settled on. It's landowners who know their land and can make sure the right decisions are made.

Lastly, there's been discussion as to the most suitable way to describe this broadband initiative. 'Superfast' is a word that gets used all the time, and the speeds claimed in association with it are between 24 and 80 megabits. The B4RN service of fibre (not copper) to everyone's door

provides 1,000 megabits, a service that can justifiably be thought of as 'futureproof'. So 'Hyperfast' seems the appropriate term. Hyperfast Broadband for Dentdale & Garsdale it is then.

May is a favourite month of mine for How canst thou bide to see him visiting Woodland Gardens – those places which specialize in flowering trees and shrubs and understory plants which do most of their blooming and growing before the leaves on the trees above them expand and cut out the light.

former bears bell shaped, white flowers which hang from the bare stems just before the new leaves open and the latter has panicles of creamy white flowers (rather like very open lilac flowers)born with the fresh green leaves.

Some of the most colourful shrubs at their best at this time of the year are those with brightly coloured spring foliage. Look for *Pieris* 'Forest Flame' and *P*. 'Firecrest' both of which have evergreen, dark green leaves and bright red, fading to pink, then cream, new foliage. *P*. 'Flaming Silver' also has red new growth but matured leaves are margined with white. *Physocarpus*, a shrub resembling a currant bush is another

excellent foliage plant with two colour forms. *P*. 'Diabolo' has deep, plum purple leaves which make an excellent foil for many other plants. I like the combination of this and pinky purple flowers of "Martagon Lilies" and an under planting of "Lily of the valley" and blue/pink flowered *Pulmonaria* (Lung wort). *Physocarpus* 'Luteus' is a bright golden yellow leaved cultivar which looks at its best in light shade. The leaves burn and brown at the edges if exposed to full sun.

Rhododendrons are, of course, coming into their own this month. Well planted woodland gardens in the Lake District area often include some of the more unusual species and *R*.

macabeanum is one of the most striking. Flowers, in large round heads are yellow, fading to cream, and are born above the big, (1ft long) woolly backed leaves. R. falconeri is similarly impressive with yellow, purple blotched flowers and massive, broad, deeply veined leaves, dark green above, and felted, rusty red undersides.

The Lake District soil (acid) and climate (moist!) is ideal for many of these plants. Good gardens to visit are Stagshaw (National Trust) near Ambleside, and Holehird at Troutbeck. Elaine Horne

MARCH WEATHER

Well March "many weathers"

a bit of everything including, surprisingly, an official drought when we had 14 dry days!! We actually finished up with 3.22 inches (82mm) of rain, which was more than enough to keep the mud going even after such a dry spell, which shows how high the water table still is. Atmospheric pressure varied which was reflected in the variable winds recorded with maximum gusts from 20.6mph to 7.4 mph. Maximum temperatures varied from a high of 60.6F (16C) to a low of 41F (5C). On the minimum side these varied from a low of 25.9F (-3C) to a high of 41.7F (5C). On all but 3 nights the wind chill took temperatures below freezing.

The cold weather rather held back certainly lived up to its name! We had the spring somewhat. The snowdrops

continued to flower and later in the month the daffodils put on a golden show. I say that but although that is the overall picture we have many shades from white to near orange and types from singles to complex doubles. This reminds me that many. many years ago we had a nice double daffodil and a very dark orange narcissus in our garden. I thought it would be nice to have an orange double. So I set about trying to produce one. I duly transferred the pollen from one to the other then covered up the flower so no further pollination could take place. Eventually the flower faded and seeds developed. When these matured I collected them and when

Imagine my disappointment when the resulting flowers were nothing like either of the parents in colour or shape!! Back to last month. SEDBERGH SHARE CLUB?

Have you ever fancied buying and selling shares but not sure what to do or couldn't afford it?

A share club is the ideal answer.







Before moving to Garsdale, I was actively involved in 2 share clubs and thoroughly enjoyed the experience but travelling back to Nottingham to attend meetings is proving too much.

I am looking to set up a club, based around Sedbergh, meeting every other month in a local hostelry and am looking to recruit 20 to 25 members, of any age and gender. The rules setting up a club are fairly flexible but generally consist of starting with a name, organising a schedule of meetings, electing a chairman, secretary, treasurer and possibly a trader, and deciding rules of membership.

Once the organizing is done, regular

meetings occur usually every 2 months and last around an hour, followed by a meal. After the usual reports from officers, three nominated members propose a share, backed by research, and a vote is taken on which share to buy. Three more members then 'volunteer' to propose a share for the next meeting.

Each member invests a set amount each month, usually around £50, which allows at least £2,000 to be spent on shares at each meeting. As the portfolio builds, dividends are accrued and shares may be sold to either be taken as a windfall or to be reinvested in more shares.


