logging companies, leading to acrimonious mass resignations. Boy, was council in a mess! Thoughts of cosy little chats with a few locals over the odd brew, writing a few notes down about planning applications, flew out of the window. Suddenly, my first council meeting, not knowing anyone or anything about Garsdale,

was rapidly becoming a nightmare of huge proportions.

I arrived at the village hall for my first meeting, clutching pen and paper, way too early. I had no key so I prepared to wait outside in absolute darkness for someone to arrive. "Who are you?" barked a voice from the depths. Already nervous, I jumped a mile in the air, pens and paper flying everywhere. The darkness was absolutely impenetrable, no lights, no moon or stars, as I scanned round to see who was there. "Erm, the new clerk" I finally muttered. "Kevin. District Councillor" was the brief response. Now, that had to be one of the most bizarre experiences of my life, trying to conduct a conversation with

someone you didn't know and couldn't actually see, about things I hadn't got a clue. The next twenty minutes felt like twenty hours until, mercifully, a wobbly torchlight emerged through the gate, heralding a key holder in the form of Tom, the vice chairman. A quick flash of his torch showed the face of "Kevin", who I had been valiantly trying to talk to. "Kevin, Phil" muttered Tom in greeting, letting us into the hall.

As there were just a handful of us, the meeting was conducted in the kitchen to the sounds of a heater rattling away in the corner. I poured myself a glass of water and was about to take a sip when the cry came up "don't drink it, it might kill you!" Thinking it was a joke, I



laughed but looking round, I saw that they were deadly serious. I put the glass down and slunk back onto my chair. After that, I didn't utter a word and after about 90 minutes, the meeting broke up. I looked at my notes in despair, how on earth was I going to write up the minutes from the hieroglyphics scrawled across the page? The meeting had been a kind of free for all, with lots of different conversations about people and places. Apparently, there were lots of "Metcalfe's" and "Middleton's", but not necessarily all the same families, with lots of "John's" and "David's" thrown in for good measure. Then there were the place names. Garsdale is the name of the dale but also the village, there were no street names

I took advantage of the last few weeks of the Parliamentary recess to get out and about as much as I could. So whether you came along to tell me about something you needed my help with, to say "hello" or just cheered me along a bit in the fell races that I took part in (I didn't come last and am feeling rather good about that) thank vou so much.

If you think about it being an MP is

really all about meeting people, hearing what they have to say, finding out where I can help and then going off to meet with other people to start sorting the issues out. So I try really hard to ensure that I get as much time out meeting people as I can.

Much of the start of September was spent meeting people to talk about the problems caused by the closure of the New Road car park in Kendal. I fully understand the need for the car park to close but then I also understand the concerns felt by people who use it. But if the car park isn't safe and if it is illegal for the council to let people park there then letting it continue in its current form is really not an option. It just leaves the council vulnerable to massive costs if

anything goes wrong and it would be all of us who had to pay then not just the people who use the car park.

We can debate at length the timings of decision making and the wisdom of spending money to make the area more attractive to visitors and residents but the key issue going forward has to be solving the parking problem that is being created. To be honest I do think that the council has done a good job there, they have listened to what people have said and are putting in place a lot of really good discounts for everyone who needs to park all day in the centre of town, not just those who can squeeze into a space on New Road. Taken altogether these measures should benefit a lot more than just the people who get into Kendal early enough to find a space on New Road. However, I am conscious that guite a few users will come from outside Kendal from places like Sedbergh and Dent and that they may not have been able to make their voices heard as the meetings have tended to be in town. If you are one of those then please do get in touch and let me know your thoughts.

We had a great day at the County Show. I took the opportunity to launch our "Save the Family Farm" petition. A lot of farmers have been telling me how worried they are about how things seem to be going with the Brexit negotiations. Currently they receive £3.8 billion in support from the EU, the Government has committed to continue this until 2020. But that is only one year after we will actually leave the EU so it really isn't a commitment at all. Added to which if Scaffolding

COUNCILLOR CORNER

Just when you thought you would escape this year without a report on Himalayan Balsam, here it is, a look back over 2017 with a mix of success stories and 'Groan' moments when I realise just how much there is still to be done.

As a quick recap, Himalayan Balsam

is a fast-growing, pink-flowering, invasive species that spreads along riverbanks to become a monoculture, crowding out native species and, when it dies back with the first hard frost, leaving the banks bare and exposed to erosion from winter storms. It appears in May, flowers from late June to September with the flowers turning to explosive seeds which spread the plant to the surrounding area or float downstream to colonise new areas.

Anyone can do their bit from May to August, pulling up the plant (it has very shallow roots) and breaking off / snipping off the roots. The two separate bits of the plants cannot regenerate and piles of plants quickly rot down.

The good news? The areas where work started up to four years ago are largely clear of Balsam and just need monitoring each year, pulling up the occasional plants that have reseeded or have germinated from seeds brought down from upstream. These include areas at the top of the catchment near Newbiggin, places on the River Clough through Garsdale, in Jubilee Wood at the top of Settlebeck and from Settlebeck School towards Millthrop Bridge. There have been work parties in various areas and on my many trips I have seen that there are other individuals out there doing their bit

The bad news? Seeds carried downstream by Storm Desmond (and other storms) in December 2015 tended not to germinate last summer (2016), but did germinate this summer (2017) so large areas I thought I had cleared of Balsam were full of plants this year. Plus a realisation of the size of areas of Balsam still to be tackled to the west of Sedbergh around Shacklabank and Havera Beck; to the east around Ashbeck; and to the southwest, near the junction of the Rawthey and the Lune downstream from Middleton Bridge.

One has to be philosophical – I was out 'Balsam Bashing' on sixty days this summer and if each time I go out I pull up a few hundred or a few thousand plants then year on year there will be more areas that are relatively clear and fewer 'Groan' moments. And one shouldn't underestimate the joy of being somewhere so beautiful, with the occasional glimpse of a kingfisher and some stunning scenery rising up from the river – it makes a welcome break from dusty committee rooms.

Wendy's first slide was of a painting by Henry Sowerby done from the top of Black Horse Hill, where we see so many people stopped in the layby taking photographs of the view.

Wendy told us why the Howgills have their distinctive shape and we saw photos of them from various sides. She then gave us a brief geology lesson on how and when the different rock layers were laid down in shallow seas and what happens when the land on one side of a valley rises and the other falls as in Barbondale. We were shown slides of limestone pavements which are common in this area , an early one of the Buttertubs and Gaping Ghyll cave.

We enjoyed photos of Wendy as a teenager with friends at various of these sites while on holiday in the Dales all that time ago. Little did she think she would one day return to this area to live.

Grants support Dales Communities Sarah Pettifer

Grants of up to £1500 are available to help community groups in and around the Yorkshire Dales to develop new and existing initiatives that benefit local people.

Local charity Yorkshire Dales Millennium Trust (YDMT) will distribute funds through the Roger Stott Community Grant programme to support small voluntary organisations and community groups with an annual income of less than £30,000.

The aim is to deliver real benefits to communities across the region. Funding can be used to cover revenue expenses such as staff costs, rent or training, or for capital investment in assets such as furniture, computers or catering equipment, to name just a few. No match-funding is required, so groups can apply for up to 100% of the total

project costs.

The grant programme was launched in March 2016 in memory of Roger Stott, the founding Chairman of YDMT. Since then 42 grants totalling just over £50,000 have been awarded to support a wide variety of projects that are making a real difference to local people in and around the Yorkshire Dales and Nidderdale.

Tanya St. Pierre, YDMT Project Officer, said: "The region is home to many passionate and dedicated individuals with great ideas that have the potential to deliver real benefits to their local community. We can help to get these ideas off the ground and become a reality. I'm looking forward to receiving proposals for projects that will have a big impact for communities in and around the Yorkshire Dales and Nidderdale."

THE NATIONAL MEMORIAL ARBORETUM David Parratt

The National Memorial Arboretum near Alrewas in Staffordshire on the edge of the National Forest is the UK's year-round centre of Remembrance; a spiritually uplifting place which honours the fallen, recognises service and sacrifice, and fosters pride in our country. It is a living and lasting memorial.

Since planting began in 1997, the National Memorial Arboretum has been a special place honouring those who have served, and continue to serve, our nation in many different ways.

It's not a cemetery. It's a place of life, represented by the 30,000 trees

planted here, where older and younger generations alike can wander and wonder.

Covering 150 acres, the Arboretum has something for everyone. For some it's a wonderful place to stroll and enjoy the trees; for others it's a peaceful and beautiful place to remember loved ones, particularly those who made the ultimate sacrifice for their country.

The trees and more than 300 dedicated memorials on the site make the Arboretum a living tribute that will forever acknowledge the personal sacrifices made by the Armed Forces and civil services of this country.

Importantly, the focus isn't totally military. There is a large area devoted

to Police who have fallen while on duty, as well as other areas devoted to the Fire and Rescue and Ambulance services. National charities representing those who have died in particular circumstances, including children, are also to be found in the Arboretum grounds.

The Arboretum was the brainchild of Commander David Childs CBE who wished to see established a national focus for Remembrance. Following a meeting with Group Captain Leonard Cheshire VC, an appeal was launched in 1994 by the then Prime Minister, John Major.

The future of the project became assured when three proposals were agreed. These were: for the site to be the location of the Armed Forces

Memorial; for the Ministry of Defence to pay a significant grant-in-aid to allow for free entry and that The Royal British Legion would accept the gift of the site as the focus for the Nation's year-round Remembrance.

The project began with no money, no land, no staff and no trees. The National Lottery, in the form of the Millennium Commission, granted some forty per cent of the funds needed and this was matched by thousands of donations, both large and small, from a wide variety of organisations both military and civilian, men and women, corporate and voluntary.

The site was developed on reclaimed gravel workings, bordered by the Rivers Trent and Tame, gifted to the charity by Lafarge, which has generously supported the idea from the beginning.

It was created by a staff of thousands: a small paid group; a



dedicated and active Friends of the National Memorial Arboretum organisation; and countless others who have either planted individual trees or helped create a memorial for their organisation. The initial planting took place thanks to grants from the Forestry Commission and the National Forest.

It was once estimated that the involvement of so many supporters made the Arboretum the most popular of all the Millennium projects. It will certainly be one of the longest lasting.

The Arboretum was officially opened to the public in May 2001.

From the start it was seen as a place of joy where the lives of people would be remembered by living trees that would grow and mature in a world at peace.

As planting began in 1997 it seemed appropriate that the site should also celebrate the turn of the century. The Millennium Chapel of Peace and Forgiveness is a central part of the site and was created to offer a place of tranquility and reflection to people of every faith or none.

The Arboretum's planting philosophy has always been inclusive, as can be seen in the many and varied plots. Nearly all were designed in partnership and consultation so that every group could feel a sense of ownership of the memorial to which they had contributed.

Now, more than 10 years on, the



site hosts an abundance of wild plants, woodland areas, grassland, a reed bed and wetland. It is populated by a variety of wildlife including brown hares, skylarks, lapwings, otters, tits and finches, green woodpeckers, buntings and an occasional black redstart. The Wildlife Watch Group meets every month and enjoy activities including, bat detecting evenings, bird watching and walks.

Although many of the trees are still young, they are rapidly growing into a unique living tribute. Every year sees the dedication of new memorials and special events at the Arboretum. Over eighty percent of our visitors surveyed say they will return, many time and again, to see the Arboretum



as it develops.

At 7:30pm on Friday 13th October, there will be a Presentation in the People's Hall on the Arboretum by Mr Tony Parrini in which everyone is welcome to attend. Tickets are £5 available from the TIC or on the door.

DENT MEDITATION CENTRE What Place is there for Dent Meditation Centre Today? Andy Weller, Chair of Trustees Why Meditate?

All of us know the consequence of living life at an increasingly rapid pace, of rushing to make badly considered judgements and then fumbling our way through the impact that our actions have on those around us. Despite our sometimes good intentions we can often feel that we have failed to make an impact or made a bad situation worse.

The ancient practice of Meditation on the other hand can help to promote good mental health by ensuring regular time is put aside for quiet reflection and considered action, ensuring time for relaxation and the slow enjoyment of life as it enfolds. This can greatly improve the quality of life of those who practice it, but also has a wider impact too. This wiser form of living is sometimes criticised as an escape from "real life" rather than what it is, an opportunity to live life at greater depth.

Why Dent Meditation Centre?

The Meditation Centre provides a beautiful and inspiring space for quiet names remain in the grounds of the

reflection and contemplation. It is a place of genuine spiritual enquiry, where beliefs are not imposed or demanded and intellectual curiosity is encouraged. Ritual is used carefully and sparingly to provide safety rather than to impose ideas. There is an emphasis on hospitality, kindness and compassion, which values the unique contributions which each person brings to the centre. It is also a community of people who respect each other's journey wherever this takes them.

This is reflected in the grounds of the Centre which are lovingly tendered by John Stanton so that a multitude of native and non native plants can live together without any one plant being able to dominate or eliminate others. At many times of year the grounds are a riot of colour and pungent scents, full of wildlife and insects including bees and butterflies once common around the Dales but now sadly absent from many of the "improved" green pastures which surround Dent.

The chapel building has retained its name as a testimony to those who toiled to build it, many of whose names remain in the grounds of the





Centre. However there have been important changes to the building since it was first built including the creation of a beautiful space freed from the dark wooden furniture which used to fill it and transparent glass in the windows to allow natural light to flood in. There is now a small kitchen for refreshments, toilets to provide comfort and soft carpets in the school room.

This living building, much used and loved, is kept clean and fresh, with flowers from the garden. The building is kept open all year to allow anyone to share it as a quiet, reflective space. Ultimately the Meditation Centre is more than a building though.... It is about the people who attend courses, teach, meditate and look after it.

The experience of Meditators at the Centre parallels the Seekers who populated Dentdale several centuries before. These religious dissenters were local farmers and artisans who met regularly, waiting silently for divine inspiration. Similarly those who experience the Centre are becoming a spiritual community of seekers after universal Truths, increasingly concerned about the wider world.

Support for this view came from radar studies tracking swifts during their daily dawn and dusk ascents and descents: swifts spiral up to altitudes of up to 2-3 km at night, descending again in the morning. from our view late in the evening. Then, in 2013, a study from the Swiss Ornithological Institute proved that another European swift, the Alpine Swift, remained airborne nonstop for an amazing 6 months during the winter. Alpine swifts are larger than our Common Swift and were capable of carrying a type of geolocator device that also had an accelerometer. thus recording both location and movement. By taking measurements every few minutes, the results showed conclusively that the swifts were constantly active and did not land at all during their migration to, and wintering in, Africa. Up until then such long-lasting locomotive activity had only been reported for animals living in the sea such as whales and dolphins.

But now there is a new record holder, the Common Swift. Last year, with the further advances in miniaturising technology, Swedish researchers were able to fit similar devices on this species as well. And the results proved that Common Swifts could remain in the air continuously throughout the nonbreeding season, staying aloft for a staggering 10 months. They also confirmed the swifts daily dawn and dusk ascents and descents. These studies are finally evidence that they do indeed eat, drink, mate and sleep in the air and land only to breed.

So how do they sleep? Studies on other animals indicate that it varies greatly across species and challenge our notions of sleep altogether. Dolphins and killer whales can go about 3 months without sleep after birth, and they have also been shown to sleep by using only 'half' of their brain. The Great Frigate birds that live off the coast of Ecuador can spend weeks at a time flying over the sea diving for fish, and during that

time have been shown to sleep for a total of only 45 minutes a day, in 10 second bursts, and even then only half their brain may be active. On land they sleep for a minute at a time throughout the day and night

for a total of 12 hours a day. Investigations of Pectoral Sandpipers, a wading bird, have shown them to survive and even thrive for weeks with very little sleep.

It's extremely unlikely that any other species can challenge the common swift's aerial record. However, among common swifts it could be that the juveniles are the true record holders, since they do not breed for anything up to 2-4 years, remaining on the wing all that time.

Wind, snow and floods disrupt our lives every winter. Wind brings down

trees blocking our roads and damaging buildings, water in our homes has forced us out and snow just brings our every day lives to a freezing halt. Wildlife has to cope with these ever changing weather conditions too and so Cumbria Wildlife Trust is urging you to help the wildlife in your garden survive the severe weather this winter. Wildlife can suffer in harsh conditions in many ways. Water shortages are caused by frozen pools, ponds and lakes, and there is a general lack of wild food. Animals that hibernate over the winter can become confused by the swing from warm to cold weather. In particular hedgehogs, the UK's favourite garden visitor, can come out of hibernation far too early, then

expend too much energy to take it through the rest of a cold winter. Shockingly, hedgehogs made it on to the list of UK endangered species last year for the first time. Animals that stay active such as small birds are susceptible to cold snaps. After the cold winter of 1963 it was estimated that 50% to 60% of our small bird population, such as robins and wrens, were lost. Want to know what you can do to help the wildlife in your garden? **Feed your garden birds**

- Use good quality, mixed wild birdseed, peanuts or sunflower seeds.
- Buy fat balls or make your own by mixing leftovers such as cake, breadcrumbs or bits of meat into melted fat and let it set.
- Blackbirds love apples.
- Keep feeding birds regularly, they will often rely on your source of food.
- Water is vital for the survival of birds all year round so keep birdbaths topped up.

Watch out for mammals

 Hedgehogs will be deep in hibernation, so it is essential to leave their safe areas alone. Do not cut back overgrown areas until spring.

- Ponds provide drinking and bathing water for all sorts of animals so keep a hole in frozen ponds.
- Long grass and ivy provide valuable roosting and hiding places for small creatures



Help your pond to breathe

- In autumn and winter it is important to clear fallen leaves to prevent garden ponds clogging up resulting in nutrient overload.
- It is best not to clean out the pond completely as many eggs, grubs and larvae need old vegetation and silt in which to hide and survive the winter.
- A good depth of water is an important guard against freezing conditions, so if rainfall is low it is a good idea to keep your pond topped up.
- Never smash ice or use chemicals to create a hole. Instead place a metal saucepan full of hot water on the ice to slowly melt a hole.

Apart from saving hundreds of creatures from a difficult winter these actions will encourage wildlife into gardens and open spaces to provide an ever-changing cast of characters for us all to watch and admire.

Douglas Thomson Progress Report

As half promised in last month's Lookaround our luck and the weather just held and allowed us to put in the ground the first ducts that will eventually bring hyperfast broadband to the Sedbergh area.

Since our start last November considerable progress has been made on a project that is far from simple. As yet you will see little activity in fields and gardens but that belies the progress that is being made. There is still a huge amount of work to be done on route planning, wayleaves to acquire, gathering interest in having the service, estimating the materials needed and raising the money before the service will be available to many properties. A few that are besides the main routes will be offered the service earlier.

When we started this project there were two of us. We have been delighted with the response to our requests for help. We now have 25+ people offering various forms of help and more showing an interest in investing. However, more volunteers are need. Can you offer to help, however little, in one or more of the following areas: -

1. Route Planning, including the documenting of planned routes, producing maps and schematics.

2. Arranging Wayleaves, by discussing the planned routes with landowners, and getting sign-off.

3. Utilities/Environmental/Historical considerations; Contacting utility companies to see if the planned routes impact their assets, identifying whether the routes raise environmental issues, or impact sites of historical importance.

4. Civil Engineering knowledge, by identifying any specific challenges produced by the planned routes.

5. Help with the installation of ducting in fields and gardens.

Cumbria Trading Standards are warning residents in Cumbria to be on their guard from cold callers looking for driveway resurfacing or tarmacing work. Consumers should be extremely cautious when approached by any cold callers offering to conduct work on their property. These types of callers often use persuasive or aggressive tactics to get people to agree to have work carried out and then charge far more than was quoted for poor quality work or poor quality goods.

In most cases traders who call at your home should give a cooling off

period which gives 14 days in which to cancel (there are some exceptions). Trading Standards advice is to always say 'NO' to any cold callers, shop around for quotes and consider using a local trader who has been recommended by others. AUGUST WEATHER

A fairly damp month with a total of 4.59 inches(116.7mm) but with only 5 days on which we did not record any rainfall!! It was also a breezy month with only 4 days when the maximum gust was not in double figures though the strongest gust was 17.2mph (27.68kps) on 2 occasions. Temperature-wise it wasn't the warmest month but we did have some days in the 70sF (20+C). We had a maximum of 76.6F (24.5C) but a cool minimum of 40.1F (4.5C) on the night of the 13th. As to be expected in August wind chill was not dramatic though half the month dropped into the 40sF i.e. single figures in C.

The rainfall, though not excessive, was enough to keep the grass growing and the mud accumulating! I don't think I have cut the grass in the garden more than a handful of times, not that it didn't need cutting, but it is too wet to get on it. It is a viscous circle! The buddleia has flowered and



gone without seeing many butterflies. Fortunately I have had only one minor fly-strike on the sheep this summer and no signs of the giant horse flies which were a nuisance last year. One local farmer had a case of Schmallenberg in his young stock. This disease is transmitted by midges but I always thought we were too far North for these midges to survive! This proves we're are not anymore. The major problem has been getting them clean and keeping them so for the sales. These didn't start too well but at least I was able to get rid of a few. Cull prices were actually better than breed sales!! The collared doves have had another clutch as there are 7 birds on the roof regularly. The

sparrow hawk keeps putting in an appearance. It goes very quiet around the feeding area after he makes himself obvious. There are lots of voles about this year it seems with well worn tracks in the grass. The badgers continue to visit the field most nights and young rabbits are very plentiful. They certainly give one of our dogs some sport. It's a good job they have a good start of we would be having rabbit pie regularly!
