SEDBERGH PARISH COUNCIL -CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

Kevin J. Lancaster.

The last year has seen the construction of the first sizeable housing estate in Sedbergh for over ten years. We have supported this

new development from long before its inception as a contribution to much needed housing stock but the forty nine houses exceeds the planned development for the

whole of the Yorkshire Dales for one vear. However, we are concerned that the centre of the town's development has drifted westwards in recent years with little new housing on the east side.

The parish remains committed to improved parking in the historic core of the town. Ample parking for those who are passing though is a prerequisite for encouraging them to stay for a couple of hours and spend some money. To this end we have

> been pushing for parking for buses to be allowed at New Bridge and all the changes that needs. This will free up space on Joss Lane.

We have made several large investments in improving the parish and have serious plans to continue to do so in the future. The footpath around the playing field is now bedded in and has greatly improved the walk from Havera into

town. We recognise how well used our play equipment and play area is and are making plans for rebuilding and relocating it within the field as the present equipment comes to the end of its life. This will free up an area for a much needed expansion of the car parking at the People's Hall.

The two car parks which the parish runs continue to make a positive contribution to our finances. However, the net profit is much less than most people imagine. We have sought out and secured outside funding for electrical charging facilities on both car parks for both visitors and residents alike and we remain committed to general improvements, especially on Joss Lane.

The relationship between the parish and the Sedbergh Economic Partnership has rarely been warm and this year we decided to suspend attending their meetings.

We were disappointed by the first tranches of the Levelling Up monies awarded indirectly by the new Westmorland and Furness Council. We believe a modest share of the money given to Kendal Town Centre would have been much more

effectively spent in peripheral market towns such as ourselves.

The parish continues to support the Town Twinning Group and there was a student visit from Zreče to Sedbergh in October. A visit the other way planned for February did not happen but it is important that it goes ahead in 2025.

All the street lighting owned and run by the council has been modernised and replaced with newer and better designed LEDs at very little cost to residents. For this we have had considerable support from the Friends of the Lake District. This is very much in line with the Yorkshire Dales Dark Skies Policy.

The parish remains frustrated with the unitary council's Highways Department whether it is signs welcoming visitors which have swung at unwelcoming angles; endless cones and traffic lights on bridges or a failure to install double yellow lines.

I remain proud of the community in which we live and the parish council which I chair. We are well served by our current members, our clerk, staff and contractors. I thank my vice-chairman for standing in for me during my absence earlier in the year. Compared with neighbouring parishes few are as active as we are and none raises as much funding from sources beyond the pockets of council tax payers.

Thank you for allowing me to serve as your parish chairman, it has been a real privilege.

BLACK HORSE FLOWER Farm Open Day 8th June





ELECTRIC VEHICLE CHARGERS

In 2022 Sedbergh Parish Council began to investigate the introduction of Electric Vehicle (EV) Chargers into the town, for use by those living in and visiting the town. The Council wanted to be resilient to climate change by allowing residents and visitors the opportunity to charge an electric vehicle. They also wanted to help promote tourism and the local economy by providing EV chargers. Ultimately, this would underline the Council's desire to give alternative options and help reduce carbon emissions. Recognising that many streets in Sedbergh do not have suitable off-street parking for safe charging, and that there were no public chargers in the area, they began to look at potential funding to support a future project. At the time, there was no support available from the local authority, so the Council began to research their own potential options. Aiming, ultimately, to install EV chargers at Loftus Hill car park and Joss Lane car park – with both public car parks being leased by the Parish Council.

The Council were successful in acquiring substantial funding for the project over several months, with 60% contribution coming from the Government's On-Street Residential Charge point Scheme, with support from Office for Zero Emission Vehicles and administered by The Energy Saving Trust. In addition, critical further grants were also secured from Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority's Sustainable Development Fund, Cumbria Action

e-mail info@strampress.co.uk website www.strampress.co.uk for Sustainability, part of the Zero Carbon Cumbria Partnership's ambitious emission reduction programme to make Cumbria carbon neutral by 2037. Community Energy Cumbria (CEC) Community Benefit Fund (Sedbergh) and Sedbergh & District Community Trust were also secured, with final contribution from Sedbergh Parish Council.

After the Council were successful in their fund raising, Electricity North West was engaged to complete the connections required to support the new EV chargers (each location also requiring full road closures for the install). And, ultimately - Eon Drive were awarded the contract to install the charging infrastructure. Four fast (22kWh) chargers have now been installed, two located at each car park, and are now operational and included on Zap Map and the National Charge point Registry. They are fully contactless, with no mandatory requirement for an App. to allow them to be easily accessible by residents and visitors.

The Council have seen many cars using the charges, by residents, and visitors, being the first publicly available chargers in Sedbergh. The installation of the chargers also supports Westmorland and Furness Council, and Yorkshire Dales National Park policies for the future of EV charging infrastructure.

The Council will continue to monitor the ongoing campaign, by Fair Charge, to reduce the mandatory VAT charged at public chargers (currently 20%) to 5%, in line with home charging.

Thank you to all of you who came to our coffee morning "Time for a Cuppa "just after Dementia Action Week. AND to all those who helped run the coffee morning. We raised just over £180 for the Dementia UK and hopefully were able to give people some useful information about this increasingly prevalent disease.

A dementia diagnosis is vital Diagnosis is vital to give people access to the care, treatment and support they desperately need. Yet, incredibly, 1 in 3 people with dementia do not have a diagnosis.

If you're worried about yourself, or someone close to you, get help describing your symptoms to a GP by filling in our symptoms checklist

This checklist contains 20 questions about possible symptoms or behaviours relating to dementia. You will need to think about the symptoms, how long they have been happening and how much they are affecting daily life. If you do not wish to answer a question, just move on to the next one. This Is not a diagnosis but may help you discuss your concerns with a GP.

A DARK SKY OVER SEDBERGH Sedbergh Environmental Network

During April this year the skies above Sedbergh have got a lot darker.

Helped by Jack Ellerby, the Dark Sky Officer at the Friends of the Lake District organisation, Sedbergh Parish Council have successfully upgraded their lighting and achieved both energy savings and reductions in light pollution They changed twenty -two streetlights to modern energy efficient LEDs compliant with guidance from Dark Sky International.

The County Council changed their lights several years ago and with the Parish Council lights now also changed we have an almost dark sky over Sedbergh.

Sedbergh is the largest town within the Yorkshire Dales National Park which was designated as an International Dark Sky Reserve in December 2020. The skies within the core of the National Park are considered some of the darkest in the world.

The sky above Sedbergh has been polluted by light or a sky glow for many decades. But now the glow has almost gone. Instead of throwing light up into the sky these new lights throw light where it is needed onto the pavement, or the road and light pollution has been considerably reduced. Looking down from Garsdale it is noticeable that the glow above the town has almost disappeared.

It would be great if the remaining lights in private grounds could also follow the Parish and County Councils lead and review their lighting to help reduce light pollution even more.

Each one of us can help and when it's time to change our fittings we can make sure the bulbs are no more than 500 lumens with a colour rating of no more than 2700K. The lights should be shielded to ensure that light is sent where it is needed rather than up into our sky or into our neighbour's window and if possible be on a dimmable switch.

We would then have a truly dark sky over our town where we could easily see the milky way on a clear night.

LIGHTING THE WAY Sedbergh Parish Installs Dark Sky Friendly Lights

Twenty-two new environmentally and dark sky friendly lights are benefitting nature and people in the town of Sedbergh.

The project, supported by landscape charity the Friends of the Lake District and the Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority, is helping Sedbergh Parish Council reduce the town's light pollution, carbon emissions and energy costs.

As Friends of the Lake District's Dark Skies Officer, Jack Ellerby, explained:

"The new lights are modern energy efficient LEDs, with four heritage style versions on brackets in the town centre. And similar to schemes in Lorton and Patterdale in the Lake District, and Dent in the Yorkshire Dales.

"The Parish Council, concerned at the rising cost of running and repairing its footway lights, worked with us and Westmorland and Furness Council's lighting officers, to assess and identify some new lighting. An important consideration is that the Yorkshire Dales area of Cumbria is also designated an international dark sky reserve.

"The design of the new lights means their beam throws light onto path and road surfaces, rather than up into the sky. They are a warmer colour too, which is gentler on our eyes and better for wildlife that's active overnight. Plus, the lights dim

by 50% after 9pm, and go off between 12pm to 6am," added Jack.

Steven Longlands, from Sedbergh Parish Council who helped with the project, said: "Working together made this happen and cut our electricity costs by 78%. Special thanks to our Clerk, the Friends of the Lake District, and the Council's Lighting Team. We are also grateful for funding from Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority's Sustainable Development Fund and Cumbria Action for Sustainability's Community Climate Grant. Funded by the National Lottery Community Fund, part of the Zero Carbon Cumbria Partnership's ambitious emission reduction programme to make Cumbria carbon neutral by 2037.

Friends of the Lake District's Dark Skies Officer, Jack Ellerby, said: "Sedbergh Council have been a delight to work with. With public finances decreasing and electricity energy prices going up councils are looking at these types of lights to reduce resource consumption. Although there is no legal public duty to provide lighting, well placed lights help to give us a sense of safety on paths and ginnels after dark. We hope it inspires other communities to act, and that other lights installed in the town are equally sympathetic."

The new Dark Sky Certified lights were supplied by lighting manufacturers Thorn Lighting UK and Urbis Schreder.

Musical instruments available to borrow!

Sedbergh Pepperpot Club was founded by Donald and Shirley Smith in 1997 and is a charity that exists to encourage and support anyone in the Sedbergh area who wishes to take up an orchestral musical instrument and widen their musical horizons.

One of the core ways in which we seek to meet these aims is through our collection of musical instruments that are available to borrow - many of which have been kindly donated to the charity. For many years these have been housed by club members.

The committee is currently reviewing the collection and considering various options. As well as looking at alternative storage options, we are discussing selling surplus instruments. Before we start this process, we are keen to make sure that no one has a claim to any of the instruments currently in our



possession. If you, or anyone you know, has donated an instrument to the charity in the past please do get in touch if you wish to take part in this discussion and help inform how the collection is managed.

More generally - do please keep in mind that this collection exists! We have violins and cellos of all sizes as well as most wind instruments. Borrowers (children or adults) can use these instruments in return for paying the annual insurance premium which is generally less than £10 per year.

Alongside the Sedbergh Pepperpot Club (which also supports Sedbergh Orchestra), the Trott Musical Foundation offers grants for children taking lessons on musical instruments (not just orchestral instruments, and singing lessons are also included). Sedbergh is very lucky to have this level of support - please bear both charities in mind if ever you hear a young person express an interest in music - it needn't be as expensive as you fear!

and help resolve the many issues I have heard about, arising between farmers and their landlords. Well, I could see that the Government weren't going to do much about this and even if they did, given the speed they tend to work at, I was far from confident that anything would happen in my lifetime, let alone in time to resolve some of the issues that tenant farmers are bringing to me now.

So, I have taken matters into my own hands and presented a bill to parliament that, if passed, would create a Commissioner. The NFU and the Tenant Farmer's Association both support the bill. It will have its second reading later in June so we

will see if the Government is supporting it soon.

I have found through rather bitter experience, that the only way to get this Government to do anything is to keep on at them. So I know it's not enough to support farmers with bills in Parliament, I have also been challenging ministers to do something. A couple of times over the past month I have pushed ministers to be more supportive of farmers in particular by sorting out the mess of the agricultural payments scheme which actively discourages many farmers from actually doing any farming and causes many of the issues between tenant farmers and their landlords. Again, let's see what they do.

The Council held its Annual Parish Meeting and the Annual Meeting of the Parish Council on 16th May 2024, due to timings, information from these will be included in the July Lookaround. However, the Chairman's report for 2023/2024, from the meeting, is included in this edition on page 5.

The next meeting of the Parish Council, will be their normal monthly meeting, commencing 7.30pm on Thursday 13 June 2024 in the Committee Room, Sedbergh People's Hall, Howgill Lane, Sedbergh.

Sedbergh Parish Council are, however, pleased to include two articles relating to projects they have recently completed in the town. These relate to the installation of new environmentally and dark sky friendly lights for the remaining streetlights owned by the Parish Council. And to the installation of four Electric Vehicle Charger points, two each at Loftus Hill car park and Joss Lane car park. Thank you again, for everyone's

patience during these installations, particularly in respect of the road closures that were required at both locations.

Overall costs for these projects were circa £54,150. However, with significant fund raising by the Council, 87% of the costs will be covered by grants. For the EV chargers, these included the Government's On Street Residential Charge point Scheme (ORCS) Office for Zero Emission Vehicles (OZEV) administered by the Energy Saving Trust. Cumbria Action for Sustainability's National Lottery Community Fund, part of the Zero Carbon Cumbria Partnership's ambitious emission reduction program to make Cumbria carbon

neutral by 2037. Along with, Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority's Sustainable Development Fund, Sedbergh Community Trust, and Community Energy Cumbria (CEC) Community Benefit Fund (Sedbergh). And for the street lighting, Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority's Sustainable Development Fund along with Cumbria Action for Sustainability, funded by the National Lottery Community Fund, part of the Zero Carbon Cumbria Partnership (as above).

FOLLOW MY LEADER?

Admittedly, times have changed and circumstances have altered, but it seems to me that over the past several decades the concept of leadership has become diluted. Just now for obvious reasons I have in mind political leadership here in UK, but I suspect it also affects other spheres of life.

I seem to remember a time when leadership primarily was about building a set of coherent principles and values in which a given party believed, and then promoting this 'platform' with the intention of persuading the electorate to support it on the basis of agreeing to those principles.

Naturally, different parties had different 'platforms', but choices were essentially offered between them on the basis of accepting or rejecting the 'vision' they outlined.

Party leaders were not 'celebrities', and not always charismatic personalities either. What mattered was the vision, as reflected in the policies and programme.

I can't help thinking that the rise of radio and television news, then of political commentating, and 'opinion' programmes has contributed to the demise of value and principle led leadership.

Maybe at first this was an unanticipated consequence, but quite soon some professional broadcasters and editors seem to have spotted the potential for them personally or institutionally to influence public and political opinion through the sheer power of outreach to millions of listeners, without being credibly answerable to anyone but themselves.

The press argument may be that they have duty 'to hold politicians to account'. Who gave them that task? It may be a useful function, but as far as I know it is a self-appointed one. The press has become a kind of unofficial but immensely powerful, non-accountable third arm of national politics.

Of course, thank goodness, there are still notable reporters and commentators who are persons of integrity and who are as objective as is humanly possible, but this does not seem to be universal, and the antics of the rest leads either to a distorted

truth being unwittingly accepted, or to a general distrust of the media, or both.

In practice, even in countries taking pride in their free press, 'holding politicians to account' often seems to have evolved from a straight-forward interviewing process, including legitimate challenging questions, to a battle of wits between the interviewer and the politician in which the interviewer's prime objective is to 'win' the encounter, rather than arrive at the truth.

Politicians themselves have not helped the situation. The clever ones have learned how to cope with aggressive and challenging interviews, but in so doing they have in fact accepted the assumptions of

the interviewers, that 'getting the best of the encounter', is more important than rational discussion of the issue at stake. Of course that may be boring, but politics is not supposed to be an entertainment industry.

The arrival of radio and TV in the House of Commons has also either revealed, or possibly reinforced, the yah-boo circus antics of PMQs, and disguised the serious and conscientious work, including cooperation between politicians of different parties, which is where much of the constructive work of our parliamentary democracy happens.

The TV, in particular, also reveals the startlingly low attendance of MPs in the chamber even during serious business, at most other times. As a result, a possibly unfair perspective of the nature of national politics has become common, and the yah-boo approach to politics is assumed to be normal, and is taken up elsewhere.

The 'confrontational' model of dealing with disagreement seems to be embedded in the way we handle issues in the public sphere. This seems in many ways rather a childish mode of behaviour. Where this inevitably spills over into wider social interactions outside formal politics, it demeans the human capacity for rationality and decency, and encourages extremism rather than meaningful communication and the possibility of reaching respectful mutual understanding and solutions.

The cult of the individual is so much easier to portray than the complex realities of politics and party. This does a disservice, not only to the individual politicians and their parties, but also to the electorate.

Successful 'public relations' often seems to have replaced coherent and meaningful discussion, and to have replaced integrity.

At the same time, the presentation and interpretation of politics in the media frequently seems simplistic. A vote for my local candidate is interpreted as a vote for his or her national 'party leader'. A vote in a non-parliamentary election is likewise interpreted as a comment on the National Government, thereby misrepresenting, undermining and

devaluing the role and relevance of local administrations and the real purpose of the local elections.

Of course, given the media methodology, and the distortions it introduces, indeed this sad picture may have become true of voter behaviour, but that does not make it a good tendency.

With all this, it is perhaps no surprise that the rapid rise of social media and related platforms has been taken up as a way for malign or deluded 'influencers' to promote non-accountable 'yah-boo' opinions and attitudes at a scale previously unimaginable.

It is not only members of the press who have understood the power of the media of course. The presence of

a so-called 'free press' does assist in preventing the institutionalised subversion of political truth by a dictatorial government-controlled media such as we are increasingly witnessing in too many countries around the world. We can look at today's Russia, China, N Korea, Myanmar, and even India, among many.

But even in so called 'free' countries, individual groups and personalities have shown considerable ability to 'harness' likeminded press organisations to promote their own take on 'false news' etc. We are familiar with how this manipulation of information through the media can lead to the expression of disagreement by opponents of the regime being designated as illegal, criminal or treasonable

It has been a shock to see this now happening in our so called 'free

country' as a British Government uses an Act of Parliament apparently to make its opinion on Rwanda a legally enforceable 'fact'. Probably behind this aberration, lies the increasing power of populist opinion, ramped up and distorted by unregulated social media platforms, and which the government feels obliged to 'follow' in its policy generation process.

Populism is not honest or genuine democracy. It is rooted in biased, self -interested demagoguery. It rarely makes allowances for the rights and legitimate interest of minority groups, who are also part of the democratic constituency, often contributing enriching diversity and interest to society and culture, and who deserve the respect of the majority. Populism exploits and plays on the oftenunfounded prejudices and fears of sections of the electorate, to create an irrational bulldozer of opinion which is difficult to stand against.

It seems to me that political leadership today has largely become the servant and follower of pollsters and so-called 'public opinion'. Instead of asking themselves, 'How can we persuade the electors to accept the vision of the party for the benefit of the country?', the question now is, 'What popular notions and prejudices from the polls and the media should we accept and promote so we can win, or stay in, office?'

"Follow My Leader", instead of being a statement reflecting an informed choice of leadership, has become rather, an instruction to any would be Leader to Follow the latest most popular political fads and

prejudices, stoked by both traditional and social media interests, however justifiable or otherwise. It is a step towards 'bread and circuses', rather than an encouragement to govern on the basis of genuinely held values and principles.

The Prime Minister has recently forecast a time of extreme danger for the nation over the next few years. Extreme danger is often an excuse for a clamp down on dissenting opinion. Yet some of the extreme dangers we face may be the very erosion of true democratic principles, and of government based on conviction, value and principled action, respectful of all.

Regrettably, I think most political parties have become susceptible to the cancer of populism in recent years. Perhaps the forthcoming election process offers each of us an opportunity to challenge them all, before we vote.

NOTES FROM DENT STATION

Recent visitors to Dent Station will have noticed that the scaffolding is back up and the next phase of the lime pointing is now well underway using the excellent Dent tradesmen. We are hopeful that this will be the last of the substantial works required to maintain the exterior of the building, but we have allowed for a period next year just in case. As responsible custodians of the building, we anticipate that some element of external maintenance will be an annual event!

In the last article I was able to report that rail services were largely improving. However, perhaps this was a little premature as, at the start of May, we experienced a number of problems including a signal failure outside Carlisle, train crew shortages, and a train fault together with further industrial action on 9th May. In addition, a number of services have been shortformed which we understand to be as a result of ongoing maintenance issues. It may seem strange that with so much spent on our railways we are so reliant on aged and even leased stock!

We were pleased to hear of the efforts of the local community in Dent to acquire the Sun Inn. Whilst this will undoubtedly present some challenges it is important for the village to retain such a valuable community asset and, hopefully, secure for future posterity. There are several examples of successful community buy-outs and, not so far distant, the small village of Muker is

well on its way to securing the Farmers Arms. So, good luck to all involved with this venture!

The existence of both public houses and tea rooms in Dent are vital to the visitor economy and, in turn, help to support other businesses and employment. Meanwhile, many of the visitors arriving by train and making the journey to the village, whether on foot or using the Western Dales Bus, would not do so but for the existence of such amenities in the village. It should also be said that visitor traffic is vital to the future viability of the station and so, everything goes hand in hand.

Of course, it something of an anachronism in this day and age that Dent even still has a station! Historically, the station was built by the Midland Railway as a railhead for coal, goods and livestock and, by all

accounts, served very few passengers in its time. Closure came in the 1970s, following which, most onlookers would have considered there to be little prospect of ever reopening – indeed the prospects for the line were not great. But reopen it did with the reintroduction of the DalesRail services and then the regular stopping service in 1989. However, we are conscious of potential risks ahead including the existence of the foot crossing, disliked by Network Rail, and the desire in some quarters to increase the speed of services, missing out some of the smaller intermediate stations. There is no room for complacency and threats come in other forms these days! It is therefore vital that we sustain and increase passenger numbers to secure the long-term future of the station.

We have for some time urged that the railway should be incorporated in any rural transport strategy for the area integrated with local bus services. Many of our stations are remote which, after all, is part of the charm. This would provide travel opportunities to local residents and visitors alike, but we also see a massive benefit to the visitor economy. Indeed, viable public transport should not be regarded as essential if we are to entice visitors away from the private car with the environmental benefits that would bring to sensitive areas such as the Dales. A visit to popular destinations such as Malham on a fine day will surely illustrate the mayhem cars can cause, ironically destroying the very

characteristics of the Dales visitors have come to enjoy! We were delighted to be able to take part in consultations with both Westmorland and Furness and North Yorkshire councils. However, it remains to be seen whether any of our suggestions will be taken on board!

It is indeed a good time to consider using the public transport services we have, including both bus and rail. I mentioned before that we have successfully negotiated an additional Sunday stopping service towards Carlisle which, as from 2nd June, will call at Dent (12.39) and Garsdale (12.44) as well as the other smaller intermediate stations. Apart from this there are no other relevant changes in the summer rail timetable.

However, we still have some work to do on the other non-stopping services and to alleviate the current 4 -hour gaps.

It is worth reminding that the Dales Railcard is available to local residents within the qualifying postcodes. For a modest outlay, currently £10, this gives a 1/3 discount from a ticket purchased on the day to Leeds, Bradford, Carlisle, or Lancaster (via Hellifield) and any station in between. These can be obtained via the Settle Carlisle Railway Development Company website or in person at Skipton, Settle, Appleby, or Carlisle Stations with proof of residency. Rather frustratingly, the pre-08.15 restriction still applies despite our best efforts, although there are other

ticket options which may be worth exploring for such journeys.

The Saturday S1 Western DalesBus continues to provide an important link from Dent Station to Dent village Sedbergh and Kendal, the first service meeting the 10.48 northbound train to Carlisle in the morning and returning for the 17.32 train in the late afternoon. Unfortunately, there is no later evening service this year. Nevertheless, this gives a fantastic opportunity for a day out in Carlisle departing at 09.58 from Sedbergh Post Office to Dent Station and hop on the train to Carlisle? This would involve returning on the 1618 train from Carlisle to catch the bus from Dent Station back to Sedbergh.

Also worthy of mention are two relatively local DalesBus services. The 830 Northern DalesBus provides a Sunday service from Ribblehead Station to Richmond via Hawes, including the spectacular run over Buttertubs Pass. This was once featured on the BBC4 TV programme 'All Aboard the Country Bus'. The bus will depart Ribblehead at 10.45 or Hawes at 11.05. Meanwhile, the 857 Wensleydale Explorer will provide a Sunday service from Garsdale Station to Hawes and Castle Bolton departing at Garsdale Station at 10.55. The government sponsored £2 single fare cap applies to all bus journeys.

50 YEARS AGO

Historic Peal of Sedbergh Bells -

The Sedbergh School Bellringers rang a full peal of 5,040 changes of Plain Bob Minor at Sedbergh Parish Church - possibly the first time at the church by a Sedbergh band since 1909. The peal lasted for three hours and four minutes. It was a notable achievement for several reasons, the main one being that it was a "first peal" for the entire band - a very rare occurrence in bellringing circles. There are about 5,000 peals rung each year up and down the country a peal in which every ringer scores his "first" occurs about once in every two vears. The band had rung several quarter peals, but they achieved the full peal at the first attempt. It was the first peal on the Sedbergh bells for 14 years and, if the peal-boards in the belfry are reliable, was the first peal by a Sedbergh band since 1909 when the late G.F. Woodhouse, a nationally known ringer, was tower captain. The ringers were: 1. Richard A. Matthews, 2. Brian G. Sedgwick, 3. Ian M. Craven, 4. Robin E. Hildrew, 5. John E. Buckley, and 6. Anthony F. Thomas (conductor).

The late Mr. J.A. Metcalfe -

The death occurred last week of Mr John Allen Metcalfe of Dene Cottage, Dent, aged 63. He was a native of Hawes but had spent most of his life in Dent, working as a builder and contractor. He is survived by his wife and son. The funeral service at St

Andrew's Church, Dent on Saturday was conducted by the vicar, the Rev. A.J.W. Barker.

Sedbergh Rider in the TT -

Mr Robin Udall, an antique restorer of Sedbergh, was riding sidecar in his 12th TT at the Isle of Man last week. Rider of the Suzuki was Mr V. Hudson of Canada, formerly of Windermere, who returned to the UK to compete in the race. Mr Udall finished in both 500 and 750cc events. At Ramsey, he was lying 23rd in a field of 75 competitors.

Secondary School -

A party of 34 children, accompanied by Mrs B. Steele, Mrs C. Williams, Mr B. Hinton and Mr and Mrs P. Roberts, recently spent a seven-day holiday in Brittany. Travelling by way of Southampton and Cherbourg, the group made their base at St Lunaire, and enjoyed excellent weather.

Annual Open-Air Service at Fox's Pulpit -

The Salvation Army Band provided the music for the united open-air service held at Fox's Pulpit at Firbank on Sunday afternoon. Prayers were offered by the Rev G.D. Rhodes, and the lessons were read by the Rev B. Capstick. The address and blessing were by the Rev D. Southward, vicar of Crosby Ravensworth. Despite a changeable day, a good crowd attended this annual service.

Fell Rescue -

The new Land-Rover ambulance, which the Cumbria authorities have stationed at Sedbergh, has already proved its worth and versatility in two recent incidents on the fells. Soon after its arrival it was used to pick up

The late Mrs R. Farrow -

The funeral took place last week at Sedbergh Parish Church of Mrs Rene Farrow of 38 Loftus Hill, Sedbergh. Mrs Farrow, who had been in failing health for some years, died at her home at the age of 59. Born at Keswick, she was the eldest daughter of the late Mr and Mrs J. Hindmarsh, and went into domestic service after leaving school. In 1938 she came to School House. Sedbergh School, but was subsequently employed by the late Dr Rothwell, until her marriage in 1940 to Mr R.J. Farrow of Sedbergh. Mrs Farrow is survived by her husband, a son and a daughter. The service was conducted by the vicar, Canon D.A. Rogers, and the organist was Mr W.L. Smith. Interment was at Sedbergh Cemetery.

THE LAST WITCH TRIAL 1944

Helen MacFarlane or Duncan was born on 25th November 1897 in Callender, Scotland. At school she apparently alarmed her school mates with her dire prophecies and hysterical behaviour. She married Henry Duncan and had six children. Her husband supported her in her supposed paranormal talents.

In 1926 she moved on from being a clairvoyant to offering seances at which she purported to make deceased persons materialise through ectoplasm pouring from her mouth. Various investigations were made of her claims and the "ectoplasm" was shown to be at various times cheesecloth and/or paper mixed with white of egg. It seems she was able to swallow this and regurgitate it. In 1933 she was prosecuted for fraud and fined £10.

She attracted notoriety by "helping" the distressed relatives of soldiers who had died in the First World War, of whom there was a rich source of credible people. When the Second World War came she continued her practice.

However, she perhaps overstepped the mark in November 1941 when she held a séance in Portsmouth and claimed that the materialisation of a sailor told her that HMS Barham had been sunk. This brought her to the attention of the Royal Navy as there was no way she should have known.

HMS Barnham was torpedoed off the coast of Egypt on 25th November 1941 with loss of 861 dead. Her sinking had been kept under wraps in order to try to maintain moral and deceive the Germans. Only next of kin of those who died had been informed and that under strict orders to say nothing to anyone else. The sinking was not revealed to the public until late January 1942. In fact as there would have been several thousand next of kin and family members who did know, it is not at all impossible that she should have picked up this information in a naval town such as Portsmouth.

In January 1944 she conducted another séance at which there were two naval lieutenants. One was not impressed when his thoroughly alive aunt was supposedly manifested, as was his sister who also appeared. He reported Duncan to the police. At another séance in January undercover police attended and arrested her when a white shrouded manifestation appeared which proved to be Duncan herself. She was arrested under the Vagrancy Act 1824.

However, the authorities took the matter more seriously – maybe because of worries that shortly before D-Day she might reveal information from whatever her sources were. There were also concerns about her exploiting the recently bereaved. She was eventually convicted under Section 4 of the Witchcraft Act 1735, which had not been used for about 100 years, and which dealt with fraudulent spiritual activity. She was imprisoned for nine months. On release she promised to stop conducting seances, but in fact



continued to do so until her death – and was even arrested again shortly before her death in 1956.

It is interesting to note that although she has the reputation of the last witch to be prosecuted, she was in fact convicted of a form of fraud, i.e. that she was not a witch and did not have the powers she purported to have. Also although she was the last woman to be jailed under the Witchcraft Act she was not the last to be so prosecuted – this was a lady called Jane Rebecca Yorke also in 1944 – she was dealt with by a fine. The Act was repealed in 1951 and replaced by the Fraudulent Mediums Act.



SEDBERGH RURAL DISTRICT COUNCIL GUIDE 1962

In my articles over the past few years I have included extracts from my copy of this guide, a first edition published by Sedbergh RDC (we were of course still in the West Riding of Yorkshire in those days), which was printed by Titus Wilson and Son Ltd., Kendal. The guide includes many advertisements for local businesses and also provides much information about clubs, activities and recreation in the district, as indeed the Lookaround has been doing over the past 38 years!

The 1962 guide states that the area of the rural district (which also

included Dent and Garsdale) was 52,674 acres, and that the estimated population of the three parishes was 3,700. The three officials for the RDC were D. Waring Esq (Clerk and Chief Finacial Officer), F.J. Lawson Esq (Public Health Inspector and Surveyor), and S. Haygarth Esq (Housing Manager and Collector). A Magistrates Court was held once a month in the Council Offices on Highfield Road, the Clerk to the Court being solicitor G.R. Hague Esq.

At that time Sedbergh had no less than four banks: District, Martins, Midland, and Yorkshire Penny Bank, the latter only open on Wednesdays. Golf was available on the 9-hole course at The Riggs (above



Millthrop), the terms being 2/6d. per day. Fishing rights in the Rivers Lune, Rawthey and Dee were controlled by Sedbergh and District Angling Association, at a cost of one pound per week. The British Legion had a club for men in Bull Yard, also one for women in Kings Yard. There was a large free car park at the easterly end of Main Street, with a new car park in Mortar Pits (Loftus Hill) due to open in the Spring of 1963.

Express coaches provided a daily service through Sedbergh to Blackpool and Newcastle, also daily services to Middlesbrough during the Summer. Local bus companies ran frequent services to Kendal, with a daily service to Kirkby Lonsdale and

Dent. Thrice weekly services operated to Hawes and to Kirkby Stephen.

Sedbergh had two chemist shops, E. Powell at 49/51 Main Street, and J.P. Lowis at 41 Main Street. Accommodation was available at the Golden Lion Inn (proprietor Harry Irving); the White Hart Hotel (proprietor James Baker); and at the Bull Hotel, which offered single bedrooms from 25/6d. per day, doubles from 50/-; breakfast costing 6 shillings, lunch 8/6d., tea 3 shillings, and dinner 10/6d. For the motorist, Sedbergh Motor Company (John Douglass) was the dealer for Morris vehicles, and R.S. Morphet

were distributors of Land Rover, Hillman, Commer and David Brown. Here is a brief extract from the guide:

Sedbergh is the market town and centre of administration for a large agricultural area, and this shows itself on Market Day when the streets of the town are busy with shoppers. The hotel accommodation is excellent and there is a wide range of social activities. The Rural District Council has provided water mains and sewers for the centres of population, and refuse is collected in all the parishes. A progressive housing policy has resulted in 233 dwellings having been erected for the Council. 156 since 1950. Recently the policy has been to provide small flats and bungalows for the elderly, and to give improvement grants for the modernisation of well-built houses lacking modern amenities. Fire, Police and Ambulance services are available, and the County Council provides a library and a child clinic in Sedbergh, with a travelling library visiting the Dales. All the Rural District is within the Yorkshire Dales National Park, so special care is taken to protect the beauty of the area from the risk of unsightly buildings. Electricity poles however have to be erected to carry a supply to remote farms, but care is taken not to spoil the landscape. Gas is provided in Sedbergh town. Caravanners have the choice of two licenced sites, both with modern sanitation and piped water: Inqmire, Sedbergh, 9 caravans; and Pinfold, Sedbergh, 30 caravans.

SEDBERGH COMMUNITY SWIFTS

Some swifts arrived early again
this year: Between the 1st and 6th
May we heard from readers that
swifts had been seen at Ingmire,
Havera, Queen's Drive, Winfield Rd.
At Lowgill we again had record early
arrivals on April 28th but as I write on
15th May, we are still waiting for quite
a few to come back and can only
hope they make it safely. The fine
weather last weekend brought
wonderful viewings of swifts
swooping over the Sedbergh school



playing fields and the nearby houses. June is a good month for seeing swifts in action as by the beginning of the month the breeding swifts will be joined by the arrival of younger swifts, the non-breeders – immature birds aged 2 - 4 years old. They migrate here each year until they themselves are mature enough to breed. These are the birds who we hope will find a partner and new nest site for life and the ones you hope to attract to your boxes. Eggs are generally laid about 10 days after a breeding pair is re-united in the nest. They are incubated by both parents and hatch after 20 days, which is usually mid to late June. While swifts are away in Africa they rely upon us to make sure they have a nest to return to. As swifts are nest site faithful it is tragic to see them trying to get into their holes if they have been blocked up. Be aware that It is a criminal offence to interfere with nesting birds under the Countryside and Wildlife Act 1981. We want to thank the people who love watching swifts and stepped up to our request to host nest boxes on their houses, near to where a colony has been lost. The boxes were put up as a mitigation project, in the hope that the displaced birds might seek a new nest site. We are immensely grateful to a company called Ozone Paragliders and Kites www.flyozone.com, who funded the project, for materials and labour. It was founded by paraglider pilots with roots in the UK, providing paragliders that can carry people great distances, even in the Alps, South America and the Himalayas. They said -

"The incredible brave journey of the swift has always been an inspiration to us here at Ozone and we even named one of our favourite wings after this intrepid bird. We're grateful to be able to support this project as part of our ongoing efforts to preserve the wild spaces we live and work in. Like the swift, we trust our wings to carry us great distances." The pictures show some of these new boxes:

Finally, as part of the UK Swift Awareness Week (29th June – 7th July), we will be having an Open Morning of panoramic swift watching at Lowgill on Friday 5th July, with viewing via our cameras too. Booking is essential. Email for more details.

As always, it's never too late to put up boxes so do get in touch for any help or advice. Remember that swifts are not messy!

COMMONS STORIES

Written and photographic portraits of the farmers, gamekeepers and conservationists who work on Ingleborough Common, Grassington Common and Brant Fell Common near Sedbergh are being exhibited at the Dales Countryside Museum in Hawes.

'Labour of Love' is a new exhibition by photographer Rob Fraser and writer Harriet Fraser. They run an environmental art and research practice from near Kendal.

The exhibition presents stories they have gathered during two years of meeting people who farm and manage commons in the Yorkshire Dales National Park, Dartmoor, the Lake District and the Shropshire Hills.

'Labour of Love' at the Dales Countryside Museum (open daily, 10-5pm) will run until 8 September. It is being staged as part of 'Our Common Cause: Our Upland Commons', a three-year project led by the charity, Foundation for Common Land. As well as Rob and Harriet Fraser's work, there are wild boar bones from

Ingleborough and items from the museum's permanent collection to see.

During a lecture at the museum in April, organised by Friends of the Dales Countryside Museum, Harriet and Rob revealed their approach to their 'Commons Stories'/'Labour of Love' project. Harriet Fraser said: "For commoners there is a lot of uncertainty and threats to this way of life – and we've been cataloguing that.

"At the heart of our work is meeting people and listening to people. So I'm out and about with my microphone, Rob with his camera. And we learn from everyone we meet, whether we're on a peat bog, or on the fell looking at dung beetles, or talking about management of the sheep, or talking to somebody from the National Trust about how to deal with the challenges we are facing. And we always have a bit of laugh. You're never far away from a chuckle when you're out with farmers.

"Although the areas are geographically spread across England, a lot of the farmers know each other from the auction marts, from sheep and sharing bloodlines."

Two of the standout stories presented at the exhibition are that of George Hare, gamekeeper on Grassington Moor, and of Adrian Shepherd, head of land management at the Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority.

In the lecture, Rob Fraser said of his photographic technique: "I enjoy making people feel comfortable in their own space, standing where they feel like they are part of that

landscape – and then press the button. It's normally about a half a second exposure on my large format plate camera. Just for that fleeting moment they look into the camera, they look at you, from where they are.

"We keep using the word privilege. But it has felt like a privilege to spend time with people who have got this much attachment to these spaces."


Professor Angus Winchester gave a fascinating talk on dry stone wallscovering their history, different styles and special features.

If the walls were built to contain deer, they would be built much higher (7/8ft tall), some examples from the 15th century were cited. In the 16th century many manors instructed their tenants to build walls ,a set length each year. Boundary walls were created to define specific areas and keep out animals.

Much land higher up the hills was divided up by acts of parliament in the century from 1750 to 1850, these were called parliamentary enclosures. Some special features to look out for include ,initials carved in the stone and hogg holes (usually at the base to allow water to get through).

I think everyone will look at stone walls more carefully in future!

It was interesting to hear from Barbara of the convictions held by the Omani people that various Old Testament figures such as Noah came from the land now recognised as today's Oman. This country had been known as an Oasis of peace in

the Middle East but today protests are occurring mostly by disaffected young people.

After a thoroughly absorbing talk with fascinating insights into countries that most, if not all, of us would have difficulty locating on a map when they expressed our appreciation to Barbara.

Following afternoon tea we dealt with the business of the meeting. We were reminded of forthcoming events in the Federation calendar. 

DON'T CHUCK IT OFF THE EIFFEL TOWER!

Helpful Book Company

Something that I think often gets overlooked with technology is how to keep your device safe and working well – after all, these things aren't cheap, so you want to look after them. Simple Ways to Make Your PC, Laptop, Tablet or Smartphone Easier to Use covers all sorts of ways to look after your device (in Section 6), but here are a few of my top tips:

Get a case

First, if you have a tablet or a phone, I'd recommend getting a case and keeping it in it all the time. There are lots of different types, but the main thing is just to get one – any case will give some protection from shattering if dropped (as long as you don't drop it too far – I don't recommend chucking it off the top of the Eiffel Tower... that really won't end well!).

Don't get it wet

Some cases help to keep your device dry, although if you drop your phone in the sink, a normal case won't be much help. If your phone is waterproof you should be OK, but a lot of them aren't. If you do have an accident and knock a drink over your device or drop it in the bath, here's what to do to give it the best chance of surviving.

First, make sure the device is unplugged and turn it completely off (properly off, not just in sleep mode so the screen goes black).

Take off the case and unplug anything like headphones, so you've got just the device on its own, and wipe the outside with a soft towel or kitchen roll.

Now you want to try to get out any water that's got inside. Don't use a hairdryer – the air can push water deeper into the device. I'd recommend just putting the device on something absorbent – like a layer of (uncooked) rice or shredded packing paper or newspaper. You should see the rice or paper get damp as it pulls the moisture out (it's worth changing it for dry stuff every so often).

Leave it for a full 24 hours and make sure your device feels completely dry before trying turning it on again. If it won't turn on or it turns itself off again shortly afterwards, give it another 24 hours to dry out further.

Look after the screen

What next – protecting the screen (which you'll find in Section 2 of Simple Ways).

Some people like to use a screen protector – a thin layer of plastic you put on. On the other hand some people find they make the touchscreen not work as well, so I wouldn't necessarily recommend one for everyone. The screens are pretty hard now, so I personally don't use one.

Clean it carefully to avoid scratches or getting it wet. If the screen gets dirty or has smeared fingerprints on it, try wiping it gently with a glass cloth (like you get in your glasses case, if you wear glasses) or a soft tissue. If it needs more "oomph" than that, you can try a wipe, but go for an alcohol-based screen wipe rather than a waterbased baby-wipe (they're just too wet to be safe). If you don't have anything like that, just very very slightly dampen a piece of tissue, and wipe the screen gently, keeping well clear of any sockets or buttons.

SOME WALKS AROUND SEDBERGH

WINDER 3.4 miles, 1150 ft, 1.5-2.5 hrs

Sedbergh's own little Matterhorn with great views of the surrounding fells and dales. (Walk 1)

THE CALF 8 miles 2600ft 4-5 hrs

A bracing ridge walk over Arant Haw and Calders to the highest point in the Howgills, . (Walk 1)

FARFIELD MILL 3.7-4.4 miles, 2-3 hrs

Fairly flat walk partly by the riverside, with the added advantage of the Farfield Café half way around. (Walk 2)

AKAY WOODS 2.3 miles 1 - 1.5 hrs

Lovely riverside stretches, past the restored Pepperpot, then through woods above the river, with vestigial remains of Akay House. (Walk 3)

SEDBERGH SCHOOL 45 mins

A stroll to see the sights of Sedbergh School (Walk 4).

FELL WALL 2.2 miles 1 - 1.3 hrs

Elevated promenade above Sedbergh Town, not as energetic as going to Winder top, but still out onto the edge of the open country. (Walk 6)

BRIGGFLATTS 4.2 miles 2-3 hrs.

Along the Rawthey to the peaceful and historic Quaker Meeting House, then back through the fields. (Walk 7)

DENT AND BACK 11.5 miles 1500 ft 4-5 hrs

Across the wild (and possibly wet) Long Moor to Dent then back by Dentdale and the River Dee. (Walk 8)

CAUTLEY SPOUT FROM CROSS KEYS 2.5 miles 1 - 1.5 hrs

A stroll across open country to the bottom of Cautley Spout. Some would say this is the second highest waterfall in Britain. (Walk 9)

CAUTLEY SPOUT AND BACK 10 miles 3150 feet 4.5 - 6.5 hours

Gorgeous walk up the dale to the Spout, with a return over the tops for the adventurous. (Walk 9)

MILLTHROP AND ABBOT HOLME 5.1 miles

920ft 2.5 - 3 hours. Up over Frostrow, down into Dentdale, to follow the Dee past the golf course, and back to Sedbergh. (Walk 10)

DALES WAY AND CRAGGSTONES. 7.5 miles

1165 ft 3 - 4 hrs. Follow the Dales Way beside the Rawthey and the Lune, then ascend past the waterfalls in Craggstones Wood, before a final stroll across the base of Winder. (Walk 11)
