"Community celebrates launch of Post Office counter at SPAR Sedbergh"

Members of the community in Sedbergh and its surrounding areas have welcomed the relocation of the town's Post Office inside the SPAR store on Station Road.

The Post Office has relocated from its longstanding position on Main Street after the retirement of the postmaster and its relocation into SPAR Sedbergh has ensured this vital asset is retained for the benefit of local people.

A ribbon and cake cutting ceremony marked the official launch

of the counter at its new location at 11am on Tuesday 1st April.

Services offered at the Post Office counter include letter and parcel handling, personal banking, business banking, bill payments, and DVLA car tax renewal.

Coming soon will be Amazon return and collect delivery services, Euro and US dollar currency exchange, and travel cards.

For an interim period to allow for full staff training, the Post Office counter at SPAR Sedbergh is open from 9am until 5pm Monday to Friday, from 9am until 12.30pm on a Saturday, and is closed on a Sunday.

Those hours will expand soon from 9am to 5.30pm Monday to Friday and

from 9am to 1pm on Saturday and Sunday.

SPAR Sedbergh is owned and serviced by James Hall & Co. Ltd, SPAR's primary retailer, wholesaler, and distributor for the North of England, based in Preston.

Joyce Cox was one of the first customers to use the counter. She said: "We use the SPAR virtually every day for essentials like bread, milk and fruit. The Post Office is an excellent addition in the SPAR for dropping off parcels as the parking is great."

Anne and Malcolm Petyt said: "Last of the big spenders, we bought some second-class stamps! It is wonderful to have the Post Office retained. It is a very good service for people in Sedbergh and I really hope it takes off. We do appreciate having the SPAR here."

Walter Bull said: "I use the SPAR in Sedbergh quite often and it is good that the Post Office services can be accessed here now. I would have been really upset if the Post Office had gone for good. It would have been a major loss, and it would have meant a trip of 10 miles or more to Kendal."





Fiona Drummond, Company Stores Director at James Hall & Co. Ltd, said: "We are thrilled to have relocated the Post Office in Sedbergh into our SPAR store. I was very pleased to meet several local people utilising the new counter on its opening morning and we had an extremely busy first day.

"Although the Post Office's launch at its new location fell on April Fool's Day, we were not fooling around in our decision to retain it. We acted quickly when we learned of the postmaster's retirement as we understand what an invaluable asset the Post Office is for people in and around Sedbergh.

THE TRANSPORT USER GROUP MEETING

On the 27th March 2025 over 30 interested members of the public attended the inaugural meeting of the Sedbergh and District Transport Group, following the recent changes to the bus service.

Councillor Hazel Hodgson and local MP Lizzi Collinge were both in attendance as were representatives of Sedbergh Parish Council and Western Dales Bus. The meeting was Chaired by Parish Councillor Helen Bromley who has spent many hours on this matter for the Parish Council.

Concerns were raised regarding the funding allocated by Westmorland & Furness Council from the BSIP (Bus Service Improvement Plan) to Sedbergh and District, which was zero. In contrast, some neighbouring areas were awarded six figure sums.

Another concern was/is the reduction in capacity. All services are now 16 seat vehicles and there have been times when this was exceeded. Going into the peak visitor season this is a worry. Every time passengers are turned away confidence in making journeys is affected.

It was agreed at the meeting that passenger numbers needed to be monitored, any volunteers who would like to help with this would be welcome. Generally, passengers should report any capacity issues & changes in behaviour e.g. using a different stop or not using the service



at all. All this can be done via Debbie at Sedbergh Information Centre.

Also available at the Information Centre, or via the QR Code published on page 5, is a bus survey. Over 120 surveys have already been completed, including a good proportion from under 20s. Completed surveys have highlighted that people think bus travel is too expensive, so it's worth noting that fares are currently capped at £3, and that A2B NowCard, which is a bus pass for young people, offers reduced fares on all local bus services in our area. Robin Ince – Normally Weird and Weirdly Normal

Robin will be at the bookshop to
talk about his latest book Normally
Weird and Weirdly Normal: My
Adventures in Neurodiversity. The
book is published on 1st May.

A powerful, personal exploration of anxiety, ADHD and neurodiversity, Normally Weird and Weirdly Normal reminds us all – no matter how weird we feel – that it's okay to be a little different. We all are.

For over thirty years, award-winning broadcaster and comedian Robin Ince has entertained thousands in person and on air. But underneath the surface, a whirlwind was at play – a struggle with sadness, concentration, self-doubt and near-constant anxiety. But then he discovered he had all the hallmarks of ADHD and his stumbling blocks became stepping stones.

In Normally Weird and Weirdly Normal, Robin uses his own experiences to explore the neurodivergent experience and to ask what the point of "being normal" really is. Packed with personal insights, intimate anecdotes and interviews with psychologists, neuroscientists and many neurodivergent people he has met along the way, this is a quirky and witty dive into the world of human behaviour.

Doors open at 7:00pm and the event starts at 7:30pm. Tickets are £5 and available at the bookshop and on our website.

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SINGING SLOVENIA 20TH ANNIVERSARY

As you probably know May 27 marks exactly 20 years since Sedbergh signed the twinning charter with our twin town Zreče, in Slovenia.

So naturally Lakeland Voices community choir are celebrating in both towns this historic moment, and the many connections we have made over the past two decades.

On May 3 at Farfield you are invited to meet the singers who have learnt a great many Slovenian songs, and who travel regularly to Slovenia to sing them along singers who live there.

The songs are well known - such as Zdravljica, Lipa, Majolka, Večernica - with others which we sing in both English and Slovenia such as Let the Circle Be Wide Round the Fireside - (Naj Ob Ognu Ražsiri se krog) - so there are plenty of songs for you to join in with in either or both languages.

On May 20 we have a concert outside the Eurostar departure gates in St Pancras Station (by the public piano) - and then we're off via



Brussels to sing in Cologne Cathedral, and a couple of days in Heidelberg, with a tour of the Castle and singing walks through the woods on the Philosophers Way.

We'll also be singing alongside choirs we have made connections with, on our tourist farm near Bled, on the island, and inside some hill top churches.

Then off to Zreče to sing with our many friends there including Pevke iz Brinjeve Gore, Zbor Jurij Vodovnik, Folklorna Skupina Jurij Vodovnik, as well as others in Skomarje and beyond - and enjoying wine tasting, visiting bee farms, and enjoying walks among the wild flowers.

We are staying in tourist farms, and also in the homes of singers from our sister choir in Ljubljana, and will be joined by the British Ambassador, who on two previous occasions sang



with us in the choir in Zreče, Bohinj and Ljubljana.

On our final day we are helping to celebrate UK Slovenia Friendship Day, singing alongside our Ljubljana friends and meeting the Slovenian president.

On our return to the UK, we have a concert at 11am in Sedbergh on June 25, (Slovenia Statehood Day) - and of course in July we'll also join the British Slovene Society picnic in Henley (twinned with Bled.)

We look forward to singing with you soon - or if you prefer to just listen, you will be most welcome at one of our concerts.

As it says on the Zreče Sedbergh apple tree: "Long may our friendship bear fruit."

BikeRegister is the UK's National Cycle Database, with over 1 million bikes registered. It aims to reduce cycle theft across the country and enables owners to be reunited with their bikes if they are stolen and recovered. It is the only policeapproved bike database and every police force in the UK uses BikeRegister to search for bikes they recover to see if they have been reported stolen. This information is available to them 24/7 through the website and app.

RUSKINS VIEW RESTORATION

A Yorkshire Dales charity has awarded a significant grant to help fund the restoration and re-opening of a key landmark and tourist attraction in Kirkby Lonsdale.

The grant of £30,000 from Yorkshire Dales Millennium Trust (YDMT), will enable Kirkby Lonsdale Town Council and fundraising charity The Friends of Ruskin's View, to restore Ruskin's View and The Brow footpath, which were both closed in September 2021, due to safety issues.

As one of Kirkby Lonsdale's most cherished attractions, Ruskin's View

was painted by JMW Turner in 1822, and welcomes thousands of visitors each year, who take in the famous landmark, described in 1875 by John Ruskin as "One of the finest views in England, and therefore the world".

This view has though, been under threat in recent years, as The Brow footpath, from where Ruskin's View is accessible, and which links the town with Kearstwick to the north and provides a route to St Mary's churchyard and the adjacent Rugby Club, has been subsiding towards the river Lune. Concerns over the stability of the steep embankment upon which the footpath is built, led to the then local authority, Cumbria County Council, to close the footpath in 2021 on safety grounds.

Kirkby Lonsdale Town Council are responsible for both Ruskin's View and The Brow footpath, and over the last year, the Town Council has been able to reopen the first length of the footpath, which includes Ruskin's View. The restoration project will now move on to its second phase, and the grant from YDMT will help support the reopening of the whole length of the footpath.

Michael Devlin, Chief Executive of YDMT, said: "We're delighted that we have been able to support the first



stage of this important project.
Ruskin's View is nationally
recognised; it is a stunning view, but
also a vital community asset.
Facilitating projects like this reaffirm
our aims to support the people,
landscape and wildlife of the
Yorkshire Dales and surrounding
areas "

Paul Cassell, the Chairman of the Town Council said: "I am delighted with the grant received from YDMT which is vital in funding the monitoring and a range of physical works that are needed to reopen the whole of the footpath, which is an important local facility."

Mike Burchnall Chair of The Friends of Ruskin's View said: "As a charity set up to raise funds for the restoration and reopening of the footpath, we welcome this grant from YDMT. When added to the money raised through fundraising events, donations etc, it provides a huge boost to the funds available for the next stage of works.'

BUS SERVICES FROM SEDBERGH.

Partly, the reason we moved to Sedbergh was because it was easy to get to London. 25 minutes drive to Oxenholme, then 2 hours 40 minutes down to the 'Great Wen' on the train. And, if you really wanted to go by car, 10 minutes, and you are on the M6. For several years I commuted on a weekly basis all over the country.

Good communications then? Well, yes, except if you want to use public transport, which, in these post Beeching days means a bus, as far as Sedbergh is concerned.

The Western Dales Bus operates most of our limited local services reliably and efficiently, given their resources, 2 16 seater minibuses driven by available volunteers, with little extra room for trolleys/prams. But they don't offer a service which would allow me to get a bus and work in Kendal, for example. Or to get the Oxenholme trains early or later in the day. Or a regular daily service that would let me get up to any of the Settle Carlisle stations. And, as far as Kendal is concerned, Western Dales run Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday

and Saturday. Monday and Friday are a Westmorland and Furness service often using minibuses with a reduced timetable. Given all this, I thought it would be interesting to research how well Sedbergh is served in comparison to other comparable settlements in our area.

First off – Settle. Population wise it is similar, 2,564 people in Settle in 2011, 2,765 in Sedbergh. Settle, though, is on (well, bypassed by) a major road, the A65. Monday to Friday about 10 buses a day travel down towards Skipton, with 6 going the other way towards Kirkby Lonsdale (where there are links onward to Kendal and Lancaster). Approximately 7 services a day (M-F) run between Horton and Clitheroe,

stopping at Settle on the way. At weekends a passenger can head over to Malham and the Dales Bus runs a Sunday service up the Ribble Valley to Hawes and on to Middlesborough!

Fine, I get it. Settle is on that main road, is a significant tourist attraction in itself, and has a station on the railway. It's not a fair comparison is it?

Somewhere a bit closer to home then? How about Hawes – population in 2011 - 887? During the week the Little White Bus runs 6 services a day between Garsdale Head Station and Gayle between 8.50 and 18.25. You could even go somewhere by bus and train and get back the same day! If Sedbergh and Oxenholme had a similar link, I would have been able to use it for a weekly commute to London.

In addition to the Garsdale service there is a service running all the way down Wensleydale to Leyburn, starting at 6:50am in school term (or 8.15am during holidays) and returning 17.20. Possible to have a job in one of the other villages in the Dale? Or somewhere on the Settle Carlisle line?

What about the old county town of Westmorland – Appleby? Population over 3000 and again with a railway station, so a rail connection up to Carlisle. It also has bus services up to Penrith and down to Kirkby Stephen running weekdays, 6 a day in each direction. It is still designated with the 563 number, a truncated version of the service Sedbergh recently lost. They start early in the morning – 6.04am and run on until 8.07 in the evening. Again, if I were living there and working, it would broaden my options for employment without needing to resort to a car.

I also browsed my way through the timetables of the other obvious candidates for comparison, Kirkby Stephen and Kirkby Lonsdale. They both have significantly better services than we do (i.e. connections to railway stations, and to major centres of population). Both have smaller populations than Sedbergh but both are on busier roads than we are. But you could live in either, work elsewhere, and get to work by public transport. Ok, I know I'm labouring the work elsewhere point, but if you can do that you can also shop, and get around as a tourist. Assuming they are not limited to 16 seater

Though, to be fair some of the services mentioned above run using 16 seater minibuses (the Little White Bus and the Dales Bus, for example) with the same limitations as the Sedbergh Service.

The replacement for the 563 service, which ran for the past year from Kendal to Penrith via Sedbergh, is a collection of routes run by Western Dales Bus, along with Monday and Friday buses run by Westmorland and Furness Council, all grouped together under the designation S1. The newly formed Sedbergh and District Transport User Group is now monitoring the S1 and within a month or so of its initiation have witnessed several incidents of full buses where passengers have not been able to get on. It has also noted that some people from Sedbergh make the round journey to Dent without alighting, to ensure that when the bus goes onward to Kendal they have a seat. Other passengers have reported that they can no longer use the service due to accessibility problems. Please let the User Group know about your experiences if anything has affected your ability to use the bus, or even what it would take to get you to use the bus regularly. The User Group need to collect evidence so we can present it to the council and bus operators in discussions as to how we can improve the service. CHRISTIAN AID WEEK IN SEDBERGH AND DISTRICT

It doesn't seem long since our Coffee Morning in March and our national Christian Aid Week is starting soon, running from Monday the 11th to Sunday 18th May inclusive. Locally, we intend to once again have a coffee morning in St Andrew's Church Room on Weds 14th from 9.30am. There will be a cake stall and raffle there and envelopes for donations will be circulated. Many will be delivered through letterboxes but if you don't receive one and would like to donate then envelopes will be available in our local churches. As in the past year or two, it will be a challenge to

go from house to house collecting them and it is often not appropriate, so please just drop the envelopes off in St Andrew's Church or at the TIC, 72 Main St, Sedbergh or, if you know them, with your local distributer. They can also be handed in at the Wednesday Coffee Morning.

Each year Christian Aid brings a particular area of work to focus on during the Christian Aid week and this year it is in Guatemala. The following section produced by Christian Aid gives particular detail of their work there:

"Uncertainty looms over Indigenous farming communities in the Alta Verapaz region of Guatemala, Central America.

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In this forested area of mountains and rivers, the livelihoods, traditions and very survival of farmers and their families are threatened by deadly droughts, savage storms and monster monoculture plantations.

That includes Amelia, a resourceful and determined 24-year-old farmer who lives with her husband and their two children, 8-year-old Lázaro and 4-year-old Yakelin, on ancient and beautiful land that's been in Amelia's family for generations.

The family belong to the Indigenous Q'eqchi' community, who are close, and live by a blend of Mayan and Catholic traditions.

Amelia's farm, first and foremost, feeds her young children. She tries to grow a range of crops and root vegetables that will provide her children with a balanced diet, such as bananas, peppers and cassava. This way, Amelia can protect them from malnutrition.

But the climate crisis is ravaging farms like Amelia's, causing both the dry and rainy seasons that would once arrive with predictability to intensify and shift erratically. As the river runs dry and water becomes scarce, the vital crops that Amelia depends on wither and die before her eyes. Amelia's ability to protect Lázaro and Yakelin is slipping away. Because dying crops means food stops.

'My first priority is to feed my family,' says Amelia. 'I worry about what my children will eat.'

These conditions are challenging enough, but Amelia and her community also have to cope with the impact of industrial plantations on their landscape.

Amelia's community, like so many others, have done little to cause the climate crisis but they are paying the highest price.

Despite these challenges, Amelia's faith keeps her strong. And her hope for a better future drives her to keep working to improve life for her family and community.

'I go to Catholic church,' she explains. 'For me, faith is very



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www.jjmartinfunerals.co.uk info@jjmartinfunerals.co.uk important, and a way for me to reach harmony in my life.'

As the community's farms are devastated, the search for solutions becomes critical. 'With high heat, there is little we can do but adapt,' says Amelia.

When Amelia discovered the work of Christian Aid's partner, Congcoop, she quickly put herself forward as a community representative who would attend the specialist agricultural training on offer.

With funding from Christian Aid, Congcoop support communities to return to Indigenous farming practices and adopt agroecological approaches that conserve their land, culture and livelihood. Agroecology, put simply, is farming in a sustainable way that works with, not against, nature.

By joining Congcoop, Amelia's gaining the skills and knowledge to cultivate native seeds that are better suited to the changing climate. She's planning planting schedules that will deliver multiple harvests throughout the year, making her own organic fertiliser, and constructing rainwater collection systems. By changing the way she farms, Amelia's pushing back against the climate crisis.


Amelia is recognised as a leader in her community. Whatever she learns, she shares – confidently training other women to adapt their farming practices too.


Whatever the future may hold, Amelia remains resilient. As

CORNERSTONE COMMUNITY CHURCH PASTORAL TEAM

On March 26th we were joined by Penny Giles, Local Services Manager for South Cumbria and North Lancashire Alzheimer's Society. She was accompanied by her colleague Liz who had recently been appointed as the local adviser.

Penny began by giving some information regarding diagnostics. In reality 8,000 people in Cumbria will have dementia of one sort or another but only 4,800 will have a diagnosis. By 2030 it is predicted this will rise to 11,500 and owing to Government

reducing the funding this will have a huge ripple effect.

There are over 100 diseases of the brain. Some of the signs to look out for are; the ability to sort yourself, i.e. meals; daily functioning; poor short-term memory (although this is something we can also experience without dementia!).

We were then presented with a very useful hand-out showing bookshelves with the stages of life and progression of dementia. Basically the 2 areas of our brain which Penny focused on that store memories are the HIPPOCAMPUS and AMYGDALA. The hippocampus stores events and facts, logic and reason; the amygdala, feelings and emotional memories. As we journey through life the shelves can gradually empty during dementia, from a normal brain to early-stage dementia, on through middle stage and finally late-stage.

By the time late-stage dementia has developed the shelves have all

collapsed in the hippocampus region but in the amygdala childhood and teenage years are intact with middle age and adulthood emptying.

We were encouraged to try and understand the difficulties people have by focusing on the feelings they may encounter on the emotional level rather than the logic and reason.

One illustration which several of us found helpful was that if a person appears to "wander" they are in fact looking for an emotional point in their lives. Maybe a childhood home or another place which was special for one reason or another.

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Finance, Amenities, and general correspondence. This included the latest information on the new Bus/Transport User Group, a planned community project at Queen's Garden (Sedbergh YFC) and BT Phone Kiosk consultation on proposed removal.

LIZZI'S COLUMN

As I continue to represent the residents of Sedbergh and support you with local issues, there is one issue which continues to be raised with me. That is the loss of a local bus service in town.

The 563 service ended in March, and I know this has impacted connectivity for residents in Sedbergh. The closure of this service leaves your community with only a 16-seater bus to transport you to Kendal, often leaving residents unable to get on an already full bus. Plus, if a wheelchair or pram is on board that reduces the capacity to 14

Following contact from residents, I have spoken regularly with Westmorland and Furness Council to push them for a better bus service in the area and to spend a proportionate amount of the £4.2m given to the council by the Government for bus service improvements in Sedbergh and District.

I have also met with Sedbergh Economic Partnership who have told me about the issues caused by the lack of transport and how this is impacting the economic situation in the town. For example, local businesses tell me they struggle to hire staff due to the inaccessibility of the town for those who do not have a car

Back in March I attended the first meeting of the Sedbergh Bus Users group. I had suggested to the Parish Clerk and interested residents that this would be a good start to address bus issues in the long term, based on my experience in Lancaster District. I know residents have felt frustration at the lack of communication with the council and a bus user's group allows residents to build long term relationships with the council and bus operators and to advocate for reliable services.

The meeting was very well attended at least 20 residents coming to raise their concerns around bus services in the area. I was pleased to attend (although embarrassingly I'd got the time wrong and was a bit late!) and I look forward to hearing more about how this group will progress moving forward.

At the meeting, I spoke about my experience as a member of

Lancaster District Bus Users Group, which covers the southern part of the constituency. This group has had some great results and meets regularly to advocate for services in the Lancaster District region. During the meeting in Sedbergh I suggested that a chairperson be elected so that a working relationship can then be established with the council and other relevant parties.

I have seen firsthand how successful bus user groups can be in representing passengers' needs and working with operators and authorities to address concerns and secure better transport.


In national bus news, new legislation currently passing through Parliament should also improve the

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situation in Sedbergh. The Bus Services Bill focuses on removing barriers which currently limit bus franchising powers and empowering local authorities to deliver better buses faster. These new franchising powers will allow councils to deliver networks that work for local and rural communities. During my conversations with Westmorland and Furness Council, I have urged them to take up franchising powers so that the community in Sedbergh can have a regular, decent bus service.



COMMUNITY TREE GROUP

Several years ago, The Children's Wood group was formed to plant trees around the Sedbergh area. A group of volunteers formed with Peter Apps, Barbara Hartley and Carolyn Flood taking on the organising and running. Last year they felt the need to step away from those roles but wished to stay on as volunteers. The group reformed as the Sedbergh Community Tree Group with Geoff and Evelyn Pardoe continuing the work of administration and organising, with much appreciated help and support from Peter, Carolyn and Barbara.

Since November we have been busy most weeks planting a variety of trees in several locations. We meet on a Wednesday 11am-1pm, weather permitting. There is a substantial group of volunteers who come along and help when they can. It is completely on a 'come if you can' basis as people have all sorts of other commitments. There is absolutely no obligation to help each week, it is very flexible.

The trees come from The Woodland Trust and Conservation Volunteers as whips twice a year, and they are free to schools and local community groups. They are all UK grown and come in native tree packs consisting of a selection of rowan, downy birch, crab apple, blackthorn and several other species. The eligibility criterion is that everyone should benefit so the trees are planted on publicly accessible land, not on private domestic property.

You may have noticed in the press that there is a national push to

increase the British woodland coverage. There is a legally binding government pledge to increase the English canopy to 16.5% of total land area by 2050. All around the country groups are planting large and small patches of woodland. They become important areas for storing carbon, mitigating against flooding and soil erosion, and providing wildlife corridors which should help our much -depleted bird, insect and butterfly populations. Nationally almost half a million trees have been planted this winter in partnership with the National Trust and UK government funded projects, creating woodlands, hedgerows and orchards which will create more space for wildlife and diversity.

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Most of you will have seen scores of plastic tubes around the area. This is a contentious issue. The Woodland Trust are working to find a biodegradable alternative but so far nothing has been successful. Our group does aftercare and tube recycling. We go back to previously planted sites to weed around the trees which encourages their development, and where necessary we remove guards and sticks which go to be recycled.

The Sedbergh Community Tree Group is now in a situation where we require land to plant the trees next season, which runs from October to March. The land has to be stock proof to prevent damage from sheep and cows. We aim to cover areas from Dent, Killington, Garsdale, Sedbergh and Cautley but would consider other options if they weren't too difficult to access. It could be reinstating hedges or planting in areas of unproductive land, we have alder and willow that like damp areas. This winter we have also helped land owners plant their own hedgerow whips, infilling established hedges where trees have failed and planting new hedges.

Our motto is 'we plant trees' and we're looking forward to doing so in October!



SEDBERGH COMMUNITY SWIFTS

The wonderful dry and sunny weather in March and early April certainly put us all in the mood for spring. As we write this in mid-April, swifts have indeed been sighted in a few places in the UK. However that is very early and now that it's cold again it is worrying that these insectivores will find enough food to sustain them.

Let us know when you see your first swift - generally from the first week of May onwards. The first swifts to arrive are the breeding birds, which go straight back to the exact same site that they occupied for previous years. The younger non-breeders arrive a little later, towards the end of May – these are the birds that you may be trying to attract to your nest boxes. So if you have installed attraction callers, that is the time to set them going (on timers).

We urge everyone to look out for swifts at Rauthey Meadows – the new houses opposite Close's garage – to hopefully see if any fly around or even use the nest holes incorporated high up in the walls in many of the homes. The great thing about swifts is that, unlike swallows and house martins, they are not messy birds. In fact they are the perfect house guests – do not do any damage to

the property, don't enter the building itself, and are only here for 3 months!

Distinguishing birds is often down to the 'jizz'. Jizz is a birding term used to describe a bird's 'vibe', the overall impression and character using shape, proportions, movement etc. and considering the habitat and location. It is their behaviour and how they fly. The term first appeared in print in a Manchester Guardian Country Diary column in 1921: for example, if you see someone walking far ahead of you but cannot recognise their features or clothes, you can often tell who it is by the way they walk, stand or general manner. This is their jizz. To identify a bird it can take a while to get the hang of and like most things, with time and patience it gets easier.

A reminder Swifts, swallows and house martins: What's the difference?

- · Swallows and martins have white patches, which you may glimpse as they twist and turn in the air, especially the white rump of house martin. So if you catch sight of any white, then it's not a swift.
- Because of their tiny legs, swifts cannot perch – a bird on a wire is never a swift.

Nesting habits:

- Swallows nest inside buildings, in outhouses and barns, on ledges and beams.
- House martins make cup-shaped mud nests on the outside of buildings high up under the eaves.
- So both these birds can be seen. on the nest.
- Swifts however are never seen on the nest, as they are hidden from

view within the eaves, or in crevices in walls

DENTDALE HEAD TO FOOT "Caring for Carers"

Our meeting on 4th March had a very interesting talk from Nicola Crawford of Sedbergh, a volunteer for "Carer Support South Lakes" (CSSL).

They cover an enormous geographical area from Harrogate to Kirkby Lonsdale and Dent to Longsleddale and estimate that within this area of 100,000 population there are 12,500 carers of which 3,000 are young carers; all undertaking their roles with little help from the state and in many cases with no help from the state. CSSL is an independent charity which is funded mainly by donations and some funding from the local authority, plus a great deal of volunteer input, which ranges from,

- First assessments required to give the level of service needed,
- Emergency care for the carer when sudden difficulties arise,
- 1 to 1 support,
- · Counselling,
- A sitting service of up to 3 hours to enable a break from caring to be undertaken,
- A volunteer monthly phone call support of about 30 minutes

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Our next meeting is on Friday, May 2nd when John Bentley, an author and photographer, will be presenting, "Hill Farming in the North of England", so do come along and join us for the small cost of £2.50 to hear what will be a very interesting talk!

Sue has been a keen member of the Fell Pony Society since about 1972. Fell ponies originate from this district, believed to have been here since the ice-age. They were previously referred to as the Galloway horse, with the first reference to fell pony being made in the Westmorland Gazette in October 1853, when reporting from Dent Horse Fair. The ponies are a hardy, native breed with many uses including shepherding, transporting goods, pit ponies, racing, forestry, war, endurance riding and being ridden by royalty. The late Queen had the ponies involved in a procession for her 90th birthday, at her platinum jubilee, and at her funeral, to name but a few. More recently they have been used for conservation work, including fixing the fells. There are only about 6500 ponies worldwide and are classed as a rare/heritage breed. There are more than 20 breeders in Cumbria and North Lancashire.

Tanya thanked Sue for a very informative and enthusiastic talk. The raffle was won by Steph, and the competition for a favourite brooch was won by Dilys with Tanya second.

What a lovely afternoon! Wall to wall sunshine with a cooling breeze and a really fun gathering of friends. As is usual, we started our meeting with the main topic for the day. This time it was to discuss the "Resolution", namely the theme which has been selected as the main subject for the WI throughout the nation to concentrate on for the forthcoming year. Shall we at Killington WI support this resolution or not? We must decide today! The title we have been given reads as follows: "BYSTANDERS CAN BE LIFESAVERS. There are over 30.000 out-of-hospital cardiac arrests a year

in the UK, and fewer than one in ten people survive. Women have a lower chance of surviving than men. Early cardiopulmonary resuscitation [CPR] and defibrillation can more than double the chances of survival. We call upon WI members to work together to increase public confidence and training in the delivery of CPR and to work with local organisations to help improve access to defibrillators in their communities to give every person the best chance of surviving a cardiac arrest." I have to say that I, for one, felt rather smug and superior when I read this. Our Killington WI raised money to purchase a defibrillator back in 2015, and we have paid for its upkeep ever since. It is mounted on the wall by the side entrance of The People's Hall. We have had our splendid First Responders to one of our meetings to show us how to perform CPR. In Sedbergh and Dent there are several other defibrillators and our community seems well aware of their importance. We decided unanimously to support this resolution and to help other communities to develop their own schemes. We all learnt some extra facts during our discussions. One surprising fact is that over a third of men worry that delivering CPR to a woman could cause them to be accused of "inappropriate touching". Some of us worried that as fairly ancient folk we lack both the flexibility and the strength necessary to carry out CPR.

Then it was on to the second part of our meeting which was described in our programme as "members reading a piece of literature that they like, such as a saying, or poem, or a quote from a book, and explaining its importance to them". We had wondered whether we would have sufficient contributors to occupy and entertain us but, my goodness, we needn't have worried. We soon decided that if we didn't pause soon then we would not have time for tea. so we combined a most delicious repast with superb readings. Coffee cake, chocolate cake, and superior biscuits. Let me reassure you that readers were not allowed to speak with their mouths full! 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sophisticated hooked ones used for creating rugs made from wool. Many different materials can be used and Sue frequently visits charity shops to source materials for her work. She showed us many different pieces of work, not only rugs or mats for the floor, but wall hangings and wreaths all made out of old cast-off materials. One of her most treasured projects was being asked to make a new Coat of Arms for the Lord Mayor of Kendal. Then the challenging part of the evening arrived. Sue had asked that tables and seating be arranged so that we members could have a go at rag rugging. She provided us with pieces of hessian, proddies (a simple half a wooden clothes peg) and lots of different pieces of material and

encouraged us all to have a go. As you can imagine there was a lot of chatter, giggles and surprisingly, periods of silence, whilst fifteen ladies studiously began to create their own pieces of work. NOTES FROM DENT STATION

All is well at England's' highest mainline station as we make steady progress through some of the maintenance jobs that need doing. In particular, local stalwart Ken McClurg has made good use of the new petrol strimmer and we have cut back the dense vegetation which seems to grow if left unchecked, and the daffodils can be seen at their best. But there is another purpose. It allows the wildflowers to grow in their profusion later in the season and we look forward to a spectacle in a couple of months. The land to the front of the station is ungrazed apart from the occasional 4-legged visitor!

On the railways, services have performed reasonably well throughout March with very few delays or cancellations. However, I don't wish to jinx things! Any cancellation can cause tremendous inconvenience with such long service gaps in the timetable and particularly the long contested 4-hour gap in the afternoon.

However, we are quickly approaching the busy season when more and more passengers naturally wish to use the trains. It will come as no surprise that a major part of the usage of the railway is for leisure purposes these days, although we



would very much like to see more use for commuting and longer distance travel. The railway can do all of these things but, as we have often said, the timetable is not ideal. On that we can expect no significant change in the May timetable but can but hope for improvements in December.

But as many will know from reading these pages, we are often handicapped by carriage availability and, with the aged 158 diesel multiple units on which we rely in short supply, this doesn't get any easier. Whilst we are promised that as from the start of April carriage formations would be increased for the summer period, experience for the first few days of the month has been variable, but we shall cross our fingers. Replacement trains are unlikely to arrive until way after 2030, and some industry commentators suggest 2035, so some way off. These will be multi-modal, that is able to run electricity or diesel. The trains will have capacity to have the diesel engines replaced at some point as more environmentally friendly technologies come available.

Train services were suspended as between Skipton and Appleby for two



weekends in early April in order to allow the reconnection of Horton Quarry which, of course, we very much support. Once operational, the trains will remove a considerable number of lorries from the roads with environmental benefits, but, of course, it adds to the viability of the railway which has seen a decline in freight in recent years. Possibly, some of this traffic will return with the temporary closures of the West Coast Main Line, and the possible desire to eliminate slower moving trains from that route. Whilst slight longer in distance, the route via the Settle-Carlisle takes around the same time due to the fact that trains are not diverted into passing loops guite as often. The new footbridge constructed at Horton as a necessary consequence of the quarry connection has been in use for some months, but rather ironically still

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awaits the installation of lifts, its main purpose, but which we believe will occur later on in the year.

Meanwhile, it was sad to see the end of the Monday-Friday 563 bus service from Kirkby Stephen to Kendal via Sedbergh. Whilst not perfect I always regarded the councilsupported Stagecoach service as a stepping stone to something better. Decent public transport is undoubtedly essential for a community to thrive along with housing and employment. It cannot be assumed that everybody has access to a car, although for many this is a necessity of living in the Dales. For those without they can be effectively disenfranchised from economic, education, welfare and leisure opportunities. I am thinking particularly about the young, elderly and disabled whilst for some, not to drive might be a personal choice.

It was great to see a good turn-out for the inauguration of the bus user group at Cornerstones, and it is quite clear that public transport is an issue that will affect many residents. Please participate in the passenger survey and also the data gathering for passenger numbers. Data is a powerful tool and can make for a compelling argument. Indeed, it is clear the needs of the community are varied from travel to work to having a

full day out which most of the services have not thus far permitted.

But back to the here and now. The Saturday S1 Western Dales Bus continues to provide a vital link from Dent Station (the highest bus-rail interchange in the country) to Dent village, Sedbergh and Kendal, the first bus meeting the 1047 northbound train to Carlisle in the morning and returning for the 1732 southbound train in the late afternoon. This gives a fantastic opportunity for a day out in Carlisle, departing at 0958 from Sedbergh Post Office to Dent Station and then hop on the train to Carlisle. This would involve returning on the 1618 train from Carlisle to catch the bus from Dent Station back to Sedbergh.

Meanwhile, the Western Dales Bus will provide a Sedbergh to Kendal service Tuesday to Thursday, augmented with a local authority community bus on Mondays and Fridays. A service to Kirkby Stephen will operate on Tuesday, Thursday and Friday. Please check www.westerndalesbus.co.uk for bus running and times.

Just over the hill the summer Sunday DalesBus timetable comes

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Mob: 07796 544596 Tel: 015396 20930 into full swing with a number of services passing through Hawes. I know not entirely convenient for Sedbergh, but for those of a more outdoor persuasion there are some excellent opportunities for linear walks, perhaps parking at one of the calling points. The 857 runs from Garsdale Station to Castle Bolton and might be quite useful, whilst the 830 runs from Ribblehead via Hawes and a spectacular route over Buttertubs Pass to Richmond.

The single bus fare cap of £3 now runs until the end of 2025 and, in the majority of cases, this will reflect a significant saving. Also, for regular rail journeys it is well worth purchasing a Dales Railcard (currently £10), providing a 1/3 discount off the on-the-day ticket price for journeys between Leeds, Bradford, Carlisle, and Morecambe (via Bentham), and will quickly prove its worth. These are available to residents within the qualifying post codes from Appleby, Carlisle, Settle, or Skipton Stations, or by application to the Settle Carlisle Railway Development Company via their website.

SEDBERGH SCHOOL'S 450TH BIRTHDAY

As Sedbergh School is celebrating the 500th year of its foundation this year, I am sharing a selection of local news items reporting its 450th anniversary back in May 1975.

Sedbergh, the boys' public school which dominates the small market town on the edge of the Yorkshire Dales, celebrates its 450th anniversary this year. And next weekend the Archbishop of Canterbury, the Most Rev. Dr Donald Coggan, will join parents and the 440 pupils to commemorate this milestone in the school's distinguished history. It is a history of growth from a small foundation for the education of local boys to one of the most noted schools in the North of England.

The founder in 1525 was Sedbergh -born Roger Lupton, who became provost of Eton and a Canon of Windsor. As he approached the end of his life, he set up his Chantry School and installed a priest "for the maintaining and increase of virtue and learning in Christ's Church and for his soul's health". The priest,



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Henry Clomeyr, was the first of 25 headmasters. The present head is Mr G.M.C. Thornely, who retires in July after 14 years as assistant master and 21 years as head. In a tribute to Mr Thornely, the chairman of governors, Mr J.O. Blair-Cunynghame, said he had been at the school for 35 years, during which time 3,000 boys had passed through his hands. Mr Thornely had wide interests, but teaching was very important. The late Mr J.H. Bruce-Lockhart thought Mr Thornely was one of the best teachers he had ever

known. His sense of humour and warm sympathy had been of great benefit to Sedbergh, as had been his sense of purpose, perception and understanding of young people. The governors have appointed Mr Peter Attenborough (37), at present at Uppingham School, and he would be welcomed as head in September.

Two Archbishops of Canterbury have been associated with Sedbergh School. The first, Thomas Cranmer, was burnt at the stake four years after signing the school's charter in 1552; the second, Dr Donald

Coggan, received a warm welcome when he and Mrs Coggan attended the school's 450th anniversary at the weekend. Dr Coggan is no stranger to the school, which is set in the beautiful countryside of East Cumbria. He was a school governor during his 13 years as Archbishop of York, and a frequent visitor to Sedbergh, the north western outpost of the Diocese, when Bishop of Bradford from 1956 to 1961.

During the office of the present headmaster, Sedbergh has undertaken an extensive building programme. New laboratories have gone up for physics and chemistry, and there is now a combined block for biology, mathematics and economics. A music school has been built, and substantial extensions and improvements have been carried out to all seven boarding houses. An appeal launched in 1971 raised £276,000, which has financed an outdoor swimming pool, a miniature range, extensions to the chapel and a projects centre.

The anniversary programme of events has been planned over three days, starting on Friday evening with a performance of Benjamin Britten's Noye's Fludde by members of the staff, school and pupils from other local schools. The opera will be repeated on Saturday afternoon and again in the evening. On Saturday morning the Archbishop of Canterbury will formally open the new projects centre. This will be followed

On Sunday the Archbishop will celebrate Holy Communion at Sedbergh Parish Church, and later in the morning he will preach the sermon at a service of thanksgiving in the school chapel.

After opening the school's new projects centre on Saturday, Dr and Mrs Coggan mingled with boys, parents and staff at a luncheon reception in marquees on the sundrenched lawn. At the reception, one boy who was most reluctant to meet his mother was 14-year-old Mark Parker, who beat a hasty retreat from the Evans House section of the marquees when he saw the hat that

she was wearing. It was an attractive creation which caught the eye of our photographer but, after hearing his friends' comments, an embarrassed Mark disappeared to the sanctuary of his House. "I am the biggest embarrassment to my son because of my hat", said Mrs Ann Parker of Sheriff Hutton, near York. "Somebody said: 'Look at this mother coming in' and when Mark realised it was me he walked away, hoping his friends would not realise it was his mother", she added. Robert Downs, 16, of Lupton House, who plays the trombone in the school orchestra and is studying maths, physics and chemistry, had lunch with his mother. Mrs Janeth Downs, and sister Ruth. 19, of The Manor House, Embsay,



near Skipton. "I enjoy life here and I don't think there is anything better than a public school education", said Robert. His mother commented: "I absolutely love coming here. My brother was at the school so I have been coming for a long time".

The head of school, Mark Whitcher from Leicester, leaves Sedbergh at the end of term after five years, with sights of an Army career. "I have enjoyed my stay at Sedbergh, and having been part of a public school, I would never want to see them go", said Mark, who hopes to train as an officer at Sandhurst. Preparing the chicken legs, bowls of rice, chicken, prawns and sweetcorn and fruit tarts topped with fresh cream for the boys of Evans House and their parents were Mrs May Penny and Mrs Isabel Mitchell. "I think there will be enough but you can never tell. Some boys wander from one house dining area to another", said Mrs Penny.



SEDBERGH HISTORY SOCIETY Anna Letitia Barbauld

Following the AGM the President of the Society, Professor Fox, gave a interesting talk on a relatively unknown lady, Anna Letitia Barbauld, noting that this year was the 200th anniversary of her death. She was perhaps the North's first "Blue Stocking".

She was a noted essayist and poet, but throughout the Victorian period she was really only known as the "good" Mrs Barbauld who wrote books for children in which she tried to see things through the eyes of children. But recently she has begun to be rehabilitated in feminist circles. Her claim to come from the North is that she was brought up till the age of fifteen in Leicester until her father taught at the Warrington Academy, a short lived Unitarian University for those who would not accept the 39 Articles of the Church of England and were thus excluded from the Universities. As a girl she could not attend the Academy but absorbed the teaching, and eventually married a student of Huguenot descent. They went to live in Suffolk and then London.

She was a follower of Joseph Priestly (one of the discoverers of oxygen) who was a supporter of the French Revolution, at least in its early years, and taught at the Warrington Academy. He did not reject the Bible but thought it should be read rationalliy.

In London she joined Mrs Montague's salon group which became known as the Blue Stockings, possibly because of a man who came in blue stockings which contrasted with the black ones of high society, Among others who attended the salon were Angelica Kaufman and Elizabeth Sheriden. Anna appears in at least two paintings of Mrs Montague's circle. In 1811 she published an antiwar poem which said war was a waste of life. and that had a theme of the decline of Britain and that the future lav with America. This wasn't treated kindly and was treated dismissively. It was held to be typical of female writing in the Nineteenth century, a century in which the Napoleonic code downgraded the status of women. However she was honoured by the Unitarians when she died in 1825.

Fifth Fire in Ten Months

Kendal CID are making inquiries following the fifth fire in ten months at a Sedbergh restaurant. A milkman on his rounds in the early hours of Friday morning spotted the latest blaze near a central heating fuel storage tank at the rear of the Epicure Restaurant, Main Street. The flames ignited nearby dustbins but did not spread to the building where the proprietor, Mr Frank Kerfoot, was asleep in bed. Firemen from Kendal and Sedbergh found diesel oil spurting from a crack in the fuel line



linking the 600-gallon tank to the building. Last September a fire started beneath the same feed-line and spread to a window frame, again while the Kerfoot family were asleep in bed. Mr Kerfoot said then that the oil pipe had been deliberately severed.

Celebrating at Killington

A well- known Killington couple celebrated their Diamond Wedding anniversary on Tuesday. They are Mr and Mrs R. Capstick, of Grassriggs. Richard, 84, and Martha, 82, were married at Howgill Church on April 15, 1915, and have lived in the area ever since. In fact, Mr Capstick's parents also celebrated their diamond wedding at Grassriggs. Mr Capstick was born at Stangerthwaite, Killington, and has spent the whole of his working life in farming. A lifelong member of the NFU, he was also a founder member of the old Sedbergh Hedging and Walling Association now incorporated with the Sedbergh Sports Committee - and both his sons and grandsons have kept up the family's stone-walling tradition. In his youth he was also a keen angler. Although born at Penrith, Mrs Capstick was brought up at Howgill.

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She is a founder member, and still an active one, of Killington WI. She has been vice-president, press secretary, and was the treasurer for 17 years. Inundated with good wish cards from friends and relations all over the UK, parts of Europe and even Argentina, they also received telegrams of congratulations from Her Majesty the Queen and Mr Michael Jopling, the MP for Westmorland. Both Mr and Mrs Capstick are in good health, and a family celebration was held at the Epicure Restaurant, Sedbergh, in the evening. They have a daughter, two sons, and two grandsons.

Dent Village Effort

The bridegroom, a farmer, is the only son of Mr and Mrs Norman Hoggarth of Ruecrofts, Howgill, Sedbergh, and the bride is the younger daughter of Mr and Mrs Gerald Buckley of Lowfield Cottage, Sedbergh. She is employed at Barclays Bank in Sedbergh. Given away by her father, the bride wore a long white classic gown trimmed with guipure lace. A long veil was held by a flowered headdress and she carried deep pink rosebuds and stephanotis. Well-known Garsdale Methodist dies at 71

Mrs Mary Jane ("Jeannie") Mason, of Rose Cottage, Garsdale, died recently at the home of her elder son in Kendal, aged 71. One of a family of 13, she was the youngest daughter of the late Mr and Mrs R. Bracken, and was born in Liverpool. In 1905 the family moved to Dent and

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

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subsequently to Garsdale in 1910. After leaving school she was employed in domestic service. In June 1927, she was married at Garsdale Church to Mr G.E. Mason by the Rev. R. Badrick, the last vicar to live in the village. A lifelong Methodist, she had been organist at Low Smithy Chapel for about 59 years, and relief organist at Garsdale Street Chapel for over 40 years. On numerous occasions she had also been organist at the Parish Church. A member of Garsdale Fellowship, and lead soprano with the Garsdale Gospel Singers for 45 years, she had accompanied the group on their engagements throughout the dales and to Sedbergh and Millthrop for 35

vears without a break. Mrs Mason had been a member of Garsdale Mothers' Union and a former governor of Settlebeck School. Her family and her faith were her chief interests, and apart from her music she also enjoyed knitting, crochet and reading. Like her close friend, Mrs Constance Harper, whose funeral preceded hers by a day, she was ever ready to lend a helping hand. Recently she had given testimony at a special service at Hawes Junction Chapel for a television documentary, "The Dale That Died". She had been aware of the terminal nature of her illness for about a year, and had made detailed arrangements for her funeral. What

she did not foresee was that it would be televised. Quite by chance, a Yorkshire TV film unit were in the area filming the entire spectrum of life and death in the dales, and asked permission to televise the funeral, which was granted. So great was the esteem in which Mrs Mason was held that the country chapel was filled to overflowing at the funeral service which was conducted by the Rev. H.S. Hills, assisted by the vicar, Canon D.A. Rogers. The service was relayed by loudspeakers to those outside. The organist was Mrs Ruth Jackson of Crosby Ravensworth. Mrs Mason, whose husband died in 1967. is survived by two sons. Interment was at Garsdale Low Smithy Chapel vard.

TV LICENSE PAYMENT

I was talking to my mum about the cost of TV licences the other day, and she said she hadn't bought one for a long time because it was too expensive. Will she get into trouble if she gets caught?

Yes, everyone who watches, records or downloads live TV, or BBC iPlayer, on any device (even a phone) has to have a TV licence by law. From 1 April 2025, the cost is £174.50 a year. Enforcement officers can carry out checks and visit homes to verify if a licence is needed. If you are caught, you can be prosecuted and fined up to £1,000 plus costs.

However, if your mum belongs to certain groups of people, or is struggling financially, there is help available. If she is over 75 and getting Pension Credit, she will receive a free licence. Contact Citizens Advice for help with claiming Pension Credit. Blind or severely sight impaired individuals receive a 50% discount. If your mum is in residential care or sheltered accommodation, there is a concessionary licence of £7.50 – the Care Manager will have information on this.

There is also a Simple Payment Plan, which offers flexible fortnightly or monthly plans to spread the cost of a licence over 12 months. This is only available for specific customers in

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financial difficulty, but South Lakes Citizens Advice can make referrals.

SOME WALKS AROUND SEDBERGH

WINDER 3.4 miles, 1150 ft, 1.5-2.5 hrs

Sedbergh's own little Matterhorn with great views of the surrounding fells and dales. (Walk 1)

THE CALF 8 miles 2600ft 4-5 hrs

A bracing ridge walk over Arant Haw and Calders to the highest point in the Howgills, . (Walk 1)

FARFIELD MILL 3.7-4.4 miles, 2-3 hrs

Fairly flat walk partly by the riverside, with the added advantage of the Farfield Café half way around. (Walk 2)

AKAY WOODS 2.3 miles 1 - 1.5 hrs

Lovely riverside stretches, past the restored Pepperpot, then through woods above the river, with vestigial remains of Akay House. (Walk 3)

SEDBERGH SCHOOL 45 mins

A stroll to see the sights of Sedbergh School (Walk 4).

FELL WALL 2.2 miles 1 - 1.3 hrs

Elevated promenade above Sedbergh Town, not as energetic as going to Winder top, but still out onto the edge of the open country. (Walk 6)

BRIGGFLATTS 4.2 miles 2-3 hrs.

Along the Rawthey to the peaceful and historic Quaker Meeting House, then back through the fields. (Walk 7)

DENT AND BACK 11.5 miles 1500 ft 4-5 hrs

Across the wild (and possibly wet) Long Moor to Dent then back by Dentdale and the River Dee. (Walk 8)

CAUTLEY SPOUT FROM CROSS KEYS 2.5 miles 1 - 1.5 hrs

A stroll across open country to the bottom of Cautley Spout. Some would say this is the second highest waterfall in Britain. (Walk 9)

CAUTLEY SPOUT AND BACK 10 miles 3150 feet 4.5 - 6.5 hours

Gorgeous walk up the dale to the Spout, with a return over the tops for the adventurous. (Walk 9)

MILLTHROP AND ABBOT HOLME 5.1 miles

920ft 2.5 - 3 hours. Up over Frostrow, down into Dentdale, to follow the Dee past the golf course, and back to Sedbergh. (Walk 10)

DALES WAY AND CRAGGSTONES. 7.5 miles

1165 ft 3 - 4 hrs. Follow the Dales Way beside the Rawthey and the Lune, then ascend past the waterfalls in Craggstones Wood, before a final stroll across the base of Winder. (Walk 11)
